Prepare Your Home for Fire Season

Keeping your home and property well prepared throughout the year is essential to ensure you survive a bushfire. A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bushfire than one that hasn't been prepared. A well prepared home:

- can be easier for you or firefighters to defend
- is more likely to survive, even if you're not there
- is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk
- will give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave and have to take shelter

■ Smooth surfaces

Paint or refurbish dried exterior timber, repair nooks or crannies where leaves and debris can gather. Design pathways, driveways and lawns around your home to keep a clear area immediately around your home.

■ Roofing


Well-secured metal roofing is preferable. A tiled roof needs to be well fitted with fire-resistant sarking (fibreglass-based aluminium foil).

Walls

Choose non-flammable wall materials such as brick, mud brick and fibre cement. Vinyl weatherboards, rough timber and other cladding can warp or catch fire. Gaps in external roof and wall cladding need to be sealed.

Windows, crevices and vents

Spark-proof your home with bronze or stainless steel flywire screens on windows and doors, or install fire resistant metal shutters. Cover all wall cavities in fine wire mesh. Enclose areas under decks and floors. Screen vents in the roof space with fine wire mesh.



Sprinkler system

A home bushfire sprinkler system that directs water over the roof, windows, doors and underfloor areas is one of the most effective ways of protecting against radiant heat, direct flame and ember attack. Seek professional advice for design and installation.

Skylights

Install wire-reinforced glass or a thermo plastic cover on skylights as plastic can melt and glass can break in intense heat.

■ Property access

Gateways should be at least 3 metres wide and there should be clear access with a turnaround point for firefighting vehicles.

Gutters

Regularly clean gutters and remove leaves and bark from any areas where they can become trapped.



Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

I hope everyone has been keeping well. It is that time of year and our roadside management has been on my mind as the fire season approaches.

Update - Council's Roadside Maintenance and Bushfire Safety Survey

Thank you to everybody who shared their thoughts by completing Council's Roadside Maintenance and Bushfire Safety survey throughout April and May.

I am happy to report that Council received 140 completed surveys, and that 61 local residents have indicated they wanted to be involved in further conversations around this topic.

Council staff have been busy reviewing your feedback and suggestions, looking to understand how service delivery, information or processes could be improved to increase your satisfaction with the way these services are delivered.

The survey results highlighted how important Council's rural roadside maintenance and fire safety programs are in keeping our local area safe, however many are not as satisfied with the quality and overall delivery of these services. The good news is that you have been able to share why - from timing of slashing programs, weed control and native vegetation challenges, vegetation fuel loads on roadsides through to the consistency of slashing and other related services.

Thank you also for sharing your concern with the illegal dumping occurring on our roadsides. Remember that you can report this to Council by ringing 8256 0333 or emailing playford@playford.sa.gov.au and placing a CRS (customer service request)

Next steps

Comments through the survey process have shown how Council could improve the service information to local residents, how work is coordinated and delivered across Council and coordination between delivery partners like Green Adelaide or Department for Infrastructure.

Council staff will be soon be reaching out to those of you who opted in to be part of further conversations, to seek your input in shaping how the information and process improvements could be delivered.

Prepare your home or workplace now.

You must:

- · Clear 20 metres around your house.
- · Clear five metres around other buildings and structures on your property.
- Cut long grass on your property (occupied and vacant land allotments).
- · Create fire breaks.
- · Prune tree limbs and branches which overhang your home.

We encourage:

- Removal of 'dead' branches, 'dead' undergrowth and leaf litter from your property.
- Removal of bark, heavy mulch, wood piles and other flammable materials close to your home and shed.
- · Regularly cleaning your gutters.

Going the extra mile:

- Clearing vegetation further than 20 metres from your house for fire prevention
 with a permit from the CFS. (Native vegetation is protected by law, under the Native
 Vegetation Act, and permission is required to clear it on your property.)
- A swimming pool or additional water tank (of at least 5,000 litres) can act as an alternative water supply in a fire emergency.

If you're planning any mowing or alterations on roadsides, bear in mind that this requires permission from Council in accordance with the Local Government Act 1999. The City of Playford will conduct flammable undergrowth inspections prior to the 2021/2022 fire danger season to ensure landowners comply with the Fire and Emergency Services Act.

Get Kids Ready for the Pathway!

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

There is a recurrent theme I am hearing.. and it goes something like this...

"... Mum and Dad never were much good when it came to me trying to make sense of my feelings etc!.... they just weren't good with the emotional stuff! and now that I am older I am coming into certain life experiences and emotions that I struggle to make sense of...I just shut down. I just want to run away etc"....

My view is that one of the most important roles our care givers have is to support young people to understand feelings. We certainly can't expect all parents to be experts and find fancy polished words...but gee it helps if parents can at least "be there", take notice, acknowledge and think about ways forward. We are not born with emotional regulation skills! These skills are taught, and our care givers are in the pole position to at least have a go in this space!



When kids have never had someone to help validate their emotions - give them a name - this can start to feel awkward and confusing for them. This becomes more of a challenge if it happens over and over again or with really significant sad, lonely, angry or grieving times. For young people it can lead to a lot of grey confusion, inappropriate reactions, unsettled friendships, depression and anxiety. As a parent it is easy to jump into solution mode.... feeling the need to tell our kids to "move on ...they don't deserve it.....find different friends" or "don't be silly". It would be amazing if more parents started by helping our kids name what is going on for themselves. For example...

"You seem to be feeling a bit sad...or "I can hear this is making you feel lonely or left out". Let's start with acknowledgement, naming emotions before we move to solutions.

Once we have acknowledged and sat with them for a bit...we can start chatting about the impact this is having on them and how they might keep moving forward. This style of parenting is really effective at building resilience in kids. There is a lot to be said for preparing our children for the pathway of life... rather than preparing the pathway for them! If we tell kids to just "walk away, hang with other people, don't feel like this" ... How is this equipping them with life skills to manage future encounters??

Recently I had a parent contact me to support their 16-year-old son. The parents said he was losing sight of his capability, spending too much time on his phone, gaming and not clear on what kind of job he wanted. I was told he had always been a straight A student and was now getting B's!! after a couple of sessions I got to know him and his perspective. I heard a very clear message! All he wanted from Mum and Dad was support and love. He told me he did not feel like they listened to him, and he said he had no understanding of the emotional pressures in his head. He said he had no idea how to talk to girls etc, but he wanted to do this!!. His head was spinning. He wanted to do well at school. He understood he had to contribute with chores at home etc, but he didn't have any way to clear his head and talk to someone about this.



I counsel some adults who say they are struggling with relationships as they are no good with "emotional stuff". Some people are meeting grief and have no coping skills. When we talk more, I hear that their parents were not role models when it came to making sense of emotions and feelings. This is a skill set I can teach them, but some positive childhood input would have help so much!

Please feel encouraged to just talk to your kids as much as they will allow. You don't have to offer anything fancy... It is incredible what a little acknowledgement and old fashioned brainstorming can do.

Humbug Scrub Fire Siren - We Need Your Feedback

The future of the old Humbug Scrub fire siren (on private property near Kersbrook and Kelly Hill Roads) is in doubt; it is in poor repair and it needs a new home. The One Tree Hill Progress Association President, Graham Watson, sought feedback from residents in the Aug21 Grapevine, but the response has not been strong. Cr David Kerrison (Ward 3 councillor from the City of Playford) has been contacted by several local residents who would like to see the siren maintained in a working condition.

The CFS no longer use community sirens to warn residents of the impending danger of a bush fires or to call out their volunteers, but they still sound the town siren when a fire threatens the township. However, we understand the One Tree Hill CFS would be prepared to remotely activate a local community siren if residents are willing to financially support and maintain the siren. The One Tree Hill Progress Association is happy to coordinate efforts if there is enough community support to keep the siren.

Hence we need your feedback. If there is little or no support for the siren, we won't pursue the matter further. All residents in or near Sampson Flat and Humbug Scrub areas are encouraged to provide feedback about the siren by answering the questionnaire on our website

ONE TREE HILL CRICKET CLUB THE BILLIES





What's Flowering In My Garden?

Everything is flowering, well, almost every plant. Spring has sprung and there are flowering plants everywhere. The birds are active, collecting small twigs and leaves for the construction of their nests. The Pink Galahs have nested again in a hollow in a dead tree and are guarding their hollow fiercely. We have enjoyed a few warm days and are still enduring some very cold nights. The Spring showers of rain and hail are still most welcome.

Banksia sessilis, with it's pale pinkish yellow large flowers has burst into full flower and is just beautiful at the moment. Grevillea hybrid Burgundy Blaze is quite majestic showing off the many colourful horizontal toothbrush style maroon/ purple flowers. Hakea rostrata is covered with a mass of lovely off white cream flowers and stunning bronze coloured new growth. This Hakea, with the common name of Dwarf Hakea, will grow up to 1m high and may spread to 2 m wide and provides adequate shelter for the Blue Wren nests. It's many flowers emit a very strongly scented honey perfume which can dominate quite a large area. Many bees can be seen on this plant, finding much needed nectar. When flowering, this Hakea can be observed putting on it's stunning coppery bronze coloured new growth above the off white cream coloured flowers. Hakea rostrata has thin rounded leaves with a tiny spike on the end of each leaf and when handling this plant, one should wear protective gloves. Hakea rostrata grows locally in the Humbug Scrub and Para Wirra areas as well as other areas in South Australia and Victoria. You may see a few growing on the roadside of the Gawler One Tree Hill Road, just north of the big roundabout. This plant will grow easily from seed that is stored inside large beak shaped seed pods that grow after the bush has flowered. Hakea carinata and Hakea rugosa are two other locally growing Hakeas that are in flower at the moment and all three locally growing Hakeas will provide tender seed pods for the Eastern Rosellas and the Yellow tailed Black Cockatoos during Summer. Hakea rostrata is available from specialist nurseries. I always look forward to Hakea rostrata flowering in early Spring with it's beautiful flowers, coppery bronze new growth and it's strong honey scented perfume. This Spring has been a good year for Hakea rostrata.

Just beautiful.

OTH Vets Say ~ Prevent Heartworm!




Now that springtime is here, so are the mosquitos, and mosquitos bring a risk of Heartworm to our pets. Heartworm can be fatal and unfortunately can go undetected until it's too late.













A mosquito bites an infected dog and ingests tiny heartworm larvae

These larvae develop into their infective stage.

The same mosquito bites another dog, the larvae infect the healthy animal.

Without preventive, the larvae continue to develop, eventually reaching the heart and lungs.

Mosquitos can carry infected larvae and bite your dog and transfer the larvae to them, which then develops into a Heartworm. Heartworm can grow up to 30cm long and infect your pets heart and of course cause major issues.

Symptoms include coughing, shortness of breath and in the later stages, breathing problems and usually death. Because Heartworm infection is so expensive to treat, it is a whole lot better to prevent.

There are lots of prevention methods available to pet owners. A Proheart injection is the most convenient. Proheart can be given to a puppy at 12 weeks of age, they would then need a booster 6 months later and then yearly.

Other products such as Advocate, Nexguard and Heartguard are also very effective, and very easy to give to your pet as part of a monthly routine.

Remember preventing Heartworm now can save your pet's life, if you would like more information give your local veterinary clinic a call.
