

ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

Recently I represented Progress Association at a meeting to discuss the proposed curtailment of horse riding on the verge of Blacktop Road between Crosshill Road and One Tree hill road. Others at the meeting were Bob Pitt(Playford City Council), members of the Trees for Life Bushcare group and local horse riders.

Many suggestions were made, none of them entirely satisfactory to the interested parties. It was finally decided to meet again on a Saturday morning so that possible alternatives could be explored by daylight. More on this later.

At October's Progress meeting it was agreed to actively pursue the re-furbishmant of the War Memorial in front of the Institute. This will include cleaning the stone and re-gilding the lettering. We feel that everyone will agree that this is a worthwhile project.

Thanks to Derek Butler from McGilp Road who responded to our request for ideas to tidy up the road. Council has been approached, as a first step, to remove the many dead shrubs along the road and, perhaps, to replace them with suitable vegetation at an appropriate time. When that's done we will consider, in consultation with residents and users of McGilp Road, what needs to be done next.

CITY OF PLAYFORD

Local Uleybury resident, Ms Caroline Roberts, is one of three Playford residents who have recently received scholarships to assist them with further study.

The City of Playford Youth Enterprise Program has identified projects that will assist people in the process towards obtaining meaningful employment. This is done in partnership with both educators and local employers. This particular scheme, which has been developed in conjunction with Para Institute of TAFE, is just one of the City of Playfords' initiatives aimed at encouraging such local employment opportunities. The scholarships provide an opportunity for individuals to further their education and training beyond what they would otherwise be able to do. This is done with the belief that such opportunities will assist individuals to obtain future employment.

Telephone towers

The City of Playford would like to thank all those who have participated in the Mobile Telephone Towers postal vote. The results are being collated and analysed and will be made available to anyone. The conclusions will be discussed at another public meeting to be arranged during October. Keep an eye out for the date!

Many replies commented on the fact that only two options were given. This was done so that it could be determined the support for a tower in the township versus surrounding areas. The comments many people made concerning possible locations will be considered in the analysis. The main fears of health implications and environmental impact that people made reference to will be further addressed at the public meeting. We do have the opportunity to influence both Optus and Telstra and we will put the community's point of view to them.

NEWS FROM OUR COUNCILLORS

Reporting Back from Mike Stevens

We have the results in from the survey on the Mobile Phone Tower(s). The analysis shows that the community is evenly divided between one tower at the CFS and multiple towers around the country side.

The Council considered the results last week and decided to recommend that the one tower option be adopted. This would benefit the CFS in that they would get a new tower better suited to their needs. There is also a requirement that the any moneys received from site rental be spent specifically on the CFS and on environmental projects in the township, such as the undergrounding of the ETSA power lines. The Council is hoping that this will be acceptable to the One Tree Hill community.

Work has begun on a study of the needs of the community for independent living units for our senior citizens. The study is City wide and will result in a policy which the Council can apply. Hopefully, we will see some movement on the proposal soon.

The Council has been asked to upgrade or maybe rebuild the public toilets behind the Institute. These have been getting progressively worse and are now considered by the Progress Association to be a health risk. There is also some repair work needed on the Institute roof.

The area around the new arch on McGilp Drive needs some attention - I am waiting for a reply from the Council staff. Please contact me on 8280 7152 if you have any matter that needs to be brought to my attention or you think I can help you with.

GARDENING NOTES FOR OCTOBER

Insects

A gardener should tolerate much of the insect life in the garden. The few insects that are seriously destructive can be controlled by moderate methods. Quite often the damage is not serious enough to justify special action, and a natural balance can be reached if some damage is tolerated and the gardener leaves the destruction of the pest to the natural predators of the insect world. For all gardeners it is important to make a distinction between serious damage and the normal day to day blemishes and defects in plants caused by the general activities of insects. Insects provide essential food for birds and animals, many insects are predators of other insects and help to maintain a natural balance.

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
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ONE TREE HILL EQUESTRIAN AND PONY CLUB

Any person who injures or destroys a dog in these circumstances must as soon as possible inform the police and the Council and try to contact the owner of the dog.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Christmas Pudding

Yes it's time to make the pudding and it's not very difficult to make your own. Here is a tried and true old family recipe. You will need 1/2 lb currants, 1/2 lb sultanas, 1/2 lb seedless raisins, 1/4 lb finely chopped candied peel, loz chopped blanched almonds, 1/2 lb shredded suet (the butcher at Craigmore will probably have some), 1/2 lb fresh white breadcrumbs, 6 oz sugar, 6 oz plain flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, pinch salt, 1/4 teaspoon of grated nutmeg, 3 eggs, grated rind and juice of 1 lemon, 4-5 tablespoons of brandy, rum or milk to mix.

Wash and dry dried fruit thoroughly. Mix in a large basin with the peel, almonds, suet, breadcrumbs, sugar and flour, well sifted with the baking powder, salt and nutmeg. Stir well together, then add well beaten eggs, the grated rind and juice of the lemon and the brandy rum or milk. Mix very thoroughly. In our family each person takes a turn to stir the pudding and make a wish. Leave overnight if possible.

Divide the mixture between two well greased pudding basins (approximately two pint size). Cover each top with two layers of greased grease proof paper and alfoil. Tie securely with string. Steam for 6-8 hours. The longer you steam it the darker the pudding. Remove wet covers when cooked and cover with fresh paper. Re-steam for 3-4 hours before serving. This makes two puddings each sufficent for 6 people. If you don't use one this year it will be even more delicious next year.
