ENVIRONMENT REPORT

A meeting was held on Monday May 11, 1998 to discuss the formation of a group to undertake various practical working projects in the local area. Present were:- Ann Davenport, Karina Bobridge, Chris Myles, Paul Smith, Mary Martin, Eric Leiper, Heather Fischer, and Linda Tout-Smith who is the Greening Officer from Playford Council. It was suggested that the committee be called the One Tree Hill Environment Committee and operate as a subcommittee of the Progress Association. The aims of this committee are:-

- To look after the local environment.
- To report environmental problems.
- To organise clean ups, planting and regeneration and clearing weeds.
- Work with other groups interested in environmental projects in the One Tree Hill area such as Bushcare, Landcare and Trees for Life.

This committee will be affiliated with the Playford Greening and Landcare group and join in the insurance arrangements operating with this committee and the Council (although their is some doubt about how these are operating at the moment). This link would also provide valuable access to a network of like-minded people with interests in the environment.

Eric Leiper and Mary Martin volunteered to attend the Playford Greening and Landcare Group meetings that are held from 6.30-8.30pm on the first Thursday of each month in the Jo Gapper Building.

undertaken after consultation and approval of the Committee and Progress Association, or if appropriate Council and other relevant Government authorities. Projects will be publicised in the Grapevine and/or local papers. Local councillors will be informed and members of the community will be encouraged to participate. All participants will need to fill in volunteer registration forms and keep a log of hours spent on projects to assist in future funding applications and any necessary insurance matters. Also they will need to be advised re safety precautions.

There are a number of ideas for projects. These include assisting with work on bushcare sites along Precolumb Road and Blacktop Road, improving the park area on the western side of the town by clearing unwanted species, planting and making a picnic spot, and planting reserve areas. Also the possibility of revegetating the corner of Karwin and Kersbrook roads, including installing post and rails to obstruct access by motor bikes. Other ideas include developing walking trails, and developing an avenue of trees into and out of the town.

Sheryn Pitman, Project Officer with Rotary Greening, is coordinating applications for federal funding from Bushcare, Landcare and other groups. She will address a meeting of all interested people on the topics of her role, how she can assist us, and we can assist her, on **Wed July 8th at 7.00pm in the Blacksmith's** Inn.

Dear Editor,

The Gawler Branch of "Heartbeat" is not well known in this area and is looking for every possible avenue of exposure in respect of as many people as possible learning of our existence and the vital services we offer for heart patients.

Heart surgery, and indeed heart problems without it, can be very traumatic and the reassurance we can offer at such times can make a huge difference to a persons recovery.

The area the Gawler Branch covers is bounded by Two Wells, Mallala, Truro, Tanunda and Williamstown and our three Reassurance Officers will visit anyone in the area needing support or advice.

I am one of the team, and like the other two, we have all had bypass surgery and can talk to patients who need help on a 'been there, done that' basis.

The Gawler Branch has around 140 members and at least half have heart problems, many having had surgery. There are no paid positions in our branch and our Patron is Mairi Walker, the Director of Nursing in the Gawler Health Service Complex.

Dear Editor,

I am writing this at the end of Australia's first National Sorry Day which I believe has been a momentous occasion - and has raised the curtain on considerable division and prejudice in our society. Sorry Day has forced me to articulate my own feelings about what has happened and so here is my own apology to these people.

I am deeply sorry and saddened that Australian governments and members of the public believed - and some still do - that it was right to dislocate Aboriginal families from their homelands and separate children from their families and their culture. I am saddened by their inability and unwillingness to appreciate the value of the cultures of our Indigenous peoples and their basic human rights. I acknowledge that I have only begun to understand this over recent years.

As a fellow human being, a mother, a daughter, a sister, a cousin, and an aunt, I have been deeply affected by the stories I have heard from Aboriginal people directly involved in these events. I have also been touched by their strength, endurance and courage. I wish to acknowledge the ongoing effect of these policies in the lives of Aboriginal people today, particularly in the areas of justice, mental, physical and emotional health, education, family life and economic well-being, and the racial prejudice that still exists in Australian society.

As a white Australian, I believe it is the responsibility of present and future generations to hear and acknowledge the pain caused by these events and to offer a sincere and heartfelt apology in the hope that there can be healing. I personally, accept this responsibility.

I also offer my commitment to redressing the wrongs of the past and to "a united Australia which respects this land of ours, values Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage, and provides justice and equity for all."



SIMON'S PET CORNER

It was great to get a letter for Simon's Pet Corner! It read as follows:-

Hello! Well...it's finally happened that we have a reason to write to "Simon's Pet Corner". We have a new budgie named "Buddy". He(?) was given to us by Stacie's friend who has lots of tame birds, but so far Buddy only wants to bite us. Our question is about Buddy's bedtime! Some days when we get home it is already dark and when we come in we think Buddy may have already had a doze. Then of course we put the lights on and if we put his cover on straight away he sometimes starts chirping so we leave this a little while. Is this the best thing to do? It is often dark in his cage until 7-8 am so he gets a sleep in. He is a couple of months old now. Should we handle him a lot or should we leave him to really settle in (how long?). We try to coax him onto a finger but have only succeeded once or twice.

It's great to know you are there when we need you. We enjoy reading all of the Grapevine and would be interested to know about the types of things Simon is doing at an Agricultural High School. Also, as unsolicited advertising, the new village pies are YUMMY! Thanks for listening...The Walkers.

Simon says it's cool getting a letter! First of all you can tell if your budgie is a boy or a girl, because boys have blue colouring around their nostrils, whereas girls have pink. You should handle your budgie as much as possible. If he bites try with a gloved hand at first until the bird is calmer. Teach your budgie to 'tunnel'. This is done by making a tunnel with your hand and making the bird crawl through, then put your other hand on top and make him tunnel through that one. Keep doing this until he gets used to you. Simon reckons your bird is chirping when you get home because he is lonely and is wanting some attention. Play with him and talk to him for a while and then put the covers back on and he should sleep okay. Ignore him then if he chirps. Encourage him on to a finger after taming him and if he is a boy budgie you can teach him to talk. Girl budgies don't talk so well. Repeat simple phrases to him again and again like "Pretty Buddy" till he gets the idea.

Simon says an Agricultural High School is similar to an ordinary High School but they have agricultural subjects too. Simon and his friend Paul have their own vegie garden. Far too many Australians die each year because they, or somebody who was with them at the time, failed to recognise a heart attack or waited too long to act.

The warning signs of a heart attack are:-

- A crushing sensation or continuous pain in the centre of the chest or behind the breastbone, lasting for more than ten minutes.
- Pain to the shoulders, neck and arms.
- Simultaneous to this may be sweating, shortness of breath or a sick feeling in the stomach.

Some reasons why people don't act fast are:-

- ◆ The "This can't happen to" me attitude meaning victims don't accept the symptoms of heart attack for what they are and hope that the symptoms are for something else.
- Calling an ambulance means admitting the situation is real, causing patients to delay for too long.
- People feel uncomfortable calling an ambulance thinking they will "bother" people and be an "inconvenience": especially at night.
- There is a perception amongst some people in the community that an ambulance trip may be too costly.

By the time you read this, the Bush Dance will have occured - and once again been a resounding success! I am pleased to see some new shops in the village, and am looking forward to visiting them again and again. I am sure the rest of us will give them the support they need to succeed.

You will have seen the recent works at Precolumb and Cornishmans Hill roads, and I am assured that Gulf View and Goulds Creek roads will be attended to soon.

Plans are underway already for the assault on European Wasps next summer with a meeting of Local Government people held at the end of May. Playford Council has an excellent reputation in this field (I know from personal experience having had two nests treated). The cost of continuing this service and the knowledge that there will be even more need this summer poses some problems, but they will be overcome.

The latest on the Mobile Phone towers is that Telstra have agreed to colocate with the CFS and to provide all the facilities required by the CFS. The Kaiser Drive site is no longer considered an option by Telstra and the Precolumb Road site has been vacated by Optus. Optus and Vodafone have both suggested that they are not interested in putting a service in our area at this time.

Concerns about the dump on Medlow Road are continuing to be discussed and a large number of people in the Ward are opposing it. We are waiting for the State Government authorities to make the decision - previous decisions of the Councils involved, removed the vote from the Local Government arena. Because of the opposition, I have reconsidered my stance and will now voice those concerns on behalf of the residents.

By the time I next report to you, the Council will have passed the Budget and struck the rates. It will not be an easy time considering the lack of funds we have at our disposal and the need for infrastructure in our expanding area. We do have the opportunity to raise some money for specific purposes that will enhance the opportunities for employment - I believe we will make the best choices and I trust you will support us, even if it means that you may be paying a little more in rates. If you have some feelings on this and would like to have an input, please contact either myself or Matthew. We want to know what you think.
