

MIKE STEVENS REPORTING BACK

The Councillors and Staff met at Blacksmith Inn at the end of June to discuss the Budget and it was approved on the 1st July. The way it is laid out is different from that done in the past with only the big ticket items being specifically referenced. This does not prevent the expenditure on minor items and these will be done throughout the year. Rest assured that I will keep track of the items of interest to us in One Tree Hill.

The part of the Budget which directly concerns us as Ratepayers is the rates. Some of us will see a small increase in the amount to pay, due to increases in the capital values (by 3.59% on average) and the rate in the dollar by the CPI figure of 3.3%. My rates have gone from \$824.10 last year to \$836.60 (1.52% increase). The State Government's rate capping process allows for small increases and the amalgamation process demands that the rates across the two merged areas be equalised. The amount of the rates to be collected this year will be sufficient to maintain the previous levels of service but is not enough to cover any new projects. Your rates can now be paid quarterly and you will receive the first notice at the end of July.

The changing of the Rubbish Hopper day was addressed promptly and resolved to everybody's satisfaction. The situation will be monitored, and the service will be adjusted if any problems arise.

I was concerned at the tone of the article in the last Grapevine dealing with the Bushcare Site. This matter has not been discussed with me by the relevant council staff and before any decision is made, all the parties concerned will be consulted.

By the time you read this, the meeting about the Mobile Phone Towers will have been held. Please contact me if you didn't attend and want to know what the outcome was.

I would also ask you to contact me with details of Community Events planned for this coming financial year so that we can have them included in the Calendar.

Environment Report

McGilp Drive, tidying up along Precolumb Rd etc.

We will have Jacqui Ayers from Playford Council Parks and Recreation Dept., so that we are made aware of the budget and other issues for our area, and can devise a joint approach.

The telephone towers

Council has sent a postal vote to residents in the township and within a one kilometre radius of the proposed sites to gauge opinion on the proposals. Choice is between 2 options:

- on the CFS site in the township
- multiple towers around the town (2)

Photos are included of 2 sites with the potential towers drawn in. However there is no photo to indicate what the tower on the CFS site would look like, which is disappointing.

Medlow Road Balefill

Progress Association discussed aspects of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) on this development at the August meeting and Angus Massie, Mike Stevens and Ann Davenport agreed to examine it in more detail and prepare a response. Basically, the conclusion was not to support the current proposal on the basis of the EIS which did not resolve a number of issues to our satisfaction eg the size of the site in relation to Australian Standards and the proximity of current and future residents; treatment of leachate and surface water; vermin; the validity of the costings and incomplete background information.

City of Playford



TREES FOR LIFE

In answer to the letter from Lynne Bassani in last months Grapevine, don't be confused! Inevitably there will be some compromises when people choose to build houses in bushland areas, but it would be unfortunate to destroy the things that have attracted us to the area. Some points to consider:

- 1. Native grasses which remain at least partly green through summer, are a much smaller fire hazard than introduced grasses.
- Woody weeds such as olives and broome are a great fire hazard, and everyone would benefit from their removal.
- What is really needed for fire safety is a strip around houses, etc., with a low amount of fuel during the fire danger season. This does not mean the complete removal of all understory in the Gawler and One Tree Hill areas.
- 4. Where understory is removed, most wildlife will disappear, and the health of the large trees will gradually deteriorate. If the path of understory removal is followed, we will lose the rural character which makes our area a pleasant place to live.
- 5. A burn will not be the end of a patch of native bush and if a fuel reduction zone is maintained around your house, it should not be the end of the house either. On the other hand, nothing stops fires on the Ash Wednesday scale.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

A Post Office was established in the One Tree Hill area as early as 1858. Located on the top of the hill on the road that leads past the Inn, the Post Office and General Store formed the nucleus for the township. Before this, postal matters were handled by the One Tree Hill Inn. The store had a large cellar which was used to store local produce and wine. The first Postmaster at One Tree Hill was Francis Buttfield, who was succeeded by R.Fiebig.

In November 1877, a stone storeroom was built on the site. The storeroom was demolished to make way for a new group of shops in the 1980's, and the post office building was incorporated into their construction.

There used to be a manual telephone exchange at the Post Office. Many older residents will know the late Mrs Hicks who, with her husband, ran the Post Office and General Store from 1942 until his death in 1969, and then Mrs Hicks continued on alone until 1973. People don't seem to stay running the Post Office and General store for quite so long these days, do they! (History notes researched by Jill McLatchie)


MARKET REPORT




VETERINARY NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

Skin irritation in dogs

One of the most frustrating things to watch is a constantly scratching dog. Allergies are the major cause of this scratching, with a large percentage being an allergy to fleas. Getting any flea problem under control is the obvious first step in treating this problem, however stopping what is called the "itch-scratch-itch" cycle can also be very important. This is especially the case where the dog has a more generalised allergy. The act of scratching itself damages the skin, causing the local release of inflammatory or "allergic" agents which then produce further, and often severe irritation.

Traditionally we use cortisone as a treatment which works by blocking the formation of these inflammatory agents in the skin. Most itchy dogs respond well to cortisone, and many are kept on long term therapy, however there are some side effects which can occasionally be serious.

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-BRIDAL CREEPER

This is a light green hairless perennial climbing plant with thin twining stems to 3 m long. It has a dense fibrous root system with many underground tubers. Its leaves are oval, pointed, 2-3cm long, shiny and parallel-veined. Small white flowers are produced along stems in the early spring, which turn into red berries containing several seeds. The flowers will be appearing now. The problem with this plant is that it invades native scrub and forest forming a dense cover which kills shrubs and ground flora. Landowners are required to control bridal creeper on their properties and may be asked to defray costs of control on adjoining road reserves. You need to pull it up or spray it now, don't wait until the berries form. You will probably need to do this each year to exhaust the tubers.
