Dear Residents,

The last month has been slow as the state elections were starting to get into full swing. By the time our Grapevine goes to print we will either have a new or returning State Member of Parliament to welcome into our regular meetings.

Having said that we have been approved for a grant to upgrade the audio system at the hall which will save us a lot of money every ANZAC Day but will also provide functions an outdoor audio capability. We are currently awaiting the equipment before installation.

ANZAC Day preparations are well underway and am happy to inform you that with the relaxing of Covid restrictions we are returning to our normal programme with a gun-fire breakfast being offered after the service for a gold coin donation. We are seeking help from people to bake ANZAC biscuits for the day.

As of today (17 March) we have been officially informed that we were successful in our Building Stronger Communities grant application. This money will now enable us to proceed with the repair and relocation of the remote CFS siren on Kersbrook Road. Nothing further has been heard about the Black Spot Phase 5 project which is to increase the mobile phone coverage of the Humbug Scrub and Sampson Flat area.

At our last meeting we welcomed the One Tree Hill CFS back to our meetings. I would personally like to thank Captain Alex Thomson, Officers and members for their generous offer of support to Progress, ANZAC Day and for keeping our town and surrounding district/s safe. With the report that was presented they are a very busy crew with many varied "jobs" that come at unpredictable times. Thank you.

McGilp Road redevelopment is moving forward. Playford have sought election promise details from both State parties and we are now guaranteed \$1.5M from State government no matter who wins the Election. City of Playford are working the finer details of their budget and we will hear from them soon.

I have received the investigative report on the Black Top / Yorktown Road intersection. I am only part way through the report and intend on giving a quick synopsis of the results in the next Grapevine.



One Tree Hill CFS ~ March Report

Only a short report with only five callouts over the last month, with four of them involving vehicle accidents. Unusually, all of these were single car accidents, two involving trees and two involving fences. The most serious of these occurred on the afternoon on the 28th of February on Yorketown Road and saw the road closed for around an hour while the car and debris were removed from the scene. The other accident involving a tree oc-



curred just after midnight on the 6th of March on the Gawler One Tree Hill Road. The two fences were hit on Uley Road and Yorketown Road respectively, with the second of these occurring around 2 in the morning. Those of you who follow the pager messages would have seen that the driver at the Uley Road incident decamped (left the scene) before we arrived.

The only other incident during the month was to a fixed alarm call at the Little Para water treatment plant. For those unaware, this plant is a large building located below the dam wall at the Little Para Dam, fortunately the call turned out to be a false alarm.

With all the craziness that has happened over the last couple of years, it was good to return to a bit of normality with the traditional CFS Election Day barbecue. While numbers were a bit down with so many other methods made available to vote this year, it was great to see so many people coming up to the marquee for a chat and a sausage. A big thank you to all who did.

A reminder that although the weather has shown some signs of becoming milder over recent weeks the Fire Danger Season does not end until the 30th of April for the Adelaide Metropolitan

and Mount Lofty Ranges Districts. For those of you venturing away over Easter, please be aware that some other Fire Ban Districts around the state have slightly different end dates. Speaking of Easter, this month's accidents are a grim reminder of the danger of driver inattention and fatigue, especially on country roads. Please stay safe on our roads and have a great Easter.

As we approach winter the cooler nights of autumn will have some of us thinking about lighting up our combustion stoves, but before you do have you thought about cleaning your flue? Chimney fires are a major cause of house fires, particularly in the early weeks of winter.



Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

The State election has been and gone, Easter is on our doorstep to be followed by ANZAC Day and hopefully the breaking of the season. I'd like to take the opportunity to wish everyone well for a happy and safe Easter.

McGilp Recreation Park Funding Commitments - The news that both major political parties have now committed to the \$1.5M funding if they win, regardless of their candidate being successful in the electorate of King, is fantastic news. This means that this will secure the State funding, regardless of who wins the election. The candidates have both indicated that the funding will be allocated in the 2022-23 State Budget. Council can now consider the matching funding through the 2022-23 Annual Business Plan with a level certainty that the State contribution will be forth coming.

Blacktop Road / Yorktown Road Intersection - The City of Playford is now in receipt of the external Road Safety Audit and Road Safety Analysis. The external Audit identified and recommended treatments comprising signage, guideposts and line marking improvements which were approved and scheduled by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT).

The Audit raised the concern of water ponding at the radii of the intersection and has called upon Council to investigate. This has been logged into the system to be investigated.

The report did analyse the specific concerns and suggestions that were raised in the Council resolution and does not support further consideration of more significant treatments or upgrades to the intersection at this time.

I will be further discussing this matter with our successful MP straight after the election and asking the City of Playford to further correspond with the department (DIT). I note that the department said since the installation of the safety measures mentioned there has been nil incidents reported at the intersection. While this maybe true, I question whether the Audit has allowed for winter conditions, heavy fog and poor visibility. Lighting of the intersection will significantly improve safety as it has done previously with other intersections in the area ie. Crosshill Road / OTH Road intersection.

I'd appreciate hearing if you support the lighting of the intersection.

Humbug Scrub Road Speed Limit - In response to Council Resolution 4530 received on the 8th November 2021, Minister Wingard asked DIT to undertake further investigations into the possibility of lowering the speed limit with the completion of investigations in coming months. At the February 2022 Ordinary council Meeting I raised this as a Question Without Notice: Mr Green advised that a response has not been received post 8th November and this will be followed up by the Mayor and CEO.



Look Up!

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

How much are you looking up? I am not talking about star gazing or becoming a bird enthusiast... instead I am talking about looking up from your screens and taking notice of what is around you. There is a very real possibility that you are missing out on some big things out there!

Technology serves a myriad of functions - from increasing office productivity, facilitating data collection, enhancing record keeping to offering a distinctly digital way for humans to communicate with one another. Indeed, the rate of communicative instances via technology is astounding. With www.frontiers.org.au reporting that in 2020 350 million photos were uploaded to Facebook, 500 million tweets, 3 billion snapchats and over 26 billion texts in the US alone!!!



Let me share a little story....I have a friend who was starting to feel the pinch of his 34 year age and wondering how and if he would ever find a partner. He was certain he was throwing all he could at creating opportunities! Yes he was all over "Tinder". For those of us not up with this - Tinder is a dating application that promotes match making - you can place your profile on this app and start having conversations with people - meet up for a date if you choose! My friend told me that he was so good at keeping all over his responses, presenting himself in the best light and his profile photo was a ripper! He just couldn't understand why he was not making progress. I asked him the question - why don't you just look up? He was the kind of guy who you truly don't appreciate unless you meet in person and this meant that a whole lot about him was not being noticed on an online dating app!!!



Take a moment to consider what gets missed when we are communicating with someone via technology. One of the big things that goes missing is non-verbal information, we can start to miss out on really understanding someone's communicative intent when we can't see their facial expressions. Text messages mean that we are missing out on important verbal cues - like the pitch, tone and inflection in a conversation. Even with video calls, we are limited with being able to engage in mutual eye gazing and picking up on gestures and body movements. Some people have traits and characteristics that can only be appreciated in person. Some people need context to be understood and appreciated! The benefit of context, to being in a common space can not be underestimated when it comes to forming human relationships.

So back to my mate... I challenged him to look up in his physical surroundings a little more. True - he was not going into the office as often due to COVID limitations, but he was going in sometimes and there were many other small instances of interaction to take advantage of. He listened... doing nothing fancy.. just taking more notice of a few people around him, making warm conversation by asking a few questions of people near him, showing interest and sharing a little about himself. It didn't take long and his eye gaze took him past his computer screen to notice the warm, kind nature of someone he worked with. So it went from there - casual friendly chatter, a little time together out of work - two years later married and expecting a baby!

Yes, good things can come from simply looking up! I understand that there is much about technology we need to embrace and I do respect that for some people this space feels safer to share feelings and manage potential rejection etc. I also know that social skills do not come easy for everyone. Many of my therapeutic hours are spent coaching social skills and developing emotional resilience. This aside - I encourage people to not miss the opportunity to engage with anyone in your immediate networks and never underestimate the value of a little old fashioned chit chat.

Ingredients

- ½ cup butter
- 1 cup of rolled oats
- 1 cup plain flour
- ½ cup brown sugar
- 3 cup desiccated coconut
- 2 tblspn golden syrup
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda



*Enough to make 35 biscuits

Directions

Preheat oven to 150°C

Melt butter in a saucepan

Mix oats, flour, brown sugar, coconut and melted butter in a bowl

Add golden syrup and bicarbonate of soda

Grease a cold oven tray

Drop biscuit mixture onto the tray. Don't put the biscuits too close together.

Bake biscuits for 20-25 minutes at 150°C

Cool biscuits on the tray.




One Tree Hill Local Legend Fred Riley's New Book

Many OTH locals may know some of the history of Fred Riley's service in Word War II. If you don't, you now have the perfect opportunity to read about all of the details in Fred's new book "Strong To Serve"! Author Joseph Mack has worked closely with Fred to record Fred's accounts and compile his memories, logbooks and photos into a new book, out now.

How Did the Book Happen? Quoted From the Author, Joseph Mack

"I first met Fred Riley in 2018 when he came to visit my Air Force squadron in Adelaide. I have been always interested in military history and aviation, so I decided to do some research into Fred's squadron. This eventually resulted in an invitation to meet up and listen to the former Spitfire pilot discuss his wartime career. Throughout the journey of getting to know Fred and his family, there was a couple of sliding doors moments. On one occasion I was in New Zealand and I met the son of one of the pilots Fred served under. This interaction led to being told about a book which revealed information to Fred he had remained unaware of for close to 75 years. Listening to Fred's stories was a truly amazing experience. I would arrive home after visiting Fred and would relay his recollections to my wife, who would invariably end up with a tear in her eye. After finishing my Masters in 2020, my wife Rebecca nudged me to reach out to Fred and his family to ask them if I could document his story. Fred and his family readily accepted my offer, and for that I am eternally grateful. "



Book Synopsis

Following flight training in Australia, Canada and the UK, Fred Riley's time as an operational Spitfire pilot with No 130 (Punjab) Squadron, Royal Air Force, began in October 1943 and continued without pause until December 1944. Initially flying the Spitfire Mk.V, he escorted bombers, participated in fighter sweeps, and undertook hazardous beachhead patrols in support of the Allied invasion of Occupied Europe on D-Day.

With a new, much faster Spitfire Mk.XIV, Fred intercepted V-1 flying bombs aimed at London. Later, based in the Netherlands and Belgium, the squadron conducted anti jet patrols and flew hazardous low-level armed reconnaissance sorties over those countries and into Germany. During one such flight deep inside enemy territory, Fred and his colleagues suddenly found themselves engaged in a ferocious dogfight against a superior force of Luftwaffe fighters.

Fred's logbook contains names, places and events which draw immediate attention. He served with some of the RAF's most notable aces, provided close escort for General Eisenhower on the Allied Supreme Commander's first visit by air to Normandy, and protected Allied transport aircraft during Operation Market Garden. Fred's final logbook entry was made on 22 December 1944 – the date he was shot down by ground fire and severely injured while flying in support of American forces fighting in the Ardennes.

As impressive as Fred Riley's logbook reads, it is his memories of his instructors, fellow trainees, and the pilots he served alongside which are most enlightening.

This account details Fred's journey to becoming a fighter pilot and his remarkable recollections of flying combat operations over the UK and Europe. It also sheds light on the incredible courage, achievements and sacrifices of those he served with while flying with 130 Squadron – a group of pilots of different nationalities who more than lived up to their squadron's proud motto: 'Strong to Serve'.

What's Flowering In My Garden?

Our mild Summer has officially ended but the humid Autumn conditions continue to test our resolve. There are a few rots and spots around but most plants have responded to a little but very welcomed late Summer rain. Early flowering Correas such as Canberra Bells and Jingle Bells are providing a bright colourful aspect. Some Callistemons are still showing off their pink and red brushes, offering much needed nectar for many Honeyeaters.



Melaleuca elliptica has burst into flower unexpectedly. After receiving useful rainfall in January and followed by a good drink from a sprinkler that was targeting a thirsty Correa, it was a delight to find this plant showing off it's many brilliant red flower spikes. These stunningly beautiful brushes, approximately 60mm wide by 60mm length, are held along the stems of the bush from the ground and upwards. This hardy plant/bush will grow to approximately 2m high by 2m wide on well drained soils and grows naturally in a large area of Western Australia. With the common name of Granite Bottlebrush, this plant bears elliptic to ovate shaped blue/green small leaves.

Whilst it is not a dense shrub, a more mature plant has become so dense that it has become the perfect location for the Top Knot Pigeons to build their nests and raise their young. The bees, attracted to the bright flower spikes share the nectar with many Honeyeaters. It was such a surprise to find Melaleuca elliptica in flower at this time of the year; it has been a delight to enjoy the massed display of brilliant red flowers provided by this plant. This plant is available from specialist nurseries or may be available from the Australian plant Sales to be held at Wayville showground on Saturday April 9th and Sunday April 10th. Plant one or more and you will be amazed by the depth of brilliant colour that this easy to grow native will provide.

Just beautiful.




One Tree Hill Playgroup News

Koala Rescue Information

How Do Koalas Beat The Heat?

AUSTRALIAN heat-waves are increasing in length and intensity, and as humans we struggle. We have the luxury of escaping by air-conditioners, easily accessible water for drinking and swimming, and just escaping from the heat by coming indoors. But how do Koalas cope with the increasing heat?



A study was done by Dr Michael Kearney from the University of Melbourne's Zoology department and found that the tree-hugging Koalas would sprawl across low-hanging branches to cool themselves down. Thus, using the dramatically lower temperatures inside trees, branches and the thick trunks, as one would use an ice-pack.

When the heat-wave comes, the most effective way for the Koala to lose heat is through evaporation. Koalas don't sweat, but they can pant and lick their fur, however this can cause them to become dehydrated. And in times of high heat and low rainfall, Koalas, which don't have sweat glands, cannot sustain the evaporation.

One method of losing heat without losing water, is by hugging trees. One will often see Koalas lying flat on the surface of tree branches and trunks. The fur on their abdomen is quite a lot thinner than the fur on their backs, so by pushing as close as possible that fur and that part of their body against the tree branch, they can lose their heat (dumping heat) into the tree.



There are a few particular eucalyptus and non-eucalyptus trees which are significant cooling trees for Koalas, with one being the Acacia, eg; the Wattle and Pine trees. Big trees have a lot of thermal inertia – they heat up and cool down more slowly than that of the ambient conditions.

During hot weather the average tree surface temperatures are significantly lower than local air temperatures. Days as hot as 39C, the trees could be as much as 7 or 8 degrees cooler.

Sadly, with the earth's temperature rising and temperatures going above 40C, even this type of method won't be enough to help Koalas cool down.


