Autumn In Your Garden

Autumn is the best time of the year for planting. The soil is still warm, the days are mainly sunny, but not too hot, nights are cooler and the winter rains will follow.

It is time to pull out any old or poorly looking plants. Improve your soil with organic matter and select some new plants to suit the site.

Existing shrubs can be pruned and a light sprinkle of fertiliser around the root zone watered in.

Top up mulch if needed.



If you have enough land, start a woodlot or windbreak/screening shrubs.

Some of the native plants that flower and attract the birds in Autumn are: Eremophila types "Emu Bush", Correas, Acacia Iteaphylia (they don't cause hay fever) many types of Grevillea, Banksia and Bottlebrush.

A Champion Swimmer From OTH

Joel Pearson (14 years of age) has been training with his coach Paul Staight for the past 4 years, last year as a 13 year old he made two National Age finals at his first ever National event, since then he has moved to another level.

Over the winter Joel swam the fastest 400 freestyle and 200 butterfly in Australia by a 13 year old short course (25 metre pool) in 2011. He has qualified for National Age Championships in Brisbane to be swum in April in 12 events (there are only 13 events in his age group), this is the most that Paul has ever had a swimmer qualify in, in his 40 years of coaching. During Paul's time as a coach he has had swimmers make Olympic finals but they did not make 12 events.

To achieve this level of performance is a family effort, his sister Abi and Chloe are also very hard working state medal swimmers. Mum and occasionally Dad get the family to the pool twice a day and Joel does the rest. In an normal week he will swim about 44,000 metres plus a couple of land training sessions. His drive and work ethic have made an enormous contribution to Playford Swimming Club's rise from 20th last year at State Championships with 72 points, to 3rd this year with 846 points. Joel sets the standards that so many of our swimmers are trying to copy. He is a suburb role model.

As a club the Playford Swimming Club is looking for entry level swimmers, children who tried out for their local SAPSSA school team would be ideal. Joel had not had swimming lessons before he went to the Playford Club or tried out for SAPSSA.

We wish Joel all the very best in the National Championships in Brisbane, with 12 events he is going to be extremely busy! Give him words of encouragement if you see him about the town and let him know that One Tree Hill is behind him.

Incident Report



The month was very quiet for rural fires in the OTH Area which has been the good news this summer. However the month has proven to be busy for the Brigade in other areas. Three car fires during the month, storm damage calls due to trees down on roads and one house. A truck and a car accident on the Gawler One Tree Hill Rd, the owner of the car had a very lucky escape after hitting the side of an oncoming truck; the car was a write off. The traffic was affected for a couple of hours due to the need to remove the two vehicles and clean up a diesel spill. The Brigade supplied a truck & crew to attend a Flour Mill fire in the Barossa Valley for over 12 hours on a night shift.

The Fire Season ends at midnight on the 30/04/2012 (subject to change). Please ensure you are familiar with the Council restrictions on lighting fires in your area. A pamphlet is available from the Playford Council explaining all the different requirements.

As the colder nights are starting to become apparent, please remember to have your chimney/flue checked for excessive build-up of soot etc. Chimney fires can be very disconcerting.

Councillor's Report by Joe Federico

Council (Staff) are in the process of gathering information to review the <u>Playford Community Plan</u> and to develop an <u>Advocacy Plan</u>. **Picture Playford 2043** is the catch cry alerting ratepayers to this process. Council (Staff) will be conducting individual interviews with various stake holders and members of the community. Brochures with reply paid postcards will be sent out to households in April to get your views on how you would like to see the City of Playford in the future. Information will be gleaned via Council's web page and also via Facebook. Community Conversation Corners will be held at the Munno Para Library on Thursday 19th April from 4.30 – 6.00pm, Elizabeth Library on Thursday 26th April 3.30 – 5.00pm, Central Districts Football Club on Thursday 3 May from 12.00 – 1.30pm and <u>One Tree Hill Market</u> on **Saturday 5th May from 9.30 -11.00am**.

It took some effort by me to convince Council (Staff) to have the OTH Community Corner. Country Townships were to be excluded from this process because Council (Staff) believed that the Blueprint discussions (which were specific to our local community and on which nothing has been acted on) held some years ago were sufficient to gauge our requirements for the whole of the City of Playford Picture 2043 as if we are isolated specifically to OTH and did not venture into the Big City (however our rates go to support initiatives in the whole of the City of Playford of which we are an integral part).

would encourage all ratepayers to read the information sent out and return the questionnaire (even if you feel nothing will come of it) because at least you will have had an opportunity to have input and Council will realise that we are part of the whole community.

I have not seen the questionnaire yet but I would STRONGLY ENCOURAGE OTH residents to attend the 3"d May Community Corner at the market to have your say. Remember this is a City Wide Vision for a future Playford for you and your kids. You may wish to comment on Rate Increases, Bus Services, Future City Wide Urban Expansion, Location of Health and Medical Centres.

However I cannot quarantee that I will be able to get any better results but will at least have council reassess their position and provide an explanation as to their resolve and in some cases if not most, reach a compromise that is acceptable to all parties concerned. 



Horse Care — Washing Your Horse

- * Beginning and end of summer is a good time to freshen up the skin, more frequently if he looks or feels grubby.
- * Do not wash on cold days without shelter, towelling dry and rugging. Changes of rugs are required as they absorb water, so it is an on-going job.
- * Try not to wash going in to winter. The oils protect him from cold and wet.
- * Have all equipment close to hand: hose (connected to tap), rubber curry comb, shampoo (horse), sponge, sweat scraper, bucket, towels, rugs if required, old clothes, patience.
- * Tie to a secure fence (post and rails for preference) with quick release knot and binding twine. Panicking horses need to be released to calm down.
- * Wash tail first, by dunking the tail into the bucket of water. Lift the bucket right up to the dock so it gets a good soak. Then, holding tail away from the hocks so as not to drip onto them, shampoo and work in. (Drips feel like flies, triggering stamping and kicking). Rinse and towel dry.
- * Wet the body by starting at the hooves and working slowly up to allow him time to get used to the idea. Check the water is not too hot or cold. Add shampoo and work in with curry comb. Rinse thoroughly. Wipe excess water off with sweat scraper. Repeat on the neck and mane.
- * Some horses love to drink directly from the hose. Hold it sideways to his face so he can control how much water he gets. He may use it to rinse his mouth out (and dribble it down your shirt).
- * Use the sponge (wrung almost dry) to wipe out ears and around eyes. Do not use shampoo. Wipe over top of head and then the rest of the face. A bit more water can be used below the eyes but be considerate.



- * Don't forget the groove under his head, between his bottom jawbones.
- * Refresh the sponge and wipe the udder of mares (between the hind legs) and the sheath of geldings. A little shampoo for mares is fine. Rinse off. Beware they can kick forward if you are not firm but gentle. Let them know you are reaching there by sliding your hand from the side, down and under to the sensitive areas.
- * Last place is under the tail. Lift the tail gently sideways and use the sponge. (I use the same sponge, working front to back and throw it away after use. If reusing later, you need to mark them for hygiene reasons).
- * Towel dry (in cold weather do this to each part as you complete it).
- * If warm day and clean place to roll, turn the horse out for 20 minutes.
- * If cold, rug before turning out and change the rugs every hour or so as they will absorb water and become damp.
- * If too dirty to allow to roll, use a summer sheet (cotton rug) and allow a roll. Change or remove the rug after he is dry.
- * I like to put a cotton rug on and have him stand while I comb out the mane and tail, using "No Knots" conditioner. It helps keep them clean and prevents tangles, lasting up to a month. Then I remove the rug and turn him out on a patch of green grass.
- * The old clothes are now soaked, with water dripping off your elbows.

The patience is a bit thin: he has walked up and down and held his head too high to reach. But patience and care, coupled with firm words of command ("stand", "over") help prevent fear of wash-day and make for an easier horse to manage in the future.

Out Among the People - From The Advertiser Thursday 12th May 1938 page 25

Going down to the Adelaide Cup meeting at Morphettville yesterday, I was struck by the revival of the top hat and frock coat. Some wearers looked well dressed; others did not. More buoyant conditions seemed to be reflected in the temper of the people and this year plenty of the country people were up for the Cup.

West Coast Sportsmen

Walking round the paddock early to see the horses in their stalls, I met Perce Roberts over from Calca on the West Coast. He, by the way, has a full brother to Golden Hill, Derby and St Leger winner. He introduced me to a neighbor, Mr H. Freeman, of Mortana, also a keen sportsman who comes over to see the Cup every year. Mr Freeman won the Streaky Bay Cup with Gold Scrip recently. Another horse of his, Drinacre, won five out of six races at Peterborough, and ran a dead heat in the sixth. Then he went on to Laura, and won everything there. Then I saw Gordon Heggine in a stall with his Inchaquire gelding, Benaian, which, he says, is "fast but not fast enough long enough". Gordon took from his pocket a tin, containing a sample of hull-less oats seed of which George Hill of Georgetown, got out from Scotland. "George sowed some last year, and reaped more than 50 bushels to the acre." he said. "I bought a bag of seed from him, paid £5 10/ for a four bushel bag (27/6 a bushel) and will try it out at Angaston." It is a very neat small oat, and should appeal to horse trainers. Mr Walter Thomas came along and facetiously said that if people took to the traps again, he could see some nice buggy horses there to suit them.

The Cup Winner

The Adelaide Cup of 1938 was a thriller, and a triumph for country sportsmen. Just as Mr. Jack Harvey arrived in the paddock from One Tree Hill with his Petunia gelding Dartford, I was with Mr Harry Rymill, who asked how the horse was. "He's much better than he was yesterday." replied the owner. I watched the big race from the stand with Walter Kidman and Ross Coles, and after Dartford had dashed to the winning post just ahead of Myles Connell's Silent Tip. Walter turned and said, "I'm jolly glad Jack Harvey won. It was nice to see a Petunia horse run out the distance so well." "I'm delighted too." said Ross, "because he never buys expensive horses, and he and his wife train them." Going downstairs, I ran into Joe Nester, who said, "Jack Harvey showed that he did the right thing not to have listened to people who said he should have accepted 1,000 guineas for his horse."

Then I met Bert Wolfe ("Cardigan," of the Melbourne "Herald") with his off sider Gwyn Jones. Bert told me that he came over in the express early in the morning with W. Elliot who rode Dartford. Looking through "The Advertiser." he said to the well-known jockey, "You mightn't have a ride after all." "Yes," said Elliot, "they rang me up to say that horse was not well but I said I might as well come over as I had several other rides." He won on Toxaway for Mr. Harvey too, and he and Mr Wolfe left for Melbourne by last night's train.

The Good Oil

Locally in recent months we have been hearing more and more about oils being added to horse feeds. One such type of oil has been vegetable based oil. A small amount of searching the internet has turned up some interesting facts that may be worth sharing with you.

It appears that vegetable oils are seen as a method of economically getting large amounts of energy into your horse. Some of the oils used are soy, corn and canola based just to mention a few. The adding of oil is basically adding extra fat to the horse's daily diet. Horses in heavy workout situations are given about a cup of oil added to their morning and night feeds. This means that about 12% of their daily intake comes from fat.

Controlled tests were carried out in Australia and the US in the mid 90s to see what the effect of oils added to feeds had on horses, the results were:

- * Normally blood glucose levels in a horse being exercised would decline as the horse begins to tire. It appeared that the rate of decline was slower in horses being fed fat in their diet.
- * The onset of fatigue was delayed in the cases of horses that were fed fat in their diet which helps the animal to perform over a longer period in events like endurance riding.

- * Feeding oil to horses that are off their usual feed is considered as a quick means of getting energy back into the animal even though it might not be eating as much.
- * Despite initial concerns, there were no negative health concerns raised by the feeding of oils reported in the test results.
- * Very little vegetable oil; if any would ever reach the hindgut of the horse as it is highly digested in the small bowel. This means that if you are looking for something to assist with lubricating food mass or sand through the large bowel you would not call on the use of vegetable oils.
- * Many websites also mention the benefit to maintaining a glossy healthy coat on your horse.

I have satisfied my curiosity to some degree and perhaps just fired up yours. I think that if you are looking to make any major changes to your horse's diet you will need to do your own research on the best type of oil and the amount to give your animal. You would need to take into consideration the animal's age, general condition and level of workout that it performs. An equestrian vet would be able to provide you with sound information first hand. As always, make any major changes to your pet's diet very gradual ones. Submitted by Dean of the One Tree Hill Fodder Store.

Keeping Husbands Well Preserved Husbands, like peaches, will not keep the year round unless they are well preserved. First select him carefully, be sure he is not too green, neither should be over-ripe. He might look very tempting and mellow in the market, but if he is too old he will not stand the test of the preserving process but will expose his hard stony heart. Husbands grown in the tropics of pleasure look very fine, but are usually insipid. The home grown are the best. Select your husband if possible from a family tree growing on the sunny side of a Kingdom Hall. You will be sure then that he has a sound heart. Unsound husbands, like unsound peaches, often have to be sorrowfully cast away. Having selected your husband, you should have a clear, steady and cheery fire of love. Your preserving pan (the home) must be clean and neat. Give him plenty of sweetness, much sugar is needed—vinegar is never used in sweet preserves. If you think he demands a little spice, use it with caution. Do not keep stirring him up, neither should you keep poking him with sharp points to see if he is done—it will spoil his looks. If you follow this recipe, love will be preserved. It's obvious that Glenice and Anne followed this. (Page 11)

The final 10 ladies in the competition displayed a colour palette, pretty florals, longer hem lines and feminine gloves of leather or lace.





A Time For Battle



COOLATAI GRASS (*Hyparrhenia hirta*) has had another exceptional year for germination and growth. Adelaide's Northern foothills have one of only a few SA concentrated infestations and it is important the community work together to keep it under control and prevent it from spreading further afield.

An opportunistic reproducer, Coolatai has again demonstrated this year why it is included on the states Declared Plants List.

As it has bigger windows of opportunity it grows and regenerates faster than most native and exotic pasture grasses out competing them.

Coolatai grows aggressively, becoming a dense tussock and creating large amounts of unpalatable dead leaf and stem of low nutritional value, dominating and displacing other desired plants in a short space of time.

Coolatai Grass produces numerous seed heads during the year and small seeds that adhere to animals, clothing, farm machinery and motor vehicles which aid in their spread. Adapted to a wide range of soil types, temperature and conditions it is drought tolerant and resistant to conventional herbicide applications.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

The Adelaide & Mt Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board will be holding a local information day in early May to alert landholders of the issues associated with Coolatai and other local weeds of priority and appropriate control methods. District Officers are available to visit properties and provide free advice on how to manage Coolatai or any other natural resource and land management issue of concern.

Local Councils, DENR National Parks staff and NRM Boards work closely together to control Coolatai on public lands and roadsides.

We are now looking for more landholders to join the forces to combat this threatening grass.
