Incident Report

For the third month in a row, the CFS has had very few incidents, a car accident, a tree down and a car fire, all of which were minor. Considering the inclement weather and the risks this has introduced, this has been a great achievement by the OTH community. However, it is not a time to become complacent and the CFS continues to train every Monday night in anticipation of a wide range of emergencies.

Certificate of Appreciation

At the recent Group AGM, the Brigade was presented with a Chief Officer's Certificate of Appreciation in recognition of the significant effort and services rendered across the state during January and February.

The citation mentions that on January 14th, 216 fires were started by lightning strikes which eventually burnt out more than 450,000 hectares across the state. A stark reminder of how quickly things can change.

With all of the strong winds we have been having lately, have you checked your gutters? Not only are leaves a hazard during the summer but can block the drains and lead to water flowing back into the house during heavy rain. Trying to clear a gutter in the middle of a storm is no fun.

Councillor's Report AUGUST 2014

special Council meeting endorsed the new rate increases and City Plan at 5% but this does not necessarily mean your rates will go up by 5% of last years rates.

The formula is complicated, there are CPI increases, land price increase, base rate increases to fund operational expenses and whatever else that determines what your final rate cost will be, however rural roads will continue to be resealed and a green waste collection will be introduced.

Council's ordinary meeting was predominately a deputation by nine members of the Munno Para bowling club. The land the club sits on is about to be revoked as community land and sold to raise funds to relocate the club to the new sports precinct. I was surprised after several confidential meetings to learn the extent of the club's involvement within the immediate community. The club apart from its lawn bowls base includes sewing groups, makes its facilities available for employment programs, Bingo nights, meals, School use, the Gawler Country Music Club, hall hire, weddings and birthdays. It appears that a clash of personalities and direction has led to this situation. The new and current board is working hard, and to their credit successfully, to rebadge and improve the image of the club, however I am not sure if it is a case of a valiant effort in vain, only time will tell.

There are several lessons to be learnt here and that is, that, regardless of all the best intentions, club management should always strive for the best interests of the community and not let personalities get in the way of sound decisions. The second point is the value of a well-disciplined deputation where eight people (one was too ill to appear) can get up and talk (for 5 minutes each) without repeating the same points and present emotional and well founded views with passion and belief. The third point is that rude and obnoxious behaviour by gallery members (usually one in the crowd) does nothing to help the cause and efforts of those fighting diligently to save their club.

Other business included Council's role in bicycle and walking trails which are a warm and fuzzy initiative that cater for a small

section of the community at a large cost, however, Council has decided to play a role in establishing such areas. Then there were the two confidential items which of course I cannot talk about but which would be of interest to the community.

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Getting Ready for Spring Cleaning

Getting ready for Spring Cleaning can make the difference between a pleasant experience and one that is frustrating and nonproductive.

Make sure you can easily get rid of it all by getting lots of containers to put it in. You may even have to rent a skip if you have missed the hard refuse pick up and have too much for the normal bin.



5: Set up an upbeat music play list for while you clean, there is nothing like moving to the music. Music makes you happy and energetic to listen to while you work.

What is Metabolism?

Metabolism describes the chemical reactions that occur in the body which are vital for keeping us alive. The process of metabolism converts food into energy that is used to provide fuel to our cells. Our metabolic rate is influenced by various factors including age, gender, weight, physical activity and health issues.

What is Metabolism? Metabolism refers to the physical and chemical processes that occur in the body which keep us functioning normally in order to stay alive, such as breathing, blood circulation and nerve function. To carry out these processes, our body converts energy from the food we eat. Chemicals in our digestive system break down food into fuel, which is either used immediately or stored in the body's tissues.

The energy (kilojoules) we expend over a day in order to survive is called our basal or resting metabolic rate. Although you can't control your metabolism, it can be stimulated during exercise.

How Metabolism works. Hormones and the nervous system control our metabolism. When we consume food, digestive enzymes break down carbohydrates, fats and proteins into a form that the body can use for growth or energy.

During metabolism, two activities occur at the same time - the building up of body tissues and storage of energy, or anabolsm and catabolism. Metabolism is a balancing act of these processes.

- * Anabolism this is the process whereby energy is used to support the growth of new cells and to maintain our body tissues, and energy is stored as fat.
- * Catabolism the energy-releasing process where large molecules from our food, such as carbohydrates, fats and proteins, are broken down to smaller molecules to provide immediate energy for the body. This energy provides fuel for processes such as heating the body and allows our muscles to move.

Basal Metabolic Rate (BMR). BMR is the rate at which your body burns energy (kilojoules) while at rest and accounts for 50-80% of your total energy use.

To some extent your BMR is genetically determined but it can also be affected by certain health problems and physical activity.

When you exercise you burn more energy. Being physically fit also increases your BMR because the more muscle and less fat we have, the higher our metabolic rate. (Muscle requires more energy to function than fat).

Horse Care - Greasy Heels, Mud Fever & Other Wet Weather ills

Greasy heels and **mud fever** are the same disease. It is an infection of the skin of the lower leg especially around the coronet and back of the heels. The leg usually swells and there is normally some lameness. It is caused by any of several bacterium and fungus, including Staph, Strep and Dermatophilus bacteria. Fungal infections tend to be smellier than bacterial infections. Usually any particular case is a combination of causes.

For some reason, white legs seem to be more prone to infection, although researchers have not worked out why.

Most cases occur when the leg is constantly wet: standing in muddy paddocks or unclean stables. Moving through wet grass does not seem to be a problem if the hoof and leg gets a chance to dry out. For this reason it is good management to feed on dry ground, where the horse will stand for 30 minutes or more with its feet completely out of mud, water or wet grass. A gravel patch or bricks will be sufficient, if it is raised above lying water.

Feathering on the backs of the legs will help maintain greasy heels or make them worse. So if infected, the hair from the heels needs to be clipped off. If the horse must spend a lot of time in mud, clip the hairs before infection can set in. Otherwise, the hairs help channel water away from the hooves and therefore help in prevention. It is the accumulation of mud that makes the hairs a problem.

When possible, wash mud from the heels to try to keep them clean. Do not rub dry: pat with a towel or paper towel. Rubbing may break skin that has become soft and let infection in.

Prevention may be possible by putting oil or grease based preparations on the skin after washing and drying. Vaseline is ideal, but any oil based cream should work. Be careful that it does not cause irritation – it must be suitable for horses. There are commercially available preparations for treatment of mud fever that will help prevent it too.

If your horse develops scabs and does not respond quickly to over-the-counter treatments (fodder store) get vet help. Antibiotics can clean it up quite quickly if started in time. Of course, you must follow up with excellent management practises: no more mud or wet stable floors. Treatment with over-the-counter preparations includes washing gently and removing the scabs (to get at the fungal infection) then coating with the treatment of choice.

It will take several days but should be visibly improving from the first day. Continued prevention for the rest of the season is essential as the damaged skin will be susceptible to re-infection. The use of a zinc cream should help, as well as daily washing and drying.

White line disease is more likely to occur during wet weather, too. Any hoof that has a flare may begin to separate (due to wet hoof being softer) and this lets disease in, usually into the white line area. This form of white line disease will be bacteria related. The farrier will be needed to trim the hoof and the vet may be needed for antibiotics. Check with your farrier as to why your horse has developed a flare. There are many management factors and some genetic ones, but flares are not normal (although common).

Abscesses are also more likely to occur during wet weather. Damage to the hoof or the coronet band will let infection in (and it is more likely to get in if the leg is wet or muddy). Abscesses do not mysteriously appear: they always occur due to a puncture wound, although this may be invisible or it may be the hole made by the shoeing nail. There are varying opinions as to how to treat them. Many say to cut the abscess out. Others say to wait until they start to erupt by themselves (and then help them by cutting to the point of the eruption). The theory here is that they will find their own way out, but if you try cutting them out you may miss some of the infection and will just have to start again as the re-occurring abscess regenerates.

To reiterate: keep your horse out of mud or standing water as much as possible. Make sure there is some ground where its hooves have a chance to dry out. Use a barrier cream if the ground is particularly wet. Be alert for infection and start treatment immediately for best results.

You may need to put up a temporary barrier (electric fence or wooden rails) across some areas, in particular the gateway or the old feed area (you are going to move to a drier area, away from the mud that has developed) as horses are creatures of habit and will return to the place he liked to stand.

Continued from page 6 - Other factors that influence our BMR include:

- * Age as we get older our bodies tend to gain fat and lose muscle, so our BMR slows.
- * Body size bigger adults have a larger BMR.
- * Growth infants and children have a higher energy demand.
- * Sex men usually have a faster metabolism than women due to greater muscle mass.
- * Temperature extremes of high or low temperatures require burning of more fuel.
- * Dieting during excessive dieting our BMR slows to conserve eneray.
- * Drugs certain drugs, such as caffeine can increase BMR.

Metabolic Disorders are usually categorised according to the type of food that that cannot be broken down properly.

- * PKU or Phenylketonuria, is the most common diagnosis and occurs when the body can't convert phenylalanine into tyrosine.
- * Fructose intolerance is when the body can't break down fructose.
- * Galacrosaemia is when the body is unable to convert the carbohydrate galactose into glucose.

When properly treated and managed with a strict dietary plan, people with metabolic disorders will progress to lead normal lives.

Hormonal disorders can also lead to metabolic problems. They are usually associated with the thyroid - the gland responsible for releasing hormones which regulate many metabolic processes. Common disorders include:

*Hypothyroidism when the metabolic rate decreases due to an underactive thyroid.

* Hyperthyroidism when the metabolic rate increases due to an overactive thyroid.

See your Doctor to have your thyroid levels checked. It may be what is causing your metabolism to be so slow!



Eat Humble Pie

Meaning: Making an apology and suffering humiliation along with it.

History: During the Middle Ages, the lord of a manor would hold a feast after hunting. He would receive the finest cut of meat at the feast, but those of a lower standing were served a pie filled with the entrails and innards, known as "umbles". Therefore, receiving

"umble pie" was considered humiliating because it informed others in attendance of the guests lower status.

Give the Cold Shoulder

Meaning: A rude way of telling someone he isn't welcome.

History: Although giving someone the cold shoulder today is considered rude, it was actually regarded as a polite gesture in medieval England. After a feast, the host would let his guest's know it was time to leave by giving them a cold piece of meat from the shoulder of beef, mutton or pork.



Go Cold Turkey

Meaning: To quit something abruptly.

History: People believed that during withdrawal, the skin of drug addicts became translucent, hard to the touch, and covered with goose bumps - like the skin of a plucked turkey.



Go the Whole 9 Yards

Meaning: To try one's best.

History: World War II Fighter pilots received a 9-yard chain of

ammunition. Therefore, when a pilot had used all of his ammunition on one target, he gave it "the whole 9 yards".

<u>Jaywalker</u>

Meaning: One who crosses the street in a reckless illegal manner. **History:** Jay birds that travelled outside of the forest into urban areas often became confused and unaware of the potential dangers in the city - like traffic. Amused by their erratic behaviour, people began using the term "jaywalker" to describe someone who crossed the street irresponsibly.

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From The Past Daid Galdy Arminal Achied

Moses Bendle Garlick features prominently in the history of One Tree Hill as a wealthy land owner and benefactor. His son Daniel received considerable fame in his own area of expertise, as a prolific and prominent architect during the early years of the colony of South Australia. His legacy can still be seen in many places around Adelaide.

Daniel was born in 1818 at Uley, Gloucestershire, England, he was the son of Moses Garlick who was a plasterer and weaver. After Moses' wife Rachel (nee Smith) died he decided to migrate to South Australia with his sons Daniel, Thomas and William. They sailed in the Katherine Stewart Forbes and arrived in the new colony on 17th October 1837.

Daniel and his father ran a business as builders and timber merchants in Kermode Street, North Adelaide until the early 1850s when Daniel's health declined imposing a life change. Moses bought some 450 acres at One Tree Hill and with his three sons grew wheat, planted a vineyard and made wine. After Moses died in about 1860, Thomas and William remained on the farm but Daniel began a business as an architect in Gawler. His projects included designing villas, cottages, country houses, shops, churches and chapels for the town and the surrounding areas. About 1862 Daniel married Lucy King, but after only nine years she died leaving three young sons.

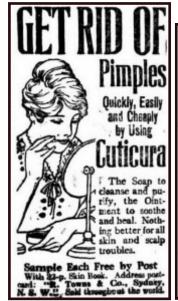
Daniel Garlick pictured along with the Adelaide Railway Station, the design shows the eastern elevation. Cost was over £250,000, the edifice took some years to complete. Messrs. Garlick & Jackman were the architects. Daniel designed many churches and banks in townships north of Adelaide and 1864 was described as an architect and land agent with offices in Adelaide. Among the buildings which he designed in and around in the 1860s and 1870s are the original buildings of Prince Alfred College, St Barnabas College, part of the Collegiate School of St Peter where the original buildings had been designed by others, the south wing of the Adelaide Town Hall and the eastern elevation of the Adelaide Railway Station. In 1891 Daniel's son Arthur joined the firm.

Daniel was active in local affairs and became chairman of the district council of Munno Para East in 1855-60 and represented Robe ward in the Adelaide City Council in 1868-70. His business affairs however took up too much time and he was obliged to step down

from these roles to work in his practice.

Daniel Garlick died aged 84 years in North Adelaide on 28th September 1902. He was survived by his second wife Mary Rebecca (B: 1832 D: 1912) a widow whom he had married on 29th September 1877 and by a son and a daughter. Daniel is buried in the North Road cemetery.









Newspaper clippings—From the Past. **Seized by Octopus**

An octopus measuring 2ft. Across the body and with long tentacles attacked C. Messenger, a fisherman, who dived into the harbour off Darling Point, Sydney to examine a launch which had sunk in 25ft. of water.

When the swimmer reached the boat a tentacle gripped his back. He tried to rise, but could not do so. Fortunately he saw a rope which had been lowered for salvage work and struggling to it, pulled it to attract the attention of those above him. He was at once hauled to the surface.

The octopus clung to him until he broke the surface, but then detached itself and sank. Messenger suffered no injury.

This was printed in the Northern Territory Times on May 10th 1932 page 3.

Escape from an Octopus

Warrnambool, Thursday - Whilst bathing in a waterhole at Shelly Beach on New Year's Day, Miss Anderson of Wangoom, was caught by the foot by a large octopus. Fortunately she managed to shake herself free from the creature and a young man subsequently killed it with a boulder. The octopus was 5ft. across and each of its tentacles was as long as a mans arm. From the Argus (Melbourne) January 3rd 1908.

Gripped by an Octopus

Warrnambool. Tuesday - A few days ago Mr. A. S. Briggs, of Allansford was fishing off the rocks on the coast and while in the act of cleaning a trumpeter one of his hands was seized by the tentacle of a large octopus. He had to crush this creature against the rock with the heel of his boot, using all his strength in the operation, before it would release its hold. Just prior to this occurrence he had speared an octopus, measuring 11ft. from tip to top of the feelers.

August in Your Garden

August in the garden can be very trying, the mornings are still quite cold and frosty at times. If you have the chance get out in the garden when it's a sunny day you can catch up on the chores to have your garden ready for Spring which is just around the corner.

Blossom on fruit should be coming out towards the middle of August, Magnolias should be just about blooming and daffodils and jonquils should be flourishing.

The main task this month is to plant, water and feed spring flowering annuals to ensure a spectacular display over the next few months. Keep beds well weeded or mulched and ensure adequate water is given during this vital growing period.

August is also a good month to work on your soil.

Hydrangeas indicate lime content, very pink means high lime. Another sign is yellow foliage, especially the tips. In alkaline soil salt content is high and trace elements low. The key is aluminum ions in the soil, so aluminum sulfate is a good quick fix, but prolonged use year after year may cause a fatal build up in the soil. Iron sulfate is a safer fix or try alternating. If pink is what you want, top dress with dolomite or drench with a quick lime solution. If your Hydrangeas fail to flower it could be for several reasons. Most common would be frost damage, followed very closely by late pruning. Too much shade or nitrogen are other likely culprits.

Plants which like acid soil conditions (like Azaleas, Camellias and heaths (Erica's) do not grow well in alkaline soils, whereas limeloving plants will adapt to acid.

This time of the year is also the very last chance to plant bare rooted trees. Race down and buy some fruit trees now before it's too late, apples, pears, plums, peaches and nectarines are all deciduous trees that need to be planted before Spring. If you have existing fruit trees now is the last chance to prune before they start to bud, all fruit trees like a big haircut apart from the Apricot tree which only requires a bit of a trim.

Plant your vegies, try some spinach, broad beans, potatoes, peas, onions, parsley, cabbage, rocket, silverbeet, cauliflower, lettuce, leek Asian greens, radish, beetroot and parsnip. There's nothing like being self sufficient!

If you are putting in some tomatoes next month, prepare a bed now (your tomatoes will thank you for it by producing a good crop). Prepare the ground by popping some organic compost, pelletised chook poo and bit of water and then apply a straw mulch. This bed will be awesome come September and you will have the best tomatoes in town.

If you have plants in pots that need to be transplanted, now is the time to do it before the plants have their growth spurt.

Apply soluble fertiliser to blooming winter annuals such as cineraria, primroses, polyanthus, stock and poppies to get every last flower. Remove faded flowers regularly too for more bloom.

Feed developing spring annuals and pinch out growing tips to force side growth. Divide any overgrown perennial plants. Work plenty of compost, decayed manure and a little complete fertiliser into the planting area. Lime a carnation bed, one handful per square metre is ideal, you need to build up the soil around the plant in September.

Roses should be already pruned but if you haven't had a chance to do them, it's not too late. Try to get them done as soon as possible. Once you have pruned them, spray with a fungicide to help control black spot and other fungal disease. Burn all rose pruning's to kill disease spores and pests. Stake and tie the young standard roses and test that climbing roses' supports are adequate. Work in top dressing of wellcomposted manure around all the roses.

The main tasks are feeding and pruning, don't forget to give your Camellias a complete fertiliser after flowering. Feed your fuchsias fortnightly and trim back by two-thirds of the previous seasons growth even though you will lose some flower buds.

Pick Daphne blooms freely to prune, new shoots develop from bare

wood. Feed with a special fertiliser for acid loving plants and mulch along with the Camellias. Do not prune frost damaged plants until the severe cold has passed. When bulbs are no longer flowering fertilise them, with the ones that will be blooming in Spring give them a light dressing of potash to strengthen stems. Iris often look bedraggled now, remove dead foliage and apply superphosphate plus a little potash.

You can also prepare your lawn for the growing and mowing season,

dig over new areas to be sown with grass to a depth of 15cm. Remove roots of perennial weeds. Into heavy or highly acidic soils rake in lime, (about 1 cup per square metre)

Eradicate that enemy of bare feet, Bindii, preferably by the end of the month before the prickly seed.

Spread lawn food to get grass off to a best possible start.

If you do all these chores it will give a garden to be proud of in Spring.

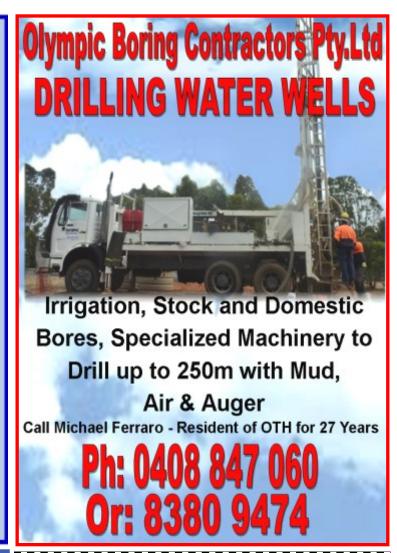
