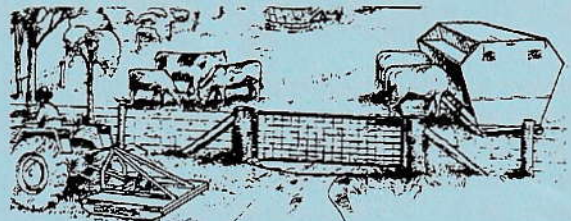
ADULT LITERACY

following list of roads showing where the wasps have been reported: Both sides of Jordan Drive, Little Para Dam, Gulfview Drive, Precolumb, Blacktop Rd, Burnett, Wood Crescent, Back of Blacksmith's Inn, Tyeka Drive, gullies off Yorktown and Walter's Roads, Goulds Rd, Johnson Road and in nearby paddocks, Toolunga Rd, Ifould Rd, all the way along Uley Rd, Viney Drive, Kentish Rd, Crommore Rd, Alexander Ave, Hillbank, Williams Rd, and Kurnajong Rd. If we want to beat this menace we have no time to lose. In about July and August the queens go off in search of a new spot to form a colony. They like to go in roofs, cavity walls, under foundations, in retaining walls and sleepers as well as holes in the ground. We all need to search our blocks in either the early morning or evening, remembering that wasps are capable of travelling more than a kilometre. Report any sightings to the Council. It is a FREE service and they will act quickly. Remember to pick up any fallen fruit, feed dogs inside preferably, and don't leave any uneaten dog food around. Wasps are DANGEROUS PESTS so let's act as a whole community together on this one.

repellent gels. These gels are silicon based but without a setting agent so they remain sticky for a very long time. Many native birds have been caught in these gels getting covered in it and dying a cruel death. It has been the experience of all carers who have tried to help birds which have had contact with these products, that it acts more like a glue than a repellent, as it entraps the birds. All the major voluntary animal welfare groups in the state are working together to try and have this product banned. LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

In the old days in One Tree Hill timber and iron ore were two of the main industries. Bullocks were used for the haulage and for all heavy work, such as ploughing etc. Grain was sown and reaped by hand. The iron ore was taken to Port Adelaide for flux, to smelt with the concentrates from Broken Hill. One Tree Hill benefitted from the opening of the Lady Alice Mines in Humbug Scrub as Cobb and Co ran a service to them right through One Tree Hill, using the property known as "Milton Bank" as a stopover point for a change of horses. The first boiler that was transported to the Lady Alice Mine took six weeks from the time it was unloaded in Port Adelaide until it reached the mine. one hundred bullocks were used in the haulage.

GARDEN TIPS FOR MARCH

Powdery Mildew is a group of related fungi producing a white or light grey powdery coating on leaves, buds, flowers fruit, or young shoots of a wide variety of plants including Crepe Myrtles, Roses, Grapes, Azaleas and Snapdragons. Attacks are in summer and autumn beginning as faint white spots and gradually spreading to cover wide areas of the plants surfaces, causing distortion and defoliation. Spores spread by wind from plant to plant. They need moisture in which to germinate, but once started will continue to grow in dry conditions. As soon as the disease is noticed, coat plants with sulphur dust.

ADVICE FOR PROSPECTIVE EXCHANGE STUDENTS BY NIPADA TANTIRAKROT

Nipada is a Rotary Exchange Student from Thailand currently staying in One Tree Hill and attending Craigmore High School. Some of you may be thinking about applying to be Exchange Students and Nipada would like to tell you about being on an Exchange. She first heard about going on an exchange when her Dad gave her the application forms and she wanted to be an Exchange Student because it would give her a lot of experience that she could not get from her own country. She thinks it is hard to go far away from your home and live with people that you have not known before. For the first month she really missed home but after that she has enjoyed the experience very much. She has had nice host parents and has got good friends and has learnt lots of different things which she had never learned before. When she goes back to her country she will be able to speak English really well and she can get better jobs she hopes! If you go to a country that doesn't speak English, don't worry about it because they will try to help you and teach you all you need to know, including swearwords!! Also you must be prepared to fit in with the customs and rules of your host families, which is not always easy! Rotary also has rules for student behaviour when overseas because the students become ambassadors for their country and Australia will be judged on the student. RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Yvonne D'Antignana has again sent in a terrific recipe for a fabulous dessert called Mother McKay's Heavenly hash. For the filling you will need 1 small can of crushed pineapple, 1 pack of marshmallows, 2 bananas, 3oz chopped dates, 2oz glace cherries quartered, 1 pint of cream, whipped. Combine the pineapple and marshmallows cut in quarters, and let them stand until the marshmallows have dissolved or heat gently. Stir in sliced bananas, dates and cherries and fold through whipped cream. Chill until firm. Now at this point you can cheat and use bought meringue bases or you can make your own as follows: You will need 4 egg whites, 9 oz caster sugar, vanilla essence, half a teaspoon white vinegar, 4oz hazelnuts browned. Line a greased baking tray with greaseproof paper, grease again and dust with equal quantities of icing sugar and cornflour. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually adding the sugar. Beat until the sugar is dissolved. Lastly add the essence, vinegar and nuts and fold through. Pipe or pile on the tray in 8 three to four inch shells. Bake in a slow oven 300 degrees fahrenheit for 40 to 50 minutes. Cool in the oven. Fill with the prepared pineapple mixture and serve immediately with bowls of fresh strawberries dusted with icing sugar. (Thanks Yvonne, it sounds really yummy).

VETERINARY NOTES FOR MARCH

Cancer in pets: You may think that just the mention of cancer means that your pet will not live long. Treatment is available for certain types of cancers or tumours. There are reports of pets that have lived

up to two and a half years after having malignant tumours removed. These pets enjoyed life completely and gave their owners much happiness and joy. Preventive health care programs are important in detecting disease early. As your pet matures we recommend a thorough yearly physical examination with a yearly vaccination. Pets with a history of disease problems will need more regular checkups. Blood tests, X-rays and other tests will be required to give more information in helping to detect and diagnose any problems in your pet. Biopsies of suspicious lumps will need to be evaluated by veterinary pathologists. They check for evidence of malignancy. We recommend that any lumps be checked for irregularities before they get to a stage when treatment may not be effective.

Agenda items of interest from our February council meeting are as follows;

1. Tyeka Drive residents have lodged a petition requesting the sealing of their road during the 1996/97 budget year. The road is rated a high priority in the current unsealed road program and so has my full support. I spoke at length on the need to maintain our (councils) current program of sealing roads and not to be swayed by public emotion, which can result in who shouts loudest wins. Tyeka residents have waited a long time and given the programs stated intent to seal

2. Rosefield Gardens Retirement Village has received Council approval for the project to proceed. This development at Smithfield will have 285 units of high quality design, built to meet the needs of our aging population and having seen the plans, I believe it will become a great asset to the city residents.

3. A Health Care Complex at Smithfield has also been approved which should compliment the Retirement Village perfectly.

4. A land division application in OTH has been refused at a considerable cost to the proponents both financially and emotionally. Although no blame can be laid at any one persons feet, I would like to stress the importance of speaking to me if you intend making a non-complying or unusual application to Council. My duty is to represent you the ratepayer, and if that means saving you time, money and worry, then surely I am worth, at least a phone call.

5. The European Wasp problem continues to alarm many residents and with that in mind I have requested Council write to the relevant Federal, State and Local Govt. representatives. The request seeks more funding, a State policy and the upgrading of the current importance of controlling this possibly life threatening insect.

6. The Council has appointed Mr. Rex Smith as Fire Prevention Officer on a temporary basis and I hope, you will all join me in wishing him well in performing what can be a rather difficult job. He has already issued some 60 Section 40 notices across the district so be warned and clean up.

This money has enabled us to do the upgrading of the building (with the installation of airconditioning) and the surrounds-changes that have been ongoing over the past few years. We are now wanting to organise a special event to acknowledge this bequest and the improvements this has financed. More news of this later as the plans emerge.
