

MATTHEW HAYDEN'S REPORT

Well, ladies and gentlemen, it's that time of the year when individuals ike me, have to put on our politicians hats and ask you to consider oting. This time round it will be less painful because of the postal oting system, which requires no more than a few ticks or crosses, and a quick stop at your local postal box. The last two years has been educational, exciting, intense, emotional, disappointing, but most of ill, worth the effort. When you become a Councillor it tends to be over a single issue, or maybe a few local problems that you feel strongly about, but once you enter the Council arena you are confronted by 10 other Councillors who themselves have many issues o be dealt with, you have City of Munno Para issues, regional issues ind in some cases State issues confronting you. All of these issues need input from elected members as representatives you the public nave chosen and this tends to take up a lot of time you may otherwise have spent on the issues facing just your own ward. I believe that if given a score card out of 100, I would be willing to score myself 80. Now that begs the question, of what could have been done better and know certain issues could have been handled better with more experience, but this term of office is like an apprenticeship, and as my tradesman will tell you, it takes practice to become a professional, and with your help I shall do just that. With limited unds, the help of community groups such as the OTH Progress Association, CFS and many individuals, I believe much has been schieved in the past 2 years, for instance the Mayor and I battled to eal the remainder of Williams Road, success in getting Tyeka Dve. sealed, earthworks on Shillabeer Rd, renovation of the OTH nstitute, paths and landscaping to the township (still in progress), najor landscaping and play equipment to Grandview Dve/Hillbank ongoing), landscaping to Springvale Heights Estate (ongoing), supporting CFS requests for funding and equipment and so many smaller issues that need to be mentioned. I am an environmentalist,

conservationist, developmentalist (if handled correctly), and community minded person, and have always made myself available to discuss any problem that should arise, whether I agree or not. In Council my attention is drawn to planning, engineering, environmental and social issues, of which I have been successful in implementing and tabling of motions, policies and solid democratic debate. There is no question in my mind as to the level of commitment I have given to the ratepayers of the OTH Ward. I spend anything from 5hrs p/wk, up to 25hrs p/wk working for the residents of Munno Para and if re-elected I shall continue that commitment. I am not a publicity seeking politician, but rather an independent individual with no political aspirations other than to tidy up my own backyard (Munno Para), before I attempt to tell others what to do. If you need me I am available, but otherwise I just get on with the task at hand. The new City of Playford will require all the elected members to double their efforts and the issues will be important, with regards how the new city grows, and that is where my experience should stand me in good stead. For those of you who do not know me, I am married to Pauline (13yrs) and have two lovely children Thomas and Kate. Both children attend Trinity College, where I have been involved with the Grounds Committee. I am employed by a packaging company at Regency Pk, SA Toyo Paper. Currently I am studying Natural Resources Management at Gawler TAFE and also hold a Certificate in Real Estate Sales. I am a member of the following committees although some more than others, MP Greening Committee, MP Environment Portfolio, Virginia Expo Committee, Para Group (CFS), Fire Prevention Committee, Hills Face Network, Waste and Pollution Action Group, OTH Progress Association, MP Soccer Club and an ongoing member of the Medlow Rd Landfill protest group. Please consider my credentials above when filling out your ballot paper and if you feel I have performed well in my first 2 years, then I would be pleased to serve you for the next 3 years. An issue brought to my attention during this month, and requiring immediate action is the OTH Primary School and traffic problems raised by the school council. They would like me to make you aware of parking correctly, U-turns performed at the correct location, and speeding along McGilp Rd. Try to remember that these children rely on you to do the right thing by them, and it could be your child or someone you know that ends up being hurt. LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

The presence of the road from Salisbury and Smithfield/Williamstown encouraged the construction of the One Tree Hill Inn in 1851. Always on a minor road, its life as an Inn was shortlived. As Martin Lindsell points out in another article this was where the Munno Para Council was formed in 1853. It closed in 1859 and after this was used as a farmhouse. This house is still standing. It's on the right hand side of Black Top Road going towards the township just past the turn off to Yorktown Road. The actual township is about 2k from the Inn which may have accounted for its demise. 

township of One Tree Hill had a post office and general store. The Precolumb School operated near the township which was replaced by the Uley School eventually. By 1864 the locality had a population of farmers with a clerk, storekeeper, shoemaker, mason and blacksmith residing here. A methodist Church was built in 1867 and in that year the area was described as an agricultural and winegrowing district with a public pound. In 1862 the Observer newspaper gives a description of Mr Innes' farm at One Tree Hill. He farmed 300 acres growing wheat, corn and ryegrass and ran some dairy cattle. He had a problem getting female servants to milk all his cows so he sold them(the cows not the servants!) and got a flock of 300 sheep. He cleared all the timber on the land using a lot of it to build his house . However there were a lot of dairy farmers in the area. John Bowman of 'Garden Creek' produced butter and bred dairy cows in 1909.(from the Munno Para Heritage Survey). History notes researched by Jill McLatchie)

VETERINARY NOTES FOR APRIL

Its been a long hot summer and a great breeding season for mosquitoes. Now would be the time to review your pets heartworm routine status. As you probably know heartworm is a disease in which worms live in the chambers of the heart ofyour dog and cat.

Treatment can be harsh, expensive, and in some cases fatal.

Prevention is better than cure. Testing for heartworm is done in house and only takes around 10 minutes for a result. If your pet is clear of heartworm disease it can start on the preventative taken once a month. If your pets routine has lapsed over the past few months, now is the time to test. Puppies and kittens can be started on prevention from 6 weeks of age. Older dogs and cats should be blood tested before starting. Dr Alan M.Irving, AL-RU FARM

CHILD SAFETY ON FARMS

On 2 December a talk was given at Gumeracha Hospital by Warren Sutton of the SA Farmers Federation, about child safety on farms. This subject has particular relevance for people in One Tree Hill. All children who live on a farm or who visit a farm are at risk from injury. Toddlers aged 0-4 are at particular risk from drowning, kicks from animals, poisoning or tractor run over. Children aged 5-14 are at greatest risk from falls from machinery, tractor rollovers and runovers, motorcycle related injury, horse related injury, asphyxiation and fire arm related injury and noise induced hearing damage. Boys, particularly, aged 10-14 are at greatest risk. Adolescent girls are often injured in horse related accidents while boys are often affected by motor cycle accidents. Children are often assumed to have greater knowledge or judgement than they do in fact possess. Many farm activities may be beyond their physical and /or mental capabilities. This places them at greater risk of injury or death.

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-Caltrop (Tribulus terrestris L)

This is a prostrate hairy summer annual with thin wiry stems from a

central taproot. It can reach out over a metre. The leaves are in opposite pairs, each divided into 4-7 pairs of leaflets. The flowers are solitary on slender stalks at the base of the leaves about 1cm wide with yellow petals. The fruit is a cluster of 5 burrs, straw coloured when ripe. Each burr is wedge shaped, 6-9mm long, with 2 long sharp spines and 2 shorter ones. These burrs are a real problem injuring the feet of humans and stock, causing internal injuries if swallowed, damaging tyres, and contributing to vegetable fault in wool. If grazed by sheep it can cause nitrite poisoning and photosensitization. Hand hoeing small patches is effective, but make sure you gather and burn all fruiting plants. Seed germinates from late Spring to Autumn. Get advice about suitable sprays from the Adelaide Animal and Plant Control Commission.

This is a school function which is held once a year in October. It revolves around a football match with a rival school. It's not always the same school.
