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

Well, Christmas is upon us again. They tell me that the time goes faster as you get older - I am beginning to believe it! Lea and I both wish you and yours the greetings of the season and sincerely hope that it is an enjoyable time for you all.

Not a lot has been discussed at Council meetings in the last months, most of the business being of a routine nature. One thing however that I do need to bring to your attention is the process that will finish in May next year to determine a Rating Policy. The amalgamation resulted in two quite separate rating procedures being modified and applied to the new City of Playford with a number of anomalies being obvious. We have decide to work through these, starting with a set of options being put to Council and followed by Community Consultation, planned to occur during January and February next year. You may have heard that Hillbank residents have already started the process. I would like you to keep an eye out for notices informing you of the meeting for One Tree Hill ratepayers, which will happen in the first weeks of February.

It seems that the recent work done on the lookout area on the side of Yorketown Road was as a result of a period of concern and complaint by the residents in the immediate vicinity. The area was used for drag racing, partying and other activities until the early hours of the morning - activities which were quite distressing. The Police attended many times, but with no long term reduction in the problem. The fencing work cost some \$1400 and the repairs will be covered by insurance.

I must relate my recent bad experience with burning off. I did all the right things, mowing around the piles of tree offcuts, etc, and applying for a permit to burn. After an inspection I gained the approval. I thought my water supply and the other precautions would be adequate. So I set fire to the pile last Friday in good faith. It took about two minutes before it was out of control!!!!!! It burnt so fiercely that the heat set fire to the surrounding grass and I simply couldn't control it. The CFS attended promptly and did the usual efficient job and I thank them for that. What's the point of relating this story? BE CAREFUL THIS SUMMER.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Shortbread Assortment.

With Christmas coming why not make some shortbread. You will need 125g unsalted butter, softened, 60g caster sugar, 125g plain flour, 50g cornflour, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla flavouring essence, egg white to glaze. Toppings and flavourings could include 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, crushed sugar cubes, desiccated coconut, raspberry jam, mixed nuts, choc chips.

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Preheat oven to 180 degrees C. Grease 2 or 3 baking trays. In a mixing bowl beat the butter and sugar together until light and creamy. Sift the flour and cornflour over; stir in the vanilla. Transfer to a lightly floured surface and cut into 4 equal pieces. Knead the cinnamon into one piece of dough. Divide in half and roll into two 30cm ropes. Cut each into 3cm lengths. Form into horse shoe shapes and mark with a fork. Roll out a second piece of dough very thinly. Cut into shapes with biscuit cutters. Roll the trimmings into logs. Brush with egg white. Sprinkle with the sugar or the coconut. Roll out the third piece of dough. Stamp out four 7.5cm rounds and four 5cm rounds. Using the end of a piping tube, stamp out the centre of the smaller rounds. Brush the large rounds with egg white. Put the smaller rounds on top and spoon the jam in the centre. Brush with the egg white and sprinkle with the chopped nuts. Knead the choc chips into the remaining dough. Roll into 6 balls and flatten. Put the shortbread on the prepared trays and bake in batches if necessary for 8 to 12 minutes until golden. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. You can also make chocolate shortbread by substituting 25g of cocoa for the same weight of flour.

Fire Ban Season - 1st December, 1998 to 30 April, 1999

The summer is once again upon us, which also means the fire ban season is here. No burning of any kind is permitted from 1st December, 1998 until 30 April, 1999. Please also note that no burning of any kind (including bonfires and small rubbish piles) is permitted at any time of the year in the One Tree Hill township. This is because of the Environmental Protection Authority's Clean Air Act.

Bottles: Please leave any soft drink/beer/wine bottles or cans on the concrete slab near to the smaller sheds, behind the station, at any time. This is one of our main fund raising activities, enabling us to purchase up to date equipment.

Hopper: The hopper continues to operate on the second Saturday of the month between the hours of 8.30 a.m. and 3.00 p.m. (approximately - when the last bin is full, we close). Please do not drop rubbish in the bins whilst CFS personnel are not in attendance. Any rubbish left in the area after the hopper hours is left to rot until the next month - Keep One Tree Hill Beautiful! We can take any rubbish except for hard rubble, tyres, paint and other liquids (such as oil and paint). Please bring identification (rates notice, driver's licence etc. stating you are a resident of the One Tree Hill area) with you as it may be asked for. Please place donations for use of the hopper, in the helmet.

SIMON'S PET CORNER

Simon has a new pet. It is a beautiful Rainbow Lorikeet called 'Blue' and it is 6 weeks old. Simon has a special mix to feed lorikeets and we are going to give you the recipe because it is useful for all nectar eating birds.

Dry Mix.

1 box of Farex baby cereal for aged 4 month babies.

1/8th can of Nestles Malted Milk powder.

31/2 tablespoons - heaped- Sustagen sports vanilla flavour.

250 grams of dark brown sugar.

Mix it all together and keep in a sealed container.

Wet Mix

You will need 4 heaped scoops of dry mix. Mix with warm water to dissolve sugar and then top up to half a litre with cold water. Add two drops of Penta-vite (Children's vitamins with iron). Feed your bird with the mix either by hand if they are very young or let them feed themselves.

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DONATION FROM THE ONE TREE HILL PRIMARY SCHOOL

Recently I was invited as editor to visit Year 1 and 2, Room 10, Mrs Tauba's class. There I was given a donation of \$36.20 which the children had raised for the Grapevine in a 'Guess the number of jellybeans in the jar' Competition. Giving to the Grapevine was their idea which was very much appreciated. The children had used the whole process as a learning experience and had learnt much useful maths on the way. The whole school was involved in guessing and the jar of jellybeans was finally won by Jennie in the front office who generously made them available to all passers by! Thanks very much students for all your efforts. Here is their own description of their competition:-

In Term 3 we set up a jellybean competition. People were invited to guess how many jellybeans there were in a container. It cost 20 cents for one guess. We went around to classes with a sheet of paper with numbers 1 to 200, we had another piece of paper that you wrote your name, class and guess on. For two weeks we were up and running. In the end we found out who was the winner. Mrs Jenny Billington was the winner. There was 194 jellybeans altogether. Amy-Lee Healey was two off. We raised \$33.20. We decided to give the money to Jill to help print copies of One Tree Hill Grapevine, where lots of our work is published. We worked out that we could help to print seventy copies! The competition was lots of fun, especially eating jellybeans in our maths lessons and counting all that money!

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

Ellen Smith was the teacher at the Precolumb school in 1922. This one teacher school was situated on Paines Road and there are still members of our community who received their education there. Reading her notes at the Uleybury School Museum, it becomes clear that she was very keen on grammar and good spelling. Some of her examinations would test modern children and adults too. Here are some examples from her test for grades 5 and 6:

- 1. Define the following:-
 - (1) Transitive verb. (2) Preposition. (3) Objective case.
- 2. How many moods are there? Give examples of each.
- 3. Analyse and parse fully the underlined words:

The sun is very hot today.

Your answers are very welcome. Please send them in for the end of January and we will publish them in the next edition.

There were 17 children in the school then and she was forced to leave 4 children in their present grades because of their weakness in spelling and arithmetic. Children had to pass all their subjects in their examinations and were often kept back a grade. Poor Walter Wesley spent two years in Grade three and was finally promoted not because he'd improved but because the teacher thought he was unable to improve 'because he hasn't the average reasoning powers'. These old records make interesting reading and they can be found at the Uleybury School Museum which is open every Sunday afternoon

For all gardeners it is important to make a distinction between serious damage and the normal day to day blemishes and defects in plants caused by the general activities of insects. Insects provide essential food for birds and animals. Many insects are predators of other insects and help to maintain a natural balance.

It's important to set aside a special time for them to talk to us, e.g. after the evening meal. It is not easy. These days we seem to have so much to do and less time to do it in. In many families both parents work. And after work, there is shopping, cooking and a few hundred other things to fit in before the working day starts all over again. But making time is important.

When talking to your kids it is important to keep the lines of communication open. Be non-judgmental. Ask open questions which encourage responses. Acknowledge your child's thoughts, feelings and outlook on life. Give POSITIVE feedback to your kids.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR DECEMBER

Did you know? - topical tips for pets.

Dogs and cats should never be given cooked bones as the hard splinters will not digest. Raw bone fragments are digestible and rarely cause blockage.

Dettol should never be used on animal wounds. It can damage the skin and especially in cats will burn the mouth and throat when they groom themselves. Use salty water or dilute Betadine (1 part Betadine in 10 parts water) are fine for bathing wounds after clipping surrounding hair away.

Human shampoos are not good for animals coat and skin.

Cats and dogs (and people) fed raw meat (especially kangaroo) can be at risk of contracting Toxoplasmosis. Thorough cooking avoids this possibility.

Sunflower seeds are like junk food to the bird world. If offered a variety of seeds birds will often choose their dessert (the sunflower seeds) first, and not eat their vegies (the better seed types). Two many sunflower seeds can lead to malnutrition, and also to the development of fatty tumours. As with any diet, variety and moderation are best.
