Here are some matters covered on August 19.

Glen Tilly and Taylor McDermitt from the Soccer Club reported that the club was going well and children and parents were having a great time. They showed us the club uniforms which had been purchased with the loan from Progress.

It was agreed that the \$5,000 loan to the soccer club would be interest free and repayable at a minimum of \$52 per year.

Representatives from the Para Districts Cycling Club attended to discuss a number of issues that arose from the annual cycling event in July. It was suggested that the club liaise with us in about April next year so that we can coordinate activities to reduce congestion in the township. (This year we did not hear about the event until shortly before and it clashed with hopper day.) Moving the start finish line to the western end of the town was suggested by residents and problems with parking and toilets were also raised. Congestion in the township on cycling days does affect custom for local businesses and creates a traffic hazard, particularly at the intersection of McGilp and Blacktop Rd. Can we think of any creative suggestions to make the event a win-win for all groups?

VETERINARY NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

Pet health and accident insurance

SIMON'S PET CORNER

Simon has imported four Polish Lynx pigeons from England. These are show pigeons and they are very big and heavy birds. They have a wing span of a metre! Two are blue lace colour with blue on their body, white on wings with lacy edgings. The other two are jet black with two white bars and white flight feathers. These are the only two like this in Australia. Simon plans to breed them and they are already laying eggs. The importation was arranged through his Pigeon Club. The birds were quarantined in England, then in Victoria for 45 days, then in South Australia for six weeks, so they have been a long time coming. One of his pigeons was microchipped while in quarantine so they can be traced.

There was a lot of anxiety about Newcastle disease while they were in quarantine because apparently a recent outbreak in New South Wales was not detected by the quarantine service. While in quarantine, chickens were put in with the pigeons because apparently the chickens show signs of any disease quicker than the pigeons. The pigeons also had blood tests. Luckily Simon's birds came through with a clean bill of health.

Simon is planning to show his King Pigeons and Birmingham Rollers at the Royal Show.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Would you believe it but it is time to make your Christmas pudding! Christmas puddings taste extra yummy if they stand and mature for a few months and are even nicer if kept over a year! so why not make two and save yourself a job next year.

Here is a tried and true old fashioned English recipe:

You will need - half a pound of currants, half a pound of sultanas, one pound of raisins, one quarter pound of mixed peel, one ounce chopped blanched almonds, half a pound of shredded suet (The butchers at Craigmore has suet, which can be easily grated when frozen), half pound fresh white breadcrumbs, six ounces sugar, six ounces plain flour, one teaspoon baking powder, pinch salt, one quarter of a teaspoon of grated nutmeg, one teaspoon mixed spice, three eggs, grated rind and juice of one lemon, five tablespoons of brandy (or rum or milk) to mix.

Wash and dry fruit thoroughly. Mix in a large basin with the peel, almonds, suet, breadcrumbs, sugar and flour, which has been sifted with the baking powder, salt and spices. Stir well together and then add the well beaten eggs, the grated rind and juice of the lemon and the brandy (or rum or milk) Mix very thoroughly (and don't forget to wish!) and leave overnight.

Divide mixture between two well greased pudding basins(approx. 2 pint size). Cover each top with two thicknesses of greased grease proof paper. Tie down with string or rubber bands. Then cover top with alfoil and tie down with string. Steam for six to eight hours. The longer the boiling the darker the pudding.Remove wet covers when cooked and replace with dry ones. Then store in a cool dark cupboard. Re steam for 3 to 4 hours before serving.

Each pudding serves 6 people easily.

GARDENING NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

Insects.

A gardener should tolerate much of the insect life in the garden. The few insects that are seriously destructive can be controlled by moderate methods. Quite often the damage is not serious enough to justify special action. A natural balance can be reached if some damage is tolerated and the gardener leaves the destruction of the pest to the natural predators of the insect world. For all gardeners it is important to make a distinction between serious damage and normal day to day blemishes and defects in plants caused by the general activities of insects. Insects provide essential food for birds and animals. Many insects are predators of other insects and help maintain a natural balance.

The Central Board of Education was approached by Moses Bendle If you want to know more about the Social Club see Steve at the Garlick in late 1854 with a request for assistance for the construction of a school. A public meeting had already been held in 1853, at which the building of a school had been considered, and funds had been raised for this purpose, although construction work had not started. Another year passed and in 1855 the Board of Education decided that they could give some assistance, offering 150 pounds on the understanding that an equal amount would be raised by the local residents. This amount was a disappointment to the locals because they estimated the school would cost 400 pounds to build. However a parcel of land was donated by the local Parson, Reverend J.P.Buttfield and the school and teachers residence was completed in 1856. The school opened with John Mattingly as the first teacher of 18 boys and 16 girls. (From Munno Para Heritage survey researched by J McLatchie)

Training Officer: Trevor Arnold, and many others. Emergency Fire Phone Procedure: The emergency number for the One Tree Hill Brigade is 8280 7000, just think One Tree Hill i.e. 82807 and the triple zero 000 emergency number. If you automatically dial 000 and ask for fire, and you are calling from a One Tree Hill number you will automatically be connected to the Brigade's fire phone system. The call rings in over 10 member's homes. After the caller's initial, for example "there is a fire nearby", the siren and pager system will be initiated, then please stay on the line to enable the member to gain further information from you. Some of the questions to be answered are: Caller's name and address, RAPID number, type of incident(e.g.grass fire, house fire, vehicle accident, etc.), and the incident details so far. Please call if you see smoke (especially during the fire ban season 1st December to 30th April), it may only be a burnoff or another fire far away, or you may be the first person to call in a smoke sighting in the district.

Hopper: The hopper bin continues to be available on the second Saturday of each month, next to the Institute. This service is provided for One Tree Hill residents only. There are 2 large metal bins, 2 small paper/cardboard bins for the whole day, and 3 large general rubbish bins delivered throughout the day.

CFS members monitor the distribution of the rubbish between the bins, and will help you off with the rubbish. Please do not place rubbish in the bins after CFS members have closed up (usually around 2-2.30pm) as only the metal and paper bins are left, and are not to be used for general rubbish. Please place donations for the use of this service, in the helmet on site. If you require a receipt at any time please leave your name and address with a CFS member, and one will be sent to you.

TOP OF THE TORRENS GALLERY, BIRDWOOD

"A SPLASH OF SPRING" is the title for the next exhibition to be opened at 3.00pm on Sunday 5th September by Vicki Nottage, Chairperson of the Central Region of the South Australian Country Arts Trust. Work featuring the beauty of flowers will fill the Gallery so that you will almost be able to smell their fragrance. Oils, watercolours, ceramics, silk and embroidery from 16 artists will be on display. Artists include Madge Sexton, Dick McKay, Sue Georgio and Beryl Hutton.

Alice Shore from the Torrens Valley Writers Group will recite some of her poetry, and wines generously donated from Leland Estate of Lenswood will be served.

Following the successful Watercolour Workshop in July, another full day workshop in Grass Basket Making will be held on Saturday 16th October directed by Valerie Surch of Kapunda at a cost of \$15. Enrolments at the Gallery or by phone to Leonie Holmes 85682319.

A further pottery workshop is planned for early December to be led by potters Liz Mount, Valerie Kroehn and Raeleen Skolik.

A new and vital Committee was formed at the Annual General Meeting and plans are afoot for an exciting program for the Gallery for the year 2000. With the help of 40 enthusiastic volunteers, the Gallery, which is in the front of the National Motor Museum in Birdwood, is open 7 days a week, 10.00am - 4.00pm.

Between Sept 24th and Oct 2nd a Road Works Exhibition from the S.A. Country Arts Trust will be at the Gallery. This exhibition is by Riverland Ceramic Artist Toni Schwartz and is called "Chook Tracks". This exhibition of ceramic items is about Toni's personal fascination with the quirky chook character, encompassing the inquisitive, cheeky and friendly, but touching on a certain sinister element that reveals itself as pushy, pecky and domineering.

TO BURN OR NOT TO BURN....

That was certainly the question on people's minds when they attended a meeting at the CFS on 21 July. A significant number of local people filled the Fire Station meeting room to hear a presentation from representatives of the Environment Protection Agency and the Playford City Council. It must have become very clear to the officials present that One Tree Hill residents feel that the regulations on burning were not welcome and unduly restrictive. It will have become equally clear to residents that the officials were confused about many of the issues and unable to provide the answers being sought.

The meeting eventually ended in confusion on all sides and clearly there will be more said before the matter is put to rest. What concerns me most, is that many people will still not know what the regulations are and how they apply to their circumstances. People should proceed

with caution and avoid becoming the legal 'test case'.

A simple interpretation of the evenings events, in my view, is this. Playford City Council, as a municipal authority, has enacted the EPA policy relating to Burning. In short, with a few minor exceptions, if you want to set a fire in the open at any time of the year, you must have a permit from the council. The exceptions are things such as barbecues and small camp fires. Even if you contain the fire in an old oil drum, you still require a permit. Even if the fire is in your veggie patch you require a permit.

There are other conditions which apply if you are a non-domestic property meaning a place of business or a farm. But, before you brandish the deeds of your 20 acre block in the fire officer's face, your farm isn't a farm if it is essentially your place of residence and not your principal or major source of income. Almost by definition, all the small acre blocks around OTH are residential properties and your sheep, horses and cows are lawnmowers.

There are restrictions on what can be burned, how much and when but I'm not going to profess that I know what they are. So my advice to you is this. You'll be on a safe bet if you assume that whether it's a garden bonfire, a stubble burn off, a fire break or just a clear up in the paddocks, within the locality of Playford, you should apply for a permit. The council says it will be reasonable and apply commonsense to all requests and for the present, at least, a permit will cost you nothing. Doubtless you will be hearing more from people who wish to pursue this matter with council.

Hopefully they will be able to agree a position which is fair and responsible for all OTH residents.

THE LAW AND YOUR DOG.

The laws relating to dogs are contained in the Dog and Cat Management Act 1995. Copies of this Act are available from State information.

Either the actual owner of the dog or a person responsible for the control of the dog can be charged with various offences under this Act. For example, if you are looking after a dog for a period of time you may be responsible for registering the dog, or, if you are simply walking the dog and the dog attacks someone, you could be held legally liable and may have to pay any associated damages. Here is a list of some of the common offences for which the owner or the person responsible for the dog can be fined. These include the dog wandering at large, attacking, harassing or chasing a person or animal (although this may be permissible in defence of property) attacking a person lawfully entering premises, and chasing a vehicle. They also include being in a school, kindergarten or child care centre without permission and also a shop where food or drink is being prepared. One other offence which has caused problems for some local residents is the offence of the dog defecating in a public place unless the person with control immediately removes and disposes of the faeces. Although this is a country area this is still an offence. Hearing dogs and Guide dogs are exempt from these

Also a person who urges a dog to attack, harass or chase any other animal, person or bird is also guilty of an offence.
