With good news there is always sad. We say goodbye to outgoing Member for King, Paula Luethen. We would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to Paula for the hard work and support she has shown One Tree Hill and to the King electorate over four years. We wish you all the best in your future endeavours.

This last month has been busy with Easter and ANZAC Day. We have the outdoor speakers on the Hall installed and had them commissioned. A big thank you to the local businesses who did the work for us, Roger Girdham Electrical from One Tree Hill and Artisan Technical Services from Kersbrook. Also, a big thank you to Steve Huckstepp for managing the project on our behalf. The speakers will allow people to hold indoor/outdoor functions with full audio and microphone connectivity. The Dawn Service being the first to utilise the function. Also, sincere thanks to the locals who made ANZAC biscuits to contribute to the community breakfast following the service.

We have received the documentation for the Stronger Communities Grant to fix the fire siren on Kersbrook Road. We are working through the details of the contract. CFS Region 2 Head Quarters have been in touch and the list of volunteer sites has been presented in a more map friendly way to work out the best location for the fire siren.

City of Playford representatives met with Cr David Kerrison and Steve Huckstepp regarding the flower beds in the town. Of concern was which flowers beds to remove whilst still providing safe traffic flow without the ability to overtake in parking zones. There is still much discussion to be had but the project is moving forward.

## One Tree Hill CFS ~ April Report

Five callouts again this month, with the most significant of these starting around 4 PM on Friday the 8th of April at the end of McGilp Road, just past the primary school. The fire was started accidentally from slashing operations and spread quickly sparking a 2nd alarm call. This was one of few times the town siren has been activated during the day in recent years. This is used to alert residents that there is a fire threatening the township.



The fire was declared "contained" around 5 PM with the assistance of Tea Tree Gully and Salisbury Brigades, eventually burning around 2 hectares.

This goes to show that serious fires can burn well into the autumn months especially in years like this one where we haven't had significant rain. Reinforcing that message, the other fires we attended during the month were both calls for

our Bulk Water Carrier (BWC) to assist with large fires burning out of the area. One was a 4th alarm fire burning in rocky terrain around Keynes Gap near Eden Valley on the 21st of March which involved over 20 appliances, including the OTH BWC, as well as 6 aircraft including 4 fire bombers. The other was to a 3rd alarm fire burning just off Norsworthy Road near Forreston on the 29th of March.

The other two calls were for vehicle related incidents, one for a car vs tree (again) near the corner of Bassnet Road and Humbug Scrub Road (again) and the other was for a vehicle fire around 6 AM on the 20th of April. Many people will have seen the results of this fire at the T junction between Blacktop and One Tree Hill Roads. The fire was suspected to be arson, and with the vehicle fully involved on arrival there was little crews could do apart from extinguish the car and stop the fire from spreading.



## Weather Is Changing



Thankfully the OTH Brigade had a very quiet Easter but with the weather closing in on Easter Sunday it is a good reminder that winter storms are not far away and with them the corresponding hazardous road conditions. As most of us know, there are numerous sections of road around the One Tree Hill area that can get very slippery both during and after heavy rains and combine that with the inevitable fog that comes at this time of the year and the results can be catastrophic. Two ways you can stay safe, first by always driving to the conditions and secondly, ensuring that your vehicle is properly maintained, with bald tyres being a particular problem on slippery roads.

Finally, we are also into the prescribed burn season, with DEW and NPWS taking advantage of milder conditions to reduce fire loads in their areas. One burn has already been conducted in the South Para Reservoir on the 8th of April and as we saw, these fires usually put a lot of smoke. If you have any concerns, please refer to the CFS website which includes upcoming prescribed burns on their "Current Incidents" page.

## Playford Council ~ Local Councillor's Report

Dear Fellow Ratepayers and Residents,

It will be time to have your say in May! The Annual Business Plan 2022/2023 will go to Council on the 26th April 2022 and if supported will be released in May for a 28 day consultation period. There is increased upwards pressure on rates. Please provide your feedback via the City of Playford engagement process. This will ensure that your feedback is captured by the City of Playford. The information is provided to all elected members before the final decision is made on the adoption of the Annual Business Plan.

If anyone wishes to discuss the Annual Business Plan with me, please give me a call or visit me at the OTH Markets in May.

Congratulations to our new members of Parliament, Rhiannon Pearce MP for King and Ashton Hurn MP for Schubert. Rhiannon Pearce visited me after the election at the OTH Markets last month and I have requested a meeting to further discuss the Blacktop Road / Yorktown Road intersection, the Kersbrook Road Roundabout, and the Humbug Scrub Road - Speed Limit. I have also called Ashton Hurn to discuss the Kersbrook Road Roundabout and Humbug Scrub Road - Speed Limit.

The installation of the new footpath connecting Jordan drive to the township has been delayed as the first section near Jordan Drive is a designated Significant Environmental Benefit (SEB) offset site. Our environmental team are currently assessing whether we can build through this section and what protections or other requirements there are for the trees. The City of Playford is hoping to construct the footpath before June 30 however dependent on Native Vegetation time frames. It is planned to commence all sections at the same time for cost effectiveness.

Thank you to the local resident that has raised the concern of Bathurst Burr locally. Unfortunately, Green Adelaide seems to have a low priority on this declared weed. I will be seeking assistance from the City of Playford to write to the appropriate authorities to manage and control Bathurst Burr within the City of Playford. If you can share information on where this weed maybe located within our area, it would be appreciated.

## Northern Foothills Land Care Group

#### **Event brief**

Just in case you missed our recent information session on "Restoring Habitat & Revegetation Planning" in the Northern Foothills, this is a brief round-up of the night. Whilst numbers were down a bit on past evenings, this actually allowed a more interactive session. We had an interesting discussion on the topic, as it relates to the original, but fast disappearing, Grassy Woodland ecosystem typical of this region.



Our two speakers, Amelia Hurren from Trees For Life, who is very experienced in terms of ecosystem restoration, and Dave Ellis, a professional ecologist who works with Bush For Life in woodland management, gave us great information about the general make up of our grassy woodlands and their marked decline in the last 150 years. They discussed what we can do to help preserve and restore this very important ecosystem before it disappears along with many species that are dependent on it. They stressed that we can <u>all</u> make a difference whether we have a suburban backyard, a productive farming property, or a park down the road.

The importance of recognition of native plant species, and particularly, of identifying introduced pest plants was detailed along with where to get help when one needs it for control of weedy plants which may be threatening the native species. The precarious position we are in, so close to the centre of a capital city, and adjacent to the native bushland of the Mt Lofty Ranges brings with it a great responsibility. This is the balancing act of cohabiting with our wildlife neighbours and maintaining the important ecosystems of the Grassy Mallee Box Woodlands of the northern foothills.

#### More take home messages:

- 1) Think about joining Trees for Life or becoming a Bush for Life carer a great organisation made up of community members and making a difference to OUR environment.
- 2) If you are a City of Playford resident and considering planting native trees, shrubs, or grasses on your property this year, you may be able to access free local plants through the Buffers to Bushland program. Contact Bill Doyle (08) 8256 0531

## **Keeping Young People Fit & Healthy!**

A Mental Health & Wellbeing Article by One Tree Hill Local Natasha Steen

Move over this month Natasha!.. Lucy Steen – (Natasha' 13 year old daughter) has something to say... Take a read of Lucy's wellbeing persuasive text for English this month.

Do you prioritise your health? Do you exercise? Do you play a sport? Do you walk the dog around the block? Well, did you know that school age kids and teens (aged 6-17) should aim for at least 60 minutes a day of moderate to high intensity activity? Despite this, only 24% of children aged 6-17 years participate in 60 minutes of physical activity every day. To me, this data is really disappointing, even more so when we stop to consider all the benefits people receive from participating in physical activity. Being active is not necessarily running or playing a sport, it can be many other things. Some activity is simple and can easily be a small part of your daily routine.



So, the question is, what is considered to be active? Guidelines from the Department of Health and Human Services say that young people aged 6 and older need at least an hour a day of moderate to high intensity physical activity. A simple definition of moderate activity is that you are working hard enough to raise your heart rate and break a sweat. Combining physical activity into our daily lives influences our future health and wellbeing. Research supports that the easiest way to



keep fit is to start at a young age. If you regularly prioritise being physically active, it is easier to maintain it as you get older. Being active isn't a hard thing to do. We just need to know the benefit of it, and this may help you find the motivation to prioritise it.

There are a range of advantages people gain from daily exercise. Incorporating movement and physical activity into your day improves not only the way you look, but it can support your mental health, sleep quality and academic performance. It is important we take a closer look at these advantages.

Research shows that people who exercise regularly have better mental and emotional wellbeing, and less chance of mental illnesses. Healthline.com explains how research shows how exercise releases endorphins and chemicals like dopamine. These chemicals are known to improve our mood and reduce any feeling of pain.

It has indeed been found that being active helps you to fall asleep quicker. People who engage in 30 minutes or more of some form of moderate physical activity, may see a difference in sleep quality. Exercise helps stabilise your mood and relax your mind. These aspects, together with fatigue, can help you prepare well for sleep.

We can also consider how our level of physical activity might impact on our performance at school. Research now proves that exercising benefits brain power, motivation and concentration, memory and reasoning, classroom attitudes and behaviour, and language skills. These all contribute to the improvement of your academic performance.

It is critical that we have an open mind on what it means to be active. There are many ways we can be active. Picking an activity or sport that you like will help you stick with it. It could start with a bike ride to the shops to get some milk, or a walk to the park with the dog, throwing a ball against the wall, or even doing a bit of gardening. I find the easiest way to be active, for a decent period of time, is to play a sport. There are so many different sports, while this is not for everyone; and that's okay, I'm sure there could be one for you!

I can't make you exercise, and I can't be sure I have convinced you to try, but I can be sure that I have put forward some persuasive information to help you decide why you might prioritise being active. So, are you prepared to dedicate one hour of your day, 4% of your 24 hours? This small part of your day may offer significant improvement to your physical and mental health, sleep pattern and general performance. Let's remember what smart watches were first invented for!

# GENERAL NOTICE BURNING PERMIT



# If you live in the City of Playford you are required to obtain a burning permit between the dates of 1 May 2022 and 31 October 2022.

Some areas are exempted from having to obtain an individual burning permit and are instead covered by a General Notice Burning Permit – per information below.

Burning Permits are issued to enforce the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016 in accordance with clause 6.

This general notice burning permit is issued by the City of Playford and authorises any person within the following areas of the City of Playford (as defined in the City of Playford Development Plan pursuant to the Development Act 1993) that are within Metropolitan Adelaide (as defined in the Development Act 1993):

- a. The Watershed Zone (Mount Lofty Ranges);
- b. The Hills Face Zone;
- c. Primary Production Zone (Mount Lofty Ranges); to carry out any of the following burning activities in those areas, outside of the 2022/2023 fire danger season (fixed under the Fire and Emergency Services Act 2005) subject to the conditions set out below:

#### **Conditions**

- 1. Burning off vegetation for fire prevention or control;
- 2. This burning permit cannot authorise a person to carry out a burning activity under (1) on land if the person is not the owner occupier of the land or does not have the consent or authority of the owner or occupier.
- 3. A person carrying out a burning activity under (1) and (2) must:
  - Only burn between the hours of 10am and 5pm, Monday to Saturday. NOTE: Burning on Sundays and Public Holidays is prohibited.
  - Create Piles 3m x 3m x 2m Maximum
  - Notify your neighbours prior to the day of burn.
  - Place materials to be burnt in a position that allows for a four-metre clearance around and over the fire.
  - Ensure all piles to be burnt are not in close proximity to other flammable materials including grass and logs.
  - Burn one pile at a time, to ensure that you retain control of each burn.
  - Have appropriate working fire control equipment on standby.
  - Extinguish the fire immediately if smoke or odour is causing a nuisance on another person's property.
  - Stay within the direct vicinity of the immediate burn site if smoke or smoulder is coming off of the burn.
  - On the completion of the burn, ensure the fire is completely extinguished.

**You must not:** Burn materials mixed into soil or permapine treated with copper arsenate, household rubbish, plastic or rubber.

- 4. This notice remains in force until 31 October 2022.
- 5. Individual permits will be considered on a case by case basis in November 2022.

#### Notes

This burning permit does not authorise the burning of a prohibited substance (Clauses (6)(3)(d) and (7) (1) of the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016. The fact that a person has complied with the conditions of the burning permit does not:

- a. relieve the person from liability for any loss, damage or harm caused by a fire lit under the authority of the burning permit; or
- b. prevent proceedings for enforcement of the general environmental duty under section 25 of the Environment Protection Act 1993, or for any offence under the Act, in relation to the burning activity (clause 6(5) of the Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016). This permit is subject to any ban, prohibition, restriction, or other requirement under the Fire and Emergency services Act 2005, the Native Vegetation Act 1991 or a prescribed act (clause 5(4) Environment Protection (Air Quality) Policy 2016). For general information and Frequently Asked Questions on Burning in the Open in the City of Playford Council area please visit the council's website **playford.sa.gov.au** or the EPA's website **epa.sa.gov.au**.



#### **General Notice Burning Permit Information**

Once Fire Danger Season is over, a General Notice Burning Permit is issued for bushfire prevention activities in some areas of Playford.

These areas include Gould Creek, Uleybury, Bibaringa, Yattalunga, Sampson Flat, Humbug Scrub, Evanston Park, and One Tree Hill.

This General Notice Burning Permit allows you to burn without applying to council for an Individual Burning Permit.

For all of your obligations around how, what, where, and when you can burn, please consult the General Notice Burning Permit on the facing page, and remember, the General Notice Burning Permit stipulates:


- · No burning in township areas
- Only dry vegetation can be burned that means no furniture, machined timber, pallets, household rubbish, plastic or rubber etc
- Burning of piles 3m x3m x2m maximum, and only burn one pile at a time

#### NOTE

An Individual Permit is still required if you are intending to burn for a horticultural or agricultural reason.

Before burning, please carefully read the General Notice Burning Permit to ensure you're adhering to the conditions required.

## What's Flowering In My Garden?

It's that time of the year when our mild to hot Summer has ended and we're enjoying many warm, balmy days that only Autumn weather can give us. The garden and our bush are both in need of a decent drop of rain but there is little on the horizon.

The early flowering Hakeas e.g. Hakea laurina and Hakea Burrendong Beauty are providing a bright splash of colour and much needed nectar and pollen for many birds and bees. With the lerp season in full swing, the trees are full of Eastern Spinebills, New Holland Honeyeaters and Pardalottes, all searching for sweet, succulent lerps. It is such a delight to watch and enjoy many birds foraging amongst the tree canopy.



Grevillea Superb is flowering and is putting on a majestic display of

large brilliant pink/orange/red/yellow brushes. This hardy plant, a hybrid Grevillea, with it's large divided mid green leaves and beautifull flowering brushes are held on long stems and will grow on well drained loamy soils. It will grow up to 2m high and 2m wide and can be grown as a feature plant or planted with other bushes to create a windbreak and/or screen. A mature plant, which can be quite dense and bushy will offer a safe haven for small birds and their nests. Grevillea Superb can be pruned quite hard and will respond with plenty of new growth, resulting in a wonderful display of stunning flowers. This Grevillea is a lovely addition to any large or small garden and is available from most nurseries. Find a spot in your garden for this beautifull ornamental shrub and you will enjoy all year round display of stunning brilliantly coloured flowers and the many birds that will visit this plant.

## **Koala Fingerprints**

DID you know koalas have fingerprints? Their fingerprints are so similar to peoples, that they could be confused if someone was dusting for fingerprints! Although it's unlikely a koala would be present at the scene of a crime! Koalas have ridges and swirls on their fingertips, just like a person. People have ridges and swirls all over their fingers and palms, whilst koalas just have them on their fingertips and part of their palms. Primates also have fingerprints.

So this makes us wonder what are fingerprints for? Scientists actually do not agree on their purpose. They may be for grip. Certainly, if you've ever got superglue on your fingers eliminating your fingerprint, it can be difficult to grip things — something both koalas and great apes spend a lot of time doing.

Another theory is that they help increase sensitivity of touch, as the roughness of the skin caused by fingerprints increases vibration and hence nerve impulses to the brain, increasing sensitivity of touch. Yet another theory is that they reduce the risk of blistering.

Another thing we share with koalas is a thumb, although of course, koalas have two! This obviously also allows gripping and manipulation of items.




