






CRAFT SHOP NEWS.:





BIRD CARE NEWS

This month I saw a very sad sight when a pacific black duck flew in to the farm with its lower bill hanging by a thread, its tongue hanging out, unable to drink or eat. Obviously a victim of a shooting, and typical of the type of cruelty that is endured by ducks in the name of the sport of duck shooting. I was unable to catch it because it could still fly and I know that duck would have suffered a slow lingering death. Surely this is wrong. Please sign the petition on Jill's market stall and help put an end to this. Like almost any kind of pet, parrots thrive on and respond to love and attention. You get back what you put in(providing you have not been tricked into buying a wild bird which is terrified) Approach a new bird slowly to avoid scaring it. A trusting friendly relationship takes time but it will be worth it and it will be a lasting one. A healthy bird should be alert and bright eyed with sleek smooth feathers unless it is a juvenile. This cool weather may find your birds sleeping during the afternoon(and who can blame them!) Healthy droppings should be firm and white with a dark centre. If the droppings are murky green or vellow and your bird has a poor attitude you should probably consult a vet. Sometimes stress or green feed can have the same symptoms but don't wait more than 24 hours as time is critical in treating and saving a sick bird. Your bird may be feeling the cold now so try to keep him out of draughts and keep him covered at night. More parrot news next month.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

Recently I was browsing through some of the old record books at the Uleybury School Museum. These books record the children who attended, examination results, comments by the teachers and the dreaded Inspector's visits and comments. In 1910 M. Clucas wrote, "The girl in class 1 attends irregularly and perfectly hates her lessons, especially reading. She is an utter failure. She won't do her homework, can't keep her in as she lives nearly 5 miles from the school (and walked there every day, no wonder she didn't always get there at age five!), I offered her parents to keep her here for a few months until she would master her tables etc. but she won't stay. She is the dullest most indifferent child I have ever had in school. Singing is an utter failure. As soon as I stop singing the little tune the children possess goes at once. The boys only growl not sing". Poor Julia Lewis in 1914 was having trouble with the Department even then:" I had a trying time getting up a concert for August with children who had never been before the public- then was censured by the Dept for having one without their sanction". By 1918 Julia was getting desperate-" I have some of the dullest children it has been my privilege to teach and I thought the previous teacher was to blame


but she was not: it is in the blood" .By 1928 things had not really improved at Uley. The inspector wrote, "There was a good deal of latecoming and several boys appeared to be in need of a thorough scrubbing. Miss Piper says the home influence, in some homes, does not supplement her efforts." However poor Miss Piper copped it in 1929 when the Inspector wrote: "Miss Piper as a teacher of several grades gave a very poor exhibition this morning. No blackboard preparation had been done, ink had not been put out and books were not ready to hand. The lesson in phonics was quite inadequate, much more ground should have been covered." Comments were made about the damp walls and the barn like appearance of the room making it difficult to be made attractive. However there were now 18 books in the school library! So these were the good old school days!!

DO YOU KNOW?

If you go on the Mack Creek Walk off Humbug Scrub Road, there is a part where the track diverts along a track called the Ruins Track. On one side of the track is evidence of a building, on the other side of the track is evidence of an animal shelter and other out buildings. On the side where the building was is a large pine tree and wild rosemary is growing. A rose is growing near a pile of rocks which was obviously a dwelling. By the ruin is an orienteering marker number 7. If you know any of the history of this building please contact Joan Lewin on 8255 6082. She is determined to find out some of the history of her favourite spot if she can. Maybe some of our older residents can shed some light on this.

MEET OUR COMMUNITY-CHAS ADLARD

Chas Adlard, of Humbug Scrub, has written a great first novel called "The Born Again Australian" which if you are quick you can obtain from our local Craft Shop. An added interest for local people is the setting for parts of the story in the Gawler area. This is a book which most people will enjoy because it's easy to read and full of plenty of action and excitement. In case you are confused by the title it is not a religious book but reflects the passion which a person born in Britain can have for their adopted country, Australia. Chas has had many life experiences which he has drawn on in the course of writing the book. He was born in Southern England and was educated in the East End of London Orphanage Boarding School, Wanstead. This is now the Snaresbrook County Court and you may have seen it featured in the "Rumpole" TV programmes! He has been in the Merchant Navy and the Royal Australian Air Force for 12 years, as well as being involved in the Royal Life Saving Society as an instructor and examiner based at Elizabeth. He has also been an Education Department swimming teacher and Red Cross First Aid Instructor. He has also been employed for over ten years as a Driver Development Officer at Gawler, Nuriootpa and Elizabeth. GARDEN TIPS FOR SEPTEMBER

Saving Vegie seeds-is it worth it?

Many gardeners prefer to save their own seed but there are pitfalls and the few cents saved may not be worth the disappointing crops. Many vegetable varieties are F1 Hybrids. F1 Hybrid seed is carefully produced by crossing two inbred parents to obtain offspring of superior characteristics. Saving seed from Hybrid plants will not produce similar plants next season. Cross pollination can occur in some crops. Cross pollination does not affect the growing crop but the resulting seed will not be true to type. Most packet seeds are treated with a fungicide to seed bourne and damping off diseases. Home grown seed can transmit disease.

<u>Tips</u>- to protect young trees from rabbits, paint fish oil on the trunks. To protect vegies from snails spread crushed egg shells. (and the egg shells will crush easier if you give them a few minutes in the micro wave first)

RI PE OF THE MONTH

Apple and cinnamon muffins

You will need, 3 cups of self raising flour, 3/4 cup caster sugar, 90g marg or butter melted, 2 beaten eggs, 1,1/3 cups milk, 1 large cooking apple finely diced, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Combine flour, diced apple, cinnamon and sugar. Melt marg and allow to coola little, then add beaten eggs and milk, pour over the dry mixture and fold through gently. Spoon into a 12 cup muffin pan, bake in a 180 degree oven for about 25 mins.(less if you have a fan forced oven)

VETERINARY NOTES FOR AUGUST

Arthritis

We'd all like to grow old gracefully, but those nagging health problems affect most of us eventually. Similarly our canine friends don't remain puppies forever. If your older dog seems stiff and slow moving particularly when they first get going, they are probably afflicted with arthritis. This is a common problem especially in the hip of larger breeds. Arthritis is a condition where the cartilage line, of the joint wears out. The lining acts like a teflon coat on a non-stick frying pan. When it's damaged or worn the bone underneath is exposed causing pain. In the early stages more fluid is produced in the joints causing swelling, but gradually the body tries to stop the joint from moving by gluing it up with extra bone. A range of drugs are available to help control the discomfort of arthritis and some newer drugs can even assist in repairing and lubricating the damaged joint. These are used in combination with controlled regular exercise. Don't wait until the symptoms are severe before getting help, your dog will appreciate growing old in comfort. 

PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH-Rhus Tree

The Rhus Tree is also called Japanese wax tree, or Toxicodendron succedaneum. It is a small deciduous tree with a single trunk and dense spreading crown. Leaves are divided into two rows of leaflets; each leaflet is boat shaped with a tapering tip. Foliage turns deep red in the autumn. Flowers are minute, greenish yellow, numerous in drooping clusters in the spring. Berries are dull brown in dense drooping clusters. The sale of this plant is now prohibited but it used to be a commonly grown tree and you may have one in your garden without realizing it. The problem with this tree is that it produces an oily sap which may occur even by brushing against the foliage. This sap can cause severe dermatitis and blisters. This allergy can develop at any time, and a large proportion of people become allergic to Rhus at some stage in their lives. If you have one in your garden it is your responsibility to get rid of it and now is the time to do it. Wear gloves and protective clothing, cut the tree down near ground level and if possible dig out the stump and the main roots. Do not burn any part of the Rhus as the smoke can cause lung damage. You will have to take it to the tip. Avoid any contact with sap, saw dust or foli even dead leaves can cause allergic reactions.


The Lost Wombat

LIGHTENING PROTECTION ACTION GUIDE

Each year in Australia lightening claims up to 10 lives and causes over 100 injuries. Up to 80 of these injuries happen when people use telephones during thunderstorms and receive an electric shock, hearing damage, or burns when lightening strikes telephone wires in their area. If you hear thunder 10 seconds after a lightening flash, it is only about 3 kilometres away. The shorter the time, the closer the lightening, so find shelter urgently as follows: If you are out of doors seek shelter in a hard top vehicule or solid building. Avoid small structures or fabric tents. Never shelter under trees. If far from shelter crouch alone, feet together, preferably in a hollow. Remove metal objects from head/body. Don't lie down and avoid being the highest object. If your hair stands on end, or you hear 'buzzing' on nearby rocks, fences etc. move immediately. At night a blue glow may show if an object is about to be struck. Don't fly kites or model planes with control wires, handle fishing rods, umbrellas or golf clubs etc. Stay away from metal poles, fences or clothes lines and don't ride horses, cycles or drive in open vehicles. If you are driving, slow down or park away from trees and power lines. Stay inside your car or caravan but don't touch any metal sections. If swimming or surfing, leave the water immediately. If boating go ashore to shelter as soon as possible. A bridge or jetty may offer immediate protection. Be sure the mast and stays of a sailing boat are adequately grounded to the water. If you are indoors, before the storm arrives, disconnect external aerial and power leads to radios and television sets. Disconnect computer modems and power leads. Draw all curtains and keep clear of windows, electrical appliances, pipes and other metal fixtures and don't take a bath or shower. Avoid the use of telephones. In emergencies make calls brief and don't stand barefoot on concrete or tiled floors. If someone does get struck apply immediate heart massage and mouth to mouth resuscitation to the victims until medical help arrives and they will have a good chance of survival. Don't worry you won't get a shock from the victim. If your clothes are wet you are less likely to be seriously injured if struck, as most of the charge will conduct through the wet clothes rather than your body. Average lightening bolts carry a current of 10,000 to 20,000 amps. An average radiator draws 10 amps. Lightening can and often does strike more than once in the same place! (This information was provided by the South Australian Emergency Service)

PARA WIRRA RECREATION PARK

A management Review Report has found its way into your editor's hands (a journalist never reveals her sources!) but it makes very interesting reading. This review was initiated in December 1995 as a means of providing basic information to develop a policy and planning strategy for the future management of the Park. It was supposed to be much more comprehensive with much community consultation but it was decided there was not enough time for this so they looked at all the information relating to the past management of the Park, and opinions were obtained from visitors, staff managers and associates through a questionaire process. As this is quite a lengthy document not all of this can be printed here so I will try to summarise the main points. Visitor numbers have declined, and staff numbers have declined. The Park is managed remotely from the Salisbury Office where there are now only 2 full time equivalent staff. As financial resources have declined so has the amount spent on development and maintenance of facilities. In other words the Para Wirra Park is in a sorry state. Recommendations say that the Park should be managed for recreational activities which are compatible with conservation rather than team or organised sports such as tennis. This would include picnics, educational activities, walking, the study of natural and cultural history and cycling. Management of fire, pest plants and animals and the kangaroo population needs to be a priority. The numbers of grey kangaroos need to be reduced to sustainable level and kept there. They do not indicate what they consider is a sustainable level of kangaroos and it seems that a large number will be killed. In the open space area which are currently grazed by the kangaroos, they would like to develop cycle-ways and possibly a mountain bike trail network. The Park has a lot of mining history and the report suggests that this could be developed and interpretive information provided on the walking trails. A strategy needs to be developed to expand community education programmes. The report recognises that Para Wirra needs staff and that this has been inadequate both in quality and numbers over the years. They recommend the park should be staffed with a Ranger and two Park Assistants and the recreation area and Kiosk should be leased out.. A stronger community network should be developed. Also the price for entrance should go up to \$5. For further details I suggest you contact the Natural Resources Group of the Dept. of Environment and Natural Resouces which manage the Park. Editor.
