## ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT MAY 2013



**Incident Report** 

During the month the Brigade has had 10 incidents to attend which varied from a small fire deliberately lit in the Para Wirra National Park to providing personnel and trucks for a Strike team to Rockleigh near Palmer which had a scrub fire. An unusual fire in a Solar Panel system on a house was reported which proved to be difficult to contain due to the fact that the system had no isolation switch at the solar panels, this enabled the power to flow continuously to the isolation switch next to the inverter which was on fire (even when the panels were covered with tarps). The only way to stop the current flow was to have the wiring disconnected by an electrician. Luckily the homeowner was home and able to report the smoke and flames.

#### **Councillors Report**

The rollout of the Rural Numbering System seemed to have come to a grinding halt however by the time this edition is out everyone should have their numbers installed and should be using their new postal address. There will always be teething problems with any roll out of this type and should you have any issues or need clarification please phone Maureen Wisdom at the City of Playford. Please remember that this is a National rollout funded by the Government and Council is merely the facilitator and has no say in the numbering. Residents in other Councils have had to pay for and install their own numbers (perhaps why it appears that they got theirs quicker) but honestly their rollout has been less complicated. Council has at the Civic Centre a maximum of 6 prepaid envelopes and notification cards for residents should you need more than were allocated to you and the local Post Office may also be able to assist with this.

The draft sporting precinct plan is out for public consultation. This is a comprehensive ambitious plan that will affect local clubs and will be, once approved, a costly and long term unfunded initiative so please have your say. It is coincidental that the 5 year strategic plan for the City will soon be out for public consultation, this plan will determine rate increases for next financial year and further and will most likely incorporate funding for the sports precinct and ratepayers expectations as revealed in the 2043 vision discussions and Section 30 review conducted by the City of Playford.

ANZAC Day will have come and gone by the time this edition is out, regardless I would like to thank the Progress Association for its commitment and dedication to this event and for the warm and hospitable welcome it affords all who attend.

Your local MP Mr Michael O'Brien was at the country market where I and others discussed with him local issues such as the lack of public transport and ongoing concerns with the Kersbrook road intersection, let's hope some positive action will be taken as a result of these discussions.

#### Horse Care - 5 Bridling Difficulties - Tricks to Make Bridling Easier

We have discussed how to make sure the bridle fits comfortably but we still have to get it on without distressing the horse. Make every bridling experience a comfortable one to minimise future problems.

Hold the bridle in the left hand; headpiece and rein buckle together. Check it is hanging straight, without tangles, and all buckles that need to be are undone. Give your horse a cuddle around the neck, and while doing so, pass the reins up the right side of the neck, taking hold at the buckle with the right hand. Slip your right thumb through the loop in reins at the buckle. (The bridle headpiece is still in your left hand.) Lift the reins up the neck so they are laying immediately behind the ears, over the poll. With them here, you can exert force on the neck if the horse attempts to pull away but if he does get away, the reins will not hang around his feet. With your right wrist resting between his ears, pass the headpiece up to the right hand. Do this by sliding the left hand up his face while holding the headpiece.

CHECK the TEMPERATURE of the BIT. If it is too hot or too cold for you to comfortably hold in your bare hand (no gloves please), it is not comfortable for him. Adjust as required. This may mean going away and dipping the bit in cool water, or warming it (most of the time, your hand will warm or cool it enough). Make it a habit to check at this point of the bridling. If you hung the bridle on the fence, the bit may have heated up while you were bringing your horse up, having a chat, grooming, whatever.

Using the right hand to take the weight of the bridle, lifting it until the bit is just under the mouth, present the bit to the horse with the left hand. I have small hands. I lay the bit on the palm of my hand, with the fingers pulling the furthest ring away from the horse (to the right). Those fingers then tickle the lips of the horse (I can't see what I am doing, it's all by feel) until he opens his mouth and takes the bit. With the bit gently pressed against the teeth and the weight taken by the right hand, the moment he opens, it slips in. If he refuses he will usually indicate it by grimacing. He will open his lips but not his teeth. It is then time to take action. Slip the fingers of the left hand into his mouth and press on the bar, the gum area between the teeth. If he still refuses, reach further in and press on his tongue.

I have been more assertive by digging finger nails into the tongue – that works and only had to be done once with each of those horses. Some people use their thumb on the left side of the mouth to open it. With my small hands, I have found the right side works better as it means I can keep the bit straight and against his teeth. Using the left side often means the bit drops away from his mouth. Don't try to force the bit in. If the teeth are closed, you cannot make it happen. He has to cooperate. Most horses, when given the chance, will pick the bit up with their lips and pass it into their mouths into a comfortable place. As he picks it up, lift the bridle with your right hand – continue to take the weight and keep the cheek pieces straight.

Now the bit is in, point the right ear forward and slip it under the headpiece. Do the same to the left ear. Pointing forward means the bit does not have to be lifted as high as if you pull the headpiece backwards over the ears. Starting with the right means you can prevent it falling off before you have finished.

Bring the reins under the neck and slip them over your left arm. Do up the throat lash, then any nosebands. Check the tightness. If they look different to the usual fit, the bridle is probably not in the right place. Go to the other side and straighten it. You may find a buckle or strap is laying over an eye, or pressing on a bone. Fix it. Always check from the right as well as the left. I have seen some strange fittings when shortcuts have been made: reins through the cheek piece, reins on the front side of the bit . . .

Finish by tidying the forelock so it lays flat. This is not a cosmetic thought; it is more comfortable for the horse. Check that bits of mane are not tickling the ears.

If you have done your base work well, the horse will find the bridle is not uncomfortable and the act is not stressful. He will be easier to bridle in the future.

Next month: getting it off without stress.

#### The Hidden Dangers of Over-The-Counter Drugs

Just because non-prescription drugs are available to anyone doesn't mean that they are harmless. Often over-the-counter medications are simply lower doses of regular prescription medications, with the same side effects and cautions that are associated with the higher doses.

Without some care, non-prescription medications can cause harm instead of helping. To ensure that you and your family are safe, keep these guidelines in mind next time you make a trip to the chemist.

As a general rule, do not consume alcohol when using any medication. Some medications can induce drowsiness, which is made worse with alcohol. Some drugs like Tylenol can cause liver damage if used long-term by regular drinkers.

Do not mix medications without asking the advice of your physician or pharmacist. There are risks when taking some types of over-the-counter products as true drugs. You must consider the risks they might pose in certain circumstances. Don't forget that antacids, laxatives and diet aids are also considered to be drugs and they should be taken with the same precautions.

If you have any underlying medical condition, such as high blood pressure, heart disease, depression, glaucoma, diabetes, or other conditions you are receiving treatment for, talk to your doctor or pharmacists.

Diabetics may develop problems simply because many medications are coated in sugar or contain high levels of sugar, like cough medicine. Pregnant or nursing women should check with their doctor before taking any type of medication.



Read labels carefully. Take only the recommended dose. Many people get into trouble when they take too much of a drug they think is harmless. The drug itself may be completely safe when taken as directed, but can become toxic when even a small overdose is taken. Do not take any medication for longer than is recommended.

Often prescription and non-prescription drugs may contain the same ingredients, and when taken together, constitute an overdose of that drug. For example, a person taking an allergy medication may receive too high a dose of antihistamines if they also take some common cough and cold products. Aspirin taken with prescription blood thinners can lead to difficulties in the bleeding process.

Pay special attention to herbal remedies. Although many are safe, some can be life threatening when taken with other drugs or used incorrectly. Check with your doctor or pharmacist first to be sure.

#### Nick Champion MP Federal Member for Wakefield

Federal member for Wakefield, Nick Champion is encouraging farmers and land managers in Wakefield to put in their application for a share of \$30 million under the next round of the Gillard Government's Farming Futures on the Ground program.

This program will implement real on-farm trials of new practices that reduce carbon emissions. Individual grants of up to \$775,000 are available to farmers, land managers, nongovernment organisations and research and industry sectors.

The grants will support innovative projects that will reduce methane emissions or increase carbon sequestration in soils. Mr Champion said that "Action on the Ground is about turning research into real world practices for use across the agriculture sector".

reduce on-farm greenhouse gas emissions or increase soil carbon while maintaining or improving farm productivity and sustainability.

The Action on the Ground program is also a key element of the Carbon Farming Futures Fund, a component of the \$1.7billion Land Sector Package under the government's Securing a Clean Energy Future Plan.

Outcomes from the program will also contribute to the development of Carbon Farming Initiative offset methodologies, paving the way for farmers and land managers to earn additional income through carbon credits.

# Young Show Rider of the Year

Local One Tree Hill show horse rider Brianna Duncan-Coward who originally started with the One Tree Hill Equestrian & Pony Club has had a very successful season with her two show horses Corndale Kiss & Tell (Baci) and Marena Gala Chief (Chief). A highlight of this was being awarded 2012 Equestrian South Australia (ESA) Young Show Rider of the Year earlier this year.

With a very successful show season just finishing they placed in every class entered at Adelaide and Melbourne Royals with a number of these being blue (firsts) ribbons.

At the ESA Horse of the Year last October Brianna won the Small Show Hunter Galloway class and then went on to qualify for the EA Nationals in the Open Show Hunter Galloway class with Baci and also winning Runner-Up Rider 12 and under 15 years qualifying for Nationals in her rider class as well. The ESA Show Horse Nationals were held in Werribee last December where she went really well in her classes and being such a prestigious show it was a privilege to be able to represent SA in two classes with her two horses.

Kindly having been just leased Chief from Victoria she was able to take him for her rider class. She has also been very busy qualifying Baci and Chief for this year's Adelaide and Melbourne Royals and next Sydney Royal next year.

In doing this she has accumulated altogether over 80 champions/reserve champions/supremes this season being very competitive with her two mounts. The Show Horse Council of South Australia just recently held a Grand National qualifying show for the 2014 Grand Nationals where Brianna qualified in her rider and qualified both her horses in their hunter classes winning Champion or Runner Up in every class entered.






Accidently Killed. Man "Pursued" by gun mishaps.

The circumstances attending the death in Western Australia last week of Mr. Alf Loftes are to hand. The many friends of the deceased will be interested to know that it was one of those unfortunate incidents that occasionally occur in the manipulation of firearms.

A few years ago in South Australia the late Mr. Loftes was taking a gun from the vehicle in which he was seated when the charge went off, and blew off the crown of the hat he was wearing. The accident last week resulted from the gun being dropped as he was in the act of removing it from the buggy, and the whole charge entered his body at the armpit. The victim succumbed in a few hours.

The late Mr. Loftes put up some fine performances as a batsman when connected with the One Tree Hill Cricket Club, and was popular in the district, in which the Loftes family have resided for many years.











TOP TIPS FOR WINTER

Top 10 Winter tips for a warm, efficient and sustainable home.

The cold and dark months of winter are the time when we spend more time indoors and turn up our heating. It's also when our energy bills and our greenhouse gas emissions tend to soar. While we all need to keep warm, there are a number of ways we can make our homes more efficient so we can keep the warmth in, the cold out and use less energy to stay comfortable.

#### HERE ARE THE TOP TIPS FOR THIS WINTER

- Use heavy curtains to stop heat escaping from your windows. Up to 40% of the heat escaping from your home in winter is from uncovered windows. Heavy, lined curtains which extend below the window frame will insulate your windows and help keep the warmth in.
- 2: Install insulation in your house (or top up old and thinning insulation). A well insulated house can use as much as 45% less energy for heating and cooling, which means that insulation pays for itself in cheaper bills. With energy prices set to rise, installing insulation now is a smart way of avoiding excessive bills in the future.
- 3: Seal up gaps and cracks that let the cold air in. In your average home in South Australia, if you added up all the cracks and gaps, it would be equivalent of having a 1.5m window open all the time. That can account for 15—25% heat loss in your home. Seal up cracks and gaps using weather stripping around doors and windows, gap filler cracks and gaps using a simple door snake for the bottom of the door. Door seal kits are also a great way of keeping out the cold. You can buy all of these things at your local hardware store without spending a fortune.
- 4: Install pelmets on top of your windows. These are not only decorative but serve a purpose. Pelmets prevent cold air coming into your rooms. If you don't have them, a cheap alternative is to stick a draught snake, heavy blanket or towel on top of your curtain rod.
- 5: **Watch the temperature.** Heat the rooms you are using to around 20°C in winter, a comfortable temperature for most people. If you don't have a programmable thermostat on your heater, place a thermometer in your living area to keep an eye on the temperature. Always think of putting on a jumper before turning up the heat.





- 6: Close off any rooms that are not in use. This will prevent you from heating areas that you're not using. Don't leave your heater running all night or while you are out. Turn it off or install a timer.
- 7: Let the sun shine in during the day. If you have any North facing windows, open up the curtains when it is sunny to let the sun heat up your house for you.
- 8: **Insulate hot water pipes.** Wrap external hot water pipes with simple lagging (insulating tape) to reduce the heat loss from your hot water tank to the taps, and reduce the energy needed to get your hot water. It can be bought cheaply from your local hardware shop.
- 9: **If you can't heat the room, heat yourself.** If you can't insulate your room or block draughts, it will be hard to heat the whole room, especially with a small electric heater. In this case you are better sitting near the heater, so it at least keeps you warm.
- 10: Maintain your heaters. Getting your heater serviced professionally at least once every two years will keep it running more efficiently. Keeping heaters free of dust and cleaning any filters regularly will also help.



# SPEEDING - SLOW DOWN

Speeding is one of the major factors contributing to motor vehicle crashes on our roads.

The faster you travel the more likely it is that you will be involved in a car crash, and the faster you go, the harder you hit. The effects of speeding and being involved in a car crash can change your life forever.

Consider this, in a 60km/h zone, travelling at:

- 65km/h, you are twice as likely to have a serious crash
- 70km/h, you are 4 times as likely to have a serious crash
- 75km/h, you are 10 times as likely to have a serious crash
- 80km/h, you are 32 times as likely to have a serious crash

Than if you drive at 60km/h.

To minimise this risk, below are some simple driving tips that you may adopt while driving:

- Be alert to temporary speed zones and if in doubt, reduce your speed
- Avoid travelling close to erratic or speeding vehicles
- Adjust your speed to suit road and weather conditions
- Avoid driving at times when under stress or distracted
- Leave earlier so you don't feel rushed and
- If possible, use the cruise control option to maintain a selected speed.



## Leaving Home Safe and Sound

If any of you are planning a holiday to get away from the cold winter we have in store, here are some tips for keeping your home safe.

- Suspend regular deliveries. This includes newspapers, milk etc. Complete a form at the Post Office to hold your mail. (Fee is applicable)
- 2) Set timers on lights and radios. Choose timers tested for safety. You can create the illusion that you are at home by setting the timers to turn on and off lights at different times and different areas of your home. If you choose to leave the radio on, lower the volume so that you can't hear it from outside.
- 3) Ask neighbours to watch out for you and let them know how long you will be away.
- Securely lock all doors and windows and lock cars as well.
- Leave curtains and blinds in their normal position.
- 6) Unplug counter top appliances, entertainment equipment and computers. To prevent a fire hazard, coffee makers, toasters, hair dryers and irons should be left unplugged. Also unplug TV's DVD Players and computers to protect against power surges.




