Our December meeting was short to make time for our traditional Christmas supper and some entertainment from Terry Davenport (and Jill McLatchie). Nevertheless, we covered a considerable amount of business. Here are some key points.

A Happy New Year to all our readers and welcome to the 22nd year of the One Tree Hill Grapevine. Please feel free to contribute to this newsletter with news, views, items of interest, poems, stories, letters, quotations, or any other news which you feel might interest

- ⇒ There will be a special meeting to explain changes in the City of Playford Rates Policy on 10 February at 7.30pm in the Institute. Ratepayers and residents are urged to attend.
- ⇒ Some environment group members have been active getting training in brush cutting and poisoning weeds as well as networking with other groups in the district. We are always looking for new members so ring Chris Myles on 82807604 if you are interested.
- ⇒ Copies of the Grapevine from the past 22 years are going to be sent to the archivist for the Elizabeth Library for safe keeping. (Perhaps you may like to view them sometime for a little local history?)
- Access for people with disabilities in the institute was discussed, as under the Disability Discrimination Act, all public buildings should provide suitable facilities. The meeting identified some obvious deficiencies such as no toilet access for people in wheelchairs; doors too heavy and not wide enough; no light in the toilet airlock space; the need for a key to get access to someone in a locked toilet cubicle in an emergency. We will write to council suggesting an audit be done on the building to improve the facilities. In the meantime those things that we can easily fix will be attended to.
- Vicki Theunens and Lorraine Vingerhoets spoke about action underway to establish a One Tree Hill Sports and Recreation Club. A constitution has been drafted and now the group needs support in the way of funds, players, equipment and other people (particularly parents) with time and energy to assist. Their initial goal is to set up junior soccer, so if you know any children who would like to play, please contact Lorraine at the OTH Fodder Store. Other sports will inevitably follow, and the plan is to link with the cricket and tennis clubs. Sport is such a wonderful means of people socialising, getting to know each other, and enjoying themselves, so we are very supportive of this group and feel sure that it will be of great benefit to this community. If you can be involved in any way please contact Vicki or Lorraine (82807680) or go along to any of the meetings advertised on notice boards or in the Grapevine. They need support to make it work!
- ⇒ An article on fire safety was tabled by Sally McKay for consideration at the next meeting. It looks at designing and selecting plants to minimise fire risks.

#### RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Do you have a surplus of tomatoes? Have you ever tried drying them to get wonderful sundried tomatoes like those you get in the gourmet delis? Here's how to do it.

Cut the tomatoes into quarters or eighths or if you are using the tiny small bite tomatoes, just halve them. Lay them on a rack eg. an old fly screen or chicken wire (clean of course!). Sprinkle them with a little salt (optional). Cover them with more fly wire or some netting (the old bridal veil??) to keep the flies off. Leave them to dry in the sun, but bring them in at night. They should be sort of dry and leathery rather than crisp as a chip. Store them in an airtight container or put them in a jar with olive oil, and some garlic and/or chilli. Yum!

The Bushfire season is with us and we have been requested to repeat the list of plants which are fire retarding. This does not mean fireproof but will aid in catching the embers:-

Trees: Apples and Crab Apples, Ash, Birch, Crepe Myrtles, Elms, Golden Rain Tree, Lemon Scented Gum, Liquid Ambers, Melia, Maples, Oaks, Poplars, Spotted Gum Willows.

**Shrubs:** Abelia, Daisies, Coprosma, Durante Repens, Escallonia, Perlagonium, Pigface, Privet, Roses, Vibunum and Vinca.

One Tree Hill Garden Centre also has lists from E.T.S.A. of plants they recommend for planting under power lines.

Fire Ban Season: 1st December, 1998 to 30 April, 1999 The summer is once again upon us, which also means the fire ban season is here. No burning of any kind is permitted from 1st December, 1998 until 30 April, 1999. Please also note that no burning of any kind (including bonfires and small rubbish piles) is permitted at any time of the year in the One Tree Hill township. This is because of the Environmental Protection Authority's Clean Air Act.

Bottles: Please leave any soft drink/beer/wine bottles or cans on the concrete slab near to the smaller sheds, behind the station, at any time. This is one of our main fund raising activities, enabling us to purchase up to date equipment.

Hopper: The hopper continues to operate on the second Saturday of the month between the hours of 8.30 a.m. and 3.00 p.m. (approximately - when the last bin is full, we close). Please do not Answers elsewhere in the Grapevine.




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#### CHILDREN'S CONTRIBUTIONS

#### VETERINARY NOTES FOR FEBRUARY

#### Microchipping.

New legislation which came into effect recently for pet owners in South Australia affects every dog and cat owner.

Identification of your dog/cat must be routine, and one very popular, safe and lifetime method is by the use of the "microchip".

The tiny microchip is implanted under the skin above the shoulder blades so that they may be given their own identification code. No two animals have the same code and the chip lasts the lifetime of the animal without any irritation or discomfort.

This simple procedure usually involves a short anaesthetic to enable the Veterinary Surgeon to inject the microchip. We also tattoo a symbol in the right ear to clearly indicate that the pet has been microchipped for permanent identification.

If lost and impounded, the pets microchip can be scanned and the owner identified.

The cost involved in microchipping is very reasonable and the fee includes lifetime registration.

#### PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH

#### Caltrop (Tribulus terrestris)

This is a prostrate summer/autumn growing annual well suited to our climate. Stems often reach out over a metre in length and radiate from a central tap root. Fern like leaves covered in fine silky hairs are greyish blue in colour. Small yellow flowers appear along stems often just weeks after germination with burrs forming soon after flowering. Single plants can produce up to 400 burrs each containing 15-20 seeds. Several germinations can take place if the soil and moisture conditions are right.

The sharp spiny burrs cause injury to the feet, mouth and intestine of grazing cattle. It can also be poisonous to grazing animals. In orchards and vineyards the burrs contaminate produce and provide a hazard to fruit pickers. The spiny burrs are a hazard to children in parks and on playing field. Check your garden and property and aim to get rid of this pest plant. Contact the Adelaide Plains Animal and Plant control Board for advice.

#### Blackberries.

Blackberry thickets are a common weed and because birds and foxes eat the berries this species can invade good bushland. Blackberries are very prickly plants and you will need to wear good protective clothing. Cut back the canes until you can get to the main stems. These can easily be swabbed with neat Glyphosphate though if you keep cutting them back and cut back the regrowth eventually they will die. It is important to check and see if there are any birds nesting inside the thickets because many native birds like to nest in them. It is best to tackle the thickets before they get too big and become a major problem. They are also a fire hazard.

#### LOCAL RESIDENTS GAOLED

Has One Tree Hill's reputation been tarnished?

About forty members of the One Tree Hill Community were gaoled on Friday night 27 November 1998. Thankfully there were no charges laid and all persons were released without penalty.

How did this happen?

Your Rural Watch has been active again and beside fighting crime and or evil in the One Tree Hill Area organised yet another community event for One Tree Hill residents, a tour of the Adelaide Gaol. What a top night it was.

After experiencing a minor delay at the departure point, the bus would not start, we arrived at the gaol at about 7.00 pm. Two groups of about twenty then proceeded to tour the gaol under the guidance of an experienced guide.

Adelaide gaol opened in 1841 and was not closed until 1988. During that time renovations were few and when the gaol closed it still had no sewage to any of the cells. Buckets were used. The gaol was built primarily to house debtors and felons. occurred firstly outside the front gates and later inside the walls of the gaol. A total of 49 people were executed at the gaol, including Elizabeth Woolcock (1873) the only female to be hanged in South Australia.

The tour took us through most of the complex, the cell blocks, into exercise vards, to the hanging tower and the graves.

Whilst viewing the hanging tower, one of our generous members volunteered her husband to give us a demonstration. He declined. (Good one Hazel).

The tour gives a very good insight to life in the gaol and the conditions in which they survived. I think everyone agrees that it is a good thing the gaol in now closed.

Don't forget, the One Tree Hill Rural Watch is a community group. #### INDEPENDENT LIVING UNITS AT ONE TREE HILL

It was very pleasing to hear that at a Playford Council meeting on 22nd September last year, Council resolved that a portion of allotment 137 (land adjoining the Institute) was no longer required as a reserve and that they were prepared to relinquish control of it in order that Independent Living Units could be built on it, subject to various conditions being fulfilled. To this end they contacted the Minister of Local Government and his instructions were to notify the intention in the Government Gazette and the local paper and ask for any interested persons to make representations to Council. The Council notice makes no mention of Independent Living Units but all residents in the vicinity have previously been notified of the idea and comments were requested. By far the vast majority of people contacted were in favour of the idea. After any further comments the Council will again have to approach the Minister. The whole process has been very slow as the first approach was made to the then Munno Para Council three years ago, but it now seems there is some momentum.

The reason for the request for units is that it is considered that elderly citizens of O.T.H. have a right to live as much as possible of the last years of their lives in the same friendly and happy environment in their own home town that they have grown to love, not to have to move to a strange area with all the stresses and torments that are involved in such a move.

In early 1997 when the first approach was made to the Minister of Local Government, he made a stipulation that one condition of any agreement to using a reserve, would be that Council would have to make available an equivalent area of Council land as a reserve. There is such an area bordering the town which it is understood was passed to Council at no cost after the main road was straightened.

For those who are younger and do not agree with the above, remember that all aged people were young once and probably felt that an aged environment was not for them. It was too far away. However it cannot be avoided, as young people will be the senior citizens of the future.

This year is the International Year of Older Persons and it would be appropriate to see a start, or even a finish to the project before the year 2000. If you agree that the units are a good thing for One Tree Hill then feel free, in response to the Council notice, to pass your comments in writing to the C.E.O., City of Playford, Warooka Drive Smithfield, S.A. 5114.


#### TREES FOR LIFE
