



Dear Residents,

Street Library Update. Last month we followed up a suggestion to locate the street library in the alcove of the second (western) entrance; this would have allowed us to host a lot more books out of the weather. However, concerns were raised, amongst other things, about the impact of that location on events being held in the hall. So, we have gone back to our original idea of placing the street library by the footpath at the front of the building and we are in the process of obtaining council approvals. Updates before our next Grapevine will be made on our website http://onetreehill.org.au.

Council have released some previously confidential Agendas and Minutes, including information on the multi-story carpark (search for "Ordinary-Council-Confidential-Minutes" from the Playford Website and then open "10-24-October-2017-Ordinary-Council-Confidential-Minutes-Extract"). They provide interesting reading! For example, the documents reveal the cost to ratepayers of the town centre multi-story carpark was \$7.086m with annual recurring costs of \$534,000. It is a big concern that ratepayers have been burdened with large, long term payments by borrowing millions of dollars to build a facility that appears to be poorly used.

If you have concerns about Council spending or any other decisions, you are encouraged, in the first instance, to discuss them with any of the Ward 3 Councillors. If you feel your concerns affect the wider local community, you are also encouraged to come along to our Progress Meetings and share your concerns with our Association, with a view to us making appropriate representations to Council directly.



Our next meeting is at 7:30pm on Thursday 12h December in the Institute at One Tree Hill. I hope to see you there. Note, we do not meet in January. Kind Regards,

Fire Danger Ratings

Fire Danger Ratings indicate the degree of difficulty of stopping a fire under the predicted weather conditions.

The Bureau of Meteorology, in partnership with CFS, determines the Fire Danger Ratings based on a combination of predicted weather conditions and current observations.

The official Fire Danger Rating for the following day is issued after 4:30pm by the CFS, and includes preliminary forecasts for the next four days.

The ratings do not predict how likely bushfires are to occur, but rather how a fire would behave if one started.

The higher the Fire Danger Rating, the more dangerous the fire conditions are in that district.

Fire Danger Ratings should be used to determine your Bushfire Survival Plan response for the following days.

Fire Danger Ratings forecast two to four days out should be used as a guide only and may change.



Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

In follow up from last month I am pleased to advise that the motion to move the One Tree Hill Township sign near Jordan Drive was amended, submitted as a motion on notice (13.1) at the 22nd October 2019 Ordinary Council Meeting and Carried by the chamber as follows.

COUNCIL RESOLUTION 3783

Moved: Cr Kerrison

Seconded: Cr Craig

That following engagement with the One Tree Hill Progress Association, Council seek the appropriate regulatory approval to relocate the One tree Hill township sign on Blacktop Road near Jordan Drive on the eastern entry to the township, to improve visibility and safety concerns of the residents.

Upon receipt of approvals the sign to be relocated and any associated costs outside of current budget to be managed through a future budget review.

That the following options be considered, or any other appropriate alternative, that will meet with the satisfaction of Council, any regulatory authorities, and the One tree Hill Progress Association:

Option 1. Move the sign in the vicinity of 180 to 190 meters on the opposite side of the road towards One Tree Hill road (AL-RU Farm) in the eastern direction.

Option 2. Move the sign in the vicinity of 100 to 120 meters on the same side of the road towards One Tree Hill Road (AL-RU Farm) in the eastern direction.

Hopefully this resolution will lead to a positive outcome for the concerned residents and community. I wish to say thank you to all the concerned residents and the One Tree Hill Progress Association who have corresponded with me over many months.

Following council as a resident can be time consuming and information difficult to find. For residents that are interested there were a number of confidential items moved to be released at the 23rd April 2019 Ordinary Council Meeting and can now be referenced through the City of Playford web page. While many of the items maybe of interest to some, they are now history in my opinion. However, anyone interested in or concerned with the CBD Multi-deck Carpark and the related finances can view the 27th June 2017 and the 24th October 2017 Confidential Agenda Extract and Confidential Minutes Extract for details.

One of my focuses and promises being elected to council was to drive efficiencies and create downwards pressure on rates. As a growth council we do have a number of challenges which only strengthens the need to be focused on efficiencies and downwards pressure on rates to minimise future rate increases. I will continue my focused approached in several key areas. If anyone would like to further discuss the council concerns or other details, please give me a call. Alternatively, I am happy to meet with residents for a coffee and chat in the local area.

The Playford Community Carols will feature this year on the 7th December at Fremont Park. Tim Campbell will host the evening, singing and dancing his way across the stage. 

What's Flowering In My Garden?

It's late Spring and, already, we have endured a few very hot days. With the Bottlebrush plants (Callistemon species) in full flower, it's quite a delight to enjoy the many shades of brilliant red brushes as well as more subtle shades of apricot pink and the dramatic deep pink and dark purple shades. It is quite amazing to see so many colours that the Bottlebrush group of plants does offer the gardener. What a glorious sight.

Kunzea pomifera is in full flower and why is it flowering now because it has never flowered and it was planted probably 8 or 9 years ago? This plant grows naturally in our area along the Gawler Road, through Para Wirra and into Sandy Creek and Cockatoo Valley. Being a ground cover plant, it is approximately 40cms high and about 2m wide.

It bears small delicate white flowers that have a very strong honey scented perfume, to which the bees and native bees are attracted. The many horizontal branches are well covered with small stiff mid green leaves and the new growth displays a lovely reddish green colour. This plant, with the common name of Muntries, should produce some delicious edible berries that can be eaten fresh or made into a jam. I wonder, will I be able pick any berries or will the birds and lizards beat me to them?

I have seen this very hardy plant available at local garden centres recently and sometimes can be found as tubestock. Search for this stunning, spectacular, perfumed ground cover but be prepared to water this plant during it's first Summer. The Blue Wrens do like this lovely plant as a place for nesting and safe refuge.

Kunzea pomifera is just delightful plant to have in the garden.

SATAY BEEF STIR FRY RECIPE

SAUCE INGREDIENTS:

- 2 tbsp. Sweet Chilli Sauce
- 125mL Beef Stock
- 125mL Coconut Cream
- ½ C Peanut Paste
- 2 tbsp. Oyster Sauce

STIR FRY INGREDIENTS:

- 500g Limousin Beef (Minute Steak, Schnitzel Cut, or Rump)
- 1 Large Onion, sliced
- ½ tsp. Crushed Garlic
- 1 tsp. Grated Ginger
- 1 tsp. Chilli paste
- 2 Carrots, sliced
- 200g Mushrooms, sliced
- 1 bunch Bok Choy, sliced (you could also use snow peas, cabbage and/or capsicum)
- 2 tsp. Curry Powder
- Oil for frying

RECIPE METHOD:

- 1. Combine just the sauce ingredients in a jug or bowl and set aside.
- 2. Cut beef into thin strips and place in a bowl with some olive oil and any flavouring you may wish to add, i.e. salt, pepper, chilli flakes. Set aside while you slice your veggies.
- 3. Heat oil in wok or frypan; add onion, garlic, ginger and chilli, and cook for 1 minute.
- 4. Add carrots, mushrooms and root end of bok choy (root end only at this point, the leaves will be added at the end with the meat), and cook for 2 minutes or until just softened. Add curry powder and 1-2 tablespoons of water (to stop curry powder sticking), and cook for a further 1 minute.
- 5. Add jug of prepared satay sauce, mix through and bring to the boil to allow sauce to thicken and veggies to cook. Once thickened, remove from heat and set aside.
- 6. In a separate fry pan or skillet cook the beef in small batches till just golden. As each batch browns, place on your vegetable mixture in the wok. If you are using Limousin steak, you won't need any oil; be sure your pan is on high and keep the beef moving to prevent sticking. It is important to cook the beef in small batches to prevent your pan cooling too quickly and boiling your beef, rather than frying it.
- 7. Once all of the beef is cooked, add your bok choy leaves to the wok and reheat, mixing thoroughly.
- 8. Serve with rice.

One Tree Hill ~ Weed Of Concern ~ Feral Olives



Feral Olive Infestation

Feral European olives (Olea europaea) are a major pest plant in native vegetation where they displace native species and degrade fauna habitat. Olives are evergreen trees that originate from the Mediterranean region. They were first introduced to South Australia in 1836 and have since become naturalised especially in woodland habitats.

An olive tree is an erect, bushy tree growing up to 12 m tall. It has a deep branched root system with a large lignotuber that stores energy and generates new stems. The trunk branches from the base and has rough grey to black bark. The leaves are narrow, glossy dark green on top and silvery underneath. It has small cream flowers with four petals that appear in large clusters in late spring. Mature trees produce thousands of fruit each year, each bearing one seed. The fruit is initially green and becomes purple-black as it ripens over summer. The seeds germinate mainly in autumn and seedlings grow during winter. New plants are several years old before flowering. New shoots and suckers can develop from the woody roots after the trunk is injured or removed.

It should be noted that olive trees are a significant bushfire hazard, because they are rich in oil and burn with intense heat. They increase the impact of bushfires on native vegetation and significantly increase the danger of fire fighting. This has become more of an issue given climate change, and the recent changes in weather patterns.

A distinction is made between olive trees that were deliberately planted and are used and maintained and wilding olives, defined as 1) feral olives that have grown from self-sown seed; and 2) olive trees that are no longer used and/or maintained such that they pose a high risk of giving rise to feral olives. Wilding olives are a declared plant under the Natural Resources Management Act 2004 (NRM Act).

The following sections of the NRM Act apply to wilding olives in the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges region:

- 182 (2) Landowners to control the plant on their properties
- 182 (3) Landowner must follow council regulations regarding olive
- 185 Recovery of control costs on adjoining road reserves.

NRM authorities may require land owners to control olives (other than planted trees that are

used and maintained for domestic, public amenity or commercial purposes) on their land. NRM authorities are required to control wilding olives on road reserves, and may recover costs from the owners of adjoining land.

Note that cultivated trees, planted and maintained for use, are not declared, but they have to be properly maintained to reduce the risk of giving rise to feral olives by regular pruning or harvesting of fruit. Feral olives can be spread by birds and foxes, so managers of olive orchards have moral and environmental obligations to assess and manage the weed potential of their crops.

Feral olives are difficult to control as the trees are hardy, have a vigorous and persistent root systems and a substantial long-lived seed bank. Regrowth and ongoing germination require continued control effort. Small seedlings can be hand pulled. Larger seedlings and small trees can be mechanically removed by a tree popper. Larger trees can be killed by cut and swab, drill and fill, or the basal bark method.
