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

On the 20th residually read they celebrated his 35th Birthday with family and mends

Born in Motherwell, Scotland, Fred was the 2nd youngest of 9 children and travelled with his family to Lithgow, New South Wales at the age of 2.

Later Fred's father purchased an apple orchard in nearby Hartley to provide work for his family during the depression years. Fred "batched" during the week (with his father who worked in Lithgow) so that he could attend school. At weekends the pair returned to do their share of the work on the family orchard. At the age of 13½ Fred left school for his first job at the "Log Cabin" milking cows, chopping wood, digging holes and emptying dunny pans. This earned him 10 "bob" a week. Later a neighbour offered Fred more money to milk cows and deliver milk to Lithgow. Fred worked there until he was 17. His brother then found him a job in Sydney working as a Clerk for the Dunlop Rubber Company. While in Sydney Fred took the opportunity

to study accountancy at night school and did National Service training in the Army. Whilst in the Army he was constantly in trouble so applied for a transfer to the Air Force where he flew Spitfires during the war.

In 1947 Fred married Dot and settled permanently in South Australia, they lived with their two daughters Sue and Kaye in Salisbury for many years until they felt it was becoming too built up. He eventually moved to a small property in the early 1970s on Shillabeer Road, One Tree Hill, this was to provide a safer venue for his daughter Kaye's horse riding pursuits. The house on their small farm was originally built by Allan Shillabeer.

Fred's love of horses always kept him busy. Showing was a family affair, Fred showing in harness classes and his daughter and granddaughters competing in other riding classes.

For over 30 years it was quite a convoy that would turn up to regional horse shows along with up to four or five horses. It is only in the last 10 years the family has retired from showing.

Fred for the past 25 years has resided on a property on the Gawler to One Tree Hill Road which he shares with his daughter Kaye and son in law lan. You can often see him about doing a good days work on the newly acquired tractor. We've also been told that he shares the cooking and always has some cookies for the great grandchildren who visit. Fred is also a major contributor for the Anzac Biscuits for the OTH Dawn Service.

To celebrate his 95th Birthday a surprise weekend away at Clare was organised by his family. He shared his birthday with his two daughters, Kaye and Sue, four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren, their families and of course his little dog, Buffy who is 14 years old. Congratulations Fred, all of One Tree Hill wish you many happy returns.



Shrove Tuesday

Tuesday 4th March is Shrove Tuesday, the day before the start of Lent. Most people these days make the effort to cook pancakes on this day. Here are a couple of recipes that you may like to try. This is a very old fashioned basic batter for pancakes, you can serve them with fresh fruit, cream, honey, maple syrup, lemon and sugar etc. the list is endless...

They are just too flippin good to resist! Try the Chocolate and Banana recipe and make Shrove Tuesday a day to remember!

You will need the following:

180grams of Butter, coarsely chopped

3 Eggs, separated

450ml Buttermilk

300grams (2 cups) Plain Flour

1 Teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

Fine Salt

Method: Melt 60grams butter in small saucepan over low heat, cool slightly, then combine in a large bowl with buttermilk and egg yolks and whisk until smooth. Sift over flour, bicarbonate of soda and 1 tsp fine salt, mix until smooth and combined. (do not overwork) Whisk egg whites and a pinch of salt in a separate large bowl until firm peaks form (about 2-3 minutes), then fold into the flour mixture. Melt 10gm butter in a large heavy-based frying pan over medium heat, add ¼ cupful's of pancake batter, allowing room for it to spread. Cook until bubbles appear on the surface and edges are golden (about 1-2 minutes). Turn with a wide spatula and cook until pancake is firm and base is golden (1-2 minutes), transfer to a plate and keep warm in a low oven. Wipe pan with absorbent paper between batches and repeat with remaining butter and batter. Enjoy.....

Chocolate and Banana Pancakes

Prepare as above but add the following to the mixture: 1
Teaspoon Vanilla Essence, 1
banana chopped, 2 tablespoons white sugar, ½ cup of chocolate chips. Cook as above and serve with extra banana and chocolate chips. This is sure to be a hit with young and old.





ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT MARCH 2014

These gifts do not go unnoticed and are greatly appreciated on the fire ground and during stand-by days. It certainly makes our tasks more rewarding knowing we have the support of the community.

We particularly thank the One Tree Hill Fodder Store for their ongoing support over a number of years.

Incident Report

It has been another busy month at the CFS with the usual calls in the local area and teams committed to the ongoing fires at Bangor and Eden Valley, as well as Crafers, Gumeracha and Chain of Ponds. We have had a number of stand-by days where the shed has been manned during the day in anticipation of adverse weather but fortunately there have been no significant local calls since the dam fire in mid-January.

The first couple of weeks of February have demonstrated the diverse range of call-outs the CFS can be involved in, from car roll overs, trees blocking roads, fighting fires in 40 degree heat and assisting the SES with flood relief.

The rain reminds us that the roads can become treacherous once they are wet, particularly after a long hot spell, and that situation is made worse by people who don't drive to the conditions. We have attended a number of accidents that occurred during the month and we are fortunate that there have not been more serious injuries.

On that subject, just a reminder that the speed limit when passing an emergency services vehicle with flashing blue and red lights is 40km per hour. You must also obey traffic directions given to you by an authorised person, in our case a CFS crew member, and it is not optional whether you obey a Stop/Slow sign.

Police attending accidents will report people for infringements of these rules.

The first rains may have come but it is not time to be complacent, the fuel load hasn't changed and a couple of warm dry days will see us back to the same fire danger situation.

If you don't have a Bushfire Action Plan please spend some time to make one now.

Councillor's Report March 2014

ouncil is now preparing to formulate its draft city plan i.e. what it wishes to provide or continue to provide or introduce as a new or "aspirated service". What does all this mean, simply how can the organisation/city grow, provide the services the city requires and in some cases wants, and how will you the ratepayer pay for it. Yes I am afraid its rate setting time and as always there will be an increase in rates to fund all these new initiatives. However in some cases some services will be reduced or ceased (e.g. those that have been funded externally or in conjunction with some government department) or as always (as has been the case for all the years I have been on Council) funding for Rural Road maintenance will be examined and as always I with the help of Councillor Craig will attempt to ensure that Rural roads continue to receive the attention they require.

This will not be an easy task as funding is limited and aspirated services have been the focus of staff attention for some time now. Unfortunately most of the discussions relating to the draft city plan will be closed to the public and confidential until a draft is formulated for a 21 day community consultation process. I will keep you updated on when the draft is released for consultation but usually this happens in between Grapevine deadlines and one ad will appear in some paper to notify ratepayers of their opportunity to have their say in relation to the draft plan.

On a non-Council related item, isn't it great to see some useful rain and cooler weather, pretty soon we will be complaining it is too cold but never too wet. As of the March edition the name of your local MP will change but the email address may remain the same?

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Horse Care - Lead Ropes

How strong does a rope have to be to lead a horse?

Strong enough so you will not break it, no matter how hard you pull. It is not about the strength of the horse. The limiting factor is YOUR strength. If you tie the rope to a 10 tonne truck and snap pull it as hard as you can (quick jerk) and it does not break, your horse will never break it while you are leading him. Why? Because you will be forced to let go before it breaks.

You need it to be strong enough that you can give him a sharp reprimand if he does not listen – the snap pull. But if that fails to stop him, you will be unable to stop him no matter how strong the rope.

How strong does a tie up rope need to be?

Depends on what you want to break first; the object he is tied to, the rope, his gear (halter etc), his neck. The horse that is tied to something solid, and then panics, will still break something. It may be the post, shed, gate he is tied to. It may be his neck. Something will break before he can calm down.

The horse that is trained to stand when tied will not need a strong rope. He will feel the pull and accept his position. If he has a fright, he will move, (break the tie up), calm down, and return to where he was left, or at least only wander away. It is the tied horse that gallops off as he is thoroughly frightened by being unable to escape.

An incident as example: a horse was tied to a solid post of a shed during a thunderstorm because he was galloping around his paddock. When the noise became too much, he broke the POST and fled. There was a THING being dragged along behind (half the shed) and he galloped for miles before getting tangled in trees.

If he had broken his rope he would probably have calmed down before he left his familiar paddock.

As we don't really want to have to buy new ropes, we can use a lighter item between the rope and the tie point. The usual is baling/binding twine from your hay bales. Even though we can't break it, a horse can. It breaks first, saving our rope, halter and his neck

If your horse learns to break the baling twine, and begins to do so regularly, you will need to retrain him. Simply put him somewhere where he will get little reward for escaping, preferably a small yard, and have lots of baling twine already tied to the fence. Move away but watch him. When he breaks free, pick up the lead rope quietly and retie him to a new piece. No fuss. After several (many?) attempts he will decide that breaking free gains him nothing, and has made his head a bit sore, so he will stop. One lesson is usually enough, although it may need to be repeated at another location. For example, if he regularly breaks away at events, you may have to sacrifice half a day of competition while teaching him to stay tied when there.

A rope halter works best for this lesson. It hurts more than a webbing halter when he breaks the twine. This is his choice; you are not being cruel as it is not you who is administering the discomfort.

Crime Report - ONE TREE HILL Rural Watch - Offences reported between 13.12.13 and 13.02.14

15th December One Tree Hill Road, GOULD CREEK **Arson of Motor Vehicle**

Motor Vehicle stolen from Holden Hill and burnt out at above location.

19th December Arson **Uley Road, ULEYBURY**

Property Damage by fire

Deliberately lit fire at above location - burnt out approximately 100 acres. Nil damage to fencing or stock.

Cornishmans Hill Road, ONE TREE HILL 20th December Arson

Deliberately lit fire located on side of road. Approximately 40 x 100m of grass area burnt out. Suspect vehicle - Mitsubishi Mirage Hatchback seen near location.

Unlicensed Person used Fireworks Cornishmans Hill Road, ONE TREE HILL

Resident set fireworks off on his property which caused grass fire. Eight CFS units responded. Police action taken.

30th January Wheelie bun set on fire.

Reading the Grapevine in January there were several comments in relation to the use of fireworks. It is an offence for any unlicensed persons to possess or use fireworks and is subject to a \$315 expiation notice (on the spot fine). However, this is insignificant to the potential dangers of using fireworks in an area such as ours and the catastrophic outcome if such devices are used and result in a fire.

Section 85B of the Criminal Law Consolidation act refers to the causing of a bushfire. Please note part (B) of the section and its reference to being recklessly indifferent - this refers to the fact that there was no intention to cause the fire but due to the actions of the individual the fire was caused.

85B - Special provision for causing a bushfire

- A person who causes a bushfire (a) intending to cause a bushfire; or (b) being recklessly indifferent as to whether his or **(**1) her conduct causes a bushfire is quilty of an offence. Maximum penalty: Imprisonment for 20 years.
- (2) A bushfire is a fire that burns, or threatens to burn, out of control causing damage to vegetation (whether or not other property is also damaged or threatened).

On top of the above offence there are other offences relating to any persons injured or killed as a result of any bushfire and acts to endanger persons lives. The individual also faces civil charges - this has happened from the Cherryville fires a couple of years ago.

EVERY PERSON WHO LIVES IN A BUSHFIRE AREA MUST SERIOUSLY THINK OF THE POTENTIAL OUTCOME FROM THEIR ACTIONS

If you are aware of neighbours who are putting lives at risk due to their behaviour in relation to fires please contact your local police station and ask the officer to submit the information on an ancillary report in relation to Operation NOMAD.

From The Past

Arbor Days at One Tree Hill

Story taken from the Bunyip 17th August 1934

outh Australia's first Arbor Day was held on June 20th 1889. Children planted 757 seedlings in the south eastern corner of the Park Lands where Greenhill and Fullarton Roads meet. The idea of Arbor Day originated in America in the state of Nebraska on April 10th 1872 where one million trees were planted that day. Arbor is the Latin word for tree. Arbor Day was at one time a holiday in which individuals and groups are encouraged to plant and care for trees. The task was assigned to students from State schools.

As well as the practical task of planting trees the children would learn how to plant them properly and look after them until they were established. It was thought that many of the children would one day own their own land and the lesson would be of great advantage to them. They were living in a young and progressive country and timber was one the things necessary to its development in making railroads, building bridges and many other necessary works.


The first Arbor Day at One Tree Hill was held on the 5th August 1890 with the students of Uley and Precolumb Schools. After the tree planting, celebrations often followed. Tea was provided in the church and afterwards entertainment was provided. Those taking part being Miss Riggs, and Mrs. F. W. Thomas, M.F. Rhodes, Hambridge and Doley.

In 1935, the children of the Precolumb and Uley Schools spent their Arbor Day on the McGilp Recreation Park. In the morning the scholars were addressed by their teachers N. Robinson and C. Fenner and practical work was done by planting trees along the east boundary of the park. The work was followed by a lunch provided by parents and friends. The afternoon was devoted to a sports meeting, the school committee being in charge. The day closed with afternoon tea, and an orange scramble among the children.

Front Page article from The News Review, Salisbury, Gawler and Munno Para areas, April 27th 1979.

The public are invited to attend the re-opening of the Uleybury School Museum by former headmaster on Sunday. The century old school is now a museum. The pulic will see a wealth of exhibits when the museum re-opens it's doors this Sunday, April 29th at 2pm. A dedicated society has collected articles and restored the landmark which was built in 1856 to cater for the children of Uleybury and One Tree Hill. The school museum, believed to be the first of its kind in South Australia will be re-opened by the former headmaster Mr. Hedley James Land. Mr Lang is one of the many people to contribute items to the school museum. "Thanks must go to the people who have contributed articles for the display," Uleybury School Museum Society President Mr. J. A. Hill said. "We received great help from Mr. Lang who contributed more than 100 items, the Blair Athol Primary School and Gawler Primary School." "The society hopes to see many former pupils at the re-opening and many other interested persons." Mr Hill heads the society which formed many years back, disbanded and reformed about a year ago. "We received considerable assistance from the Munno Para Council which owns the land," he said. "Council helped us secure a \$70,000 SURS grant to renovate the old place, and it has handed over the tenancy to the committee." Munno Para Council has been very good to us. It has donated \$6,500 for renovation." Another of the six member committee is Mr. Hill's 18 year old son Steven who is designer and curator of the old premises. Steven, a local artist, has poured his talents into presenting the school museum as it would have been. "We want school children to visit the place and see what things were like in the old days". Steven explained. "It is also designed to re-educate the older people who remember the place as it was."

The school museum will be open Sunday afternoons and can be viewed by schools during the week by appointment. On re-opening day, there will be refreshments and home made biscuits provided.

The Uleybury School and teacher's residence was built in 1856 and owes its beginnings to Moses Bendle Garlick, a Baptist layman, weaver and soldier in Napoleonic Wars. The first teacher, John Mattingly, taught 18 boys and 16 girls. It was conducted much like a church school until 1874 when it came under jurisdiction of the Government. The school was renamed the One Tree Hill Primary School in 1946.

The school remained open until 1971 and was the oldest school building still in use by the Education Department. On display are school memorabilia, photographs and copies of school records including student rolls.

Today the Uleybury School Museum is owned by the Playford Council. A Manager lives on site who looks after the property and conducts tours. The museum is open on a Sunday from 1.00 - 4.00pm.Entry fee is a gold coin donation.

The Heritage Coordinator manages the museum part of the property. There is no longer a committee or volunteers involved.

How Long Does it Take for our Rubbish to Decompose?

Nowingly or unknowingly we harm nature by littering.
When we search for peace of mind and to enjoy nature we end up in adding to the degradation of nature sometimes.

For example, we go to a sanctuary for a picnic, some people have fun with loud music even though it is prohibited in sanctuaries, they leave bottles and cans behind, scatter disposable plates and glasses about. Next time you go for a picnic be aware of the damage you may do to the environment if you are not responsible and dispose of your rubbish thoughtfully.

Here is a small list of items with the time it takes to decompose. Banana peel - 3-4 weeks, Orange peel - 6 months, Apple core - 2 months, Paper bags - 1 month, Cardboard - 2 months, Milk cartons - 5 years, Newspaper - 6 weeks, Paper towels and Serviettes - 2-4 weeks, Tins - 50 years, Aluminum cans - 200-500 years, Disposable nappies - 550 years, Plastic bags - 20-1000 years, Glass - 1 million years, Cigarette butts - 10-12 years, Plastic containers - 50-80 years, Foam cups - 50 years and Plastic bottles - 450 years... It really makes you think doesn't it? If you go somewhere take your recyclable items home with you and put them out for collection.

Here in South Australia we have for many years had a deposit on our cans and bottles, encourage your children to pick them up if you see them when out walking, it's great pocket money for the kids and it will be helping the environment.

Polyethylene Terephthalate

Drop a tomato sauce bottle onto the floor, and you will be thankful for the nearly indestructible plastic used to make most containers and bottles. Drop the same bottle into a landfill however and you may have second thoughts! Why? Because petroleum-based plastics like PET don't decompose the same way organic material does. Wood, grass and food scraps undergo a process known as biodegradation when they are buried which is a fancy way of saying they're transformed by bacteria in the soil and into other useful compounds. Bacteria turn up their noses at plastic! Load their dinner plates with some plastic bags and bottles and the one-celled gluttons will skip the meal entirely.

Based on this logic, it's safe to argue that plastic will never biodegrade. Of course that's not the end of the story, a student in Canada recently demonstrated that certain types of bacteria can break down plastic. Until other researchers can replicate this experiment waste treatment plants can't implement any new processes. The only real way we can break down plastic is through photo degradation. This kind of decomposition requires sunlight and not bacteria. When UV rays strike plastic, they break the bonds holding the long molecular chain together. Over time, this can turn a big piece of plastic into lots of little pieces.

Of course, plastic buried in landfills rarely sees the light of day. In the ocean where a lot of discarded plastic bags, soft drink bottles and six-pack rings end up, the plastic is bathed in as much light as water. In 2009 researchers found that plastic in warm ocean water can degrade in as little as a year. This doesn't sound so bad until you realize those small bits of plastic are toxic chemicals such as bisphenol A (BPA) and PS oligomer. These particles end up in the guts of animals or wash up on shorelines where humans are most likely to come into direct contact with the toxins.

One solution to this environmental disaster is biodegradable plastic. There are two types currently on the market—plant-based hydro-biodegradable plastic and petroleum-based Oxo-biodegradable plastic. In the former category, polylactic acid (PLA), a plastic made from corn, tops the list as the most talked about alternative. PLA decomposes into water and carbon dioxide in 47-90 days. Conditions have to be just right to achieve these kinds of results. PLA breaks down most efficiently in commercial composting facilities at high temperatures. When buried in a landfill, a plastic bag made from corn may remain intact just as long as a plastic bag made from oil or natural gas.

The History of How Plastics were Introduced

While you are reading this article there are probably numerous plastic items within your reach (your computer, your pen, your phone). A plastic is any material that can be shaped or molded into any form.

Most plastics are made from oil, Oil is a carbon-rich raw material and plastics are large carbon-containing compounds. Plastics have revolutionised the world.

Before the invention of plastic, the only substances that could be molded were clays (pottery) and glass. Hardened clay and glass were used for storage but they were heavy and brittle. Some natural substances like tree gum and rubber were sticky and moldable. Rubber wasn't' used for storage because it eventually lost its ability to bounce back into shape and became sticky when heated.

In 1839, Charles Goodyear accidentally discovered a process in which Sulphur reacted with crude rubber when heated and then cooled. The rubber became resilient upon cooling - it could stretch, but it snapped back to its original shape. It also retained its resilience when heated. We now know that the sulphur forms chemical bonds between adjacent rubber polymer strands. The bonds cross-link the polymer strands, allowing them to 'snap back' when stretched. Charles Goodyear had discovered the process now known as vulcanization, which made rubber more durable.

In 1846, Charles Schonbein, a Swiss chemist, accidently discovered another polymer when he spilled a nitric acid-sulphuric acid mixture on some cotton. A chemical reaction occurred in which hydroxyl groups of the cellulose fibres in the cotton were converted to nitrate groups catalyzed by the Sulphur. The resultant polymer, nitrocellulose, could burst into a smokeless flame and was used by the military in place of gunpowder. In 1870, chemist John Hyatt reacted nitrocellulose with camphor to make celluloid, a plastic polymer that was used in photographic film, billiard balls, dental plates, ping pong balls and of course the celluloid doll.


In 1909, a chemist named Leo Baekeland synthesized Bakelite, the first truly synthetic polymer, from a mixture of phenol and formaldehyde. The condensation reaction between these monomers allows the formaldehyde to bind the phenol rings into rigid three-dimensional polymers. So, Bakelite can be molded when hot and solidified into a hard plastic that can be used for handles, phones, auto parts, furniture and even jewellery. Bakelite is hard, resistant to heat and electricity, and can't be easily melted or scorched once cooled. The invention of Bakelite led to a whole class of plastics with similar properties, known as phenolic resins.

In the 1930s, a DuPont chemist named Wallace Carothers invented a plastic polymer made from the condensation of adipic acid and a certain type of diaminohexane monomers that could be drawn out into strong fibres, like silk. This plastic

became know as nylon. Nylon is lightweight, strong and durable and became the basis of many types of coverings (tents), luggage, bags and ropes.

The use of these early polymers became widespread following World War II and continues today. They lead to the creation of many other plastics, like Dacron, Styrofoam, Polystyrene, Polyethylene and Vinyl.

This simplified diagram shows the relationship between monomers and polymers. Identical monomers can combine with each other to form homopolymers, which can be straight or branched chains. Different monomers may combine together to form copolymers which also may be branched or straight.

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


You will be required to make 3 identical items for the theme of the month. Paper plates will be supplied and entry cards including entry number will be attached. Judging will commence at 9.30am.


