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

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
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One Tree Hill Progress Association ~ President's Report

Dear Residents,

With the further easing of State Government Covid-19 restrictions on 19th June, the One Tree Hill Institute is again open for business. Additional health restrictions are in force and hall hirers will be asked to sign a liability document regarding adherence to the Government-mandated conditions. Please check our website and contact our Hall Manager for further details. The ongoing social distancing requirements mean that we are unable to safely restart the Country Market for some time yet.

The Association held its Annual General Meeting on 11Jun20. Many thanks to Lisa for stepping up as the new Secretary and for volunteering to become involved in Progress and the One Tree Hill community. It was great to also welcome Paula Luethen, the member for King, as a new member. Thank you to Councillor David Kerrison for attending and continuing to take an active interest in Progress activities.

The Minister of Environment and Water has replied to our letter regarding our water supply concerns during power outages. He referred us to SA Water for information regarding their plans to install a new switchboard and a generator 'quick connection point' at the One Tree Hill Water Pump Station. We are following this up, as we have ongoing concerns that in some emergency situations where power is lost, SA Water would not turn up at the Pump Station with a generator until after the danger had passed.

Please check our website and Grapevine Facebook page for any important community updates as well as notice that the new Grapevine is available for reading online. It was great to welcome two new members at our last meeting. If you would like to make a difference to your local community, please come along to our next meeting at 7:30pm on Thursday 9Jul20. We try to keep meetings to less than an hour and visitors are always welcome.

One Tree Hill CFS ~ Incident Report June 2020



A quiet June so far for the two shifts with only 6 calls across the 4 weeks ending on the 20th of June. Two of these were mutual response calls with the MFS, one for a Private Alarm on Kelly Road, just up from Craigmore and the other for a multi-story flat fire in Elizabeth. In both cases, MFS were quickly on the scene and were able to place a stop on our units before we arrived. We were also called to assist the MFS for a Change of Quarters (COQ) in the wild weather late on the 31st of May. COQ calls happen when a station is left empty, usually due to a large event, leaving an entire area vulnerable. They occur quite regularly and are usually filled by other

MFS Brigades, but in this case many weather-related calls in a short space of time meant all the surrounding MFS crews were otherwise committed. With our unit stationed at the Elizabeth MFS, this effectively makes us responsible for all callouts in the Elizabeth area.

The wet and windy weather also caught out a driver earlier that same day when their car came to grief against the guard rail going into Snake Gully, fortunately the call was only for a clean up but could have been far worse. Another driver was lucky to escape with minor injuries on Saturday the 13th of June when they rolled their car in slippery conditions on the Kersbrook Road. The car was between two corners and partially obstructing the road. Our crews were called on to do traffic control while waiting for the tow truck to remove the vehicle.

The only other incident was for a vehicle fire at the gates of the Para Wirra Conservation Park in the early hours of Thursday the 18th. On arriving, this turned out to be smoke related to a mechanical fault and our truck escorted the van back to a safer location near the roundabout while they awaited assistance.

Many people may not realise but our station is also the base station for the CFS Para Group which extends south to Tea Tree Gully and west to Virginia and the coast. This means that for any major incident in this area involving 2 or more Brigades, our station becomes the communications hub for the Group. Para Base was called to open for one such incident on the night of Thursday the 18th when a semi-trailer full of rubbish caught fire at Burton.



A Welcome Return To Training

People passing the station on a Monday night would have noticed the doors were up and the Brigade is finally back to training. While the extent of the training is still curtailed by COVID conditions it has been a welcome return for brigade members and a good chance to get our hands back on the equipment and practice skills for those who have been unable to attend callouts. Hopefully, a return to full training is not too far in the future.

As we sit through these long cold days, summer seems to be an eternity away and while it is the ideal time to start preparing properties the weather does not always allow us to get out. What better time to dust off your fire plan and check to see that it is still current? Even better if you are new to the area and do not have a fire plan, time to get working. The CFS website has several resources that can assist with your planning.

■ Smooth surfaces

Paint or refurbish dried exterior timber, repair nooks or crannies where leaves and debris can gather. Design pathways, driveways and lawns around your home to keep a clear area immediately around your home.

■ Roofing


Well-secured metal roofing is preferable. A tiled roof needs to be well fitted with fire-resistant sarking (fibreglass-based aluminium foil).

m Walls

Choose non-flammable wall materials such as brick, mud brick and fibre cement. Vinyl weatherboards, rough timber and other cladding can warp or catch fire. Gaps in external roof and wall cladding need to be sealed.

Windows, crevices and vents

Spark-proof your home with bronze or stainless steel flywire screens on windows and doors, or install fire resistant metal shutters. Cover all wall cavities in fine wire mesh. Enclose areas under decks and floors. Screen vents in the roof space with fine wire mesh.



m Sprinkler system

A home bushfire sprinkler system that directs water over the roof, windows, doors and underfloor areas is one of the most effective ways of protecting against radiant heat, direct flame and ember attack. Seek professional advice for design and installation.

m Skylights

Install wire-reinforced glass or a thermo plastic cover on skylights as plastic can melt and glass can break in intense heat.

Property access

Gateways should be at least 3 metres wide and there should be clear access with a turnaround point for firefighting vehicles.

Gutters

Regularly clean gutters and remove leaves and bark from any areas where they can become trapped.

Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Further Delivering on Transparency!

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

During the City of Playford's 2017 Rate Review Process that was going to impose significant rate increases to many ratepayers in Playford, it was evident that the minutes of the meetings did not capture the debate behind the Council Resolutions. Ratepayers were left looking for answers with most Councillors being very tight lipped. It was evident that we needed to improve transparency!!

Since being elected I have been advocating for Council to support Live Streaming and that the recordings of meetings be made available to the public. There has been strong opposition to this process and arguments based on financial costs and the fact that elected members do not have parliamentary privilege has been raised. The previous report indicated that the delivery cost was approximately \$35,000. However, since the COVID-19 pandemic it was evident that we could piece this service delivery together on a temporary basis with Zoom and a single camera. I believe we should be able to deliver this service more economically than previously quoted. Either way, it is a sound investment in transparency for the ratepayers and supports community involvement in council meetings.

It has been a pleasure to work with fellow Councillor Clint Marsh who supported the move every step of the way. Thank you Cr Clint Marsh, and to all the elected members who have supported the latest motion (Council resolution 4035 – copy below)


The Annual Business Plans 28-day Consultation period is due to close on the 16th June 2020. I will provide an update on the outcome of the review process next month.

Young OTH Author Publishes Second Book



In 2018, OTH local 23 year old Jordan Hawkey published a children's novel for 8-14 year olds about meerkats called *The Disc of Power*. Following on from this story, Jordan recently published the second book in the series, called *The Vault of Souls*. Both books feature vibrant and unique artwork, which was commissioned by young illustrator Kate Verner, who is a school friend of Jordan's. Several OTH youngsters read the draft of both of the books, and their review feedback is featured on the back covers.

Inspired and influenced by another local OTH author, Phil Cummings, Jordan has achieved a life goal in becoming a published author. His first book is now available in Dymocks in Rundle Mall, and the second book will be

there soon. Jordan has donated copies of both books to the OTH Primary School library, and has also to our OTH Street Library. The first book has been very popular with kids, including reluctant readers. The text has been laid out in a way that is friendly to the eyes for dyslexic readers.

Following on from where the first story left off, *The Vault of Souls* follows the adventures of twin meerkats Pan and Samson, who find evidence of a mysterious location known as the Vault Of Souls. If they wish to prevent disaster and chaos in Ghonsor, they must find it quickly, and prevent other creatures from finding it!



Jordan is currently working on the third book in the series, and also a separate "prequel" telling the history of Ghonsor, which is the world depicted in the books. Please do not assume your child will automatically be accepted. Form needs to be returned to the Front Office by 30th June.





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
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Where The Glowing Things Are

The **Ghost Mushroom** (*Omphalotus nidiformis*) is a bioluminescent fungus that emits a soft green glow at night. They typically emerge after late autumn rains, emitting a luminescent glow after dark. The photo on the front cover was taken at Para Wirra Conservation Park. If you do decide to visit Para Wirra at night, please be sure to check with the ranger first, as sometimes feral control shooting is done at night in the park.

Some facts about Ghost Mushrooms:

- They are native to Australia and are often found growing on decaying plant material
- Theyemerge in late autumn following good rain, and will continue into winter, reaching a size of up to 20cm wide.
- The soft green glow is a result of a chemical reaction between fungal enzymes and oxygen. It is thought that the glow
 attracts insects and other invertebrates which feed on the mushroom, helping to spread spores and propagate new colonies.
- The Ghost Mushroom glow can be bright enough to read the words on a page!

What's Flowering In My Garden?

It's just beautiful. Winter is well and truly upon us with sunshine, cold nights and a few really crisp and crunchy frosts. We have had some really worthwhile rain, resulting in a very good crop of weeds. The Hakeas throughout the garden are providing a very welcome colourful display of cream, pink and red flowers. The Correas, Thryptomenes and Croweas have opened their small flowers creating a lovely understory of Winter flowering plants.

Crowea exalata "Twice as Nice' is just beautiful. This small understory plant has been flowering now for about three weeks and is just a delight for the eyes. Planted three years ago, it has grown to be about 50cms high and 60cms wide and has many rounded mid green arching stems growing from the base of the plant. The new stem growth which is a lovely cherry red colour, supports the dark cherry red flower buds that open to display dark pink/cherry red star shaped flowers. These five-petalled waxy flowers fade with age to mid pink and at maturity, are a soft off white shade. The 1.5cm long elongated narrow leaves are held close to the stems and vary in colour from mid green to a stunning cherry red shade thus providing another colour factor to this most delightful plant.


The flowering period is about 6-8 weeks but with late Winter rains, flowering can extend well into September. This plant, excellent as a border plant or as a feature plant in a rockery, is, also, most useful as a "gap filler" amongst other taller plants. Give this plant a gentle prune after flowering and you should be rewarded next flowering season with new pink/red stems and flowers. It's great as a cut flower and looks stunning when mixed with blue/green Eucalypt foliage. It's just gorgeous. This plant is available from good nurseries occasionally and if you plant one, be prepared to give it some Summer water as it's roots are fairly close to the surface of the soil.


Crowea exalata "Twice as nice" really is quite a spectacular plant to admire and enjoy during our Winter.

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

If you're anything like me, you've thought on more than one occasion, "Man, if I could have just a few more minutes/hours in the day..."

But, alas, we're all stuck with the same 24 hours - no more, no less.

And in that time, we're asked to cram so much – work, kids, spouses, friends, family, volunteering, errands. It can feel like we're already packed to the max, without a spare second for anything else. I hear so many people around me saying..."I could, I should... One day I will start.. There is never enough time.."

People often ask me what the typical reasons are that people seek my coaching and counselling support. Many assume it is for people with significant depressive or traumatic life challenges. The reality is that many people have sought help to feel better about how they are living their life, what they can do to feel more satisfied and how to sort out their priorities.

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There ARE Only 24 Hours In A Day!!! (cont.)


I hear many people say things like..."why can't I do what he does... How do they get time for exercise...I wish I could learn to cook...if only I didn't have so many unfinished jobs sitting around......I will never get fitter"!

.... Get ready for it... there is a silver bullet..."What we prioritise gets done"! Yep amazing!... Believe it or not we all have 24 hours in a day. With these hours most of us only have a smidgen of spare time and the reality is that what we choose to prioritise gets done! The person you look at that always has a clean car while yours is coated in mud is simply cleaning their car while you are doing something else. While they are buffing their loved automobile you might be



working overtime, spending quality time with a loved one, walking your dog etc etc! The key message here is to stop comparing yourself to other people. We all have small pockets of spare time and we all use them differently. What you prioritise gets done!

We all have limited time and energy – so it is a really good idea to use what we have effectively!



I am not a big lover of massive "TO DO" lists. These can be overwhelming and unrealistic! Instead try setting yourself a weekly rhythm. This still involves using a TO DO list but not looking at this every day. Try the following;

- Write your larger TO DO list
- Look at this list once per week only
- Write on your calendar or make up a simple Monday to Sunday table
- Take a couple things off your list and place them in your week with a set time
 of the day you are going to start this task (or complete if you can allow the
 time needed)
- When you do this be realistic! Start small.
- Put the larger list away and focus only on the week ahead

Remember sometimes the only way to create some time is to drop something off of the list. Sometimes I like to have a big Sunday "cook up" for the week and the only way to make this happen is to say no to a date with friends, leave the beds unmade and the ironing til another night!

When you are deciding what to put on your weekly rhythm, think about the difference between what is urgent and what is important. Do what's important first.

In many ways, life is a circle – what you put in to it comes back around. When you make a positive impact in the world, the world will have a positive impact on you.

If you want to be rich, be generous. If you want to make friends, be friendly. If you want to be heard, listen. If you want to be understood by others, take the time to truly understand them. If you want to live an interesting life, be interested in the happenings around you.

Focus on your priorities, but take things in your stride. Make decisions, not excuses. Live one moment at a time. Count your blessings, not your troubles. Let the wrong things go. Look for lessons in unforeseen obstacles. Ask for help from someone you trust or a professional counsellor or coach. Give as much as you take. Make time for those who matter. Laugh when you can. Cry when you need to. And always stay true to your values.


