EUROPEAN WASP- a serious ONE TREE HILL PROBLEM

European wasps remain a serious problem in our community. We all need to co-operate together to find their nests. They have very direct flight patterns from their nests and food sources. They fly up to 500 metres from the nest in search of food and go directly back to the nest once food has been obtained. When looking for the nest you will see only an entrance hole with wasps flying in and out. The nest normally cannot be seen. You will need to observe which way the wasps fly during day light hours. Warm calm sunny days are probably the best conditions for observation. Put out food sources such as canned tuna fish for wasps to collect. This makes them easier to see in flight and to track the nest. The food should be placed in a safe place away from children and pets that can be easily observed. Establish the direction the wasps are flying in and move in that direction. Keep relocating your food source in the direction the wasps are heading. If they fly over your neighbours fence, notify your neighbours and work with them to locate the nest. The nest could be in the ground, retaining wall, cavity wall, house ceiling, or tree hollows. (Any nest constructed of mud are not European wasps) When you've found the nest, DO NOT DISTURB IT: tell your Local Council who will destroy it free of charge.


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

for the eights and the fours in the over 60's section of the

duck shooters in action at Bool Lagoon on the 24th of February . For the first time in South Australia, TV camera crews went out into the lagoon among the shooters and were able to film the shooters dogs attacking swans. At least 4 swans were mauled, 3 being killed. The Tv also showed some graphic footage of the injuries which shotguns inflict on our native wildlife during this" so called "sport.

Major conservation groups like the Australian Conservation Foundation and the Wilderness Society have joined forces with the RSPCA, Animal Liberation and the Bird Care and Conservation Society to form the Duck Defence Coalition and are taking part in a major petition. Some of you have already signed this petition at the One Tree Hill Market and it will be available for others who may wish to sign at Jill's market stall on Saturday April 6th.

Editors note: I received 10 injured birds from this shoot for possible rehabilitation. All were severely transatized. One was dead on arrival, one died shortly after. Of the remaining 8 only 3 recovered sufficently to be released. The rest died. I would like to express my thoughts on this subject with the following poem:



LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

Can you imagine what it was like to be a pioneer settler in One Tree Hill? Imagine a wild unknown country, harsh climate, little or no equipment or machinery, just their own strength and determination. Many were new to working the land and they had to build their own houses, fence with post and rails which would have to be split by hand. They might have some bullocks to pull a single furrow wooden plough, a sickle and a flail, wooden harrows and possibly their only transport was a bullock cart. Their homes were probably not too flash, houses made of split logs, plaster up with clay inside, the roof split paling, bark or thatch, with earth floors, the furniture homemade and rough and the cooking utensils few. There is a good picture in the Uleybury School Museum of the first house in the Humbug Scrub Sanctury. Often the bush houses would have large fireplaces which could take big logs in the winter. The houses would be lit by tallow candles, no electricity in those days. It must have been hard at night for the woman of the house to do her sewing in such a dim light, yet she probably made all her families clothes in this way. After all those efforts of the early pioneers to clear the land they would probably be horrified at the push to plant lots of trees back again!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Tony Myles is pleased to share a marinade that cannot miss. It's used with beef, lamb or chicken. You will need-1/2 cup of olive oil;3/4 cup of soya sauce;1/2 cup wine; 1/3 cup lemon juice;2 cloves of garlic chopped finely or pressed; 1 tablespoon worcestershire sauce; 1 teaspoon dried basil;1 tablespoon parsley flakes. Combine all the ingredients and pour over the meat. Marinate 3-4 hours or overnight. Cook over charcoal or barbecue or grill. (Thanks Tony, it sounds great. Contributions to this column welcome)

VETERINARY NOTES FOR APRIL

A healthy pet is a happy pet. To ensure your pets stay healthy we recommend regular care and close attention to any hint of ill health. We suggest you seek assistance if your pet shows any of the following signs:

- *Abnormal discharges from the nose, eyes or other body openings.
- *Loss of appetite, marked weight losses or gains, or excessive water consumption.
- *Difficult, abnormal, or uncontrolled waste elimination.
- *Abnormal lumps, limping, or difficulty getting up or lying down.
- *Excessive head shaking, scratching, and licking or biting any part of the body.
- *Dandruff, loss of hair, open sore, and a ragged or dull coat.

TREES FOR LIFE

The approach is through conservation by collecting seed from original vegetation and growing only indigenous plants. The nurseries are the thousands of backyards of its members-urban dwellers and farmers alike. No financial support for the Free Tree Scheme comes from either State or Federal Governments. PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-SOURSOB

April is the month when the Soursobs begin to sprout afresh. This plant is small ,bulbous and succulent, with clover-like leaves, which are green and often speckled. The flowers are bright yellow. The plant grows from bulbs which are formed in winter and spring. This plant is a problem because it competes strongly with cereal crops and pastures. Its oxalates cause chronic kidney damage to livestock. Treatment is difficult but try and contain it and prevent its spread. Cultivation should be at the bulb exhaustion stage in mid May to early June. Seek advice about suitable sprays from the Pest Plants Commission.



SIMON'S PET CORNER

Simon had his 11th birthday last week (congratulations Simon) and decided to spend his birthday money on a tropical fish tank and 4 tropical fish. Unfortunately 3 of his fish have since died. Simon thinks the trouble was due to not having a big enough filter. The big fish he has left is called a platty. It is orange with black tips on its fins. Simon is going to get one more platty and two neons or "glow in the dark" fish. He feeds his fish on tropical fish flakes taking care not to give too much. When setting up a tank you need well washed gravel, a big filter, heater and thermostat, and you will need to condition the water. 1 level teaspoon of conditioner is needed for every 10 litres of water. Simon has observed that fish sleep floating in the middle of the water and don't rise to the top or sink to the bottom. They don't seem to move their fins either.

Simon did very well with his pigeons getting Champion King at the Golden Grove Show, Champion Utility King, and Young Cock at the Mount Pleasant show, and Champion King, Cock, Hen and Utility at the Mannum Show. That is good news, Simon!

OTH PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

Our March meeting was again a full one.

 David Dunn from the Department for Environment and Natural Resources spoke to us about changes to lot numbers on lands titles in SA. (Some of you may have noticed this on your 1995 rates notices.) In short, the new number will apply to your title but don't change your postal address as the change won't impact on this-at least at the moment. If you want more details, David volunteered to summarise his report for the Grapevine.

The town water supply

This supply got very low over summer and water carting has been needed. Originally the scheme was designed to cater for 40 connections but now has 50, including the school and McGilp oval. A meeting of residents on the scheme is to be held on 6 May in the Institute. Please send any questions you want addressed to Gwyn Cleeves at Munno Para Council prior to the meeting. This will enable him to research any specific information needed to provide an answer. At this meeting we will also raise the issue of provision of water to the township during high fire risk days when the power is off and consequently, the pumps can't operate.

The council's latest drafts of plans for the village green area were presented. The preferred design (i)connected to the Institute grounds and (ii)relocated the rubbish hopper (perhaps to an area just outside the township.) Council has received the insurance money to reconstruct the McGilp Rd Arch that was badly damaged last year. We have decided to use some of the streetscape money to help reconstruct this in a style more in keeping with the hall ie with pillars and ajoining wall in local stone instead Besser brick as before. The council will liaise re the design of the arch itself. We are still eager to locate a photo of the original arch to help this process, so if you are one please contact me or Gwyn Cleeves.

Unfortunately funds for labour market and urban renewal projects have been redirected since the election which means that the proposed playgrounds can't go ahead at this stage. However we are still committed to having an overall concept plan for the township with a range of components eg improving the planting in the main street and undergrounding the power lines, development of a 'village green', playground areas, planting of reserves and creation of walking tracks in the subdivision, planting of entrances into the subdivisions and the town itself, an the equestian trail etc. This will enable us to identify aspects that we can work on over a number of years in stages as money comes available rather than taking a haphazard and uncoordinated approach. Groups in the area interested in small environmental projects eg schools and clubs, could also refer to this plan and perhaps target particular aspects.

We intend organising a meeting of residents to discuss these concept plans once they have been developed. Not all will be formally drawn up as this is too expensive for a consultation stage, where we can expect a number of changes to be made. We shall try to come up with an economical way of capturing concepts that have alreadome up at our Progress Association meetings on this issue so that they can form the basis of this discussion.

Very detailed drawings would probably only be created when the particular area targetted for development had the funding to go ahead.

- An interior wall plaque is being made to acknowledge the bequest from Mrs Clucas that has enabled us to make many improvements to the hall and surrounds.
