
GRAPEVINE



European Wasp- a nasty pest

A One Tree Hill Resident who lives on Paynes Road has recently seen a European Wasp on her premises. She contacted the Council and it seems Brett Hogan has a full time job trying to get rid of the European Wasp in our Council area. He came out very quickly and laid baits for them. They have also been seen on Precolumb Rd and are possibly around in other places in One Tree Hill. If you see them on your property even if they seem to be nowhere near the hou. please report them to the Council so we can eliminate them as much as possible from this area.

Wasps are about the same size as bees but are bright yellow and black. They like both sweet and meat food and will invade picnics and barbecues to find the source. They search backyards, picnic areas, schoolyards, and will crawl into the openings of cans and bottles. They interfere with beehives and ripening fruit on trees also attracts them. The major problem with these wasps is that they sting and unlike the bee they can sting repeatedly. The stings are painful and individuals may also be allergic to them. Also if they crawl into a drink container and sting your mouth or throat the swelling may stop your airway preventing breathing. The greatest danger is if you accidentally disturb a nest when the wasps may swarm out repeatedly stinging the person or animal. The stings pain can be relieved by ice packs, an ammonia solution or bicarbonate of soda. Don't feel tempted to try and swipe a wasp that comes near as they can get very angry.

These wasps are very active in the summer months. During the spring and summer the queen in each nest lays a large number of eggs which hatch into grubs, turn into pupa and become adult workers. This means at the end of the summer the nest could contain several thousand workers and this could become perennial. So its important to:-report any sightings to the Council, avoid leaving any food scraps around, drink from clear glass containers or use a straw, feed pets indoors if possible. Local History notes

Yattalunga Estate at one time comprised of an enormous area of land covering the major part of the South Para River and Tenafeate Creek. The building of the house, a thirty room mansion was begun in 1851 by Philip Butler, uncle of the Hon. Richard Butler, M.P. Building continued for a further three years due to a scarcity of labour caused by the Victorian Gold Rush. Six stone pillars on the lower balcony at the rear of the house, were never completed. The stone used for a major portion of the house was sandstone which was quarried near Humbug Scrub and carted to the site by bullock dray. The hand-tooled stone was originally white but has since weathered to a warm cream. The roof was tiled with imported Welsh slate and the columns supporting the front verandah are solid Huon pine. For many years the residence was known as "Butlers Folly" because Mrs Butler refused to live in such an isolated wilderness!

The 100 square residence featured finely carved oak furniture and fire place mantels, cedar woodwork and a series of arches, each of a different size and shape, in the main passageway. The home was approached by a sweeping circular driveway which enclosed a formal English garden. The property at one time extended from the outskirts of Gawler almost to Para Wirra Park and Humbug Scrub.

**TOTAL FIRE BAN SEASON,
1st December, 1995-30th April 1996**

Call outs: The One Tree Hill Brigade has been kept very busy with numerous fires in the area, and also assisting neighbouring brigades in their areas. We have also been involved in task forces to the Tarlee and surrounding areas fires. We spent an unusual New Years Eve in the flooded areas of Burton, Andrews Farm, Salisbury, etc. sandbagging and pumping flood water away from homes.

We would like to thank residents who have reported smoke sightings, fires or other emergencies by using their road names and also their RAPID numbers as this saves us a few extra needed seconds.

Thank you: Bruce Schulz would like to thank everyone for helping him celebrate his 50th birthday recently with a surprise party and a surprise "guest". He also warns he has a long memory!

Caution: If you are slashing, cutting scrub back, or using tools outside, please take care by not doing these jobs on high fire danger days (i.e. hot and/or windy days) and always having water at hand. Please also note some pump exhausts may spark starting a fire, please have a cleared area around pumps and pump sheds.

BCF Extinguishers: It is now illegal to use the BCF (yellow) extinguishers. Replacement dry powder (Red with a white band) extinguishers can be purchased for under \$25 (for kitchen size) from hardware and department stores. Old BCF extinguishers can be left at the station—we take them to CFS Headquarters who dispose of them "environmentally".

Garden Notes for January.

Acidity and Alkalinity are measured in terms of PH units. The scale ranges from 0 to 14 and PH 7 is neutral,(that is neither acid or alkaline). Acidity increases as the PH falls below 7 and alkalinity increases as it rises above 7. Soils range from about PH 4 for the most strongly acid to about PH 10 for the most strongly alkaline. Although this range of soils covers a number of units on the PH scale it is small when judged by popular concepts of acidity and alkalinity. Even fruit juice with a PH of about 3 is much more acid than any soil. Some plants are sensitive to acid and some are sensitive to alkalinity. On building sites where builders have mixed materials the PH may be altered.

One Tree Hill Garden Centre offers a PH soil testing service and advise on correcting soil PH.

Numbers for our December Meeting were boosted by a group of residents who came to express their concerns about plans, resubmitted to Council by Trinity College, involving the development of a bush campus in the OTH area on the old Tuckwell property. A large part of the meeting was spent hearing and discussing these issues which centred on concerns about:

- * the safety of the road and the inadequacy of proposed alterations
- * fire risk and safety and
- * proposed water supplies which were thought to be inadequate.

Generally it was thought the concept of a bush campus was good but the particular location was unsuitable. As a result of this discussion, Progress Association decided to submit an objection to the proposal so that the above issues would be addressed in making the final decision on the application.

This year Progress Association will have a stall at the Munno Para Australia Day Fair to advertise our community and its special features. Do call in and see us if you are there.

As mentioned in December, Council has funds for streetscaping in the township and is also placing applications for new works projects in our area. Draft plans have been displayed at the shops re the planting of a village green and some of the park areas in the new subdivisions. We have not heard back as yet on some suggested alterations to these plans or the possibility of undergrounding of the power lines in the main street (which would be partly funded by ETSA) but these are matters that will arise in our meetings early in 1996.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR JANUARY

Ever lost a pet?

Each year thousands of animals are lost and many of these never get returned to their original owners. The reason they are not returned is lack of adequate identification. All animals should wear collars with tags attached. We suggest that you have one that gives your name, address, phone number and the pet's name.

Another very good method of identification is the microchip. A small chip is implanted between the shoulder blades and the right ear is tattooed with an "M". This is a permanent means of identification and the animal is simply scanned by the pound to locate the owners.

Use of either one of these methods will ensure a speedier return for a stray pet, should it be picked up by the council, dog catcher or humane society.







residents have all been given the opportunity to speak on this issue and because of their input the first application was refused and I supported that in every way possible. The second application received the same effort and commitment regards debate and notification (85 notices sent out) but this only resulted in 25 submissions being returned of which 1 was in support. A meeting was held for those who had been notified, the night before Council was due to vote on the application and it was from this meeting and 3 long conversations with the CEO Mr. Joe Collins, that I finally decided to give my vote in favor of the proposal. The conditions placed on the College are very strict and I believe that given time the Bush Campus will become a major asset for the City of Munno Para and its residents. To those residents who intend to appeal I sincerely wish you well and I hope, that this issue will not destroy your trust or faith in me to represent you in the future.

In regard to a couple of issues raised in the last Grapevine, I would like to add the following information;

1. Mr. & Mrs. Perryman's letter concerning the OTH water supply or should I say lack of it, has received my fullest attention and after meeting with 4 senior members of Parks & Recreation, we have come up with a list of issues to be addressed immediately and a number of items that will need budget funding before they can be corrected.

2. The issue of traffic intersections throughout the OTH ward, is already being addressed through the Eastern Hills Traffic Study which Munno Para Council commenced this month. The intersection of Karwin/Kersbrook Rds, has already been attended to and options are being considered. I would like more information regarding OTH/Blacktop Rd intersection and your suggested changes/improvements.

Despite being told by NAWMA that we were not actually required to do this, our bin was not returned (unlike the council which picked up and returned bin to the driveway)


It would have been unthinkable to ask the children to retrieve it due to the real risk of their being killed or injured.
