

A Fond Farewell from the Grapevine

As you may have read in the December edition of the Grapevine a very dedicated member of the community passed away. Sybil Winsor will be remembered for the many things that she did in the town right up until she was admitted to hospital. Sybil was an inspiration to us all.

Everyone in the town of One Tree Hill knew Sybil, some are still talking about her famous apple pies. Once the word was out that Sybil had apple pies for the Uniting Church stall at the market people would flock to the stall and stand in line hoping to get a pie. Some walked away very disappointed!

Doug, Sybil's husband has been kind enough to send us the recipe for Sybil's famous apple pie, please see below. We are sure that the most important ingredient in the recipe is the love of cooking for others. That was Sybil's secret ingredient, keep it in mind when preparing!

The following was written by Sybil, we did a feature about how the Grapevine was started a few years back. Sybil was kind enough to supply the information for the article we featured.

Sybil's Pastry

500 grams Self raising Flour

250 grams Margarine (I use Meadow Lea)

1 cup of cold water

Pinch of salt

1 egg, beaten. (for brushing pastry)

(Makes 3 pies)

<u>Method</u>

With very cold hands, rub margarine into the flour until it resembles bread crumbs, lifting the mixture up, to make pastry light. Add water gently (very cold) and mix until it forms into a dough-like lump.

Form into a ball, and roll out as much as you need for the base, always rolling from the middle, and rotating the pastry mixture as you go.

Place in pie case, & brush the base with the beaten egg and add the cooked and sugared apples. (the apple mixture should be cold)

Roll out enough for the top and make two cuts in the middle. Put in place and fork round the edges.

Bake in a moderate oven for 20 minutes, checking to see whether the pastry has turned moderately brown

About 2 kilos of Granny Smith apples for 3 pies.

The Origin of the Grapevine by Sybil Winson

Jill Wilson and Sybil Winsor (then Richardson) got together in 1978 to put into practice an idea they had talked about, i.e.: producing a Community News Sheet.

They came up with the name "Grapevine" as an example of something growing and spreading - where do you find out things? Of course on the 'Grapevine'.

The first Grapevine was produced as follows:

Initially it was hand written on the "Fordigraph" spirit duplicating sheets. Later, information was typed up on a Typewriter and then Jill and Sybil would travel to Elizabeth Downs to the Uniting Church there, and using the Gestetner, would print copies. People could then pick up their copy from the Craft Shop or the Deli.

Since that date, of course it has become a much bigger project, and many people have been involved in editing and producing it.

We are grateful to all those who have played a part in making the Grapevine what it is today.

ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT FEBRUARY 2013 Incident Report



The last two months have been busy for the One Tree Hill Brigade. The total call our rate has reached 104 at the time of writing this report, this is a record number for this time of the year. The Brigade has provided members and equipment for strike teams to Yorke Peninsula, Clare and Jamestown over the past two months. We have also had a number of suspicious fires in the area which remain a concern; one in Forestry Land on Bassnet Road had the potential to be a problem. There have been a number of grass fires that have been caused by carelessness. One on the Kersbrook Road caused by an angle grinder was looking very dangerous until it was brought under control. The usual car crashes and car fires have occurred on a regular basis.

One thing the CFS has is a variety when it comes to the type of incidents reported.

Councillor's Report by Joe Federico

Firstly I wish everyone a HAPPY NEW YEAR.

I hope everyone has weathered the holiday season without adding too many kilos. My deepest sympathies and heartfelt condolences to those who have lost loved ones (especially over the past few months), having lost my father 12 months ago I can empathise with you and assure you that it does get easier but the memories never die, in fact they come flooding back when you least expect them keeping your loved ones alive in your memory and your heart.

Council has developed a policy for its staff when a catastrophic fire danger day is declared. Apparently staff are not allowed east of Adams Road to protect them in the case of fire. However for the safety of those in the fire danger areas Council will lock the public toilets and advise of the nearest toilet location (no map provided) which if you are at the Institute is at Fremont Park (too bad if the fire is on Yorktown Road). The reason the toilets are locked is because Council staff can't get there to clean them?? Other services provided by Council are also suspended on those days, services like home assist etc. An interesting fact to come from my ongoing discussions with Council in relation to cutting services to protect staff (don't forget you chose to live in a bushfire area so it is up to you to protect yourself "apparently") is that there is NO SAFE mustering point in One Tree Hill, so if your emergency fire plan includes a safe spot in Playford then that will have to be the Council chambers (don't know if any arrangements are in place to accommodate anyone in these circumstances) or a friend or relatives place.

Please do not lock your gates on these days in case CFS and emergency services need to gain fast access. In the case of an emergency Council will undertake a risk mitigation assessment and act accordingly. I hope the CFS, Ambulance and Police do not have a similar policy to Council. Playford CEO, Mr Tim Jackson, will be briefing elected members at a Council meeting, on this policy as it was developed with NO input from elected members.

The rollout of the Rural Numbering System should be in progress

by the time this edition is printed, it is anticipated that resident's letters and information will be collated by Friday 18/1/13 for the Hills area (total – 706). Letters will be posted in the week 21 – 25 January (Included in this mail out – New RPA Address, 6 postage paid change of address cards, a pamphlet outlining Rural Postal Addressing Project Time Frames). Two weeks are allowed for Resident's queries (Final date for queries - 1/2/13). DPTI will provide updated address spread sheet to the Contractor who will manufacture signage (approx. 3 weeks) which will be followed by the Installation of signs in Hills area (10 -14 days).

The Tour Down Under should have been through by now, I hope it has been very successful and that everyone has had a great time and the weather's not been too hot.

However I cannot guarantee that I will be able to get any better results but will at least have council reassess their position and provide an explanation as to their resolve and in some cases if not most, reach a compromise that is acceptable to all parties concerned. Horse Care - Bridling Difficulties Part 2: The Head Shy Horse

The horse comes with a built-in fear of its head held by a predator, as it is likely to be killed. We have to be patient until they allow us to touch their head, not forcefully hold it until they give in. The horse that gives in is terrified, not compliant. Begin with the advance and retreat method. Before he does more than tip his nose you must remove your hand. Each stroke should get you a little closer. This may take 2 minutes or 2 weeks – it takes as long as it takes. Try to avoid haltering or bridling while this training takes place; you will undo what you have achieved. This stage culminates in you sliding your cupped hand over his ear from base to tip and releasing instantly. When he does not lift his head at this, you can move to the next stage.

Each lesson lasts, from the horse's point of view, for 3 to 10 seconds. But you may spend 10 minutes or an hour and may repeat several times a day, daily, or whenever you can find the time.

Feed (small) slices of carrot with the other hand to encourage the positioned head. Keep the carrot so he is reaching down (or up, if it is a pony) to the point you would like him to hold his head while you bridle. I like my horses/ponies to hold their nose level with my waist. This puts their ears at about shoulder height and makes them easy to bridle, halter and groom.

Now we have a horse that tolerates us handling his head but we still have to get it in our reach. So teach the "head down" cue. But first get into the habit of putting halters on from the shoulder, not the nose.

Approach the horse, pat his shoulder and slip the lead rope around his neck in a big cuddle. Slide the rope up his neck until it is behind the ears (over the poll). Add the headpiece of the halter to this position. If he throws his head up, use the rope to insistently pull down.

You cannot pull his head down, but you can make it uncomfortable to hold up. (A horse can lift 100kg in the air with its teeth. Ask the man that was thrown, by his shoulder, over a fence). The moment he drops his head 1 mm, ease the pressure, then ask again until the head is in your reach. Slip the noseband over his nose and do up the head/throat strap. Continue to work on the head down cue until it is habit for you and the horse. Pressure on the poll means head down. When we bridle, this pressure is applied with our wrist between his ears and Horse keeps his head where we can bridle.

"Head down" can be all the way to the ground. Or any point you choose. Teach all levels so you can put the head where you want it and it will stay until you give the release cue. Make sure you have a release cue. It can be as simple as a rub on the neck and turning away.

Ponies often cannot lift their head out of our reach. Some learn to put their nose on the ground and this is just as hard to bridle. Teach them "head up" by the same methods; a carrot held at the correct height reinforces the "where" while we teach the cue (in this case, a hand under the chin).

The carrot is an aid to help the horse understand where (by rewarding instantly), the cue is vital unless you want to carry carrots all the time.


Trying to put the noseband on first is an invitation to resist. The horse can easily back his head out of the noseband. At any sign of refusal, you have no way of insisting.

CRIME PREVENTION SOUTH AUSTRALIA POLICE KEEPING SA SAFE ARSON PREVENTION

The South Australian Police State Crime Prevention Branch develops strategies to prevent crime and the fear of crime within the community. Arson is the act of intending or being reckless, with fire to destroy property. Arson can occur against different types of property including vehicles, homes, buildings and other tangible property.

Arson can also occur in grassed and bush areas.

Remembering some simple prevention tips can help to minimise the risk of arson in your community.

* Keep your home, sheds and vehicles locked at all times.

- * Consider the storage location of any fuel and flammable liquids if possible store in a locked cabinet located away from house.
- * Keep your yard and premises clear of combustibles such as rubbish and plant material.
- * Keep lawns and grasslands surrounding homes and sheds mowed. If necessary contact your local council to manage areas.
- * Plant shrubs and bushes away from houses and sheds.
- * Be alert and record details and report to the Police.
- * Consider signage with regard to arson prevention and penalties.

- * Be on the lookout for other forms of vandalism. If graffiti or damage is not cleared up quickly it can make it a target for arson.
- * Ensure periodic inspections of your own property and conduct fire risk assessments.
- * Install fire extinguishers, fire blankets, smoke alarms and other fire protective equipment necessary, ensuring these systems are checked regularly.
- * Gaps under doors should be narrow to prevent paper or fuel being pushed under them.
- * Consider joining Neighbourhood Watch, Business Watch or Rural Watch programs.

Arnold Paine's Tribute

This article is dedicated to one of OTH's loved characters.

We remember and honour Arnold Frederick George Paine, he was 96 years young. Arnold was born in 1916, it wasn't exactly yesterday, it was back in the days when you could buy a 30HP 2 seater Buick for £150. In the day you could also buy ladies cotton gloves for 1/- a pair at John Martins and even get a great set of teeth for £2 and 10/- from Joseph Blitz who operated his business in Rundle Street.

Times have changed quite dramatically since then and many different events have unfolded and Arnold must have witnessed so many of these. Wouldn't it have been wonderful to have witnessed so many life changing events, some good, some not so good.

You have all heard of the expression, "Jack of all trades", this sums up Arnold as he was the Master of just about all those trades despite no formal qualifications. His family drew up a list of the achievements in Arnolds life, he was a farmer, a dairy farmer, orchardist, a water diviner, an electrician, mechanic, builder, driller, surveyor, fire wood supplier, bush vet.....plus so much more!

Arnold was born in the family home at Hamley Bridge on June 18th 1916, he was the oldest of the 3 children for Ern and Pearl Paine. After Arnold came his brother, Ern (now deceased) and his sister Thelma.

Arnold left school at quite a young age (as most of the people born in that era) and worked for Jack Harvey at One Tree Hill. He started out on 7/- a week, plus his food and lodging. While still very young, he worked with the Harvey family at Coonalypyn, when he returned home he worked with his parents milking cows, picking fruit and supplying wood for both industry and homes in the local area and in Adelaide. Arnold married Rose McGhan who hailed from Smithfield, they were married for 50 years and they had 5 children. (Rose passed away in 1990).

The providing of wood continued for a number of years, he

was still working this job with wood cutting when the children started to arrive. His children Jan and Claude still remember sitting on a stack of wood as it was delivered to Adelaide. (Imagine how long the trip would have been)

In later years, Arnold went back to work with the Harvey's, at the time they were selling up their properties to be sub-divided and Arnold showing his diverse range of skills did the fencing and help to put in water systems. In the process, he got to know many of the settlers in the district and he became a father-like figure to many of these people.

Arnold had a number of interest although his main hobby was to work with his tools.... Some of those tools carried initials A.P. 8, which stood for Arnold Paine the 8 indicated when he received the tools. Arnold could turn his hand to just about anything.

In 1980 Arnold even appeared in the Advertiser, he had made so many water strikes that Dick Smith and others wanted a contest over in Sydney, Arnold declined as he didn't like flying. As we are limited to space if you would like to view the article email us or drop us a line.





Bushfire Alert

What would you do if there was a Bushfire heading toward your home? Residents in Gumeracha are learning how to be Bushfire Ready, with the development of a series of Community Fire Safe Groups in the area, through the Country Fire Service (CFS).

Community Fire Safe Groups are aimed at assisting residents living in high bushfire risk areas, by forming community action groups that develop plans and community strategies to reduce the bushfire threat and increase the community's preparedness.

The groups may consist of just a few families living in the same street or within an area that faces a common bushfire threat, and with the assistance of a CFS Community Education Officer they learn about fire behaviour and bushfire preparedness.

The Gumeracha group began when Paula Tose, from Checker Hill Road, saw Penny Kazla, Community Education Officer, present a Bushfire Awareness Session at the local Neighbourhood Watch meeting. It prompted her to, with support from the CFS, organise and host a number of meetings with her neighbours to discuss and gain information about their personal Bushfire Survival Plans.

"I feel really empowered now to know what to do in the event of a fire in our area," Paula said. "This program is brilliant and, as a bonus, I have met some of my new neighbours! I think the Community Fire Safe Program was delivered so well - Penny is a wonderful presenter who made the information understandable and relevant to our local situation."

The last meeting for the group was held at the Kersbrook CFS Station, where local Captain, Graham Rehn showed the group around the station.

As I'm sure you are aware the Fire Danger season commenced on 1/12/2012. As part of the new WHS Fire Danger Preparedness Procedure you will receive a Corporate Information Bulletin on Catastrophic fire days, website messages will also be posted to alert employees and the community to the declaration (*for Extreme and Catastrophic ratings*) on the following Playford sites:

- * Intranet home page
- * Internet home page
- * Emergency management home page

On declared Extreme or Catastrophic Days there are zone restrictions. For example on an Extreme day no Council employee can work east of the Playford Safer Working area, whereas on a Catastrophic declared day (such as today) employees are only to work within the Playford Safer Working area. There is exception to this rule; if service delivery is mandatory (e.g. dog attack) a thorough risk assessment is required to be undertaken and approved by the relevant stakeholders – Management & OHS Team.

In addition each department has completed a service delivery matrix of services that can be shut down or provided via alternative methods, services that are required but could be scaled down or managed differently, services that must continue or services that require an increased service level.

This information is being fed through to the Customer Care Team so should any residents have queries about why a service is not being performed on a particular declared day they are equipped to manage that query.

This procedure has been put in place to ensure the community gets maximum service whilst we maintain the highest safety standards for our staff and the community. This procedure will help with planning works for the following years; ensuring that areas with higher fire danger/potential are serviced through the cooler months of the year.

Community Update - Fire Danger in the City of Playford

Days of heightened fire danger impact our community and residents need to be prepared for the increased risk this carries

Know the fire danger

The CFS releases Daily Fire Danger ratings which indicate how dangerous a fire could be if it occurred. The Fire Danger Rating is the trigger to act; the higher the rating, the more dangerous the situation. CFS Ratings should be used to plan your behaviour and where necessary, prompt your Bushfire Survival Plan. If you are not familiar with the rating system, or to view the Daily Fire Danger visit cfs.sa.gov.au

What to do in periods of increased risk

The CFS advises a written and practised Bushfire Survival Plan is the most important part of your preparation to survive a bushfire.

Your plan will help you take action and avoid making last minute decisions that could prove deadly during a bushfire.

The CFS has developed a hierarchy of places that can offer relative safety from bushfire. In this hierarchy there are; Bushfire Safer Settlements; Bushfire Safer Precincts; and Last Resort Refuges. Detailed information about these areas are available on the CFS website. In line with this information, a portion of the City of Playford is included in the CFS Bushfire Safer Settlement. The CFS has not identified any other safe areas outside of the Safer Settlement in the Playford area; this means Playford does not have any Bushfire Safer Precincts or Last Resort Refuges.

The Township of One Tree Hill is not recognized by the CFS as a Bushfire Safer Precinct. The CFS has also advised the One Tree Hill Institute is not considered a muster point in the case of fire. Depending on your locality, a Safer Precinct or Last Resort Refuge may exist in a location that falls within an adjoining council area. You should be aware of the most accessible Bushfire Safer Place as part of your Survival Plan. Check for Bushfire Safer Places near you by visiting cfs.sa.gov.au

Council services on declared Fire Danger Days

In the interests of community safety, on days of heightened fire danger the City of Playford may be required to reduce services to certain areas, or restrict the type of services conducted. Council's Fire Danger Preparedness Procedure outlines the impact Fire Danger Ratings may have on services.

In accordance with the CFS Safer Settlement, the City of Playford has developed the Playford Safer Working Area (PSWA). To view the PSWA, visit playford.sa.gov.au/dailyfirerating.com and click on the Safer Settlement Map link.

On a declared Extreme Fire Danger day, Council services, programs or events will not be carried out in areas east of the PSWA. Services to the west of the PSWA will continue where deemed safe. On a declared Catastrophic day, services, programs or events will not operate outside the PSWA. This means that all Council services in the One Tree Hill area will be postponed until the rating is downgraded.

Where a risk assessment deems the provision of an essential service to be safe, such services will be delivered, including emergency response work, transport assistance and other critical incidents. Letter to the Grapevine—Dated 29th Dec 2012.

Yesterday, I believe I came within a hair's breath of losing my life in a head on collision.

I was headed along One Tree Hill Rd towards Golden Grove, I had exited the 100KM zone and was now in the 80KM zone, DOING 80KM, approaching Shillabeer Road. As I approached, 3 cars came down the road, over bend that runs over the little creek. No problem, everyone was driving sensibly, nothing to raise an eyebrow over. One eye on them, one eye on the Road! The first car crossed in front of me, with plenty of room, onto Shillabeer Road. The second car stopped waiting to turn into the road and the car behind it also stopped, waiting for me to drive past them. Nothing special, nothing unusual....I continued along and the front of my car was almost level with the car waiting to turn, when all of a sudden at the speed of light, a silver sedan came flying around that bend and down the road at a rate of knots. As I was doing 80----it would at least have been a 110km per hour and probably faster. It came from nowhere and in such an instant there was barely time to react. It was on top of us in milliseconds!

NEXT THING IT was swerving out around the TWO CARS and it was going soooooo fast that it was way over on the other side of the road! At this moment the front part of my car was in line with the first stationary car, (i.e. side by side) . YEP, I WAS SET FOR A HEAD ON COLLISION!!! I drove a white car so I was clearly visible and the first stationary car was white as well! He/she was just way, way, way TOO FAST!!!

It was luck, just sheer luck that I am alive! I swerved hard to the left and only just managed to keep control of my own car and miss the silver one. (He, I might add, barely had control of his, the way he swerved so widely around the other two.

If Shillabeer Rd had not been there, I would be dead, as there would have been nowhere to go!!! The verge would not have saved me as the car swerved so much onto my side of the road that he/she still would have hit me!

Years ago in my 20s, my lack of experience in a similar situation saw me in hospital. Many years later, experience has arrived and I managed to avoid a crash. Had it been our newly licensed teen, we would probably have lost her.

Had I had kids in the car, had I flitted my eyes down to adjust the a.c., had a fly settled on my knee and I glanced at it...had ANY OF A MILLION MILLI SECOND EVERYDAY OCCURRENCES caused, FOR THAT SPLIT SECOND IN TIME, my eyes to have been anywhere but the road, I would have been dead.

THIS ISN'T A KEEP YOUR EYES ON THE ROAD MESSAGE. because everyone always has split seconds when they take their eyes off, to look at the kids in the rear view mirror, to see the fly, to press the button to turn on the radio /a.c. But if I had happened to do that in that split second, quite simply I wouldn't be typing this now!

A few years ago a mother lost her life on that very bend. I'm a mother too and I DON'T WANT TO LOSE MINE!!!

We have lost lives on every road in and out of this town. All of us have had hair raising experiences with idiots who over -take on blind corners on Snake Gully Rd. I don't know the answer. The police can't be everywhere and even responsible drivers have split seconds where their eyes leave the road. Had I been travelling less than 80 and been in that same spot, I probably would not have had the speed to get out of the way, THAT IS HOW CLOSE IT WAS. I could have felt his wind, had the window been down!

If you know the really bad spots, and this is one of them, pay extra attention. This all happened in less than a blink of an eye lid!! AND IF BY CHANCE YOU ARE GUILTY OF GOING TOO FAST ON THAT ROAD!!!! REMEMBER IT IS NOT YOUR ABILITY TO CONTROL YOUR CAR AS YOU DRIVE ALONE, THAT IS ALWAYS CALLED INTO QUESTION, IT IS YOUR ABILITY TO STOP IF YOU NEED TOAND THAT DRIVER COULDN'T!!!

I hope I am never a fatality, but I no longer walk out of the house feeling sure of that!

(I had not told my family I loved them, I had just walked out with a quick" BYE, I'm going to the shops and will be back in about 2 hours"....for many, that sort of thing is the last sentence their family hears.

PLEASE DON'T run the risk of being the one who causes that. Anon!

January 2013 One Tree Hill families start benefiting from Schoolkids Bonus cash

The Gillard Government's new Schoolkids Bonus has started landing in the bank accounts of One Tree Hill families.

Federal Member for Wakefield, Nick Champion said One Tree Hill families would receive their Schoolkids Bonus over the next fortnight before their kids return to school.

"The School kids Bonus will help lighten the load of back-to-school costs for a lot of One Tree Hill families as they get their kids ready for school over the next few weeks," Nick Champion said.

"It helps parents buy uniforms, shoes, school books and stationery." as well as other costs like school excursions, music lessons and sports registration fees.

"Each year eligible families will receive up to \$410 for each child in primary school, and up to \$820 a year for each high school student paid in two installments - just when families need it most.

"The first Schoolkids Bonus payment starts arriving in bank accounts in January, so local families have plenty of time get to the shops and get all the things the kids need for school."

"The Schoolkids Bonus replaces the old Education Tax Refund, which too many families were missing out on," Nick Champion said. "A lot of families just couldn't afford to buy the school items first and then wait months and months to get something back.

"The upfront payment means families do not have to collect a pile of receipts or fill out that extra paperwork at tax time. They money is in their pocket when they need it most - before the kids go back to school."

Families receiving Family Tax Benefit Part A, as well as young people in school receiving Youth Allowance, and others receiving certain income support or veterans' payments are eligible for the Schoolkids Bonus.

Families with kids starting primary or high school this year need to make sure their child's enrolment details are up to date with Centrelink. They can do this by checking their details on the Centrelink website.

Families who claim their Family Tax Benefit at the end of the financial year will receive their payment then.



RURAL & TOWNSHIP RABBIT CONTROL

Rabbits may look harmless, but take another look! Check the new trees you have planted, the vegie garden or pastures and crops. Check shed and rain water tank foundations. The furry critters can cause havoc to our environment. Their burrowing can lead to erosion problems and cause structural damage to buildings. Rabbits excite dogs risking injury on the chase and encouraging barking. Rabbits breed quickly and can cause a lot of damage in a relatively short time.

It is easy to underestimate the actual numbers of rabbits on properties because generally less than 25% are actually seen. Rabbits know no boundaries so it is important neighbours work collaboratively to control them. Under the Natural Resources Management Act 2004 it is the legal responsibility of the land owner to control rabbits on their property.

The first step towards the management of rabbits is to identify the location of any warrens or above ground cover that provide rabbits some refuge and a safe place to breed and to destroy or remove them. Rabbits are territorial and generally don't travel more than 200 metres from these sites, with most of their feeding done within 25 to 50 metres. Look for signs where rabbits have been active, such as burrows, fresh scratches in the soil, scattered or piled dung and damage to vegetation. Make an estimate of the total area within which the rabbits move. This is where your control program will need to concentrate. Also working with neighbours is the most effective way of controlling a rabbit problem that crosses boundaries. Late summer or autumn is the best time to control rabbits using bait. Rabbits are at their most vulnerable as natural food is scarce. Currently Pindone is the only poison bait that can be used in urban situations for rabbit control but its use is restricted to properties larger than 1000m2, and can only be used in accordance with label instructions. There are two types of Pindone bait currently available. Pindone coated oats is available commercially in various size packages through most agricultural supply retailers. The Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges NRM Board produces Pindone-coated diced carrots and is supplied in bags that need to be kept frozen until ready for use. There are a number of methods that can be used to control rabbits. To achieve good results it is best to use a number of ongoing approaches.

A free presentation offered by the Adelaide and Mt Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board will held in One Tree Hill on Wednesday the 27th of February 7pm to discuss effective control of rabbits. Topics will include:

- * Identifying rabbit damage & likely harbours
- * Rabbit behaviour & life cycle
- Control options
- * Long term management tools
- * Various control techniques will be discussed, including the use of ferrets, legal trapping, exclusion fencing, warren destruction, baiting and fumigation.


