BIRD CARE NEWS

Are we smarter than geese? Has anyone ever said to you after some unbelievable silly behaviour or poor judgment call in a situation, that you have about as much sense as God gave a goose? I would like you to consider the following facts about geese and see if we might learn something from them.

Fact 1:- As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the

bird following, and by flying in "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson 1:-People who share a common direction can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are travelling on the thrust of one another.

Fact 2:- Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the "lifting power" of the bird immediately in front.

Lesson 2:- If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go and accept their help as we help others.

Fact 3:-When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

Lesson 3:- It pays to take turns at the hard tasks and sharing leadership with other people. When we do this we all remain strong and able to do our best.

Fact 4:- The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those upfront to keep up their speed.

Lesson 4:- We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging and not something else.

Fact 5:- When a goose gets sick or wounded, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it is able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own, with another formation to catch up with the flock. Lesson 5:- If we have as much sense as geese, we too will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR MAY

Is your cat safe this winter?

Your most precious pet could be at risk this winter. However, simple precautions can help to make your cat's life safe, warm and comfortable.

Cat flu is one of the most prominent infectious diseases of cats. There are two types of cat flu and both can range from mild to potentially fatal. The first signs of cat flu are usually sneezing and then a watery eye discharge. The cat will also become lethargic and will often stop eating. Kittens and Siamese and Burmese breeds suffer severely from cat flu but every cat is at risk.

The most simple and effective way to protect your cat is regular vaccinations at 6-8 weeks and 12-16 weeks. A yearly booster is then required to keep your cat safe from cat flu.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I refer to the query re Justices of the Peace(JP) in the area and draw your attention to the following information for your readers.

- 1. Police Stations have JP lists and should be able to supply people with details of JPs in their area.
- I am a JP and therefore my name should be added to the Grapevine list.

3. A problem frequently encountered by JPs is signing documents where it states that the person(s) is well known to the JP. These are normally documents dealing with land and property transaction and the method is called the "Short Proof". For this reason it is preferable that people go to JPs known to them, for I know from experience, refusing to sign because a person is not well known to you is usually not well received. Naturally there is the alternative "Long Proof" method where a third person, well known to both parties, is brought in at the time of signing. This process has to be planned in advance so all parties agree and can be present together.

Rotary"Project Robin" was introduced to members at a recent meeting by project chairman Barry Barratt. "Robin" is Rotary Native Bird Nestbox Project, and aims to make and supply nestboxes for birds, reptiles, bats and possums, working with local communities and landholders. Particular attention was drawn to Kangaroo Island's Glossy Black Cockatoo, which has endangered status. Nearer home, Sulphur Crested Cockies, Rosellas, possums and some species of ducks also need our support. Land clearance of large trees with suitable nesting hollows, and competition from colonies of feral bees in sometimes up to 95% of available nest sites, has made breeding particularly difficult for sections of our wildlife. Once in place nestboxes are monitored regularly to make sure that "undesirables" have not moved in (starlings, bees etc.)

Our Member of Parliament, Mr Neil Andrew will be addressing the Club at our meeting on May 7th. Mr Andrew will talk on current items of interest and take part in discussions of a non political nature. Come and join us for an interesting and enjoyable evening. Total Fire Ban Season 1st December 1996- 30th April 1997 Fire Ban Season: The fire ban season will finish on 30th April 1997. As from May 1st 1997, burning is allowed outside the township. Please continue to use common sense whilst burning during the next month or so while it is still dry. Residents in the township are reminded they are not to light fires at any time of year. This ruling comes under the Council's compliance with the Clean Air Act.

An extract from the poster/media articles issued by CFS Headquarters: We would like to extend a special thanks to all our CFS volunteers and their families and to the individuals and businesses that supported them during the States emergencies throughout the fire danger season. Without your help either as a volunteer or as a business or individual that supports their local Brigade more lives would be lost, many more people injured, and homes and properties wildlikfe and native vegetation would be destroyed. We thank you sincerely.

CFS Headquarters will be holding an end of the fire danger season promotion on 2nd May. This will involve interviews with the media outlining the many services CFS provides and acknowledging the support of other emergency services etc. One Tree Hill Brigade has been asked to be a part of this day so look out for a few local faces when you see the promotion. Smoke detectors: Please heed all the warnings of how smoke detectors save lives. Don't think the smoke/ coughing would wake you to warn you of a fire in your house. MEET OUR COMMUNITY-RUTH IRVING

Ruth was born in Germany and came out to Australia with her family when she was eight. They lived in Modbury which was only a small place then. She met Alan at this time as he had just set up his veterinary clinic in Modbury and she was the first girl who worked for him. It was a part time job for Ruth to earn money to keep her horse. Romance did not blossom at this stage however. Ruth went to Melbourne for six years and then overseas for a year. It was during this time that Ruth developed her love for antiques. Ruth returned from overseas because her father was very ill. Ruth and Alan met again and later married. They went overseas and Ruth collected a container of antiques, prompting Alan to suggest she open an antique shop which she did.

Ruth and Alan bought Al-Ru Farm from Doug and Phyl McKenzie 15 years ago. The McKenzies are a well known pioneering family in One Tree Hill. ENVIRONMENT REPORT

It's 12 months since Progress Association held the public meeting to discuss and compile a set of ideas to guide the development of our town and so this is a good opportunity to look at how far we've come. There were 6 main directions identified for the 1996-7 budget.

- Top priority was to rebuild the Mc Gilp Arch. This is now in place (permanently this time we hope!) and the new wall is almost completed. Stone has been used as the building material to match the new structure to the face of the old hall. Several people have asked why the lines have been marked between the stones. The builder did this after examining the old hall and finding that lines were there originally but many have disappeared as the mortar has deteriorated. (You can still see some.) One day perhaps we may be able to repair and restore the face of the hall. As planned, pillars will be built around the arch supports for extra strength to complete the wall.
- 2. Paths in the reserve off Lorna Court have been made so that children have an all weather track to school.
- 3. Undergrounding the power lines in the main street. Council supported the request and wrote to ETSA and the proposal is now in the "design phase". This means design and costing.
- 4. The village green.

Plans for this were progressing but have been put on hold pending the outcome of a suggestion to Council that this area be used for the development of some senior citizen units. A quote of \$13,000 was given by council to relocate the hopper to the back of the institute but no decision has been made on this.

5. Tidy and plant the entrances to the township with particular attention to the Precolumb Rd/Blacktop Rd corner with a bay for

Planting of Jordon Dr has been done and is scheduled for Rose Ave. A retaining wall will need to be built to preserve the soil around the large gum which is a feature of the entrance island to

Rose Ave. The Precolumb Rd/Blacktop Rd corner has been assessed by the council's engineers. It will be quite expensive and so has been recommended for consideration the next roads budget.


6. Follow up with the equestrian club re proposals for trails. Council began the contact, but the equestrian club contact person was overseas at the time. Further follow up is required.

Other matters:

- · The roadside island in front of the Institute will be removed soon to enable more parking in front of the hall. On market days however, this will be a non parking zone to enable cars to queue for the hopper entrance.
- At the March meeting, Progress agreed to pursue removing the islands altogether and planting the main street with attractive trees. Council has advised we wait until the undergrounding of the powerlines.
- Blackberry bushes have been noticed along the OTH Rd just north of Harvey Rd.. Council has been notified but keep your eyes out for other outcrops as these are a noxious weed.

Mobile phone tower for OTH

Have you heard that TELSTRA intend building a mobile phone tower in this area, the preferred site being at the corner of Precolumb and Johnson Rds? Progress Association has written to Council to suggest use of one of the other possible sites (at the Blacktop Rd Sub Station) even though it is not favoured by Telstra as the range is not as good. We are very concerned about possible health risks associated with these towers. If you have concerns, contact our new Playford Council.


ATCV
