A pleasant and surprising call was received from a McGilp Rd resident, Brian Leonard, who rang offering a donation of a twin keyboard Kawai organ. This thoughtful and generous donation was much appreciated. The area at the side of the netball court and the end of room 12 has been developed through the school's involvment in Arbor Day. At the school's request, the Munno Para Council provided the school with sufficient native trees, shrubs and grasses enabling planting at a ratio of 1 plant per 2 students, machinery to dig 120 plus holes, weed mats and one of their personel, who has a role in the "Greening of Munno Para Project" Trevor Arnold, who made himself available to help students on day. C.F.S. NEWS

TOTAL FIRE BAN SEASON-1st December, 1996-30th April, 1997. Call outs: We are having a quiet winter season with just a few call outs. This is giving us time to undertake appliance maintenance, station maintenance, attend training courses etc.

We would like to thank residents who have reported incidents using

RAPID numbers as this saves us a few extra needed seconds. *Training:* Congratulations to our nine new members who have recently finished their Level One Basic) training course. *BCF Extinguishers:* It is now illegal(@ January 1996) to use the BCF (yellow) extinguishers Replacement Dry Powder(red with a white band) extinguishers can be purchased for under \$25 (for kitchen size) from hardware and department stores. Old BCF extinguishers can be left at the station-we take them to the CFS Headquarters who dispose of them "environmentally".

Bottles: Please leave any soft drink/beer/wine bottles or cans on the concrete slab next to the small shed, behind the station, at any time. Hopper: The hopper will continue to operate on the first Saturday of the month between the hours of 8.30 am and 3.00pm (approximatelywhen the last bin is full-we close). Please do not drop rubbish in the metal or paper bins after we have left as it is not picked up with the skips and is left to rot another month(Keep One Tree Hill Beautiful!). We can take any rubbish except for hard rubble and tyres. The separate metal and paper/cardboard bins have been popular. Please place your donations for use of the hopper in the helmet. Smoke detectors: Have you put your smoke detector up yet? When I last spoke of the advantages of having a smoke detector fitted, many people were reminded to get theirs from out of the packet, put a battery in it and put it on the ceiling. Please do this today if you are in this situation. I have a couple of pamphlets on where to place smoke detectors etc. If you are interested in getting a pamphlet, please phone me at the station on a Monday or Friday night after 7.30pm on 280 7412. DOG IMMUNISATIONS

Check that your dog is up to date with all their immunisations. Some records seem to have gone astray with all the vet changes in One Tree Hill and you may not have received your annual reminder. Also heart worm is getting more common in our area, and prevention is better than cure. Check with your vet.

BIRD CARE NEWS

Many thanks to the many people who have signed the petition against duck shooting. The good news is that 35000 signatures have been collected so far. The Duck Defence Coalition has decided to ke on collecting them, and hope to get a record total. If you haven't signed it yet and want to, go to Jill's stall at the Market. (Apologies to those people who came last month—she forgot it! Please come again this month!) If you keep parrots such as galahs, sulpher cresteds, corellas

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or similar birds take care that you don't lose them. They will have trouble coping physically and emotionally as they get very attached to their owners. Don't ever use a chain on a parrots leg. Sales of these are illegal but not everyone seems to know this. If the bird gets a fright or flies off quickly, it could break its leg or pull it out of the hip socket(this has happened as people in the Bird Care and Conservation Society can verify). Also members have rescued a sulphur crested cocky that had the ring grown into its leg as if ring barking it. It's very important that you don't lose your bird but there are other ways to safeguard this than chaining them up. If your bird is out de its cage then it should be inside the house, under supervision. On, take your bird out in the garden if it is unable to fly or has clipped wings. There is a correct way to clip a parrots wing and this can be done by a bird vet who can show you how to do it properly. If you keep your sulphur crested or corella in an aviary ensure that it's made of very strong wire. It's also a good idea to have a slip bolt or dog clip and chain on the inside so that you can secure the door while inside the aviary. Another safety measure is to have wire fixed to the top space of the door so you have to bend down to enter and then the bird cannot fly out over your head. Your pet bird depends on you for food drink and affection. Pet birds have a very difficult time if dumped back in the wild. More about the care of these beautiful birds next month.



LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

Have you ever visited the graveyard on Uley road and had a look at some of the inscriptions on the tombstones? One name you will find is that of Moses Bendle Garlick. He opened up the Uleybury area and named it Uleybury after his home in Gloucestershire, England. Uleybury retained its seperate identity to One Tree Hill until 1943, when Unley residents complained they were losing too much of their mail. Moses Bendle Garlick was an English weaver who was born in September 1784 and who died in October 1859. "He served during the whole of the Peninsular Campaign and was present in six general actions." This graveyard is all that is left now but once there used to be a chapel there built in 1851 and used at first by all denominations, then by the Baptists. Parson Buttfield or the "cricket playing parson" as he was known offended the local Baptists by playing too much cricket! The chapel was vandalised in 1981 and pulled down but if you look at the names on the tombstones in the graveyard you will find the names of many of Elizabeth's Streets. There is also a story that an English mother came out and planted a stick of willow from Napoleans grave on her sons grave and that it grew into a fine tree. Is it still there? Why not go and have a look? (information from the One Tree Hill Sketchbook by Steven Hill) By the way it seems that One Tree Hill was not the last manual telephone in the State. It seems that Freeling was quite a few years after us and there were a number of others too. Thanks to Bruce Hewitson for this information.

okay. Deep sandy soil is also good. Proteas grow in acid soil, but some notable ones grow naturally in alkaline soil. Fresh water (low salinity) is preferable. Avoid watering on the leaves in Summer, so drip irrigation is best. Proteas love hot summers and cold winters, they do not like humidity so a breezy open site is best. Proteas do not need a lot of feeding. Blood and bone, well rotted horse, cow and sheep manure in spring and autumn is all they require. Once planted do not disturb the soil. Mow or slash the weeds. Nip out tips of proteas when young, but once established very little pruning is needed apart from removing old flower heads. Happy gardening! By the way, the One Tree Hill Garden Centre recycles plant pots that are in good condition.

ANSWERS TO PUZZLE CORNER

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Here is a recipe for an ANY WHICH WAY CURRY.

You can use any meat, be it chicken, beef or lamb. A kilo will f family of 4 adults. You can also add any vegetables you may like. You will need:-

1 stock cube, 1 large onion diced, 1 clove of garlic, finely diced, 2 dessert spoons of Cummin powder, 1 teaspoon Garam Masala, 1 teaspoon of coriander seeds, ground, (these are readily available from supermarkets), 1 dessert spoon of any curry powder, i teaspoon of sugar.

Add a little oil to a frying pan and seal meat, remove and place in a medium to large casserole dish. Saute onion and garlic in a little oil and then add the spices and sugar, gently heat through. Put in the casserole with the meat, then add enough stock to cover meat and any vegies you have added. (You can eliminate vegies if you want to) If you have any home made tomato sauce or chutney add a little as this will add to the flavour. Also a diced apple will help thicken it. Cook in a moderate oven. Chicken takes about 11/2 hours, other meat, 2 hours. Serve with rice and papadams.

It's important to save large trees

Many people believe that it is okay to cut down a tree so long as you plant a new one to replace it but have you ever thought about some of the functions of those big old trees on your property. They provide wildlife habitat, even if they are diseased, dying or dead. Their deep roots draw many litres of water from the ground each day and return it to the atmosphere, keeping the water table low and preventing salinity problems. Also they help to prevent serious soil erosion problems by holding the soil together preventing tunnel erosion and stopping the top soil being washed away or blown away by winds. Big trees also remove lots of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and the bigger the tree the more it removes, something a newly planted tree can't do. This is vital now the world is aware of the greenhouse" effect and global warming affecting our climate. So please think twice before you chop that big tree down, we need to of them especially now.

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-Varigated thistle

This is a very tall growing thistle, in fact it can grow as high as 4 metres. The leaves are shiny, large, deeply cut, light to dark green and they have spines on the tips. The leaves have white veins on them giving them a varigated appearance. The flower heads are large and purple growing to 120 mm diameter. They are produced from June to February. These flower heads produce numerous seeds which are black with a long white parachute, helping them fly all about your property and your neighbours as well. This thistle smothers pasture and it can be poisonous to livestock. Cultivation before flowering and the establishment of vigourous perennial grasses will help control it. For information about possible sprays, contact the Pest Plants Commission.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION-GORDON COOKSEY.

Recently I had a conversation with a local businessman during which comments were made about One Tree Hill in general and the

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Progress Association in particular, which I would like to address. The first remark was that "newcomers" to the town felt shunned and excluded by the longer term residents. If this is so it's a matter for deep regret. I am certainly not aware of this situation. As far as Progress Association is concerned, we are very anxious to include new residents in our activities. If anyone feels they have been badly treated, please let us know about it, and I'm certain this applies to the many other groups and organisations which operate in One Tree Hill. My wife and I were newcomers fourteen years ago and found people to be very friendly and welcoming. We did, however, attempt to meet them half-way by becoming involved in the life of the town. Perhaps that's at least part of the answer to any perceived problems. Another remark made during the conversation was that Progress Association was seen to be "a bunch of geriatrics who never do anything!" I am well aware that these days it is often considered a crime to grow old, and if anyone has found a way to avoid it, I, for one, would love to hear about it! Seriously, though, two of our members have recently resigned due to ill health and advancing years, after well over twenty years of service to the local community through the Progress Association. I strongly resent these people and others like them, being referred to in such derogatory terms. It's people like these, who have, over the years, kept the Progress Association going, while waiting for others to take over their roles.

However members of the Progress Association are not all retired people. Some of us still have full-time jobs and some of us belong to other organisations as well. No, we don't have more hours in the day or days in the week, and we are not "special" people, just people who are prepared to at least try to get things done instead of relying on others. The "geriatrics" of the Progress Association ".....never do anything". There seems to be some confusion about what Progress can actually do. It can't, for instance, order roads to be repaired, rubbish to be collected, reserves to be planted or even the McGilp Road arch to be re-built. Progress Association's value is as a focus for community concerns, as a pressure group for the people of One Tree Hill and as a reference group for the Munno Para Council. These roles we fulfil with varying degrees of success, while conscious that there is always more that could be done given more "personpower". Council frequently asks our opinion on matters concerning the town(as in the May Public Meeting) but ultimately decisions are made by Council and as money is usually involved, we have to stand in line with all other districts in the City of Munno Para. Even the Institute belongs to the Council and Progress operates it on their behalf. There's little doubt, incidentally, that if we didn't do so, Council would have to seriously consider whether to retain the Institute or not. Progress Association also publishes the Grapevine and both the Craft Shop and the Community Market operate under the umbrella of the Association. Overall we believe that we do make a difference, we do get things done. It has, however, sometimes been

pointed out by our One Tree Hill Councillors that we may have more "clout" with Council if Progress Association was a bigger group.

This, of course, is where you come in Progress Association is not in exclusive Club, it's for everyone in One Tree Hill. If you are interested in the life of the town and district, come and help us, new ideas and new energy would certainly be more than welcome.

While thinking about these matters I read in the Grapevine the letter from Dawn Tschirn which detailed how she came to realise that the "buck stopped with her"in a particular matter. Dawn's letter is worth reading or re-reading, perhaps even re-printing. If you are not happy with the way things are, don't blame "them", only "we" can do anything about it. Unfortunately the August meeting of the Progress Association has had to be cancelled because so many members will be away .The next meeting will be on Thursday September 19th., at 7.30pm. I promise you will be made very welcome, and I look forward to seeing you.

The latest on the amalgamation process with Elizabeth is as follows; After both Munno Para and Elizabeth had discussed the problen. hey were encountering with a Facilitator from the Local Government Reform Board and after receiving her recommendations, we have decided to try again. A Mayoral Forum is to be created, from which new guidelines and procedures will be considered and if successful, may allow both Councils to formally head down the road to amalgamation. The issue of CEO has been clarified and will now be open to tender. Although there is always something happening across the city, this month has been fairly quiet for the OTH Ward and this was reflected in the July Council Agenda. The belated appointment of a Fire Prevention Officer has finally been decided and a 12 month contract awarded to Mr. Andrew Oakley from the City of Tea Tree Gully, where he fulfills a similar roll. Mr. Oakley has a detailed knowledge of the district and is currently a Para CFS Group Officer. Congratulations Andrew and I am sure all residents will welcome your appointment in this very important roll. The City of Munno Para has unanimously carried a motion that endorses the development of a Local Agenda 21 Program. This program is a strategic concept and is intended to provide a framework for organisations such as councils operating at the local level to bring about change that will I achieving sustainability in the 21st century. Residents and ratep-yers now expect that their local authorities will play a leading role in managing the local environment in such a way that future development is in fact sustainable. Local Agenda 21 offers a means of addressing this issue by ensuring community participation and the merging of environmental, economic and social factors in the course of development decision making process. A community forum will be held in the near future to discuss the Clean Up 2001 project for Smiths Creek and bring to light relevant issues and hopefully gain further resident support. For those of you that may not be aware we have received notification that the CES Office on Warooka Drive will be closed as part of government cut backs. This decision is likely to impact on our local unemployed and council believe the decision is incorrect and is lobbying local government members in the hope of reversing the decision. It does seem strange that in an area of high unemployment we should now suffer the loss of a facility only opened 3 years ago to assist our local unemployed. Due to time constraints I am unable to bring you some of my regular reports but I trust my efforts to date, are meeting your expectations.
