ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

Two major subjects dominated this month's Progress Association Meeting. Hans Van Heuven and Councillor Mike Stevens brought us up-to-date on the proposed 'phone tower and possible future developments. There is more about this elsewhere in this issue. The other matter was the agreement to change the rubbish hopper day to the second Saturday in each month, beginning in August. Our thanks to Vince Cozzitorto and his fellow CFS volunteers for agreeing to this change, and to Playford Council who will implement it. This should considerably lessen the traffic congestion on Country Market days. During discussion of this matter we were surprised and disturbed to hear of the attitude of some members of the community who use the hopper. We regained the hopper service after it had been withdrawn because of abuse by some users, only on condition that its

future use would be strictly supervised. The only group able and willing to do this was the CFS. They looked upon it as a valuable community service, which it undoubtably is and as a fund raiser by way of donations for services rendered. While some people are said to be "over generous" and others are happy to make an appropriate donation, a small minority of people refuse to donate anything or reluctantly toss in 20c or so after the volunteers have unloaded their trailer or ute for them. The frequent remark is -"I pay my rates, why should I pay again?" The answer is of course that you do pay your rates, as do all people in all other areas. They, however, also pay a pretty steep fee to dump their rubbish, irrespective of how much the pay in rates. If the CFS volunteers eventually get tired of being taker for granted by some users and decide not to supervise the hopper an longer, we will lose the service altogether. Everyone will then be faced with a long drive to the Council dump and a considerably higher than a reasonable \$4 to \$5 which many are happy to give. Let appreciate what we've got and show due consideration to those who give their time and energy to make the facility available to all in One Tree Hill. MIKE STEVENS REPORTING BACK

Firstly, I would like to thank you for supporting me in the election for the City of Playford. The new Council has met 3 times since May and has had 2 Committee meetings. I sit on the Community & Corporate Services Committee - this community is considers policy and procedure matters and oversees the organisational side of the Council's operations. The Council's main focus to date has been on the issues of combining two existing organisations and ways of working into one. It is taking time for this to happen and there are still some teething troubles. The will is certainly there! I have been directly involved with a number of issues concerning our area -the rubbish hopper/market congestion, moving the 80kph sign by Jordar Court and several maintenance problems with the Institute. The firs two are covered elsewhere in the Grapevine so I won't go into detail here.Regarding the mobile phone towers, the last information to han is that OPTUS are preparing to go ahead at the Precolumb Rd/Johnston Rd site but would consider moving the site onto the Hughes property providing they could be guaranteed no objections from the community or the Council. I have written to the Council saying that the Progress Association at its last meeting expressed the desire to have the tower built on the Hughes property. We now have to wait and see what the OPTUS response is TELSTRA have told the Council that they want to use the CFS site in the middle of the township and that any oher location is unacceptable to them. The Council have written back saying that the CFS site is unacceptable and asking them to co-locate with OPTUS. The feeling in the community is that if OPTUS go ahead at Precolumb Road, TELSTRA will be asked not to co-locate. The problem is that, until

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later this year, the wishes of the communiy do not have to be considered by either carrier which leaves us with no option but to appeal to their community spirit and commercal good sense. Please contact me if you want more information or if you have an opinion to express. I can also report that there will be a feasibility study into the, proposed Senior Citizens accommodation in the next year and that the conditions under which the Trinity College Bush Campus was granted permission will be formalised and enforced. There are two issues coming up with which I will need your help. The first is the Community Events calendar for 1998 and would ask you to contact either the Council directly or myself with the dates proposed for any and all events being planned and with requests for Council support either financial or in kind, or both. We need this information to draw up a calendar and for budgeting. The second is the question of community contribution to the maintenance of facilities used by groups (the "user pays" principle). I am quite concerned about the viability of a large number of community groups should this be introduced completely, and about the effects of the removal of such recreational and sporting activities on the health and wellbeing of the community. I will be contacting all such groups in our area to discuss the impact of this on them so that I can present the best arguments against this proposal. In preparation for the acceptance of the budget on the special Council meeting on 1st July, the Councillors and Staff met at the Blacksmiths Inn on the 28th/29th June for a workshop. At this we considered the budget, the transition plan and the strategic planning process. The transition plan documents the actions Council will take over the next 12 months while the longer term strategic plans are developed. I can only be your representative on the Council if you make me aware of the issues, concerns and problems which face our community. I also can only support any projects, events or ideas you have if I know about them. So please contact me at any time on 8280 7152 or 018 844


ENVIRONMENT REPORT

In response to a reader's request for information on local trees and plants, Anne Dealtry kindly agreed to contribute to our environment column this month and has this to say:

Local eucalyptus of the One Tree Hill/Para Wirra area include: Eucalyptus leucoxylon, Eucalyptus fasciculosa, Eucalyptus goniocalyxx, Eucalyptus camaldulensis and several other large gums that have naturalised in the district. None of the above species are suitable to plant near houses or power lines, but make great paddock specimens. Here are a few suggestions for local plants that would be suitable in the house garden: Prostanthera behriana (Native Mint Bush); Dianella revoluta (Flax Lily); Acacia pycnantha (Golden Wattle - also the Australian emblem); Banksia marginata (Silver Banksia); Correa reflexa (Native fuchsia); Dodonaea viscosa (Native Hop Bush). Some of these plants will be hard to track down as many of the local species are very difficult to propagate. The following native trees are not local species but do very well in gardens in OTH. They have the advantage of not being too big or getting into plumbing etc.. Hakea laurina (Pin Cushion Hakea); Callistemon (Gawler Hybrid) Eucalyptus lansdowneana (Pt lincoln Mallee) Eucalyptus forrestiana (Fuchsia Gum). These are all bird attracting species.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

Our One Tree Hill Institute is a focal point for our community and has been for a long time. William Kelly had purchased part of Section 4193, comprising 71 acres in July 1882. He sold it to Edward Arthur Kelly in December 1891 who in turn transferred a small portion of

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it(measuring 200x250 feet) to a group of men including William Kelly, John Sladden Harvey, Peter Dungay Taylor, Frank Lomer Ifould, Rudolph Fiebig, John Hutchings and George and William James Bowman on 6th March 1906. This group were the trustees for the One Tree Hill Institute, the building of which commenced in late 1906. The foundation stone was laid by Edward Kelly on 7th November 1906. The Institute was completed at a cost of around 600 pounds, which had been loaned by Arthur Thomas, and was constructed of stone quarried from a property on Cornishman's Hill Road. The Institute building replaced the Precolumb School as the local social gathering place, and originally had a raised stage at one end, with change rooms undernath. The basement room was later used as a library. The hall was used for a variety of functions including dances, meetings and sporting activities. The supper room on the north side of the hall was completed after the 2nd World War. The addition to the south side was completed in December 1978. After the Second World War a memorial was erected in front of the building to honour local residents who had given their lives in both wars(taken from the Munno Para Heritage Survey) (history notes researched by Jill McLatchie)

SECRETS OF THE ULEY COOK

This little book which you can read at our Uleybury School Museum was sold in aid of the Uley Village Hall in Gloucestershire England. Our Uley was named after this place. Here is a good recipe for all those suffering from aches and pains, an embrocation "good for the joints of man or beast"! "Take half a pint of turps and two eggs. Put in a large bottle, cork and shake until the mixture becomes a cream. Then add gradually 1 pint of vinegar and the mixture is ready for use. It can be improved by adding a small lump of camphor, and it will keep for years." If you want to visit the museum it is open on Sundays between 2.00pm and 4.00pm.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR JULY

Fleas are wingless, blood-sucking parasites which prefer the blood of dogs and cats instead of people. If the animals are not present at feeding time, the fleas will attack humans. Flea eggs are usually laid within 24 hours of a blood meal. They are white and hatch in about a week into a yellowish white larva that can mature into an adult flea in as little as three weeks or as long as two years, depending on climatic conditions. Fleas can survive without a blood meal for up to 17 months. Best breeding conditions for fleas to multiply are between 18 and 27 degrees Centigrade. Most of the fleas life cycle is spent in the environment, not on the animal! Therefore an important part of flea control is proper and thorough treatment of the house and yard as well as the animal itself. Fleas can cause skin allergies through their saliva "reacting" with the victims skin. Flea infestation in the house has nothing to do with being a dirty housekeeper. It is a fact of life that if your pet goes outside into a flea infested yard, fleas will come into the house on your pet. A complete flea programme requires pet, house, and yard to be treated at the same time and at regular intervals. October is an important month to commence a flea control programme. TREES FOR LIFE

One of Trees for Life's main objectives is to put back native vegetation and try to recreate the bush that was once cleared. Local species have evolved in your conditions so they have the best defences against local diseases or insects. Some non local species may appear to do well at first but die prematurely often falling over after 10 or 20 years. Understorey shrubs are very important too. This is because they often harbour the good insects which prey on the damaging type insects. A healthy bushland provides a balance. It's not only the insects which like an understorey. Many of the birds which eat pests like lerps rely on a good understorey for feed. Birds like striated pardelotes, thornbills and honeyeaters consume large amounts of lerps and need to be encouraged. If you have a stand of trees in your paddock with no understorey under them they could be at risk of premature death. If you fenced them off it would encourage natural understorey to develop thereby attracting a bigger range of bird species.(information from Trees for life magazine) On Sunday July 20th at 11.00am there will be a tree planting and Meeting at Cheryls with a BBQ provided. PROTECTION OF BUSHCARE SITE

Council intends to erect'No Horses' signs at strategic points along the southern roadside at Black Top Road between the One Tree Hill Road and Crosshill/Precolumb Road junction. The area concerned has been adopted by Trees for Life volunteers as a Bushcare Site and is being cared for with the aim of protecting and nhancing the remnant native vegetation which is present on this site(39 species to date.) The main threats to this vegetation are rabbits, weeds and soil erosion. The impact of hard hoofed animals on this site is contributing sigmifcantly to erosion of the sandy soil(part of a relic dune formation) and trampling of smaller species adjacent to the worn path. The presence of horses also introduces weeds-manure left can be a source of weed seeds and also causes over fertilisation. Local flora is adapted to low fertility soils; excess fertiliser can kill

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rather than assist the vegetation in this area. Manure must be removed, creating extra work for Bushcare Volunteers. The site is particularly valuable in that it has a high diversity of species, some of which are rare, threatened or vulnerable, and not commonly seen elsewhere on private land due to grazing pressures. Council asks that horseriders in the area respect the work both of Council and local Bushcare volunteers in trying to protect this valuable site, and avoid travelling through the vegetation. Signs will be erected in the near fuure to more clearly define the site.

GARDENING NOTES FOR JULY

Lagerstroemia or Crepe Myrtle is a small deciduous tree which grows to about 4 metres, with long arching flowing branches weighed down with heavy panicles of crinkled flowers. This is a neat tree well suited for our hot summer. It makes a fine show in late summer and with plenty of water will flower on until late autumn when the leaves become very ornamental. The bark is also prettily mottled. Medium pruning in spring is best in our area. Flower colour ranges from pink to mauve. This tree is available from the One Tree Hill Garden Centre for \$15.00. They also have in a large range of fruit trees and ornamentals from \$16.00.

BIRD CARE NEWS

The last duck shoot for the season was held at Bool lagoon on Saturday June 14th. This makes the fifth that has been held this year. All the injured ducks that were rescued by Animal Liberation members from all the shoots were brought to our farm for rehabilitation. This has meant that each month varying numbers of ducks have arrived to be bandaged, injected with anti biotics and lavished with tender loving care. In total 65 ducks have come to our farm, 16 died, so 49 have been rehabilitated. Some will never fly again but they are assured of a happy life either being cared for by members of Bird Care or at Warrawong Sanctuary. While most of the ducks were Pacific Black Duck or Grey Teal, we have also had Mountain Ducks, Pink Eared Ducks and Blue Winged Shovellers. Hopefully this cruel sport will one day be banned.

MUNNO PARA PUBLIC LIBRARY

This is a free community service. It is located at Warooka Drive Smithfield but the Mobile Library comes up to One Tree Hill every Friday and is parked outside the Institute between 2.45pm and 4.15pm. Anyone who is a resident of South Australia can join the Library. Just fill in an application card at the library and provide identification and proof of your address. Children can join too but need their forms signed by a parent or guardian. You might not realise it but the library doesn't just lend books; there are videos, cassettes, CD's as well. Home visits can be arranged to the house-bound. There is also a photocopier and community information service.

WILDLIFE UPDATE

It is very difficult to deter possums from eating your roses and flowers once they get a taste for them, but here are a few suggestions: Hang a small container of dried food(i.e. Nutri-grain breakfast food) from a branch of a tree at night. Put naphthalene

flakes or camphor blocks in sealed containers with holes punched in them(e.g. margarine or yoghurt containers etc.) and hang them around the bushes. Quassia spray(made from chips of bark from the quassia tree and available from some chemists) To make your own spray-boil a packet of quassia chips(from the chemist) in 10 litres of water for two hours. Strain, discarding the chips and reserving the liquid. Add a further 20 litres of water to the liquid. Strain discarding the chips and reserving the liquid. Spray the affected area for 5 consecutive days, and again after rain until the problem is eliminated. Ouassia chips are a natural pesticide but it is also a poison and may make your domestic animals sick, the effect on possums is unknown, but the taste is so foul that they probably would not eat enough to do them harm. Sprinkle red pepper round the bushes. Put a spotlight or party lights to shine on the area for a few nights, as possums do not like bright lights. Unfortunately there is no foolproof way to stop the possums enjoying your choice plants, but if you put a platform(such as an enamel plate nailed to a branch) with a selection of fruit and vegetables on it, they would probably turn their attentions to that, and you would have the pleasure of seeing them feeding and playing.
