



One Tree Hill Progress Association Annual General Meeting 16 May 1996 Annual Report

1995-96 has seen the fruition of a number of plans and some new developments.

- Roadworks to the corner of Yorktown and Blacktop Road have made this intersection much safer-an issue of considerable concern after a serious accident involving two young residents in 1995.
- Upgrading of the cemetery has been completed by the council.
- Our new storage room, with direct and convenient access into the hall, is now completed and in frequent use. This has been a very valuable addition to the facilities of the hall. It was yet another project funded from the bequest monies donated to the Progress Association by Mrs Clucas. Thanks go to members of Progress who put considerable time into the planning and oversight of this project, particularly Richard Wilson. And to assist with the movement of chairs in and out of this storage room, we now have Albert Baggs' very handy chair lifting device!
- Our Community Market continues to prosper and this year we were delighted that it won the award for Munno Para's Community Event of the Year, presented at the Australia Day Celebrations. This is a real credit to all those connected with the market and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their continued involvement and contribution to creating a positive community culture in One Tree Hill, which was one of the main aims of the market concept. Particular thanks go to June Bourne who coordinates the stall holders, David Parker, Progress's liaison with stall holders and our treasurer, Pat Beck who collects fees.
- The Grapevine Newsletter also continues to prosper under the editorial leadership of Jill McLatchie with skilled desktop support from Stephen White and Chris Adlard. This is a good opportunity to formally thank them for the huge amount of time that they give to this task. The paper has grown to 10 pages over this year and provides an informative coverage of local news, garden and veterinary tips not withstanding the odd joke, crazy recipe, brainteaser and snippet of gossip. Through its advertisements it promotes our local businesses and through the newswork of our editor, it introduces members of the community to each other and involves young and old-and those in between. (I particularly enjoy Simon's Pets Corner and the articles from the school children). As such, it too is contributing to the development of a sense of community in One Tree Hill. Thanks go also to the families and local school children who have been involved in the folding and stapling of this paper so that it can be distributed through the mail.

- The improvement of our local environment has been on our agendas a number of times this year with discussions of plans for a village green, relocating the rubbish hopper, an equestrian trail, improved streetscaping including undergrounding of power lines, playgrounds, planting of reserve areas and entrances to the new subdivisions and of course. restoration of the McGilp archway which sadly was demolished one Saturday by the rubbish hopper and eventually replaced only to be demolished again within a week. The upshot of all these discussions and draft plans is the public meeting that is to follow this AGM, aimed at consulting with the community and compiling a set of ideas that can be used as the basis for more detailed planning by council-as funds become available. This will enable a more coordinated and planned approach to local projects.
- We have also had a number of discussions on upgrading the interior of the hall-repainting walls etc and resurfacing and waxing the floors. Following through on this will be one of the projects for 1996.
- Perhaps the most contentious issue that arose this year
 was the application by Trinity College to build a bush
 campus on property off Frank Barker Road. Serious
 concerns were raised by nearby residents mainly
 concerning availability of water, fire danger and traffic
 safety. The first application was refused by council but
 a second application was passed and is now awaiting
 the attention of the Development Assessment
 Commission. Whilst understanding the educational
 benefit of such a concept, Progress Association has
 indicated its commitment to ensuring that the concerns
 of residents are addressed.
- The water supply in the township has been another issue this year, as the town bore has not been able to cope with the increased demand. A number of meetings of users have been held. Of concern also has been the lack of water in the town on high fire risk days when the electricity is turned off and the pumps therefore cannot operate. This is also another issue to resolve in 1996/97.

In the year ahead I hope Progress Association will be able to continue with its existing projects and see some tangible outcomes. It has also been the intention of members to have a special event to acknowledge the Clucas bequest.. A plaque has been purchased to be mounted inside the hall. Planning this event will be one of our tasks for this next year.

Another challenge will be the recruitment of new members. Some of our senior members are now feeling the need to resign from Progress. We thank them sincerely for their long association and support and wish them well. To continue the work of Progress Association and keep it alive in the community, we need to attract new faces and new energies. This may require us to review our meeting procedures and develop some new approaches. I leave this challenge to the committee and members for 1996/97.

Public meeting - a report from OTH Progress Association

About 30 people attended the public meeting on Thursday 16 May which was designed to

- consult with the community re the future park areas, streetscaping etc for our township area and
- compile a set of ideas to be used as the basis for more detailed planning by council, as funds become available.

A range of opinions was collected which will allow us to proceed on some aspects and will give us some directions for further problem solving on others. Here is a summary of outcomes.

1. Streetscaping in the Main Street

All respondents were in favor of

- · undergrounding the power lines in the main street
- tidying and planting the entrances to the town and the subdivisions, with particular attention required to the Blacktop Rd, Precolumb Rd intersection-perhaps with a pull in bay for the school bus

A footpath to the houses in Precolumb Rd was also suggested.

2. Curbside Gardens

Some concerns were expressed

- there should be fewer of them
- they should be relocated away from the commercial area as parking has become a problem
- · they cause problems for people on horseback
- extending them so that they joined the road would give horse riders no where to ride off road and if drains were to run under these extended gardens they might easily be blocked by rubbish, thus causing flooding.

Replanting of remaining curbside areas using native ground covers and trees was favoured.

Another possibility was widening the footpath area when the undergrounding occurred to enable greening of the curbside but using a straight edge concept that did not interfere with parking. Care needed to be taken that canopies of trees would not impede traffic.

3. It was suggested by a resident that signs be erected urging motorists to slow down through the township and that there be more regular radar traps.

4. McGilp Arch and connecting walll

The meeting overwhelmingly agreed that the arch should be rebuilt at its previous location at the entrance of McGilp Rd. An alternative location, at the recreation park entrance, was not supported. There was also general agreement for proposals to build the columns and connecting walls in stone work to match the old hall, and to use a stronger and higher construction to avoid damage. There was definite aversion to using cement blocks, such as Besser block, as a construction material. It was acknowledged that the arch will be a feature of the township and should be constructed accordingly. There was some concern about the cost of construction. Responses to the arch design submitted to Munno Para Council as part of the quotation process were

 lettering was too large and blocky and colour scheme inappropriate

· construct lettering from wrought iron instead

 treate the arch with a natural black metal finish rather than colour.

5. A 'village green' - or 'town park' in the main street

The idea of relocating the hopper to enable the village green/park to abut the institute grounds was accepted by a majority provided that the hopper stayed within the township where it could be closely monitored. Many people did not support relocating the hopper outside the town because they were concerned that this would result in rubbish being dumped at any time. Some did not mind the hopper where it was and prefered money to be spent on other projects.

All were in favour of planting the park area with suitable low maintenance grass and shrubs (minimum water) to create a pleasant central park area. One suggestion was that this be a dry rather than green area.

Watering systems to this park and possibly the traffic island gardens- funds and water permitting was favoured but only if township water was not used, due to current problems in supply.

6. Reserve areas-especially in new subdivisions Planting of the reserve areas, building paths/walking trails where required and planting of the entrances to subdivisions met with general approval. One resident felt roadside foot paths were unnecessary in the new subdivisions.

Playground areas for under 5s at McGilp Oval next to tennis courts (so children were near parents) was acceptable. Older children might be able to use the equipment at the school if current laws allowed this. There was no objection to equipment for older children at other reserve spots, west of McGilp Park.

Equestrian trail

With the increase in traffic through the town, it was appreciated that riders needed safe areas to ride. It was recommended that the following areas be investigated to provide horse and walking access only.

- From Precolumb Rd through Blencowie Rd to Johnson Rd. This then provides a circuit back to Precolumb
- Through the extension of Mc Gilp Rd to Gawler Scenic Route then via the road reserve to the Para Wirra Rd. This would link up with the equestrian trails in the Para Wirra Park and the Tom Roberts trail to Kersbrook.
- Stars Gully Rd.

Issues such as any existing leases and legal liability would need to be addressed. Access can be limited to horses and walkers only, by means of low rails.

Other comments included the need for

- horses to be kept off the western side of Precolumb Rd at the township end to prevent damage to water mains and grassed areas. Create trail along eastern side.
- a safe horse crossing over Blacktop Rd in the vicinity of the township.

Finally, it was agreed that the OTH Progress Association meetings would be the mechanism for consultation with the community regarding future steps with the town planning. These meetings are open to all residents and special agenda items regarding the town planning will be advertised in advance in the Grapevine.

One Tree Hill Primary School News

During the school holidays there was some vandalism to the school bus with some damage to the windows which were etched with a sharp instrument. The Education Department has now asked whether the bus can be kept in a different place which is not so isolated and more secure. If anyone has any ideas or suggestions about suitable places, preferably within the town, please contact the Principal, Irene Simpfendorfer, on 280 7027 as soon as possible. The Child Parent Centre pergolas were also damaged with sections of the shade cloth being cut and torn out. Please contact the school if you have any ideas who the offenders might be. A big thank you to the One Tree Hill CFS who burnt off a pile of rubbish at the school during the holidays. It's great to have their co-operation and support. The school is planning a gardening elective and would be very grateful for any donations of seedlings/plants/bulbs so that the students can create a small garden. Is there anyone who could lend or hire a 1x3/4 guitar for a year 3 student to use? It's guaranteed to be cared for. Please contact Irene(Principal) if you can help. If your children have outgrown their board games and no longer want them, the L.A.P. volunteers would be grateful for the donation of such items for the L.A.P. programme. The games can be used as they are or adapted to teach ideas and concepts in a way which doesn't seem like hard work. If you can help with a donation please leave it at the front office at the school. 



BIRD CARE NEWS

Have you ever picked up a musk lorikeet and found it was covered in warty lumps on its head and shoulders or skin? The chances are this bird is infected with granulatomous mite. This is a highly infectious disease which affects musk lorikeets but is also seen in rainbows and purple crowns. The main oms are loss of wing and tail feathers, aggression, increased appetite and the warty lumps. If you find a bird like this it is kinder to arrange for the bird to be euthanased as soon as possible. The birds suffer extreme irritation and any treatment only extends their lives by a few months. Whatever you do, don't mix the bird with your healthy ones. Make sure you wash your hands well after handling it . It is unknown exactly how this disease spreads. Many thanks to the many people who have signed the petition against duck shooting. The Duck Defence Coalition has decided to keep on collecting them until the end of the year. If you haven't signed it yet and want to, go to Jill's stall at the Market . She will have a copy there for you to sign.

Here is a list of some of the best ones for you to think about.

Cupressocy Paris Leylandii castlewellian gold

This is a quick growing good hedge or windbreak 5m x1.5m.

Chamecy Paris Obtusa nana aurea

150cm upright habit. Good rock garden or tub specimen. Slow growing.

Cupressus Sempervirens Stricta

15m column effect. Very useful for avenues and tubs but not for small gardens.

Cupressus Sempervirens Swanes Golden

6 metre slower growing with fine foliage. This is suitable for smaller gardens.

Chamaecy Paris Pisifera Boulevard

This has silver blue foliage and grows 1.5m x 1m. It is very attractive.

Cupressocy Paris Leylandii Naylors Blue

This is a quick growing conical tree with blue-grey foliage and the added advantage of being salt tolerant.

Cupressus Torulosa Minima

This is a small conical tree with blue-green foliage.

Juniperus Virginiana Skyrocket

This is a narrow tree which is fast growing and with blue-green foliage

Thusa Orientalis Aurea Nana Gold Biota

This is one of the best garden conifers around. It is a dwarf globular bush, which is slow growing.

Juniperus Scopulorum Repens

This plant is ideal for rockeries because it only grows to 15cm high. It is grey-green in colour.

Juniperus Conferta (Shore Juniper)

This is fast growing and dense. It does well hanging over a wall. It grows $2.5m \times 25cm$ high.

Juniperus Pfitzerana Gold Coast

This is a dense spreading bush with tips of yellow green to gold. It adds great colour to the garden.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Here is a recipe for Spicy Thai Fish Balls with dipping Sauce which Nipada our Exchange Student cooked for us recently and it was very delicious. You will need:

For the Fish Balls:-500g redfish fillets (We couldn't get redfish so we substituted with another kind) 1 tablespoon of red curry paste, 1 egg lightly beaten, 2 spring(green) onions, including tender green tops finely sliced,4 fresh kaffir lime leaves, finely chopped, 1 tablespoon of finely chopped fresh coriander(cilantro)root and leaves, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt or to taste.

Also needed: 400ml vegetable oil for deep frying, fresh coriander sprigs and cucumber slices for garnish.

For the dipping sauce:-2 fresh red chillies finely sliced, I clove of garl finely chopped, 100ml fresh lemon juice, 80ml fish sauce.

Method:- Mince the fish up in a mincer or food processor, or chop up with a sharp knife. Add curry paste and mix it in. Add the egg and mix or process until the mixture just comes together. Transfer to a bowl and add the onions, lime leaves, coriander, sugar and salt. Roll the mixture into small balls about 2 cm(3/4 ") in diameter and refrigerate until firm. (about 30 mins). Heat up the oil until hot then deep fry about 10 fishballs at once until golden brown. Cook in batches like this until all cooked, draining the cooked balls on paper towels. Arrange the fish balls in a serving dish and garnish. Serve at room temperature with the dipping sauce. This is made by mixing all the ingredients together in a bowl.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR MAY

Last week I spoke on the ABC's rural network with Anna Jackson on the problem of Hip Dysplasia. There were many callers to the programme and I think it should be mentioned in the Grapevine. Hip dysplasia is an inherited defect most evident in our large breeds of dogs. The condition is due to malformation of the hip joint which ideally should be a round ball of bone well seated in a deep socket. A dog with Hip Dysplasia will show signs of weakness in the back legs. They often sit with an arched back and show signs of pain in the hip region. They tend not to stand up on their hind legs and may be hesitant to get into or out of the car. These behavioural signs are usually seen in the 6-18 months of age period. Diagnosis is by pelvic X-Ray. Dogs

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with Hip Dysplasia can be helped medically in mild cases or surgically in moderate cases. Severe cases may need to be euthanased to spare the dog from a lifetime of pain and suffering. A dog diagnosed with Hip Dysplasia should not be used for breeding. When buying a new puppy of one of the large breeds always ask about the sire and dam. Ask if they are certified Hip Dysplasia free. Dr Alan M Irving, AL-RU Farm.

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-Boneseed

This grows into a shrub which is 1-3 metres high. It's an evergreen perennial. It has densely branched stems, a thick woody trunk, oval leaves which are smooth and slightly toothed, dark green and on short stalks. The flower heads are yellow, daisy like, about 2-3 cm diameter, in dense clusters at the ends of the branches in August to October. The fruit is a cluster of green to black berries with a large white bony 'stone' containing a single seed. The reason it's a problem is because it forms a dense cover shading out native vegetation. It harbours vermin and can establish in undisturbed forests. The seeds are spread by birds. It will take two or three years to eradicate this if you have it on your place. Aim to pull out the mature plants by hand or mechanical means. This will be followed by a massive germination of seedlings which will also need to be treated. For information on possible sprays contact the Pest Plants Commission.

media reports may be somewhat misleading. For the record MPCC and Elizabeth CC had reached a joint agreement as to how the CEO for a new authority would be chosen, and how best we could keep the process free of bias decisions from either council. It was decided to use a consultancy firm who had previous experience in this area and after short listing numerous companies McArthur Management Services was chosen. It was further agreed that both councils wished to remove themselves from the final decision as to who was the better candidate and after 158hrs of grueling written and verbal examinations and some \$6-8,000, Mr Joe Collins was given the winning flag. It should be noted by all that the Councillors of MP had committed themselves to accept the decision of the consultants as to which candidate was most suited to the challenge of running the new city. Unfortunately at the last hurdle two Crs., Rocca and Norris of MP decided to side with Elizabeth and vote in a completely opposite direction after a motion by Cr. Watts of Elizabeth moved the preferred candidate be Mr. Graham Foster. Why this happened only Elizabeth CC knows but unless there is a change of heart and commitment from Elizabeth CC, MPCC will look elsewhere for a partner.

May has been an extremely busy month and I feel extremely confidant that it has also produced a number of good results regarding some local issues. Further progress was made with regard to the OTH Water Scheme and it's users. The public meeting held by OTH Progress Association for future landscaping within OTH Township was well organised and some excellent suggestions were given to Council staff.

A special note of thanks needs to be given to Anne Davenport who due to other commitments has stepped down as President of the OTH Progress Assoc.

Budget time is upon us once more and although I have made a list of items for budget consideration I feel it would be better to wait for the outcome before raising hopes that approval will be given. We as Councillors will be attending the budget weekend on the 1st and 2nd of June and the budget will be handed down all being well at our June Council Meeting, so for all residents who have requested money for various items keep your fingers crossed.

Please excuse my absence from the OTH Market last month and unfortunately I cannot guarantee to be there next time as work is currently being offered on Saturdays and as we all know, you have to take it while it lasts.

At the May Council Meeting we supported the Clean Up 2001 program and as a first project we shall be looking at rejuvenating Smiths Creek which runs from OTH through to Stebonheath Control Park at Smithfield. Involvement from schools, Westpac, industry and business, community groups and individuals will form the basis for a concentrated effort to produce a quality project for the betterment of our city. NAWMA has advised Council that it will appeal against the EPA's refusal for a license, and it should be noted that myself and the city Engineer Mr Ken Liu voted against this motion. Council also passed a motion: Lequesting NAWMA to provide information for the strategic overview and strategies in relation to waste management including safe environmentally sustainable facilities. 2.NAWMA signify relevance of Medlow Rd to these strategies.3. Council believes following costly appeal on EPA decision will not assist resolving Medlow Rd future.4. Council officers prepare discussion paper on waste management in our city. Council received a letter from Mr Luke Freeman requesting OTH Cemetery wall to be rebuilt due to ongoing structural problems and at a cost of \$24,000 it must be presented to the 1996/97 budget. As a result of the meeting of the consumers of the One Tree Hill Water Scheme council has recommended connection of the One Tree Hill oval to the E&WS mains and construction of the Precolumb Road main at

a cost of approx. \$17,000 be presented to the 1996/97 budget. Engineering Report
