

Thanks to Ian Slater and the group of volunteers who returned the town map sign to the front of the Institute on 12Sep20. The wooden frame failed, and it blew over in early June so Ian organised the local fabrication and installation of a steel frame and it is now much stronger. We are still waiting to hear back from the City of Playford regarding a review of the garden beds on Blacktop Road in the township.

Following earlier written correspondence, we have had informal discussions with the Minister for the Environment and Water and explained to him the situation regarding the lack of town water during a power outage. He said he would take another look at our concerns; this was followed up by one of his staffers in a phone call on 15Oct20. Cr David Kerrison, Cr Andrew Craig, Cr Clint Marsh and I met with the Bunyip on 9Oct20 to present the facts for an article to improve community awareness.

Our next meeting will be held at 7:30pm on Thursday 12Nov20; if you would like to help the community, please think about coming along.

One Tree Hill CFS ~ October Report

After a noticeably quiet period for the CFS over the last few months, October has been busy including several unusual calls. 14 callouts were recorded including 2 third alarm structure fires, 2 animal rescues, 3 vehicle accidents, 4 trees down, 2 grass fires and a private alarm.



In the first of the 2 large structure fires, our crews were called to assist along with 14 other crews from the MFS and CFS with a fire burning in one of the buildings in the old DSTO/WRE complex. The fire started in a building used by the Ex-Military Rehabilitation Centre and our crews were required to don breathing apparatus to assist with mop-up. The second of these fires was in a lettuce packing shed in Lewiston and was widely reported in the press. In this case, there were 19 units, mostly CFS, called to the blaze which burnt well into the night and caused 3 million dollars in damage.

The first of the vehicle accidents occurred on Hannaford Hump Road and involved a four-wheel drive towing another vehicle on a trailer. The weight on the trailer was enough to force the towing vehicle off the dirt road and into a tree. Fortunately, there were no injuries. One of the other vehicle accidents was unusual in that on arrival the crew found a car lodged in the middle of the large roundabout on Kersbrook Road. The car had shredded tyres and had been abandoned by its driver, the crew was asked to assist SAPOL in a search for the occupants.

Speaking of unusual, we do not get a lot of calls for animal rescues, but this month, we have had two. One involved getting a possum out of a tree, a first as far as we can remember ... before you say "possums are supposed to be in trees", in this case, it was a baby possum whose mother had been killed on Blacktop Road. The call came from wildlife rescue who were afraid the young possum would not survive on its own. The other animal rescue call was for an injured cat stuck in a stormwater drain in Hillbank.

Stormy weather on the 20th of September resulted in a high volume of calls all over the metropolitan area. As a result, our crews were called to assist with trees down near McDonalds in Elizabeth and another where the tree was blocking a road in Golden Grove and had caused a hole in the roof of a house. The other tree related calls during the month were for trees blocking roads, one at Humbug Scrub Road near Para Wirra and the other on Cornishmans Hill Road. The private alarm was an early morning call to the OHSC room at the Primary School where a rather embarrassed carer had burnt the breakfast and set off the fire alarm.



Prepare Your Property

Anyone who has driven around recently will have seen that the signs saying the current focus for the CFS is on property preparation. The late spring rains have resulted in low curing rates in the grass and weeds, but this also means we are looking at an increased fuel load for the summer months. The best time to get out on your mower is while the grass is still green. Delaying by even a couple of days can significantly increase the risk of accidentally starting a fire in dry grass.

As of the 24th of October, there has been no word on the Fire Danger Season dates, please refer to the CFS website if you have any questions. In the meantime, if you are burning off, please take account of the weather conditions and refer to your local council if you have any questions regarding the general burning permits and for guidelines on when, how and what you are permitted to burn. Notifying your neighbours is required in some councils, and a courtesy call to the CFS duty phone may help prevent an unwanted visit to your property.

Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

The City of Playford has now delivered a leaflet in response to the Fire Safety and Verge Mowing Council Resolution (3836) seeking your feedback on our verge and roadside management. Please take the time to provide your feedback on how we can improve the delivery of our services by ringing the City of Playford on 82560333 or by emailing playford@playford.sa.gov.au. The administration has advised that all feedback will be logged and recorded for further consideration. "Your feedback is important to support change".

The risk of the OTH Township residents being left without water during an emergency bushfire event has been raised again by residents and the OTH Progress Association. Unfortunately, the response from SA Water has not adequately addressed the concern. The concern has been raised with our local MP – Paula Luethen and was escalated to the Minister for Environment and Water, David Speirs. I have now been advised that the Minister for Police and Emergency Services is investigating.

I will continue to work with the OTH Progress Association, Paula Luethen and fellow Councillors Clint Marsh and Andrew Craig advocating for action from the State Government. The SA Water supply is delivered to the township from the holding tank on Wood Crs. via an electric pumping station. When SAPN cuts power due to fire risk or any other reason, the OTH township is left without adequate water for residents. The appropriate onsite backup generator would deliver water assurance for residents.

Since being elected to Council, community members and local sporting clubs have expressed their concern with how McGilp Recreation Park is coping with the growing community needs including the carpark, facilities and drainage. Since raising these concerns the administration has developed a concept plan for McGilp Recreation Park and I have had the opportunity to see and discuss these plans. The delivery of these plans are subject to funding and I'll be discussing further why the State Government should be coming to the table with assistance.

The City of Playford is waiting on further information on the Fire Danger Season Dates. I will place updates received from the City of Playford on my Facebook site, if you have further questions please give the City of Playford a call.

Hoping to see everyone again at the OTH markets.

Protect SA farmers

Our farmers have been through a lot lately with drought, fire and even a pandemic. We can help protect farmers in South Australia from further loss by implementing sound biosecurity measures on our properties, large or small.

Farm biosecurity is a set of measures designed to protect a property from the entry and spread of pests, diseases and weeds.

If a pest weed or disease becomes established on your property it will not only affect the health of your animals and your hip pocket through lost productivity but it also has the potential to spread into neighbouring properties and the local districts.

Chilean Needle Grass (Nassella neesiana) for example, threatens to escape local properties and invade other parts of South Australia where it is not present, furthering its negative impacts on livestock production.

All land managers play a key role in protecting Australian plant and livestock industries from pests and diseases by implementing controls and having sound biosecurity measures on-farm.

Property biosecurity is your responsibility, and that of every person visiting or working on your property.

Pests, diseases and weeds move around the landscape in a number of different ways, often assisted by human activity. Being mindful of this, there is much that we as property owners can do to prevent the entry and spread of biosecurity threats.

Property scale biosecurity underpins regional and state level biosecurity. So what we do in our backyard will protect SA farmer's livelihoods and secure our states reputation as producers of exceptional products.

Early detection and immediate reporting of an exotic pest or disease increases the chance of being able to carry out eradication. If you spot anything unusual, call the Plant Pest Hotline 1800 084 881 or the Emergency Animal disease Watch Hotline 1800 675 888.

As reported in the Grapevine recently been a change in leadership at the One Tree Hill CFS with Thomas Walsh stepping down as captain and taking up the role as a Deputy Group Officer (DGO) for Para group, this is still a volunteering role, but involves assisting with the management of multiple Brigades.

Para group is made up of the One Tree Hill, Tea Tree Gully, Dalkeith, Salisbury, Virginia and a Region 2 Reserve CFS brigades. Thomas's new role will involve being on call to attend major incidents that occurs within the boundaries of the Para group area and to assist all the brigades in various capacities. There has only ever been one other One Tree Hill CFS member who started at One Tree Hill as a fire fighter and advanced to the level of DGO (Bevis Dixon joined the One Tree Hill Brigade in 1973 and was a DGO from 1995 to1997). Bevis is still a highly valued and active member of the One Tree Hill CFS brigade.


Thomas has been a member of the One Tree Hill CFS since he joined in 2004 as a 17 year old, his family living in the Humbug Scrub area. He quickly progressed within the brigade serving in various roles including brigade training officer, management committee member, senior fire-fighter, Lieutenant and ultimately brigade captain. He had a baptism of fire after becoming captain when the Sampson Flat bushfire took off a few months after he started his new role.

He very quickly became the spokesperson for the brigade on a local, state and national level and excelled in this role. With his CFS knowledge, his untiring commitment and his cool head in emergency situations, he quickly drew the attention of CFS management at group and regional level.

One of Thomas's many achievements was being nominated by the One Tree Hill brigade for the Australasian Institute of Emergency Services Young Australian Volunteer of the Year award in 2011. Thomas deservedly won this award and as part of his prize he went sailing on the high seas on the training ship the Young Endeavour, sailing along the coast of Tasmania for a week.



In 2018 Thomas started his own business. Lumenetic electrical. and it is a credit to his time management skills that he was able to spend nearly as much time running a successful business as he



professional and well run brigade which in turn makes our local community a safer place to live in.

David Cockburn is the brigade's new captain, having previously undertaken the role of Brigade Captain from 2007 till 2014.

OTH Vets Say ~ Watch Out for Snake Bites!

Weather Changes:

As the weather warms up snakes become more active. It is important that pet owners are aware of the signs of a snake bite and how to help prevent them. Snakebites are relatively common in many areas of Australia; in particular, the Tiger and Brown Snake are responsible for most snakebites. Snake bites often occur in the late afternoon or early evening

Cats and Dogs:



Cats and dogs are curious animals, and because of this bites will occur. Pets are most frequently bitten by Brown Snakes. Owners often report that their dog collapses shortly after a snake bite and can then appear to recover. This is often related to the presence of a pre-paralytic signs that a lethal dose of venom has been delivered to the dog, a dog can die within an hour of envenomation. Urgent treatment is required.

In the case of cats being bitten, they will often show no signs of paralysis until 12 or more hours later sometimes even up to 24 hours after envenomation.

The chances of survival in dogs and cats is improved by administering antivenin and veterinary intervention, 75 - 91% of patients will recover. Without antivenin the survival rate of dogs is 33% and 66% in cats.

Preventative Action:

We can protect our beloved pets by making our properties less attractive. Keep the grass low, clean up any rubbish piles and clear away objects where snakes may hide.

If you can safely do so, a photo of the snake can help identify which antivenin is needed, however please do not put yourself or others at risk for a photo. Please do not bring a snake into a clinic, dead or alive.

Signs of Snakebite in Dogs and Cats are:

- Fang marks
- Sudden weakness followed by collapse
- Shaking or twitching of the muscles and difficulty blinking
- Drooling
- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea
- Urination
- Weakness
- Paralysis
- Blood in urine
- Dilated pupils

If you suspect your dog or cat has been bitten by a snake you should keep them calm and quiet and take them immediately to the vet.



Snake Bites in Horses:



Signs of Snakebite in Horses:

- Wobbly gait and weakness
- Laboured breathing
- Colic signs- sweating/ pawning/ rolling
- Reluctance or inability to walk
- Swollen muzzle
- Dilated pupils
- Unexplained bleeding from nose and or mouth
- Blood in urine

Bites from some snakes will make a horse collapse and then seem to recover. This can be misleading. What really happens is that the snake toxins are spreading through the system and starting to cause damage. Within a few hours other signs will start to develop.

When a horse shows any of these symptoms and you suspect they have been bitten, it is vital to try and keep the horse calm.

The symptoms can also be indicators of other diseases that

include Hendra Virus Infection. If the horse has any of the above symptoms and is not vaccinated, it is important to avoid all contact with any secretions and/or discharges from the horse's nose, mouth or eyes.

Contact your veterinarian immediately. Identification of the snake is often difficult, however may help the vet to apply treatment.

First Aid with Equine Snakebite:

If possible, keep the horse in a quiet, dark place. If the horse's nose is swollen and restricted breathing is present, use some cut hose in the swollen nostrils to ensure breathing. To prevent damage of the swollen nostrils use Vaseline or place tape around the ends of hoses.

If marks are identifiable, apply a compression bandage above and below the bite until the veterinarian arrives.

If on a trail ride and suspect your horse has been bitten, stop and keep the horse as quiet as possible. If it is a leg bite, bandage the area above and below the bite and organise transport for the horse to the nearest vet.



Veterinary Treatment:

The vital treatment of snakebites is prompt administration of antivenom and intensive supportive care. Intravenous fluids, antihistamines, adrenaline and supportive oxygen can sometimes supportive ventilation. Hospitalisation with intensive care of a minimum of 24 hrs is often required.

What's Flowering In My Garden?

There's lots and lots of flowers in my garden at the moment. The Winter flowering plants are putting on new leaf growth and the Spring flowering plants are putting on a stunning array of colours from many different plants. The heady perfume from the yellow and cream flowers of the Native Frangipani (Hymenosporum flavum) is sensational on warm mornings and balmy evenings. The beautiful perfume from the perfectly formed petite flowers of the rose Cecil Brunner is just amazing and intoxicating. There is colour and perfume everywhere I look from the golden bronze spider like flowers of the grevilleas to the soft pale pinks and creams of the Eremophilas and to the delicate pink flowers of the Eucalyptus sideroxylon. It is Springtime, just a sight to enjoy.

Melaleuca teretifolius variety Georgiana Molloy is full flower providing striking flowers to admire and enjoy. Although it does not emit any distinguishable scent, it's stunning flowers make it a must have plant for any garden, whether it be a small suburban garden or for a larger garden. Growing 1.2m by 1.2m, this plant has long stems from which thin branchlets are held. These branches display soft pink flower buds that open to reveal beautiful bright pinkish purple bottlebrush type flowers. It bears small dark green narrow leaves and it's seed capsules are retained for a very long time.

The honey bees are attracted to the nectar that is produced and, also, many native bees can be seen enjoying this plant's flowers. The many Honeyeaters spend a lot of time foraging for their share of the nectar that is produced. Being a small rounded but open plant, it is ideal to plant as a feature plant or planted as a hedge with other plants. Planted close together Georgiana Molloy can become effective as a windbreak. It can be trimmed back to keep it in a rounded shape in order to keep it from becoming too straggly. From time to time, Melaleuca Georgiana Molly can be found at good garden centres. You may need to water during Summer until it is established. Once established and flowering you will enjoy the spectacular flowers that this variety exhibits. Melaleuca teretifolius Georgiana Molloy is one of my favourites; it's just lovely. Just beautiful.



Kick That Habit!

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

Let's talk about habits! First thing is that habits are not necessarily bad. There are many regular patterns of behaviour that foster a healthy lifestyle. It is useful to consider some of your favourable habits, consider how they may have formed and what you do to maintain them.

It is useful to think of less desirable habits on a continuum – mild, moderate and more significant. Mild habits could include leaving your shoes in the lounge or not untying your shoelaces. A moderate habit might be always letting your petrol run too low or drinking too much just when you go to a party! Or perhaps you have some more challenging habits like smoking or gambling that can be more destructive on your health and wellbeing.






To change our habits - especially the more destructive ones, I think it is important to first take the time to think about why you might do this. For example, with smoking, some people may have developed this habit for more so physical reasons (smell, taste, fix, something to do with their hands) and for others it may be more so emotional reasons (loss, self doubt, depression, stress, anxiety). By taking the time to be honest about how this habit came about you should slowly unravel and understand how you can effectively kick the habit!

Kick That Habit!

Once you have considered the reasoning behind your habit - you might find the below tips useful:

- 1. **Work out what your triggers are...** this can help to stop our autopilot actions kicking in. This can be harder to do if your triggers are emotional.
- 2. **Deal with the triggers...** if you come home stressed and go straight to the fridge for a beer... what could you do instead? If you know it is emotional stuff...why aren't you seeking some counselling? Counselling can be good for anyone not just people with significant mental illness.
- 3. **Find substitute actions...** this is really, really important. You need to be aiming to DO something different rather than nothing. If you do nothing you will find it harder. IF you want to avoid binge eating at night....start by swapping the time nearer to the pantry by taking one cookie only and a cup of tea to bed and pledge to not leave the room until morning. With your cuppa read a book, watch TV or have a chat.
- 4. **Set up prompts...** Once you have ideas on what will distract you.....try to put your helpful distractions right in front of you...eg if you want to distract yourself by taking a walk put your sneakers just outside your bed OR leave your favourite song ready to play before you get in the car to help you after a stressful day at work



- 5. **Reward yourself...** and give yourself regular pats on the back.
- 6. Get support from family and friends... Find a buddy to have a coffee with and distract yourself with conversation. Go to the doctor with smoking many people have a lot of success coupling the above with medication. Call telephone support lines and consider booking in with a counsellor/coach.
- 7. **Be patient and kind to yourself...** These things take time and can have discouraging patches.

While all habits are different....the main game is to be proactive and know that you are in control...and without a doubt will power does come into it! Importantly the person with the habit needs to want to make the change themselves. No one can do this for them.

Maybe you are ready to take some action on a habit of yours?

Remember Nothing Changes if Nothing Changes!
