ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

Report from the meeting of August 17, 1995. Pat Cole from the MPCC Community Development Team described the Community Cleanup Campaign being organised for the 15th & 16th September. The purpose of the campaign, which is part of both a National and world wide event, is to encourage members of the public to work together in collecting litter and rubbish lying around in their local neighbourhood. It was decided that Progress would support the campaign and is organising a cleanup of Blacktop Road. Members of the Community are invited to assist in this community event by collecting roadside litter and rubbish and depositing it in rubbish sacks. The cleanup will start from the Blacktop Rd/One Tree Hill Rd intersection (near Sampsons Flat) at 9.30 am. on Saturday 16th September. The event will be followed by a sausage sizzle. Please bring gardening/working gloves, hats, sun glasses, etc. Sacks will be provided. The meeting also discussed the condition of the Institute floor. Bill Carrick of MPCC reported that the levelling and "springing" problems were caused by unseasonal weather conditions and the movement of dwarf walls. Council will rectify the situation once the ground has stabilised. Council was also requested to consider the sanding and resealing of the Institute floor at its next budget session. The structural framework and external cladding of the store room and the opening to the main hall has been completed. internal lining is on site and should be installed soon. Matthew ranyden reported that the McGilp archway sign has been constructed but the wet weather has delayed its painting and installation. The Trinity College Bush School development proposal has been rejected by Council. Road safety issues concerning the intersection of Blacktop and Precolumb Rds were discussed and will be investigated by MPCC. It was stated that the Dept of Transport is unlikely to construct a round-a-bout in the near future. The next meeting of the Progress Association will be held in the Institute Supper Room on 21st September at 8.00pm. All members of the community are invited. Supper will be provided. Development Proposals - One of the objects of the Progress Association is to "foster community spirit and promote the welfare of the One Tree Hill community" Proponents of development proposals that may effect and/or require the support of the One Tree Hill community are invited to approach the Association so that appropriate forms of community consultation can be arranged.

GARDENING CORNER

Deciduous Ornamentals: Most ornamental trees are best planted when dormant. Containerised trees may be planted any time. Soil should be well drained. Adding gypsum and compost will be a big help. Good ornamental trees are:

Betula Alba (Silver Birch) to 10 metres. Adaptable to most soils. It has a white trunk with drooping branches. It is frost and draught resistant and fire retarding.

Fraxinus Excelsior Aurea (Golden Ash) to 6 metres. It has green leaves turning gold in autumn. Frost tolerant.

Ulmus Louis Van Houten (Golden Elm) to 10 metres. Rich golden leaves all summer. It's an ideal shade tree. If you want to make a "French Protest" this year avoid planting french lavender, larkspur, sweet william, laburnum, perennial cornflower, sweet alyssum, virginia stocks or shasta daisy as they all originate in France!!



The goats got out and stripped the fruit trees while the nanny goat would only allow Mike to milk her so he often could be found milking at midnight after a late night! With the adults working full time it all became a bit much so now they only have dogs and cats while someone else's sheep eat the grass! But Lea says it was all a great experience. Lea decided to move from teaching into politics when the opportunity arose. She sees politics as a challenge and an opportunity to make a difference by speaking out and also bringing groups together for discussion. As the Labor member of Parliament for Elizabeth she has the opportunity to become involved in decision making and being a catalyst for change. At the end of a long day Lea enjoys escaping to the peace and quiet of One Tree Hill and relaxing.

The members of the One Tree Hill Country Fire Service are enjoying our quiet winter season catching up on training, maintenance and RAPID plates! We have been continuing to distribute RAPID plates and collect donations (\$5). We are well over half way with distribution and so should be visiting your place soon! Please be careful whilst driving around and put your lights on when it's foggy. BCF (yellow) fire extinguishers become illegal to discharge after 31st December 1995, because of the damage their contents can cause to the ozone layer in the atmosphere. These extinguishers can be handed in at the fire station. We will be handing them on to our headquarters

who will dispose of the contents in an environmentally "friendly" manner. New dry powder extinguishers to effectively replace BFC extinguishers can be purchased from hardware shops for under \$30. Look out for the Canadian "Super Scooper" water plane demonstration. South Australia will have the use of this aeroplane, which carries six tonnes of water, for three days in January 1996. VETERINARY NOTES FOR SEPTEMBER

Since our last Vet notes I know of two dogs who have begun an exercise and slimming programme and I'm sure their owners will benefit too! Dr Irving has provided us this time with the answer to last months question - what to do if your dog is scared of thunder. Many dogs fear thunderstorms. They know the storm is coming long before we do. Some dogs may try to break into the house to be closer to their owners. Others may break out of the house and in panic take flight which can be dangerous for the dog and heartbreaking for the owner. Don't despair - there is something you can do. Exposing the dog to very gradual increases in loudness of a thunderstorm tape-recording and by giving it rewards for being relaxed when exposed to the noise is known as "systematic desensitization" and "counter-conditioning". You can retrain your dog not to fear thunderstorms. Training starts with quiet playing of the tape and later increasing the volume. Each time the volume is increased and the dog remains calm you should give it a treat. It is rewarded for good behaviour and in this way any bad association with the storm will be lost. So what can be a nasty experience for all concerned can be changed with appropriate training. You can contact me on ABC country radio talkback, 3.pm. 30th August. Dr Alan M. Irving, AL-RU farm.

MATTHEW HAYDEN'S UPDATE FOR SEPTEMBER

The past month has seen me dealing with a variety of issues, but the most prominent of these issues must surely have been the Trinity Bush Campus proposal. At Council's August 8th meeting the application was refused, after representations were received from both proponents and opponents and discussions between Councillors and staff, and finally led to a vote of 3 for and 7 against. It was an extremely difficult issue and one that my fellow Councillors and I spent a great deal of time considering before casting our votes, but I sincerely hope that the school can find an alternative site within Munno Para in the near future, so that the Bush Campus concept is not lost for ever. The archway over McGilp Rd. should be up during the next month, as the delay revolved around our recent wet weather and the need for the archway to be painted immediately it is erected. OTH Primary School has received Council approval for two transportable classrooms from Dept for Building Management and I understand one is in place already. The recent storms resulted in 40 calls for assistance from 34 locations and I would like to thank the CFS, SES, and Council crews for their efforts. Due to the severity of the storms and the damage which resulted Council will need ratepayers to appreciate our works program is behind schedule and may result in delays to some projects.



PEST OF THE MONTH

How many of you have tried to get rid of your artichoke thistles which featured in last month's Grapevine? Now is the time to do it. I tried the salt method and it really works. It's cheap too. You just need about a tablespoon of salt on the crushed centre of the artichoke. It takes several weeks to kill them. If we all did this we could get rid of them in One Tree Hill. This month we are going to talk about the rabbit which is a pest to some people here. The rabbit was introduced into Australia with the first fleet apparently and because of its great ability to reproduce it has become a pest. Rabbits construct burrows under the ground which helps them survive a wide range of conditions. They also eat a wide range of foods and can graze plants down to ground level, so they are capable of causing a lot of damage. The most effective control is poisoning with "1080". Part of this chemical occurs naturally in some native plants. Native



are the ideal bait. Get the rabbits accustomed to the oats by feeding them plain oats. Feed three plain feeds with a three day interval between each feed. Then wait four days and lay the poisoned bait. 50 grams of oats is enough for 12 metres area. Poisoned oats are laid at the rate of 50 grams to 18 metres. Warren destruction is the most rtant part of effective rabbit control and here people in the District can work together. Often a warren will be on a neighbour's property. Thorough ripping is the best way to destroy warrens, burrows and holes. Start a couple of days after poisoning. Begin ripping outside the furthermost hole and rip a series of parallel lines 40 cm (18") apart right across the warren. Then rip another series of parallel lines at 90 degrees to the first. Remove all possible rabbit shelter. Fumigants can be used where poisoning or ripping are not possible. Please contact the Adelaide Plains Animal and Plant Control Board for any further information on 085 224721. One Tree Hill could get rid of rabbits if we work together. Some of you may have other ideas on how to get rid of rabbits. Let us hear about them.

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

How many know who founded the Uleybury School on Cornishman's Hill Road? Moses Bendle Garlick who opened up the area and named it Uleybury after his home in Gloucestershire, England, and Uley Chapel's first Minister, Pastor J.P.Buttfield were both responsible for getting funds from the government of the day. Pastor Buttfield was known as the "Cricket Playing Parson". Apparently a group of frock coated Uleybury men marched indignantly into the Baptist Headquarters in Adelaide to complain he was playing too much cricket! The government offered Moses Garlick and Pastor Buttfield 150 pounds for the new school provided residents equalled this amount. Pastor Buttfield donated the land and the building went ahead in spite of protests from One Tree Hill residents that the school was too close to the existing Precolumb School. It was completed in 1856 at a cost of 400 pounds. Teachers and their families lived in the premises at the rear of the school room. Mr Mattingly was the first schoolmaster. Pastor Buttfiled also taught at the school until 1862. In 1887 the Headmistress was Marion C. Kekwick, widow of Mr W. Kekwick, second in command of John McDouall Stuart's celebrated expedition from Adelaide to Darwin. In 1943 the school became known as the One Tree Hill Rural School. It was the oldest school building still being used by the Education Department when it finally closed in 1971. In 1978 the Uleybury School opened as a museum. Mr Hedley Lang, a former teacher at the school, unveiled the commemorative plaque as well as donating a number of items including his old desk. His original lessons and tests are chalked up on the blackboard. You can take a step back in history by visiting any Sunday between 2.00pm and 4.00pm. For the 94/95 financial year the following number of incidents were reported: Shedbreak...19 Property damage...7 Stolen Vehicles...5 House/shop break...12 Larceny......9 Recovered stolen vehicles.....6 Total...58 This total compares with the entire total of 23 incidents for the 93/94 financial year.

As you can see we have had an increase of well over 50% in criminal activity in our area. Please take simple measures such as locking your sheds and writing down registration numbers of vehicles you may think out of place in the area. BIRD NEWS

Have you heard of "Hot Foot" glue? It's a silicon glue which never dries out. It is applied to ledges and building facades to discourage birds, mainly pigeons and starlings from roosting. Theoretically the bird simply lands on the glue, finds it sticky and unpleasant and so flies off. Unfortunately it does not always work that way. If a bird with short legs like a welcome swallow lands on it the feathers can get stuck up, either to each other or to the building preventing the bird flying away and thus it dies a cruel death. If the bird can escape, when they preen the glue off their feathers they swallow the glue which can cause gut obstructions. Some of the names this product
