A Special Day for a Special Lady

Rose Shillabeer was born on the 15th August at Dover Street, Unley. Her parents were Martin and Selma Bonds and siblings were Edna Charlson, Phyllis McKenzie and Alfred and Charlie Bonds. Selma died when Rose was 11 years old, their Auntie May Westley looked after the children at One Tree Hill and Rosewater until they grew up.

Before marrying Melville Taylor, Rose worked as a housekeeper in Adelaide. After marrying they moved to their cottage at One Tree Hill, this was in 1935. Melville died after falling from an apricot tree when their daughter Margaret was just 6 month old.

Rose's sister Phil and Doug McKenzie looked after the farm while Rose went to work (munitions, grape picking etc.) so that she could pay off the farm.

Rose then had a small dairy for several years and eventually met Russell Shillabeer. They married in 1948 and continued to live at Rose's property at One Tree Hill (where she still lives today). Russell passed away in 1990. Rose has continued to live in her own cottage, there wouldn't be many people who can say that they have lived in the same home for 79 years. Her grandson Craig Tilley and family also live on the same property at One Tree Hill.

Rose keeps active with ten pin bowls and attending senior citizens. She still drives although doesn't venture too far these days and loves tending her garden that includes a vegie patch along with many pot plants.

Rose has 4 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

Rose's brother Albert will turn 93 on September 7th, we wish him all the very best for his birthday.

Councillor's Report SEPTEMBER 2014

Council has endorsed the revocation of community land at the Munno Para Bowling Club which means the club will be relocated to new facilities in the regional sporting precinct in Elizabeth. The club will have a co-existence with the Elizabeth Bowling Club. The club tried valiantly to keep its current location but at times the efforts of a few turned ugly with the threatening of a Councillor (this is unacceptable and cowardly behaviour since the threat was made anonymously, not to accept that any threat is acceptable). Councillors are volunteers and act on the information they are given by staff and make a determination based on all the available information. Sometimes all the information is not made public, however, Councillors need to make a value based decision and at the end of the day it is the whole of Council that votes, not just the individual and the majority wins. The threat was followed by a wilful act of malicious damage to the club resulting in 10s of thousands of dollars damage, this is also unacceptable and one member when leaving the meeting made rude and offensive remarks, loud enough to be heard by some of the chamber. Ladies and gentleman, this is not the way to influence people and make friends, we all at times get passionate about individual issues and in the majority of cases people are passionate in their responses, but, rude, obnoxious and unacceptable behaviour does not help. In this case it leads to Police intervention.

On another note, Council is developing an Economic Development Policy to increase economic development in the City and assist in reducing commercial rates and unemployment. This is a long term strategy and may find difficulties in its implementation seeing that a new Council may evolve after the November elections.

Please be aware that to have an elected member representing your best interests you need to vote, voting is by postal vote and not compulsory, however it is in our best interests to vote for local representation.

I have decided to run again and your support would be very much appreciated. Given the Messenger no longer takes an interest in rural distribution information, it will be hard to access but available via electronic media.


As of September's Council meeting, Council will go into caretaker mode but this should not affect Council operations.

There's no point in pretending you're not going to be out in your garden the first warm second of Spring. While there is no harm in cleaning up fallen branches and debris, wait until the soil is no longer wet enough to form a ball in your hand, before walking on it and compacting it. But don't wait too long to start your clean up. It's much easier to cut plants. back before the old growth gets tangled up in new growth.

The first task is removing and composting any dead annual plants that remained over winter. These will not return and any self feeders will already have done their job. If you didn't prune back your perennials in Autumn, they are probably looking pretty shabby as spring sets in. Many perennials actually prefer to be left standing throughout winter, for extra protection. But by definition, herbaceous perennials will die back to the ground during winter. If you didn't cut them back, once you see new growth it's safe to begin cutting them back to ground level. Some shrubby plants with woody stems (such as Lavender) need to be cut back each spring, because they only bloom on new branches. They are pruned in the Spring to limit winter damage and to encourage the plant to start sending out those new flowering branches. It's best to wait until the danger of frosts has passed. Most of these types of plants will let you know when it is time to prune them by showing signs of opening buds on the lower stem.

Spring is also time to tidy plants up like Bearded Iris that have probably retained their leaves all winter. Spring is the time to trim back the tattered foliage and encourage new growth to.

If you left your Ornamental Grasses for Winter interest, you can now cut them back as soon as you can get to them.



You don't need to wait for new growth. Cut grasses quite close to ground level and they'll come back up when they are ready.

Most evergreen trees and shrubs require little or no spring care other than tidying up. Spring is also a time to fertilize evergreens, because they are actively growing at this time. You should remember that if the

soil is healthy and rich, you should only need to feed them every other year.

Early Spring is the time to take action against weeds with some pro-active weeding. Damp soil makes it much easier to pull young weed seedlings. Don't try to compost weeds, they'll come back and haunt you.

Spring is the ideal time for dividing or transplanting. It's amazing how plants recover from this abuse if you catch them early when the weather is still mild.

Staking plants is a tedious task but the sooner you stake the easier it is on your plants. Sure, they look straggly for a while but it's worth it to do it now rather than trying to squeeze the plants on stakes when they are bushy.

Mulching does many wonderful things for your garden, it conserves water, cools plant roots, feeds the soil and smothers weeds. Every garden deserves a good layer of mulch. Be sure to keep it away from stems and crowns of your plants when you put it down to avoid damaging the plants. Enjoy your Spring gardening for 2014.

Horse Care - Cost of buying a horse - Part 1: The Purchase

I was asked "How much does it cost to buy a pony?" The questioner was a parent of a pony mad daughter.

The fist part of my answer frightened the parent. "Not very much, about \$2,000 to \$3,000. (He thought he was about to be pushed into buying a pony.)

But the devil is in the details:

Pony, aged, trustworthy - \$3,000 to \$5,000. Less than this and there is a problem. It might be the age (and therefore the life span, fitness, chronic illness but still ok for a beginner rider) in which case a lower price (and the pony) can be acceptable. If none of these reasons, be very suspicious. It could be "killer" value: only good for dog meat because it might kill the rider.

Gear, saddle (\$100 to \$3,000), bridle (\$40 to \$100), saddle cloth (\$30 to \$100), halter (\$9 to \$30), lead rope (\$7 to \$50), 2 rugs (50 to \$200 each), grooming brushes (\$35 to \$100). About \$500, more if you have trouble getting a saddle to fit and have to go for an expensive one. Cost could easily go to \$2,000 total without buying top of the range items. Saddle is assumed as fully fitted with firth, stirrups and leathers.

Riding Wear: I mean helmet and boots. I really don't care about the jodhpurs, shirt, etc. But helmet and boots are essential safety equipment and will set you back about \$200.

Agistment: If you have your own property, this will be minimal, but not nil as it means you cannot run 10 sheep or 1 cow on the land used by the pony. (Requires a minimum of 2 acres for most-of-year feed). If you have to pay for agistment (putting your pony on someone else's land) it will be from \$20 per week (poor, small paddock with no shelter) to \$100 per week, (good paddock, shelter shed, good grass in paddock, possible use of a stable).

Feed will be required except in spring, and possibly even then. That depends on how good the grass is. If too good, you will have to lock the pony up and feed a little hay. Estimate 1 to 2 bales of hay per week for a pony in beginner work with little grazing. Cost will be \$10 to \$20 depending on quality, variety, availability and source. A small amount of supplement should be fed, approximately weekly for beginner ponies. This is mostly for vitamin and mineral content. Grass and hay will not provide all

nutrients (in the wild, horses eat a wide variety of grasses, weeds, and herbs and lick rocks). A good supplement will be about \$2 per week plus the "carrier" feed (bagged feed to mix the powdered supplement into). Carrier feed about \$1 per week. **Total feed cost \$33 per week**.

Of course, all these are estimates. They will vary depending on your particular circumstances and the pony in question.

The next two articles will continue to discuss costs of keeping a pony.

CCR is not means tested, and fees paid by a parent for childcare is paid back up to a cap of \$7,500 a year for each child. If you have twochildren you could receive up to \$15,000 towards the cost of childcare each year.

Outdoor Light Bulbs: Clean all light fixtures, and replace burnt out bulbs with energy saving CFL bulbs.

Give Your Doors Some Love:

Restore the lustre of your doors by polishing the hinges and knobs with polish. Paint or stain the door with a colour that stands out, yet compliments the trim and siding. Put out a clean or new welcome mat and make sure the doorbell works.

September is Dementia Awareness Month

Dementia is something that we all hope we won't get, this month is dementia awareness month so we thought we would give you some details of this dreadful disease that affects so many people.

What is dementia? Dementia describes a collection of symptoms that are caused by disorders affecting the brain. It is not one specific disease. Dementia affects thinking, behaviour and the ability to perform everyday tasks. Brain function is affected enough to interfere with the person's normal social or working life.

Who gets dementia? Most people with dementia are older, but it is important to remember that not all older people get dementia. It is not a normal part of ageing. Dementia can happen to anybody, but it is more common after the age of 65 years. People in their 40s and 50s can also have dementia.

What causes dementia? There are many different forms of dementia and each has its own causes. The most common types of dementia are Alzheimer's disease, Vascular dementia, Parkinson's disease, Dementia with Lewy bodies, Fronto Temporal Lobar Degeneration (FTLD), Huntington's disease, Alcohol related dementia (Korsakoff's syndrome) and Creutzfeldt-Jacob disease.

Is it dementia:?There are a number of conditions that produce symptoms similar to dementia. These include some vitamin and hormone deficiencies, depression, medication clashes or overmedication, infections and brain tumours. It is essential that a medical diagnosis is obtained at an early stage when symptoms first appear to ensure that a person who has a treatable condition is diagnosed and treated correctly. If the symptoms are caused by dementia, an early diagnosis will mean early access to support information, and medication should it be available.

Can dementia be inherited? This will depend on the cause of the dementia, so it is important to have a firm medical diagnosis. If there are concerns about the risk of inheriting dementia, consult your doctor or contact Alzheimer's Australia to speak to a counsellor. Most cases of dementia are not inherited.

What are the early signs of dementia? The early signs of dementia are very subtle and vague and may not be immediately obvious. Some common symptoms may include: Progressive and frequent memory loss, confusion, personality change, apathy and withdrawal, loss of ability to perform everyday tasks.

Tips to Save Money and Help the Environment

- 1: Don't buy bottled water: It's much better and more economical to install a water filtering system in your home, or use your rain water for drinking.
- 2: Make your own homemade cleaning products (see page 18) for some great ideas!
- 3: Make waste free school lunches for your kids: Do your bit for the environment and save money at the same time. Resist buying individual snacks for the kids at the supermarket. If you really need processed snacks, minimise packaging that needs to be disposed of and encourage kids to make their own lunches if you are short of time.
- 4: Going meat-free once a week: This can really help the environment and your wallet, it's more important to buy meat that is grass fed or organic as the animals produce less methane. Try to support people that are raising animals and feeding them in the way intended by nature. Free range and with a natural diet. You'll be contributing to agriculture, which is less harmful for the environment, and the animals themselves.
- 5: Cut family shower time: Set your shower timer and save your heating bill and the earth, along with recycling shower and bath water for use on your plants. "Grey water from both laundry and bathing can be safely recycled onto the garden if chemical-free washing products are used. Don't forget to turn the tap off while brushing your teeth, that can save you hundreds of litres of water per year.

What can be done to help?

At present there is no prevention or cure for most forms of dementia.

However, some medications have been found to reduce some symptoms.

Support is vital for people with dementia and the help of families, friends and carers can make a positive difference to managing the condition.

Warning signs of dementia: The early signs of dementia are very subtle and may not be immediately obvious. Early symptoms also vary a great deal. Usually though, people first seem to notice that there is a problem with memory, particularly in remembering recent events.

Worried about you memory? Feeling forgetful or confused? Finding out what is wrong is the first step to getting help.

Tests used in diagnosing dementia: There is no one diagnostic test for Alzheimer's disease or for most other causes of dementia. Doctors use a number of different tests to determine whether symptoms fit a certain diagnosis and to rule out other possible causes of symptoms.

- 6: Grow whatever food you can: Even if you are not a keen gardener, simply keeping pots of herbs and salad on your window sill will save you a substantial amount of money over a year. Enjoy the resultant improvement in your own health as well as the pleasure of knowing that you are not adding harmful chemicals to the food chain, either in the soil or in the food itself.
- 7: Dry clothes outside: While it might be tempting to put load after load of your clothes in the dryer, it's environmentally unsound and will cost your family money. Use a clothes line to line dry your family's clothes rather than a machine dryer. Dryers are great electricity guzzlers.
- 8: Turn off those lights: By switching off household lights and turning off microwaves, televisions and computers at the wall, you'll be saving dollars on your power bill and upping your green status. Your efforts will save money, improve your health and contribute to a society that uses less energy, fossil fuels and chemicals.



From The Past - Tenefeate Shool

Most of our readers will no doubt know the long sweeping climb up to the Para Wirra Park gate on Humbug Scrub Road.

About halfway up that hill there is a ridge below you on the right hand side on which the Tenefeate School was sited on an acre block on the side of the road. It had been part of the Tenefeate land owned by the Barrett's (ref. Yattalunga) and was resumed in 1951 when the school was removed.

The current road up the long hill to the park was constructed and sealed to suit Para Wirra National Park in the early 1960s.

The photo on the right was taken by Rev. Braysher, who occasionally took the kids for RI. It's of the school group from Tenefeate School, it was taken around 1948. Pictured are the Bellchambers boys, Phillip (*who sent this in to us*), Donald, Lawrence and the teacher Mr. Alec Millikan (standing at the rear), front row is Robin Bellchambers (Phil's brother) and Rex Hall.

Lawrence and Donald were the last 2 children of Gordon and Doris Bellchambers who had their own property abutting the sanctuary. Rex Hall also attended the school, the Halls were sheep farmers with land north of the school and also in Humbug Scrub. The Nobles lived in the house at Tenefeate, probably after Doug McKenzie left for what is now called Al-Ru.

Don later became a works foreman in the Tea Tree Gully Council and was known as a good batsman (cricket) in his youth as well as a keen apiarist. Lance Walter should have some good memories of Don.

Laurie had an inventive streak in him and worked all his life as a technical officer in DSTO Salisbury. Robin spent most of his working life as an inspector/manager in Coles and Woolworths. He showed a keen interest in sport such as tennis and tenpin bowling.

Apparently Ronnie Noble continued farming in the South East, (nobody is sure if he is still there, if you know, let the Grapevine know), Don, Laurie, John and Robin have all passed on.

You'll notice in the photo below that all the windows were open at the school, there wasn't electricity in those days and so no electric fans!

Apparently brown snakes were rife on hot days, in the photo it shows stout lengths of fence wire (to the right of the teacher), this was used by an older kid when they accompanied the smaller kids to the toilet. The wire protected them by cracking any snakes back with the length of wire if it dared to come on the footpath. Phil said that the long drop (toilet) was covered with railway sleepers, it didn't bear thinking about it but snake eggs were often hatched underneath them. On a hunt one day the kids found about 11 different sizes of brown snakes and chopped them up with garden spades!

Cleaning the Natural Wa

Cleaning products don't have to come in a shiny happy spray pack straight off the supermarket shelves. Air and water are two of the planet's best cleaning products.

Adding ingredients like bi-carb soda, borax, soap, salt or white vinegar to the basics of air and water creates a smorgasbord of offerings to clean a home in a planet-friendly and affordable manner. After all, who wants to know their kids are ingesting chemicals from the spray pack you've smeared all over your household surfaces? Not a nice thought is it? Adding a rag, a bucket and recyclable spray bottle to your home cleaning products list will give you an arsenal of cheap and effective cleaning tools, all for less than the price of a bulk pack of regular laundry powder.

Now, something that hasn't been mentioned is a little elbow grease. As lovely as homemade cleaning products are, it may take a little longer to achieve the results. Don't let this put you off though, many of these ingredients are much cheaper and safer than traditional cleaning products. There is no point in creating a green home unless you KEEP it green by cleaning with non-toxic ingredients.

Water doesn't sound terribly potent as a cleaning product and it can leave lime scale or spot marks, but is extremely powerful at removing dirt and grease. Adding a little heat to the water will give it even more grime-removing oomph! Adding a flake or two of soap (organic plant based soaps are the most biodegradable option) will make it work even harder. Hot soapy water is one of the best cleansers around. It will clean bench tops, wash dishes and clean people. Heating water activates the alkaline soap into lifting more effectively from a surface. Wiping a bench with an old rag (recycled bath towels) will clean the surface more thoroughly than spraying it with a cleaning chemical that is simply left on the surface.

Water is even more powerful when it is turned into steam, if you are lucky enough to own a steam cleaner, this will disinfect floors and bathrooms beautifully.

To make sure dish cloths stay hygienic without using chlorine bleach, simply wet them and put them in the microwave for two minutes where the steam will kill most bacteria.

We all know the wonders of fresh air, but most of us forget how important it is at keeping rooms, especially bathrooms, clean. Mould and bacteria thrive only in moist environments, so the best way to prevent them is to have plenty of air circulating. Airing the house regularly is important for deodorising and making sure the air inside the home - which CSIRO has found can be more polluted than the air outside a home, is regularly exchanged and freshened. Even just a few minutes a day can noticeably improve your indoor air quality, no matter what season it is.

While chemical-free cleaners sound virtuous, it's nearly impossible to maintain an entirely chemical free cleaning regime unless you solely rely on air, water and micro-fibre cloths. Most cleaning 'helpers' like vinegar or borax are useful because of their alkaline or acidic nature. It's important to understand how the more harmful substances, which are cheaper than traditional store-bought cleaners and more likely to be biodegradable, can be integrated safely and easily into your cleaning routine. If you give it a go and don't like it, that's fine, there are still plenty of alternatives on the supermarket shelves that are natural products.

Bi-carb Soda, or sodium bicarbonate, is fairly safe to use but is a nightmare to clean if you sprinkle too much. A little dollop will do. This white powder is mildly abrasive and is slightly alkaline, it can neutralize odours by changing the pH rather than masking the smell like essential oils do. Mixed with a little detergent, it creates a creamy cleanser (like Jif or Gumption) but remember to use only a small amount of it.

Borax or sodium borate is an alkali that is toxic if swallowed, it is a great cockroach deterrent and has strong cleaning powers, especially in hot water. You only need a small amount, around 1 tablespoon to 4 litres of water, and is great to wash woollen clothes and blankets as it preserves the softness of the wool. Mix 5 tablespoons with 4 litres of water and you have a cleaning solution to scrub old concrete paths (just be careful the borax solution doesn't wash onto nearby plants).

Washing soda or sodium carbonate decahydrate is a mineral that is also alkaline. It cuts grease, removes stains and can be used to clean walls, sinks and tiles. You can add 2 tablespoons to 4 litres of hot water to make your own surface spray, this is especially good for cleaning ovens, outdoor furniture and BBQs. Rinse off and dry thoroughly though! Do not use on aluminum.

White vinegar is the great for removing mildew, cutting grease, dissipating odours, and removing stains and wax build-up. Generations of housekeepers swear it shines floors better than detergents (which leave a film behind) as it evaporates quickly. It can be used as the rinse-aid in the dishwasher and a dose in the washing machine every now and then will help remove detergent build-up and whiten clothes. It is powerful when combined with Bi-carb soda as the froth and bubble of the alkali and acid combined will lift and remove heavy grease and dirt.

Make your own cleaners: White vinegar costs around \$2 from the supermarket. Put 4 parts water and 1 part vinegar in a spray bottle to clean rubbish bins, the acid will neutralize the smells.

Bi-carb soda is around \$2 as well, this is perfect to clean stainless steel sinks. Vinegar will help clear the drains, finish with a good blast of hot water.

Washing soda is about \$3, this is available at supermarkets and hardware stores, usually in the laundry section. It is a great silverware polish as well as an aid for washing woolens etc.

Borax is available at most supermarkets or hardware stores and again it's normally in the laundry section. By mixing equal parts borax and washing soda this could be used for automatic dishwashers, make sure the mixture is well rinsed off before eating off dishes.

Salt, this is just about the cheapest cleaning product on the market, a great use for it is to soak yellowed linen in a mix of salt and bi-carb, this should brighten them up.



MICROWAVE CHRISTMAS PUDDING

Ingredients:
250 grams Butter
250 grams soft brown sugar
4 Eggs
1 kg Mixed Fruit and Nuts
1 teaspoon Cinnamon
1 cup Cooked Apple
1/2 teaspoon All-spice
1/2 Nutmeg

1 cup Plain Flour 1½ Cups Breadcrumbs ½ cup Sherry 1 tablespoon Golden Syrup

Method: Soak fruit in the sherry for two hours. Cream butter and sugar, mix in eggs, add other ingredients. Lightly grease two containers (microwave proof) and then fill with pudding mixture. Cover loosely with Glad Wrap. Cook the two containers together on De-Frost for 30-35 minutes, then on high for 5 minutes. When cold cover with greaseproof paper and replace Glad Wrap and store until needed.

To Re-Heat: Stand basin in boiling water for 1 minute, then turn out onto a plate. There is a disc of greaseproof paper which needs to be removed. Cover very loosely with Glad Wrap and microwave for 3 minutes on high. Wait for 3 minutes until serving.

Microwave used is 1000w when on high. Defrost is 270w. Please check your microwave rating and adjust if necessary.
