ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT JULY 2013 Incident Report



The month has had the usual variety of incidents, 3 trees down that were blocking main roads and 2 road crashes which included a rear end collision in Snake Gully. The accident was caused by inattention, it was lucky that there were not more serious injuries. There were also 2 reported fires, which turned out to be people burning bonfires in the evening. Finally a structure fire on Medlow Road, Uleybury, a house which was unoccupied was deliberately set alight, unfortunately with both MDS and CFS attending it was still totally destroyed.

Reminders

Clear access and egress should allow for the safe movement of fire fighting vehicles. Gateways should be at least 4m wide. In addition, the driveway should also be clear of obstructions, a height clearance of 4m, shrubs and sheds etc. Over time people tend to miss the fact that vegetation is slowly encroaching onto the width and height of the driveway and suddenly when access is required, the CFS find access difficult if not impossible.

Councillor's Report June (Belated Report)

I will start by commending the Progress Association on their commitment, dedication and delivery of the ANZAC Day commemoration event and the warm and hospitable welcome it affords to all who attend, I would estimate 5-600 people from as far away as Tea Tree Gully and interstate.

I will keep this short, Council is busy working out its rate increases for the coming financial year, the draft recommendation and City Plan should be released for community consultation in June, please write in or appear at the Public Meeting to air your views. The Council Ward boundaries are again under review due to growth in some areas and none in others, I am hoping that this will not impact on the number of Ward Councillors for our ward (3). Please keep an eye out for the draft report once it is released, I will try to keep ratepayers informed but invariably these reports get released in between Grapevine issues.

I was pleased to see that lobbying to the State authorities has finally seen the mess at the corner of Black Top and Yorktown Road addressed and some bitumen applied to the surface of Black Top Road at the power station to make the road safer and less of a four wheel drive track.

Lastly thank you to all those kind people who sent cards and or condolences at the passing of my Mother on 20th May.

Councillor's Report July

Council has recommended that a rate increase of 5.3% would be required this financial year to achieve its intended outcome of a 1.6% increase in services and 0.4% capital injection to be used for debt reduction. The draft plan is out for community consultation which ends on the 4th July. The rate increase is based on a hypothetical \$23K valued home so if your home is valued greater than \$230K, be prepared for a larger increase to the amount above

the base rate. I apologise I can't be more specific but Councillors haven't been given the specifics yet. Further information will be available to elected members in July.

Council has costed its Sports precinct aspirations at 53 to 55 Million Dollars which are not included in it's 5.3% increase and it is yet to decide on what if any reductions will be offered to Commercial properties so these are not costed either.

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
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

Horse Care - Helmets

I am often asked by parents "Can she use her bicycle helmet?" Legally the answer is no. I am negligent if I allow it and could then be sued. The next question is "Does she need one when riding at home?" I always answer yes. Our children play softball/baseball/ t-ball and the catcher wears a chest protector, the batters wear helmets. Cricketers wear helmets when they bat and sometimes when they field in close. I am sure you can think of many other examples. But for some reason we seem to want to ride horses without a safe helmet. With insurance companies refusing to insure if you are not wearing a helmet, I ask "why would you want to?" They obviously have the statistics to suggest there are less serious accidents if you are wearing one. Helmets are designed for maximum protection in the sport they are designated. Horse riding helmets not only have to withstand falls from a height, at speed, but also reduce the force of a kick (or misstep) from the horse as he departs. Bicycles do not usually kick or tread on you.

Most of us know the good rider who refuses to wear a helmet, saying they never come off. But we also have examples of great riders who have come off: one who leaps to mind is Meg Wade, international endurance rider. The day she came off, no one will ever know what happened. She was close to a check point, on a favourite and familiar horse. She was found on the ground by another rider. For weeks she was in a coma, and for months she was in a wheelchair. She has recovered, and rides again. But her helmet was totally destroyed. She credits the helmet for saving her life and says she will never ride without one again, or let her workers do so. Helmets must fit correctly and be fastened correctly, whatever the sport. Some heads are oval, some are more circular. Some are high crowned, some are low. The eyebrows must be visible or the wearer is uncomfortable, and may refuse to wear it. If there is pressure over the temples, the wearer will get a headache within about 10 minutes. The chin strap must be firmly fastened, but not choking. The straps should fit in front of AND behind the ears (a Y shaped fastener), but not where they will rub the ears. It must be fitted low on the brow, not on the back of the head. If the helmet moves when the wearer nods vigorously, it is not the correct fit or is incorrectly fastened. (There is a small amount of movement, but should not be displaced.) If the rider has to reposition the helmet whenever they trot, the helmet is not correct. You will not have time to fix the position while falling.

The Australian Standard is AS/NZS3838. It meets requirements in Australia and New Zealand. There is another standard that is often sold in Australia; the EN1384, which is a European standard. If you are tempted, take a look at where the protection is in both types.

The 1384 does not require protection over the temples, nor at the base of the neck. So if you hit the ground in a flat manner, you should be safe, but beware of any projecting rocks, flying hooves, etc that happen to strike you at an angle. Having been hit in the head by hooves as my (fallen) horse got up, I am very glad I was wearing a good helmet.

Some disciplines want you to wear their particular style of hat. The good news is that there are now helmets that take covers so they look like the standard: Stetsons for western classes and Akubras for Stock Horse classes. I believe they also make derby style covers for the dressage riders who want to keep safe. Helmets come in black and white. While dressage riders traditionally wear black, (probably because the Derby of old was a black felt hat), white is far cooler in our climate. Take it from one who has changed to white. Many also have good vents in them, to keep the airflow happening.

I know that many governing bodies have started accepting the EN1384. This has been in response to people wanting cheaper, or in some cases, prettier, helmets, not because the governing bodies think the 1384 is good enough. Better to have some helmet than none at all. But I would not wear a sheath dress on horseback, nor stilettos, why would I want to wear a pretty hat rather than a safe helmet?

Remember to look after your helmet. If it is dropped onto a hard surface, or worse, thrown into a car/float/shed, the inside may be cracked and will not work when you need it most: in an accident. It may look fine, but has already been crushed inside. It should be replaced every 5 years or so. The plastics start to deteriorate, especially if stored in hot or bright conditions. To increase its life, store in a cool, dark, protected place, like the bottom of your wardrobe, not in shed or stable.

You are spending all this money on horse riding, please spend a few dollars more and get a good, safe helmet.

My final thought on this subject: what price do you put on your life or your child's life?

The night rounded off with a bit of impromptu soccer practice with some of the seniors taking on Ryan, Luke and Sam from the Juniors, much to the kid's delight.


The night raised approximately \$2,500 in profit - we may do it again sometime so keep a look out in the future.



Invisible Ink - Made with Lemon Juice

Making invisible ink is a lot of fun, you can pretend you are a secret agent, you can keep all your secret codes and messages hidden from others. All you need is some basic household items and the hidden power of lemon juice.

What you need: Half a Lemon Water Spoon Cotton Bud White Paper Lamp or other light bulb.

Instructions: Squeeze some lemon juice into the bowl and add a few drops of water. Mix the water and lemon juice with a spoon. Dip the cotton bud into the mixture and write a message onto the white sheet of paper. Wait for the juice to dry so it becomes completely invisible. When you are ready to read your secret message or show it to someone else heat the paper by holding it close to a light bulb. (Not too close though).

What's Happening? Lemon juice is an organic substance that oxidizes and turns brown when heated. Diluting the lemon juice in water makes it very hard to notice when you apply it to the paper, no one will be aware of its presence until it is heated and the secret message is revealed. Other substances which work in the same way include orange juice, honey, milk, onion juice, vinegar

Have fun making your invisible ink and remember, don't put the paper too close to the lamp or you could possibly start a fire.

Neil will be remembered by some as the Hookers' guy or the guy who rode the three wheeled trike, he is remembered by many younger residents as the guy who, for many years drove the Birdwood High School bus but most of all he will be remembered by all as a good mate and a good friend.

Neil was well known in the local community and could be relied on to secure the Hookers' tents for any event where they were needed. As a step-father to Timmy, he was involved in the first season of the One Tree Hill Soccer Club and served on the inaugural committee as Treasurer, he was also a long time member of the Rural Watch and a foundation member of both the original Blacksmith's Inn Social Club and later the Patron's Club. As a member of the pub Dragon Boat team he competed in all 7 successful pub championships and his inspiration and determination will be sadly missed.

Neil worked for many years at LJ Hooker Craigmore in various roles, including part owner and was known as a competitive employee, a bit of a joker and particularly as the Real Estate "Oracle".

During recent months Neil had a desire to live a more relaxed lifestyle and was looking at a "Sea Change" on the Gold Coast where he could enjoy more time with his 2 beautiful daughters. He achieved his wish - albeit much too brief because he was tragically killed on 23rd May riding his beloved motorcycle.

Neil leaves his much loved partner Denise, his two daughters Jessica and Jamie, and his step-children Gemma, Ashlea and Timmy. He was also dearly loved Poppy to Sommer.

ULEYBURY CEMETERY

When Moses Bendle Garlick migrated to Australia from Uley, Gloucestershire, England he was so reminded of his home that when he settled he named the area Uleybury. In 1851 Garlick paid four hundred pounds for a small chapel to be built on an acre of his land set aside for the Church. Garlick also helped with the building of the Uleybury School in 1856. Moses Garlick died in 1859 and a massive memorial spire is erected in the Uleybury Cemetery as a gesture of the work done in the area.

The Uleybury Cemetery has so much history with many tales both grand and strange. An English woman travelled to Uleybury in the 1860s to plant a stick of willow from Napoleons grave onto her son's burial plot where it grew into a fine tree. Many of the pioneers of the area are buried in that one acre of land that Garlick donated. It has been used by many religious denominations common to the area.

As with all cemeteries Uleybury is not without its share of ghost stories. The old Chapel which was demolished in 1981 is said to have been used for all sorts of unholy practices. Through the 70s and 80s the cemetery was a regular hangout for young people and the headstones and Chapel were badly vandalised, most of the damage you see today was caused back then. Many stories have popped up from that time and the stories still linger whether re-experience or passed down as legend.

One of the more common ghost stories, the ghost in white, may have been seeded prior to 1953 when a gentleman would dress in white sheets and jump out, scaring the wits out of passers by! The nearby crossroads have the local name of Ghost Corner due to these pranks.


Today people share stories of a girl in white stepping out onto the road right in front of your car, or a woman in a wedding dress running out on the road screaming, variations of peoples experiences due to that old prank? Who knows!

Footsteps, moving shadows, whispers, talking and cries in the dark have all been reported at the cemetery. Many people who have ventured there at night have taken away an experience. Is it due to a heavy imagination borne from the all too commonly found tales about the area or is there indeed something haunting this piece of colonial past?

Some of the early pioneers buried in the cemetery include Barritt, Bowman, Hogarth, Ifould and McKenzie.

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From The Past

South Australian Register Tuesday 23rd June 1863 One Tree Hill Farewell Dinner to Mr. F. Buttfield.

(From the Correspondent)

One of the most pleasing gatherings which have taken place in this locality was held on Thursday evening last, the 18th instant, at William's Old Spot Inn on the Little Para, for the purpose of a farewell to Mr. Francis Buttfield, of One Tree Hill, who is about to leave the district, after a residence of more than 12 years, for the neighbourhood of Port Lincoln. Though but little notice had been given of the affair, between 40 and 50 gentlemen assembled, including the principal residents of the district, and many visitors who had come from Adelaide and other parts of the colony to do Mr. Buttfield honour on this

of the colony to do Mr. Buttfield honour on this occasion. Amongst the latter, we observed Messrs. E.W. Dewhirst (Second Inspector of Schools) and J. Harvey, J.P. and many others.

The proceedings took the old English fashion of a dinner, to which the company sat down at about half past 7. The appetites of those who had come from a distance having been considerably sharpened by the delay, ample justice was done to the capital spread which Host Williams had provided, and which, indeed, could not have failed to satisfy the most fastidious.

The chair was ably filled by Mr. E. L. Ifould. On his right sat the guest of the evening; and Mr. J. Harvey, of One Tree Hill, occupied the vice chair. A letter was read from Mr. L. Glyde, M.P., apologizing for his absence on account of an engagement with other members of the Legislature at Government House.

After the cloth had been removed, the usual loyal and patriotic toasts were given by the CHAIRMAN, and responded to by the company with that fervor and enthusiasm which characterize South Australians on such occasions. Particular attention was called to the toast of "The Prince and Princess of Wales," and the Chairman made some appropriate remarks on the recent event, which, he considered, augured so well for the happiness and welfare of the nation.

Bumpers being called for, the CHAIRMAN then rose to propose the toast of the evening - "The Health of their esteemed guest, Mr. Francis Buttfield" - which was received with loud cheers and every token of applause. After a few introductory remarks, he observed that the loss of such a man to the district was one that would be deeply felt as he had in a quiet and unobtrusive manner identified himself with every movement connected with their welfare. But he felt that loss in a still great degree when he considered that he should miss the society of an old and esteemed friend; for he had known Mr. Buttfield for the past 12 years, and their acquaintance, which had commenced in the ordinary course of business, had ripened into close intimacy and friendship. He would not make any lengthy remarks but would call upon a gentleman present to read the address which had been signed by many who, he regretted to say, were unable to attend that evening. He believed, however, the address only inadequately expressed the sentiments of all who had enjoyed the pleasure of Mr. Buttfield's acquaintance.

The address to Mr. Buttfield was then read, which, while expressing the general regret felt on the occasion of his departure from the district, and unanimous wish for his future happiness and prosperity, referred in highly complimentary terms to his conduct during the 12 years the subscribers had known him, as having followed in every instance the dictates of a just and generous mind. A similar address to Mrs. Buttfield, signed by the ladies of the neighbourhood, was also read to the meeting. Both addresses were neatly engrossed on velium and numerously signed, and were handed to Mr. Buttfield amidst loud and hearty cheers. Several residents of the district then rose and bore testimony to the readiness with which Mr. Buttfield had come forward on all occasions in which the pleasure or well-being

of the district was concerned; and they referred to the Cricket Club, Mechanics' Institute and Volunteer Corps as examples, of which Mr. Buttfield had been a prominent member. It was as a friend in the private relations of life that the highest compliment to their guest was paid, when it was repeatedly and popularly known as the severest test, and that in numerous cases Mr. Buttfield had proved himself a tried friend in adversity. Messrs. Dewhirst, McLean, Knowles, Byers, and other gentlemen made remarks of a similar nature, in which the many virtues and good qualities which distinguished their guest and his amiable family were highly extolled, and warm wishes expressed for their happiness and success in the future.

A capital song was then sung by Mr. COLYER, and Mr. Buttfield rose, amidst vehement cheering, to return thanks for the expressions of goodwill and respect towards himself and family which had been uttered. He said he could take but little credit to himself for all the kind things that had been said of him, but he had always considered it to be the duty of a man to use his best endeavours for the benefit of his fellow-men; and acting on that principle he had felt great interest in what concerned them all - the welfare of their district. With respect to what they had so kindly recorded of him in the addresses handed to him by his friends, he feared he was not altogether deserving of such praise; but he should ever preserve them as incentives to increased exertion, and in remembrance of the many friends he had found and the kindness he had experienced during his residence amongst them. Mr. Buttfield, who appeared with difficulty to restrain his emotion, resumed his seat amidst tumultuous applause.

After some more songs and a short interval for conversation, Mr. KNOWLES of Gawler Town, in few words proposed "The Army and Navy" coupling with the toast the South Australian Volunteers. "The Red, White, and Blue" was then sung by Mr. T. HEWSTON, and the gentleman who had commanded the first company of volunteers raised in that locality responded.

The usual toasts followed at suitable intervals. "The Parliament," proposed by Mr. DEWHIRST, was responded to by Mr. J. HARVEY, who was formerly member for the district. "The Agricultural and Pastoral Interests," proposed by Mr. McLean and responded to by Mr. SCOTT. "The Chairman," "The Vice-Chairman," "The Ladies" "The Visitors" &c., were all ably proposed and seconded, and the party broke up about the commencement of the "small hours", having spent a most agreeable evening. A few "choice spirits," however, remained at their posts until daybreak, somewhat to the distress of those who were disposed for the rest after the evening's exertions.

We understand that Mr. Buttfield is about to take charge of some islands in Spencer Gulf, lying near the Port Lincoln coast, upon which it is proposed to form a sheep-station.

My Year in Tonga - Part 2

A Little More of Tonga by Pat Beck

A visit to the dentist is an experience. No separate room for anyone. A number of people, including me, were lined up like peas in a pod, lying on very antiquated chairs. The dentist had no assistant so while tending to your teeth he also operated the water so one came out with a wet face, wet hair and wet clothing. In visiting some of the other islands my friends and I went by plane. The Crown Prince owned the planes which were old DC3's. Before getting on board, yourself as well as the luggage is weighed. This happens because of weight distribution. I would be sitting next to my friend who was asked to shift so a large Tongan could sit next to me to balance the weight. On the island of Ha'apai the road crossed over the runway, so you had to look left and right (up in the sky) before crossing over the road. I was somewhat confused about trading hours for some of the smaller shops. When I went back to the dressmaker, or the hairdresser, one day they would be open, but on the next visit closed. The owner goes off somewhere, returning whenever and it seems to be the normal practice.

Each Sunday morning we would go to the Tongan Church (out of respect for the Tongans). We couldn't understand anything and quite often the Minister would literally shout his head off. I was told that happened because he had not prepared his sermon. After a while I ended up in leaving before the sermon to save my ear drums although I could still hear him from my house. Feasts are a regular event to celebrate anything. Tables are laden with lots of little roasted pigs. Traditional dancing is common and very beautiful. When dancing, it is expected that people will go up to the dancers and place money on them which sticks to their arms as they are covered in coconut oil.

Problems with flight tickets:

A few of us were going to the island of Vava'u. Before going I checked my flight ticket and realised it had the wrong time on it. I took my ticket back, which meant several trips as the only person in the office who could correct it, was away. Eventually it was sorted out - the person writing out the ticket had put the time that the ticket was written out instead of the flight time. Having sorted that out, the flight was for 10.40am on the 26th June. On the 25th at 6.00pm the airline rang to say that the 10.40am was cancelled and we could have a 1.45pm or 4am on the 27th. I opted for the 1.45pm as someone else was driving us to the airport. At midnight on the 25th the airline rang again to say that the 1.45pm flight was cancelled and the only flight available was 4.00am on the 27th. So at midnight I packed my bags and left a message for my other friends about the change and prayed that they would get the message. When we arrived at the airport which lists domestic and international flights, there was no one there. The place was lit up with a few cars parked and a couple of people snoring somewhere. Then my mobile rang asking us where we were. So we drove on further in the pitch black to try and find this airport. We got lost and backtracked! Eventually we found the entrance. After handing my ticket over and just waiting around the office, the lady said that she could not find my ticket and thought that my friend had driven off with it. Eventually she found it under a pile of papers and eventually we were on the plane with no more mishaps. Having an airline ticket does not mean you will have a seat on the plane. You have to go back to the booking office to make sure you are on a list or no seat on the nlane.

The Crown Prince owned the planes and domestic flights. Then some business men bought more modern planes and this provided competition. The Prince did not like this so without any due process shut them down. The Court over ruled him so they started up again with the right to renew their contract in 6 months time. Before the 6 months came the Prince shut them down again so they gave up, sold the planes and people lost their jobs. As the only industry there is in tourism, it did not help employment.

After a while I decided to buy a second hand scooter. I had several practice runs which were a bit disastrous. My logic said that turning the accelerator towards you slowed it down and the opposite sped it up. As that was completely wrong, I ended up falling off several times and nearly ran over a friend as the scooter accelerated away from me. Unusual Uses For Toothpaste

Toothpaste, it whitens, brightens, deodorizes, removes stains and restores and protects enamel. But toothpaste's cleaning capabilities work wonders on many things besides our teeth. The same ingredients that help polish our pearly whites can also soothe some common ailments, make household items sparkle, and even get rid of stains and pungent smells. Try out these tricks with a white non-gel toothpaste and watch that cavity-fighting, breath-freshening tube of wonder work its magic.

- Relieve irritation from bug bites, sores and blisters. These skin irritations all tend to weep and in the case of bug bites, often itch. Apply a drop of toothpaste to a bug bite or insect sting to stop the itching and decrease any swelling. When applied to sores or blisters, it dries them up, thus allowing the wound to heal faster. It's best when used overnight.
- 2) Soothe a stinging burn. For minor burns that don't involve an open wound, toothpaste can deliver temporary cooling relief. Apply it delicately to the affected area immediately after a burn develops, it temporarily relieves the sting and prevents the wound from weeping or opening.
- 3) Decrease the size of a facial blemish. Want to speed up the healing of a pimple (zit)? Apply a tiny dot of toothpaste to the affected area at night before bed. Wash it off in the morning.
- 4) Clean your fingernails. Our teeth are made of enamel and toothpaste is good for them, so it stands to reason that toothpaste would also be good for our fingernails with a toothbrush and toothpaste. Scrub them after a day in the garden and they will look great again.
- 5) Scrub away stinky smells. Garlic, fish, onion, and other pungent foods can permeate the skin cells on our hands. Scrubbing hands and fingertips briefly with toothpaste removes all traces of smelly odours.
- 6) Remove stains. Toothpaste can make tough stains on both clothing and carpets disappear. For clothes, apply toothpaste directly to the stain and rub briskly until the spot is gone, then wash as usual. (Note that using a whitening toothpaste on colours can sometimes bleach the fabric) For carpet stains, apply toothpaste to the stain and scrub it with an abrasive brush, then rinse immediately.
- 7) Spruce up dirty shoes. This tactic works great on running shoes or scuffed leather shoes. As with carpet stains, apply toothpaste directly to the dirty or scuffed area, then scrub with a brush and wipe clean.
- 8) Remove scratches on DVD's and CD's. This remedy has been used with mixed success rates, but it seems to work fairly well on shallow scratches and smudges. Apply a thin coating of toothpaste to the disc and rub gently, then rinse.
- 9) Make silver jewellery and other silver pieces sparkle. Rub toothpaste onto jewellery and leave overnight. Wipe clean with a soft cloth in the morning. Make diamonds shine by giving them a gentle scrub using a toothbrush, toothpaste and a little water. Rinse thoroughly to remove all traces of toothpaste.
 Do not use this method on pearls as it will damage the finish.
- 10) Deodorize baby bottles. If baby bottles develop a sour-milk smell, a good cleaning with some toothpaste and a bottle scrubber will clean away residue and deodorize. Always make sure you rinse well.
- 11) Remove the burned crust on irons. For those of you who still iron, you may find that after time, the sole plate of the iron develops a burned crust. The silica in toothpaste gently grinds away this rusty looking layer. Just spread the toothpaste on the plate and rub, wipe it over after with a damp cloth.
- 12) Defog goggles. Scuba divers, swimmers and triathletes may already know about this handy little trick. Rub a small spot of toothpaste onto each lens of your goggles, then rinse thoroughly and abracadabra! There will be no need to ever buy expensive defogger gels again. Avoid rubbing too vigorously though, as the abrasive ingredients in toothpaste could scratch the lenses.

Staying Safe in Your Home

There are many dangers around the house, every parent knows that! Thankfully there are some ways to make your house safer.

- 1) Keep Rodents Out: If you have crumbs on the floor, rodents are bound to be attracted to the smell and will enter your home. They are disgusting little creatures, and definitely not sanitary for your house. Even if you don't have rodents, keep rat poison in a lid on the top shelf inside your pantry cupboard, just in case, you never know when one will sneak in. Try to keep crumbs vacuumed up.
- 2) Stop Spiders in Their Tracks: Spiders can enter the house just as easily as rodents, except some spiders can be dangerous and lethal. Grab yourself some Outdoor Spider Spray and spray it around the outside perimeter of the house. You should also spray any little cracks or holes around the house. The barrier sprays normally last around 6 months so set yourself a reminder so that you don't get spiders in the home.
- 3) Get Your Heater Checked: If you have a wall heater, get it serviced and checked at the start of winter. Your wall heater could be doing your family damage, but you won't know until you get it checked.
- 4) Always Lock Up: Always keep the front door and back door locked inside your house, especially at night time. Always lock everything up before you go ourt It's better to be safe than sorry, and show the children how to lock the doors and windows as well.
- 5) Clean Your Bathroom: There are a heap of germs in your bathroom (think shower, toilet and sink).

 People using the toilet, brushing their teeth in the sink, standing in the shower, that's a lot of germs! Make it a habit of once a week to completely sanitize the bathroom. Wipe down all surfaces, wash the toilet and clean the shower to get rid of soap scum. Germs spread easily, it's better to have a super clean bathroom than a moderately clean one.
- 6) Make Dust Disappear: Dust is awful for our bodies, especially if we are in contact with it a lot. Dust causes asthma, blocked noses and chest infections. Get out the dust buster and clean up any dust.
- 7) Banish Pet Hair: If you have a dog or cat, you will definitely find fur around the house. Vacuum up regularly as this can make children sick especially if they have a cold.

Keeping you house clean, tidy and safe is good for you and your family. It may take a little effort but it's worth it in the long run as there won't be so much sickness
