#### ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

We had a very large turnout for our June meeting - about 50 people. The reason for this was 4 motions, two pending from the May meeting:

- 1. "that the meeting terminate the actions of the Environment Committee" and an amendment:
- "that Progress curtail the actions of the environment committee until a list of species for conservation and eradication is drawn up, and a management plan is put in place"

plus two new notices of motion

- 3. that "the environment sub-committee of the Association be disbanded and that the business that it used to deal with be brought back to be dealt with in the same manner as other matters handled by the Association, that is by the membership at monthly general meetings".
- 4. that "the position of Publicity Officer be created to act as sole spokesperson for the Association and that Bill Sims be appointed to that position".

The outcomes of the meeting were to:

- clarify the current terms of reference of the environment sub-committee - it cannot act on projects without the consent of Progress
- clarify the events leading to the motions being put
- agree that additional consultation was needed with residents re species that should go and stay
- halt working bees on the roadside verges until a management plan has been worked out between Council, residents and the environment group
- allow the environment group to continue to function on other projects eg. work around the Institute and the Blacktop Rd Bushcare site
- retain the President as the spokesperson for the Association.

In regard to the latter outcome it was acknowledged that:

- the press has been known to misquote before, and
- Playford Council has acknowledged that my fax to the Rating committee was my <u>personal</u> response to their consultation process and not sent for and on behalf of Progress Association.

We now have some direction for constructive action. We will need to action the motions passed and begin the consultation processes with residents and council. I'd like to invite interested residents to attend our monthly meetings - they are held on the third Thursday of every month at 7.30 in the Institute - the next one is July 15.

And last, but certainly not least, our very best wishes to Gordon and Sarah Cooksey who have now moved from OTH into their new home in Surrey Downs. Both Sarah and Gordon have been staunch supporters of Progress Association and have been officer holders in a variety of positions - Gordon has been President and Sarah, Secretary; both have been committee members for many years. We will miss their positive contribution, sound advice and practical support. A presentation of a photo of the Institute, carefully framed by Doug Winsor, was made at the last meeting and we had a special supper to farewell them.

#### MIKE STEVENS REPORTING BACK

Well, I tried but did not succeed. The vote supporting an 8% rate increase was passed 9 votes to 6 with myself, Matthew Hayden, Shirley Wissell, Julie Norris, Julie Bebbington and David Strauss voting against. I proposed that it only be 5% this year. I know you asked me to put a 0% increase or at most 2%, but there was simply no way that that would have achieved any support. This means in some cases a significant rise because of the new Rating Policy which in itself resulted in some increases. However, no one will pay more than 10% this year, but eventually the difference will be made up. The rates accepted which affect the One Tree Hill area are the fixed component of \$324 which every one pays plus a rate in the dollar of 0.329410 for primary production areas and 0.3415 for the township. The Residential rate is 0.38425.

The budgeted expenditure without depreciation of \$8.3m is \$26.0m and the revenue \$27.3m. This gives an operating surplus of \$1.3m. The net increase in borrowings is \$1.0m and the capital expenditure is net \$3.1m. I'll keep this report brief - except to say that the Progress Association needs to be congratulated for another successful Barn Dance.


#### ONE TREE HILL PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

#### CORRECT DIET FOR KANGAROOS

Many people in One Tree Hill have rescued kangaroos or are visited frequently by them. There are lots of good things that you can feed them but there are also some bad foods too. There are three sections to the kinds of foods you should feed and some of each section should be available at all times if they are in captivity.

Section one-fruit and vegetables.

Feed apples (not Granny Smiths), bananas, kiwi fruit, grapes, melon - any kind, tomatoes, raw carrots and tops, pears peaches, apricots, nectarines, plums, corn, broccoli, spinach/silver beet, fresh raw peas, strawberries, mango, celery tops, lettuce.

Section two-Grains.

Feed rolled oats, muesli, nutrigrain, rice cakes, weetbix, wheat bran sticks, mini wheats (no fruit centres), cornflakes, sultanas, raw two minute noodles (crushed), large parrot seed, lucerne chaff, roo pellets, instagrass, fresh picked grass (with roots and dirt)

Section three-Native plants.

Feed acacia (wattle), callistomen (Bottle Brush), gum leaves and flowers, mellalueca, grevillea, plumbago.

#### DO NOT FEED

Citrus fruits, cauliflower, cabbage, clover, potatoes, bread, oleander plant, hydranga, hibiscus, meat, cat or dog food (any kind). High protein foods aren't good for roo's over long periods of time and if you feed oats make sure it isn't too hard as it can get into gums and cause infections. If you feed bread to a roo you should only do it when they are very young, and given very sparingly and it should be not fresh or mouldy. A hard diet is preferred as soft diets lead to teeth problems and the animal finds it hard to adjust in the wild.

#### RECIPE OF THE MONTH

#### WELSH CAKES - PICE AR Y MAEN

Ingredients: You will need: 500g plain flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 pinch allspice, 1 pinch salt, 125g butter, 250g lard, 220g sugar, 125g seedless raisins (cut up), 2 eggs beaten. Milk to mix. Caster sugar to sprinkle.

Stir together the flour, baking powder, allspice and salt in a large bowl. Rub in the butter and lard. Add the sugar and raisins. Beat the eggs and add to mixture, with a little milk, to make a fairly stiff dough. Roll out to a thickness of about 1/4 inch, and cut into 2 inch rounds with a pastry cutter. Cook on a greased griddle, or Frypan for about 3 minutes each side until golden brown.

Sprinkle with sugar and serve warm.

Cook at 150/160 °C. (This authentic Welsh Recipe contributed by Sybil Winsor)

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#### GARDENING NOTES FOR JULY - PRUNUS.

An extensive genus, Prunus, is considered to provide the most spectacular spring blossom and include flowering almonds, apricots, cherries, peaches and plums. They are selected as ornamental plants for their blossom, rather than fruit. Prunus are very hardy, adaptable, and are probably the most popular deciduous trees grown in Australia. Flowers can be white, pink or mottled, single through to double and range in size. The prolific flowering habit makes them excellent as small to medium size specimen trees. The long slender branches can become completely covered in blossom making them ideal for floral displays when picked in the bud stage.

The Land Management Course recently held in One Tree Hill Institute, by the Land Management program, can be considered a resounding success. The course was filled quickly with many of the participants being local to the One Tree Hill area.

The Land Management Courses have proved to be a popular option for landholders to receive practical information on soils, water courses, pasture management, weed identification and control, horse management systems, revegetation and property planning. Participants of the One Tree Hill course enjoyed the interactive style of the lectures, relishing the opportunity to get their hands dirty in the noble task of learning how to texture their soils. On the first night participants were encouraged to ask questions of the technical specialists who deliver the lectures.....they eagerly adopted this suggestion and the course coordinator was left considering that the course should have been offered with an overnight option!

Many course participants felt that the course provided them with an extensive range of practical information, which has provided them with direction to undertake future land management activities on their properties.

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#### VETERINARY NOTES FOR JULY

Psittacosis.

Psittacosis, commonly called the bird disease, is a bacterial infection of parrots, pigeons, canaries, chickens and ducks, and is usually related to stress. It can be seen in either an acute form where there is sudden death, or where the birds are just "poor doers" with a respiratory tract infection. The symptoms of psittacosis in birds are nasal discharge, sneezing, weight loss and paralysis. Older birds do not show signs of illness, but can still be carriers. Diagnosis is made by a specialised laboratory faecal test. Infected birds are treated with antibiotics via either a series of injections or mixed in their drinking water for up to 45 days. Unfortunately even with treatment, it is likely that once a bird has contracted psittacosis it will be a carrier for life.

Psittacosis may be transmitted to humans via the birds dust, droppings and droplets of nasal discharge and can cause a flu like illness and in worst cases pneumonia. Person to person transmission occurs rarely if ever. Symptoms begin 5-14 days after exposure in humans, and can be headache, fever, muscle pain, fatigue, dry cough, skin spots, shortness of breath and abdominal pain. Complications may include a spread of infection to the heart or brain and in extreme conditions a second bacterium may cause double pneumonia. Diagnosis is routinely made by blood testing at the beginning of the illness, and 2-3 weeks later to confirm psittacosis. Treatment involves tetracycline antibiotic drugs for 10-14 days and is usually highly successful in eradicating the disease from humans.

To prevent infection clean all bird cages, food and water bowls daily and disinfect them at least once a week. Do not buy or sell birds that are sick. Buy parrots from reputable dealers with exotic bird permits as illegal birds are more likely to be infected. Keep any new birds away from other birds for 30-45 days, and have them treated or tested for psittacosis by your vet prior to allowing them to mix with other birds.

Psittacosis is a relatively rare disease, but one which bird owners should be mindful of.


#### **NEWS FROM NATHAN**

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#### LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

The locality of Uleybury, located to the North of the One Tree Hill Township was named by the early settler Moses Garlick after his native village Uley in Gloucestershire England. Moses Garlick was a staunch Baptist layman and in 1851 he built the Uley Baptist chapel on a hill near the track which connected Smithfield with One Tree Hill. (Now Uley Road.) The stone slate roofed chapel had a full immersion baptism tank with steps leading down to it and an underground rainwater storage tank. The chapel, its small cemetery, storage shed, and stable were enclosed by a stone wall. The chapel closed in 1881 as the numbers in the congregation dwindled. The building was still used however. For a time it was the headquarters of the Munno Para Rifle Brigade. The Munno Para East Council used the building as offices for a 40 year period. The last burial in the cemetery was in October 1975. Restoration of the chapel began but constant vandalism aided by rumours the site was haunted led to the demolition of the chapel. The graveyard is still there on Uley Road. Have a look next time you're down that
