One Tree Hill... Councilor's Report

Hello and welcome back. I take this opportunity to wish everyone a very Happy New Year, I hope it will be a good one for all of us. Bushfire season is now upon us and no matter how prepared and vigilant we are I guess we should always expect and be prepared for the unexpected. My son came home one Friday evening shouting get the fire extinguishers there's a fire across the road. By the time I got the extinguisher there a vigilant person from Burnet Drive OTH who was thrashing the fire with an olive branch which he ripped off an olive tree and with the help of the fire extinguisher we took care of the rest. The CFS were alerted and were really quick on the scene. We thought the fire had been deliberately lit however as time progressed the remaining CFS volunteers diagnosed the problem as sparks falling from a crinkled high tension wire. ETSA came out, shut the power, so OTH was in the dark for a few hours while the wire was repaired. Congratulations and a job well done to all involved in averting a potential tragedy and expediting quick repairs. By the time you get this Australia Day would have come and gone, it's a pity the day is sullied with connotations of ill doing and ill feelings. To me, changing the date will not change history and history should be remembered on the day it happened, including the good, bad and indifferent, and not be denied. As an Australian son of Italian immigrants I am of the opinion that Australia is the best country in the world and that we, every one of us, regardless of our race, religion, beliefs and views, are blessed to live in Australia and should celebrate the day for what it is with all its warts and roses.

From a Council perspective. The new multi-storey Playford CBD Carpark has commenced construction. The 360 vehicle carpark, which includes spaces for disability parking, is a key element in the \$400 million CBD of the North project and will support a proposed hotel, retail space, medical hub, government offices and Playford Arena. The \$7.5 million carpark, situated on the corner of Main North Road and Philip Highway, has received \$1.5 million in State Government funding. New temporary car parking around Prince George Plaza the new temporary carparks will be available during the new multi-storey carpark build. The car parks can be accessed from Philip Highway or Main North Road via Prince Charles Street. The larger car park has approximately 60 spaces and is between the Civic Centre and Main North Road. The second car park, of 13 spaces, is located on the new CBD Hotel site at the western end of Prince George Plaza. Disability parks are available at the nearest points to Civic Centre, Prince George Plaza and Grenville Community Connections Hub. Road warriors each year substantial works are undertaken to maintain roads, curbs and footpaths across the City of Playford. So far, Council has already renewed 19km of road out of its target of 30km for the financial year and 7km of footpaths out of its 12km goal. In addition to this, Council has recently negotiated significant savings with roadwork contractor Boral. The contract also ensures employment and training opportunities for the local community. Congratulations to the organisers of the Christmas Twilight Country Market, a great success. At the market I was asked if it would be possible to have a white line marked along the entire length of Crosshill Road as some road users appeared to wander across the road making for unsafe driving conditions. I am pleased to advise that Council has advised me that in the interests of road safety, a white line will be marked along the entire length of Crosshill road in due course.

One Tree Hill CFS — Incident Report Dec'17-Jan'18



Happy New Year to everyone from the CFS, and it was a happy one for us because there was no call out on New Year's Eve. It has been a busy couple of months since the last Grapevine with 28 callouts during December and January. 10 of those were fires, most of which were either out of area or on the urban/rural fringe. The most significant fire was on the 13th of December at Blencowie Road which threatened a house and was widely reported in the press. Fortunately, we were on stand-by at the shed because of the dangerous conditions that day and were able to respond all trucks immediately. This meant we were able to contain the fire to a relatively small 1.5 hectare area including some damage to grape vines, rather than facing a much bigger blaze.

Amongst the other fire calls, was one for a fire in a backyard in Evanston. On arrival, the fire had escaped the backyard and burned nearly two hectares in the vacant paddock behind the houses, causing a few nervous moments for locals. A small fire on the 5th of January was put out by residents but was caused by a fallen power line which took several hours to repair, this resulted in an extended blackout that night for the township and surrounding areas.

There were also several car accidents during the period, unusual amongst those was one for an accident with a kangaroo. There seems to be a lot of kangaroos on the road recently, especially west of town where they have not normally been common, so please take care.

With the hot weather there have been several stand-by days where we man the station for a quicker response, one of those was for the Tour Down Under and it was good to see some of the locals calling into the station to have a look around. Finally, we have been called up for 5 strike teams, to the mid north, Yorke Peninsula, Sherwood in the south-east, Roseworthy and the Tour Down Under. The last two of those were precautionary teams, strategically placed to pre-empt possible major incidents.

Alerts SA discontinued

We have been asked to remind people that the Alerts SA app which was launched last year has been discontinued due to failures on the catastrophic fire ban day on the 6th of January. The public have been asked to remove the app from their phones and refer to the web sites of relevant agencies for emergency information, for the CFS, the address is below. One Tree Hill CFS has also launched a Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/onetreehillcountryfireservice/ where we have been putting articles of interest, and information relating to fire bans.



Recipes of the Month... Banana Bread

Banana Bread



Ingredients

- Melted low-fat dairy spread, to grease
 - ♦ 265g (1 3/4 cups) self-raising flour
 - ♦ 40g (1/4 cup) plain flour
 - 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - ♦ 140g (2/3 cup, firmly packed) CSR Brown Sugar
- ♦ 2 overripe medium bananas, mashed
 - ♦ 2 eggs, lightly whisked
 - 125ml (1/2 cup) skim milk
 - ♦ 50g butter, melted, cooled

Method

Step 1

Preheat oven to 180°C. Brush an 11 x 21cm (base measurement) loaf pan with melted dairy spread to lightly grease. Line the base and 2 opposite sides with non-stick baking paper, allowing it to overhang.



Step 2

Sift the combined flours and cinnamon into a large bowl. Stir in the sugar and make a well in the centre. Mash bananas in a medium bowl. Add the eggs, milk, and melted butter, and stir until well combined. Add the banana mixture to the flour mixture and stir until just combined. Spoon the mixture into the prepared pan and smooth the surface.

Step 3

Bake in preheated oven for 45-50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Remove from oven and set aside in the pan for 5 minutes. Turn onto a wire rack to cool completely. Cut into slices to serve.

What's Growing in my Garden Today...

Not much really, it's January and we have endured some awfully hot 44 degree summer days.

Many years ago, I planted a few Babingtonia Virgata bushes. Back then the plant was sold as Baekea Virgata. When in flower from mid December through to the end of January, it bears masses of dainty white flowers to which many, many species of insects are attracted. The buzz and hum from the many colourful insects is very audible as they all scramble for a share of the pollen and nectar that this plant produces. It is a sight to be seen.

Babingtonia Virgata does enjoy a deep watering during January and/or February if we have not received much summer rainfall. It's seed is easily germinated and the Eastern Rosellas enjoy the green seed capsules that are produced.

I am pleased that I have this plant in my garden. It is still flowering now and as a cut flower, it is a pretty addition to a vase of roses. Just beautiful.

History... Humbug Scrub Wildlife Sanctuary 1960-1969

Professor Cleland (Chairman of Commissioners of The National Park [Belair]) had proposed a change to allow more parks to be created and the commissioners to control them. This led to the search for suitable land (mentioned in the previous article). In 1959, it gained impetus when Mr. Lance Rasheed donated 500 acres for a reserve. This was to be called Para Wirra National Park and was dedicated on 21st June 1962. Both Tom and Ray had agitated for many years for this to happen.

The 1960's continued to be a quiet time in the newspapers, with no references to the sanctuary. But in 1965, the "Women's Weekly" carried a front page story of a visiting French Ballerina. Liane Dayde and her husband were taken to the sanctuary by the French Consul, Mr Buttfield. She is reported as having been mesmerised by the "children in the pockets" and chose to dress in her tutu and dance with the kangaroos.

The 1960's were the beginning of the reign of Neville Bellchambers; reign of terror, I am led to believe. With his driver's license firmly in hand, he got his

first car. One of his joys was to race the emus in from the gate to the cottage – any hour of the night, which did not please his father. This usually happened after a date with one of the local young ladies.

Neville remembers seeing bobcats in the sanctuary. They were just outside the cottage, causing some consternation. Apparently they had escaped from a wildlife park in the Port August area. Bobcats are native to North America and weigh about 8 to 9 kg.

Income for the family and the sanctuary they supported was mainly earned from the land itself. Ray had bee hives and grew fruit and vegetables. He also ran a few sheep which he sheared himself, using hand blades. Ray also worked off site, in the Wynn Vale vineyards (now completely covered by housing) and in the Barossa. At this time there was still some harvesting of wattle bark, which was sold to Port Adelaide tanneries. Neville remembers rolling sheets of wattle bark into bundles for transporting.

Unfortunately, there are very few written records of the sanctuary's day to day routine and events. While Tom kept some details and we can glean some from old newspapers, there is very little written from about 1950 and I am forced to rely on Neville's memory. Any photos or information about the old days will be much appreciated by the Trustees. If you are a local with such information please contact Neville at the sanctuary, or me. I will archive electronic data within the sanctuary records for future generations.





Animals ... Horses: Lessons Learnt

(by one of my pupils)

Every horse is different. Sensitive ones need different handling to the disrespectful ones.

Some don't have a page in the manual of handling. You have to be prepared to make up your own ideas.

Leadership. Different characters look for different things. The nervous look for confidence and need to feel you will keep them safe. The confident ones test your leadership, asking if they should be the leaders.

Training session times. How long depends on the horse and the situation. Sometimes you will spend an hour and get no improvement. Other times it happens in a few minutes. Quit when you have an improvement, not when you have spent a pre-set time. Don't repeat an exercise endlessly just because he is good at it. He will get bored or start to wonder if he did get it right. Either way, you have created a problem where none existed.

Relationship. Having a horse is not all about performance. Much is about the relationship between you. You are friends, dance partners and confidentes. Without a relationship, you will not go beyond a set level as he will not give you his very best. Ribbons are not the only indicator of performance.

Attitude. Is it his or your attitude that needs changing? Develop patience, understanding and sensitivity to get the best from your horse. If he is scared, hitting to get through it only tells him it really is scary. Use patience until you have trust and let him know that the scary thing is not so scary.

Animals ... Goats: Buying Goats at a Market

To be very pointed: I would not. You know nothing of its history; genetics, health, handling.

That cute kid at the market may have health issues. Has it got CAE (small ruminant lentivirus), worms, lice? Did it get a good start to life, so it's gut health is good? How soon will you lose it in spite of your best efforts and expensive vet care, just because you got something that others had not cared for?

What is it's genetic potential? Without a pedigree you know nothing of its genetic ability to produce. Sure, pedigrees don't guarantee anything either, but you do have a better chance of an honest assessment.

How many have been roughly handled? Damage to legs and joints is common with rough handling. These will cause issues in the future.

If you want a cute kid as a pet, you are not interested in genetics. But do you want health issues that could have been avoided? How much are you willing to spend in saving a goat? Or failing to save in spite of your vet bill.

Even if you want to buy it for the meat, do you really want to take it home? You may be bringing problems to the animals already there.

But if you are determined, then may I suggest the following.

Do not buy if it has a runny nose, coughs, has swollen legs or joints, diarrhoea, or a harsh coat.

Stay quietly by its pen and see if it settles to your presence. If you get it home and cannot catch it, you could be in for trouble.

Try to determine who its owner/seller is and see how they move around the animals. Do they seem to care or is it all just a commodity.

Having bought your risky investment, make sure you take it home in suitable containers, a pen or cage on a ute or trailer, or in the back of your air conditioned car. NOT in the boot, tied up with rope. Don't leave it while you continue your shopping. Once in a trailer in the sun, animals get heat stressed very quickly. Not only is this extremely dangerous for the animal, it is dangerous for your wallet as the law can prosecute you.

Oh and all those cute multicoloured kids are probably bush goats. Hardy, small and adept at escaping.
