GARDENING NOTES

DIOSMA (Breath of Heaven)

From the Greek 'Dios' meaning divine odour, because of the fragrance of the leaves when crushed, this genus has about 15 species, though these are seldom seen in Australia. A very close relative, Coleonema, is mistakenly called Diosma and is widely

Diosmas are hardy, heath like evergreen shrubs originating in South Africa and growing 30-60 cm high. Diosma Ericoides (offered as Coleonema Album-white in Australia) has tiny star like white fragrant flowers in Spring. Diosma Pulchra (sold as Coleonema Pulchrum) is a fine leafed shrub with many tiny starry pink flowers through late winter to Spring. Gold Diosma (sold as Coleonema Aurea) is a hybrid that was developed in Sydney.

Diosmas are hardy, not fussy about soil conditions, but need Summer water and full sun to thrive. Tip prune after flowering to encourage dense foliage. It is a great hedging plant.

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH - BLACKBERRIES

Blackberry (Rubus ulmifolius) is a prickly plant that grows canes which arch over and take root or layer. Its flowers are white; flowering times are between November and February. Fruits can be ripe by late January.

Wear good protective clothing when working on Blackberry because they are very prickly. Begin by cutting back the canes, so that you can get at the main stems. These can be swabbed with neat glyphosate or if regrowth is cut back often enough the plant will die.

Many native birds use blackberry as a habitat so don't overclear large thickets until there is suitable replacement habitat established (from Trees for Life newsletterMarch1998)

VETERINARY NOTES FOR APRIL

Dental care for pets

A common complaint with older animals, is that they have bad breath. This is caused by tartar (plaque) building up on the teeth near the gums. The first signs of tartar are a yellow stain on the teeth near the gums. As the tartar increases it hardens pushing back the gums to expose the tooth roots. Decay and infection follow, leading to bad breath and eventual loss of teeth. Where the tartar is well established, it is often necessary for the animal to have its teeth cleaned professionally by your veterinary surgeon. Once the teeth are cleaned, tartar build up can be prevented.

To prevent tartar build up, feed your pet two to three times a week with food that needs a lot of chewing. Food rubbing on the side of the tooth acts like a toothbrush. For dogs, raw marrow bones are excellent, while raw chicken wings and necks work well for cats. Commercial raw-hide style chews will also help, with newer products such as "rasks" being designed to specifically rub the teeth as they are chewed. Pet toothbrushes and toothpaste are also available for the well behaved pet.



Since this is my first contribution this year, I trust you all had a good New Year's break and have settled into 1998. Matthew's article in last month's Grapevine filled you in on the tight budget the Council is having to operate under this year, but we were successful in keeping \$15,000 available for maintenance for the OTH water supply. The review of the water scheme will be starting soon and we will keep you informed of the results.

No news has come through on the mobile phone tower planned for the township, although I have been told that OPTUS have removed the work they did on the Precolumb Road site. I guess the downturn in the economy has made them put their expansion plans on hold.

The barbed wire which was put on the fence by the native vegetation site on Blacktop Road east of the township should have been removed by now. I have been told by Bob Pitt that Blencoe Road has been opened up for our horse riders and that low styles have been installed. He also told me that some modifications by the gate on Johnston Road will be done soon.

Those of you who live in and around the township will be receiving soon a small survey about the Independent Living Units. We would appreciate getting your responses because they will help the Council and the Senior Citizens Club decide on whether to pursue the plan and what your preferences are for their location. If you don't get a survey in the mail, copies will be available from the Senior Citizens Club, the General Store, Matthew and myself.

The Strategic Plan for the City of Playford through to 2010 has gone through the approval process. The amount of community involvement in its preparation was really high and it is a very worthwhile document. If you want a copy, please contact me or the Council.



SURVEY RE INDEPENDENT LIVING UNITS AT ONE TREE HILL.

A survey is being conducted by the City of Playford in response to a proposal from residents in One Tree Hill.

This survey has been mailed to all residents in the township and within a 2km radius of One Tree Hill. Copies of the survey have also been made available at the One Tree Hill General Store.

Purpose

The purpose of the survey is to quantify the demand for the establishment of Independent Living units in the town, and also to gauge residents opinion on the preferred site location.

What is an Independent Living Unit?

The units are accommodation specific for aged persons.

These units are usually built by a private developer in which case the units are resident funded. In some cases the Units are rented. At this stage a developer/buider has not been engaged to progress the proposed units at One Tree Hill.

Preferred site for the Units.

Several sites have been identified within the town. The preferred site is the **Reserve** behind the One Tree Hill Institute. This site is preferred for the following reasons:-

- Accessibility to shops and the Post Office.
- Minimal distance to walk to services.
- Relatively flat terrain.

The proposal is to build Units on the site which will not occupy the entire Reserve.

Please note this is only a proposal and requires the consent of Council. It is envisaged the results of the survey and a report will be presented to the May Council Meeting.

Interested in being involved in some environment working bee projects around One Tree Hill?


