CFS REPORT SEPTEMBER 2011

During storm events emergency services can become stretched leading to delays in responding to callouts such as trees down or flooding. The CFS does not always receive these jobs as they are often directed in the first instance to the SES. The One Tree Hill CFS is more than happy to receive calls about trees down or similar storm related events in the One Tree Hill district directly by phoning the duty officer on 8280 7055. ALWAYS call 000 in any emergency or life threatening situation.

Unfortunately far too often the CFS is called out to car accidents which are the result of irresponsible driving. When driving, even on familiar roads, everyone needs to drive appropriately taking into account weather conditions, your line of sight for oncoming traffic and your speed. No time saved from not following these basic rules are worth the serious consequences of a traffic accident. If you have children who are driving please emphasise these rules with them, a lot of the accidents we attend involve young drivers.

Now is the time to start preparing for the coming bushfire season. Cleaning up around your house and having your bushfire plan in place should be a propriety. Remember once you have seen a bushfire it is often too late to leave the relative safety of your home.

ouncillor's Report

Council has undertaken an Efficiency and Effectiveness survey across a broad range of its service provisions and financial commitments.

The report is still in its DRAFT form and Council is still to take ownership of the report. It looks like some efficiency gains are available to Council and once these are agreed to by Council and Staff. Council can then instigate steps to help realize those gains. Whereas these gains probably will not lead to a decrease in rates, Council may be able to at least stick to its current plan and provide some stability to operations and service to Ratepayers. As stated final details are not available to be released yet and any actions at this point in time are only speculative, more as real data becomes available. Council is still waiting for the random customer satisfaction survey.

If you use the train to get places please be aware that as of the 18th September the rail line from Mawson Lakes to Gawler will be closed to upgrade and electrify the line. At some point in the anticipated 8 month closure the train station at Salisbury will be reopened whilst upgrade and electrification works continue on the remainder of the line. In the meantime alternate bus services will provided between Gawler Central and Mawson Lakes, please be aware that you may have to leave earlier to get to town at the same time as usual. There may be some confusion at first as there will be express buses, semi express and slow coach at different times of the day.

Resources will be used to mitigate the larger risks across the whole of the City and if resources remain less fewer pot holes will be addressed.

Please remember that I am available in person at the Country Market held on the 1st Saturday of each month to listen to and advise on your concerns. The Uniting Church again approached me with a concern (not really Council related) however I was able to, through Council, find them some assistance which I believe met their needs. I am near the Russian food stand trying to sell my olive oil in-between talking with Ratepayers and judging the Junior Chef Competition. Congratulations to all the entries and to the OTH Progress Association for a great Community activity that involved the younger members of our community.

Chilean Needle Grass Awareness & Containment

Please be advised that an outbreak of Chilean Needle Grass has been detected in the One Tree Hill area. This grass is classed as a noxious weed and can cause long term problems to land holders if not addressed.

A Committee has been formed to create awareness and take steps to contain the outbreak. These are primarily landholders who are affected by the grass, but other interested parties are offering support as a community based project.

The Natural Resources Management Board are helping to co-ordinate activities and Playford Council are also supporting the program.

A notice board depicting the grass and control methods, will be outside on the One Tree Hill Fodder Store around the middle of September with take away leaflets and a field day is being organised for November 5th.

This is not a time of panic, but awareness and action to ensure that this outbreak does not advance any further.

This project is supported by the Northern Foothills Biodiversity and Land Management Project, through funding from the Australian Government's Caring for our Country.

On Thursday 4th August police received a phone call from a resident on Shillabeer Road, Sampson Flat re: a vehicle parked on the side of the road at about 8:15am. Two persons were seen near the vehicle and a third person inside the vehicle. Police attended the scene and located the vehicle and occupant. A check showed the vehicle to have been stolen in June from Noarlunga and was displaying false plates. A search of nearby properties by the Police Dog Patrol and Helicopter resulted in a second offender being located almost 2 hours later hiding from police. This person was also arrested. Both persons were charged with Illegal Use of a Motor Vehicle and the second person was also charged with Unlawfully on Premises with both to appear in the Elizabeth Magistrates Court in September. These person were not local (one from Woodcroft and the other from Ethelton). The third person was not located.

This is an excellent result from the Community showing that being observant and getting involved by simply making a phone call achieves a great outcome for all.

Putting the finger on AMPHETAMINES

How would you know if a nearby property is being used to make amphetamines? What might you see?

Blacked out or covered windows, bars on windows, extra bolts and door padlocks, or sophisticated alarm systems might be fitted. The premises might only be attended occasionally, possibly at night. Anyone carrying chemistry equipment like tubing, flasks, and glassware, should raise suspicion. Discarded wrappers or packets used for flu capsules would be an obvious clue left by a careless



drug producer. What might you smell? A strong and unpleasant smell of chemicals may be noticed. The sharp odour of ammonia may be present. A smell rather like cat urine, or is in the case of ecstasy the smell of aniseed is often associated at backyard labs. Sometimes smoke is given off as part of the chemical process. Have you seen anything suspicious? Have you seen anyone committing a crime? Do you have information about a crime? If you have, remember to call Bank SA Crimestoppers 1800 333 000









Bring Back The Bush

he Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board (the Board) is working with local landholders to restore areas of remnant vegetation across the Adelaide Plains and the Mt Lofty Ranges. The Board's Northern Foothills Biodiversity and Land Management Project, supports local rural landholders in the northern foothills district with preserving their remnant native vegetation through the provision of advice, technical support and funding for eligible projects.

One such landholder is Heinz Schroeder of Gould Creek

who sought advice on how best to control feral olives and boxthorn that were threatening to smother his remnant grassy Eucalyptus porosa woodland.

Mr Schroeder has now successfully removed these invasive species and has begun restoration work by revegetating the site with missing understorey species to replace lost habitats.

Managing remnant bushland from the threat of weed invasion and stock grazing impacts is an important factor in protecting and enhancing biodiversity across the hills. Creating a healthy, functional will encourage wildlife such as birds,

kangaroos and koalas to return to the area.

Protecting remnant vegetation is a key to sustainable land management.

It does this by providing ecosystem services such as water purification through filtration, improved soil structure and productivity, reduced risk of land

degradation and erosion, dry land salinity and rising water tables.

A FREE Native Remnant Restoration Field Day will be held by the Board on 24th September in the Northern Foothills District. The field day will provide useful information for people interested in protecting their own remnant patch of native vegetation or increasing the area they have.



Horse Care - A Carrot can Kill a Pony

This article is aimed at all those people who like to give a treat to the pony they walk past. Founder Season is approaching. This means that all pony owners are being very careful to avoid overfeeding their ponies and horses.

Without getting too technical, too much sugar causes founder in some ponies and horses (mostly ponies). Founder shows up as very sore feet (the pony can't walk) and sometimes they get so bad that the pony has to be put down.

In spring, the grass is very full of sugar.

So we lock our ponies up so they cannot eat too much. Ponies will eat for 22 hours a day if given a chance. (They sleep for most of the other 2 hours). Apples and carrots and very rich in sugar.

So is the green grass on the outside of his yard and the hay stack outside his reach (which will be fed to him in carefully measured amounts).

So if you see a "poor pony" locked in a yard with no grass or feed DO NOT FEED HIM or you could be KILLING HIM.

If you walk past a pony on the way to school and give him a carrot, and so do the other 50 kids who go down the same path, he could be getting 50 carrots a day. This is enough to founder most ponies. But even one or two could be the last bite to do it.

Even if it is not a pony at risk of founder, it may be a horse that is allergic to something, or it may have been ill and now on a restricted diet. So please, for the health of the animal DO NOT FEED unless you have permission from the owner.

More Than Just a Chook

At the Fodder Store we are often asked to obtain the more exotic types of chickens for our customers. These are usually very difficult to get hold of as many of the breeders hold out for more money than the average person wants to pay as many do not want to go on to show the birds but rather are just looking for something a little different to colour up the old chook house.

The following is information on some of the breeds of chickens that we have handled in the short time that we have been in business at the Fodder Store.

Hy-line Browns: Nothing fancy here, these are very affordable birds that have been developed to be very calm docile birds that are prolific layers and suit the concept of alternative living in Australia. These birds are great fossickers and adapt to free ranging very well. They are probably one of the best feed converters around and should produce in excess of 400 eggs over their lifetime.

Rhode Island Reds: This is a very hardy, medium sized bird that is bred for both egg and meat production. The roosters can tend to be a little aggressive at times and are therefore not perhaps the best choice of bird to keep around with kids present. The skin of the bird is a yellowish colour. These birds, as the name would suggest, originated from America in about 1890. The hens are considered a good layer producing about 280 eggs per year and their lifespan is said to be about 5 years producing for about 3 of these years.

Silver Laced (Penciled) Wyandotte: These very pretty birds are considered as a medium sized hen. They were developed in New York State in about 1870 and was the base of other varieties of Wyandottes. The hens will lay about 200 eggs per year, they are devoted mothers and their nature is very friendly so they will make a good pet for the back yard. They have a good rounded shape, rose combs and their markings are very striking indeed.















Gold Laced Wyandotte: One of my personal favourites, these birds are obviously very similar to their silver coloured cousin mentioned but if you want some incredible colour to add to your hen house you can't go past these. Photos do not do justice to them, you will have to see for yourself or take my word for it.

Light Sussex: A very robust and well rounded bird that is happy in either confined or free range conditions. They are also considered dual purpose bird being good for producing meat and eggs (about 250 per year). The breed originated from England and are said to date back as far as the Roman Conquest making them one of the oldest known breeds. I have had these birds at home for many years, they are great parents and both rooster and hens have wonderful natures. Once the initial pecking order has been sorted out they seem to adapt to having other breeds around them well.

Plymouth Rock: These birds originated from New England US in about 1860. They are a fairly large hen that is also bred for both meat and egg production. They have a lovely rounded shape and are beautifully marked. They come in several types and the one pictured is a Barred Rock. I have read that these birds will continue to lay throughout the winter months but perhaps in a slightly reduced capacity.

Silky Bantam: These are by far the highest requested bird that we get. They are extremely popular and make wonderful gifts for kids to raise. Once again I have had these at home for many years and they all have individual natures. Having said this you can get the occasional rooster with a little too much spirit form time to time. It is believed that they originated from China, Marco Polo actually mentioned them in his travelogues in the 13th century. Their plumage is quite different to that of the usual chicken and if you study their feet you will find a 5th toe. There are about 6 or 7 different coloured varieties of the birds and they also come in 2 types, bearded and non-bearded. The hens make excellent mothers and I have seen other hens in the flock take on the role of protective Aunties. They are not the best of layers and the size of the egg is not very big but I can attest to the flavour as being as good as you will get. The skin of these birds is black and their meat is quite dark. They are considered as gourmet food in many Asian countries but we won't tell the kids that.

With the approach of another breeding season the fancier of chickens will become scarcer on the market.

We are looking to combat some of the shortages of these birds by incubating our own stock over the approaching weeks with the intention of being able to offer them at more affordable prices. In fact we have some baby Silky Bantams hatching as I write.

Once again thank you to the Fodder Store for their contribution.


