ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

Linda Brown and Jenny Hoffman from the Council were visitors to our September meeting to inform the community about plans to set up a support groups for senior citizens in the Playford area, including one in OTH.

Linda is the coordinator of this program and the idea is to contact seniors in the area and design a program in conjunction with them to meet their various needs. The purpose of these groups is different from the Senior Citizens Group which already meets on Tuesdays in the institute. The new group hopes to assist people link with services and supports that will assist them if they wish to maintain their lifestyle in their own homes. In addition, members may be interested in a range of other activities to provide information, promote health and well being or whatever. It will depend on what the group wants. An information meeting is to be held at the Institute on Thursday, Sept 10 from 1 to 3pm. See adjacent announcement.

Our environment committee has been consulting with council and Rotary about developing the park area along Blacktop Rd, just west of Rose Ave. Heather Fischer, who is on this committee and also representing Rotary has prepared a report for Grapevine on the outcome of our last meeting with council - see below.

- 1. developing a playground for young children in the area and /or
- assisting in planning a OTH picnic next year in conjunction with the Rural Watch Pet Jamboree

Progress received information about a Strategic Bicycle Plan which is being proposed to encourage cycling within the City of Playford. This is part of a statewide strategy to promote bike riding for recreation, fitness and environmental reasons. Consultations are being held (although the one at OTH on Monday night was cancelled). Another meeting will be held in October, and we will be advised. You can contribute by coming along OR by responding to a set of discussion papers - either by phone or via a written response sheet. Ring Margaret Howard on 08 8449 4095 if you would like copies of the discussion papers etc.

Progress received notification of two development proposals in the area: a child care centre in McGilp Rd and a vineyard on Blacktop Rd. Our main concerns re the vineyard proposal were the effect on the bore water supply in the area and whether sprays might cause any problems to neighbouring properties - especially if they relied on rain water. We have asked council to consider these points in making decisions.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor.

I recently sent a list of questions about NAWMA and council procedures to the Salisbury, Gawler and Playford Councils. We thank the Gawler and Salisbury Councils for their comprehensive and quick reforms.

Playford Council's reply answered none of the questions, but seemed to be very concerned with Action Against Underground Water Contamination Committees or my involvement with the Medlow Road Group.

If Playford Council is unable (or unwilling) to provide a written reply to questions asked, is it because they have been acting without regard to the Local Government Act in relation to:

- * NAWMA?
- * the motion to support the Medlow Road balefill proposal?
- * writing cheques to themselves?
- * some elected members misusing ratepayer's money?
- * an elected member making unsupported statements about mayor's salaries?
- * council holding two committee meetings at the same time so residents and council members are unable to attend both meetings?

It is important for Council to attend functions and interstate trips to receive information that can benefit the area. If ratepayers' money is used inappropriately on functions that some councillors are not invited to, or do not represent the Playford Council, how can ratepayers be expected to accept inferior services (e.g. potholes in roads, insufficient signs and street lighting and littered areas).

As we have written to the Playford Council without success, we see no other way to receive the information from this Council except through freedom of information applications.

LAWNMOWERS.

In an effort to control grass and weeds on small acreages or vacant blocks, many people acquire some 'four legged lawnmowers' to do the job. This is envisaged by many as being a way to get rid of weeds involving no effort on the part of anyone except the sheep or goat, and all they have to do is eat...Right?...WRONG!

Sheep and goats do require maintenance and some amount of supervision. Many people each year discover the hard way when an RSPCA Inspector calls on them to advise that their sheep are flyblown through lack of shearing or crutching. Or worse still that their sheep are dead as feed or water supplies were not checked frequently enough. Sheep and goats which are tethered without shelter are also at risk of exposure in extreme weather. (From the RSPCA newsletter July 1998).

Check on the notice board in One Tree Hill and you will find the names of local shearers who will shear small flocks. A flyblown death is a very cruel death.

Once we had seen everything we went on to watch a video that told us of the dreaming story of Ngarrindjeri. The story tells of Ngarrindjeri on a search for two wives who had run away. On his search, he travelled down the Murray and the dreaming explains how they believe certain physical features in the landscape came to be there. Eg. he threw a spear and there became Long Island.

The Ngarrindjeri community is the largest Aboriginal community in South Australia.

They lived mainly in the lower Murray River, Coorong and the coastal areas. They had a permanent source of food and raw materials.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES


Before the bridge in Snake Gully was built, local residents had to travel to Tea Tree Gully via Salisbury. However in 1872 Mr Percival Gaylard, in the company of other local farmers put on an excellent lunch and champagne convincing a parliamentary party on the need for a bridge! A grant of 1000 pounds was given almost immediately! In 1873, the cornerstone of the bridge was set in place by Miss McEwin, daughter of Robert McEwin of Golden Grove. Under the stone was placed a document giving details of the days events. The foundation stone and document are still there. One year later the bridge was declared open by Mr Gaylard's daughter who smashed a bottle of wine on the causeway. It was a hot day but hundreds of spectators came to watch. There was a marquee with WELCOME TO SNAKE GULLY inscribed above it, and lunch and drinks were provided. Most of us who drive over it are unaware that there is some magnificant stonework supporting it. We probably think it is too narrow now, but it has been very valuable for the last 124 years. (Researched by Jill McLatchie from the Tea Tree Gully Sketchbook.)

ACTION FOR RECONCILIATION

Local singers and songwriters Les Montangees and Terry Davenport of "No Going Back", have recently returned from a trip to Aboriginal communities in the state's north west. The trip was a way of expressing their feelings about reconciliation and commitment to its processes. The idea came to Les, in the shower (the source of many good ideas), after John Howard had refused to apologise on behalf of the nation for the suffering past government policy had brought on aboriginal families, particularly 'the stolen generation'. Les said he wanted to do something practical and meaningful, and so the idea of writing a set of reconciliation songs and presenting them to aboriginal communities was born. Les and Terry produced a book of songs, which also included several contributions from Katherine McLennan of Victoria. Their trip took them to Maree, William Creek, Oodnadatta, Marla, Indulkana, Mimili and Fregon. They found that reconciliation was not an issue amongst these people who were more concerned about very real problems in their communities - unemployment, petrol sniffing, the fading culture. Terry and Les felt their concerts were not the way to go and so started to think of alternatives. The outcome was a 2 hour radio interview at Omawa which was broadcast to all the aboriginal communities in the surrounding area. The station also organised a recording of all their songs so that they could continue to play them on air in the months ahead.

Commenting on the trip, Les said that he was struck by the terrible mess in some communities. The aboriginal people there, have "fallen between 2 stools". Their old culture is crumbling and they know they can't go on the way they are, but they don't know yet how to change it. People seemed to have no strong sense of what they were going to do with their lives. Terry too, was struck by these things, particularly the tragedy that petrol sniffing is causing to the lives of a whole generation of young men. Despite this, they had a wonderful experience, which they wouldn't have missed.

If you want to hear Les and Terry's songs, No Going Back plays regularly from 8 to 10.30pm on the first Friday of every month at Conversations Café in Julian Tce, Gawler.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Nutty choc fudge.

Grease a shallow 19cm square tin. Put 400g white sugar, 125ml cream, 125g unsalted butter, 150g dark cooking chocolate, and 8 teaspoons of golden syrup into a heavy based saucepan. Warm gently over a low heat until the sugar dissolves and the butter and chocolate melts. Bring to the boil using medium heat and boil to 116°C or 240°F, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. (A sugar thermometer is useful.) Remove from the heat and stand for 10 minutes. Using a large wooden spoon beat the mixture until it just becomes thick and creamy and begins to look grainy, but don't overbeat. Stir in 75g of unsalted peanuts or hazelnuts and pour into prepared tin. Leave fudge to set and cut into small squares.

BIRD CARE NEWS

People are often tempted to put out food for the birds, but there are a few reasons why this is not a good idea. Feeding artificial honey mixes to birds, like lorikeets and honey eaters, causes them to become undernourished and more susceptible to diseases such as paralysis of the foot and leg as well as poor feather growth. Their normal diet of nectar from flowers is quite complex and is supplemented with protein from insects and pollen. Feeding them artificial mixes fills them up, so they do not seek out nectar. Also their digestion is designed to cope only with very small quantities of seed, bread or fibre. Larger, mostly meat eating birds, such as Kookaburras, magpies, butcher birds and currawongs, might enjoy the lean meat or mince you put out for them, but it lacks many of the vitamins, minerals and fibre they get in their normal diet - which includes fur, bones and organs. Diseases such as calcium deficiency can often result. Also, artificially fed birds no longer dependent on flowering times can breed more often, leading to population explosions. In the long term this is detrimental to them and to smaller size bird populations in the area, as the competition for nesting sites becomes more intense. Inevitably the larger more aggressive birds win out, but even they can then run into habitat

So next time you feel the urge to feed the birds, hold back and plant a bird-attracting tree or shrub in your garden instead. That way you will benefit both yourself and the birds. (From WIRES Info pamphlet Trees for life newsletter, 'Re-leaf', June 1998)


PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-FURZE OR GORSE

&\&\&\&\&\&\&\&\&\&\&\&\

This is a dark green spiny perennial bush to 2.5 metres high. The young stems are green, hairy and ribbed, while the older stems have light brownish bark. The leaves are reduced to spines with shorter branching lateral spines, while bright yellow pea like flowers are found along green branchlets near the growing tip. The pods are hairy, and contain up to six green-brown seeds. This bush is a problem because of its obnoxious spines, and it forms dense thickets which harbour vermin and are a fire hazard. If you have this on your property try to grub it out before it spreads, and burn the plants. Check the site for regrowth over several years.

TREES FOR LIFE

Native trees and shrubs can maintain a healthy ecosystem by providing homes for birds and animals. These in turn keep insects at bay from crops or pastures. Choose shrubs and ground covers as well as large trees for your revegetation project. A healthy understorey can support a balanced community of insects and birds. This helps to control harmful insects on trees and in nearby pastures as well as stabilising the soil and slowing wind speed. Grasses are important too, as they stabilise the soil preventing the loss of valuable top soil and nutrients. Dead trees can also be an asset to your property as they are used by a variety of animals and birds. Hollow logs or trunks provide nesting sites and homes. Their roots still bind the soil after the tree is dead.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

Dog Breeding.

Owning a female dog brings about the dilemma of whether or not to let her breed. A few facts to know about the normal cycle of dogs are:-

Bitches cycle around once every six months starting from around six to twelve months of age. The first signs are drops of watery blood from the vagina, and swelling of the vulva. The bleeding lasts for 7-10 days, followed by a 5-10 day period when she is most receptive to mating.

When "on heat" bitches release odours called pheromones, producing an attraction for male dogs no six foot fence can deter. The mating process includes a period of "tying" which can last anywhere from fifteen to forty minutes. "Tying" is where the male and female dog become locked together. Many dogs will turn back to back during this process. This is quite normal and they will become "unlocked" eventually.

If you do not wish to breed your bitch, it is best to have her desexed. This can be done anytime from 6 months of age, and also has the benefit of preventing infections of the uterus, and greatly reducing the chance of mammary cancer. Desexing does not make dogs fat, only overfeeding will, once dogs are desexed, their metabolism slows down, so you do not need to feed them quite as much.
