TOTAL FIRE BAN SEASON 1st December, 1995 - 30th April 1996. The fire ban season is nearly upon us. 30th April is the current finishing date, but this can be extended by a month by CFS Headquarters depending on conditions. If it is extended I will let you know in the April or May Grapevine editions. Clearing of grass, scrub, rubbish etc from around homes, sheds, properties, should have been completed by now. If you are slashing, cutting scrub back, or using tools outside, please take care by not doing these jobs on high fire danger days (i.e. hot and/or windy days) and always have water on hand.

BCF EXTINGUISHERS: It will be illegal to use the BCF (vellow)

extinguishers after December 31 this year. Replacement Dry Powder (red with a white band) extinguishers can be purchased for under \$25 (for kitchen size) from hardware and department stores. RAPID: We have completed putting the plates on gates and key tags on phones for the RAPID system. If you weren't home when we called and have not received your plate and key tag yet, please phone 280 7412 or drop into the station on a Monday or Friday night between 7.30pm - 9.30pm. RAPID fees are also being collected at \$5 per plate (thanks to those who are also giving us an extra donation). We have already had a few calls where the RAPID number has helped to locate the property very quickly. Please teach children to use the RAPID number as it can be used for ANY emergency service. BOTTLES: Please leave any soft drink/beer/wine bottles or cans on the concrete slab next to the small shed behind the station any time. HOPPER: The hopper will continue to operate on the first Saturday of the month between the hours of 8.30am and 3.00pm (approximately - when the last bin is full, we close). We can take any rubbish except hard rubble and tyres. The separate metal and paper/cardboard bins have been popular. Please place your donations for use of the hopper in the helmet.

Me and Leon had an accident but it was good fun. Tim showed us a basketball champion's medal. He gave us his signature. I got it but Scott and Mary didn't. RECIPE OF THE MONTH- PLUM PUDDING ICE CREAM Ingredients:

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3 rounded tablespoons caster sugar

1 level tablespoon gelatine

1 tablespoon butter

2 tablespoons water

1 tablespoon brandy or lemon juice

1 275ml can of evaporated milk (chill overnight)

1 __spoon vanilla essence

three quarters of a cup of fruit mince

glace cherries for decoration.

Place gelatine and water in a saucepan. Let it stand for five minutes then stir over low heat until dissolved. Add butter and allow it to melt. Stir in sugar and vanilla. Beat chilled evaporated milk until stiff then gradually add gelatine mixture stirring constantly. Add the fruit mince and the brandy, pour into a plastic container, decorate with cherries and freeze. By the way did anyone try the recipe from last month?

TRINITY COLLEGE BUSH CAMPUS

Thanks to the assistance of a couple of One Tree Hill locals, Trinity has followed up three alternative properties as possible sites for a bush campus development. Unfortunately the purchase price of two properties was beyond the College's capacity and the other property was sold prior to the College's enquiry. Following consultations with Munno Para Council Officers, neighbours of the Tuckwell property, the One Tree Hill Progress Association, National Parks Officers, Loc and State CFS Officers, and ETSA personnel, Dale Martin from Trinity is looking to reapply for development approval on an alternative site within the Tuckwell property. Before making formal application Dale will again visit the majority of neighbouring property owners with information about the application to indicate how the issues raised in the first round of visits will be addressed by the College. These consultations will provide the opportunity for neighbours to make suggestions for amending the application prior to it being submitted to Council. Dale will also be available on Market Day in December with plans and drawings of the development and a copy of a draft application for Council. SIMON'S PET CORNER

Simon reports that his baby magpie is flying now and still is around the place, though is not allowed to get too near as the male magpie he reared last year is keeping him away. It's the breeding season for pigeons now and this month Simon is going to give us some hints on

successful breeding. You will need a cage with a nest box in it. To make a good nest box take a plastic dessert bowl and line it with newspaper in the following way: tear up about 4 sheets of paper into small pieces and mush them up with water. Don't use glue just water. Then mould the mushy paper onto the plastic bowl and let it dry. The reason this is done is because the baby pigeon or squeaker as they are called can't grip properly if there is no newspaper and the squeaker may grow with its legs spread out and be unable to walk. Put the male and female together. This sounds obvious but it can be difficult to sex pigeons and you need to do a lot of observation and listening. Cock birds coo a lot, females don't usually but there are exceptions. When the male makes a whoo whoo sound and moves his flight feathers the female should fly down. The male goes on top of the female and flaps his wings, then he gets off and the female prances! If this has been true romance she will start laying eggs in ten days. You can tell if they are fertile after about a week by shining a strong light through and you should see a dark red dot. The eggs take 18 to 20 days to hatch. Pigeons usually sit on two eggs but often break one. Sometimes males are not fertile. This can only be found through trial and error. After hatching you can leave the pair together but sometimes the males get aggressive and attack the baby. Also make sure the squeaker doesn't get with the other pigeons or it may get pecked. Feed pigeon mix to the parent bird and they turn this into a special pigeon "milk" in their crop which they feed to the baby. At 8 weeks the squeaker will have most of its feathers except for some under their wings. They may lose these feathers as they mature to get their adult feathers. The baby down goes away and it depends on the colour of the pigeon how much down they have. Simon reports some success in his breeding programme and has his eyes set on competing in the National Pigeon Show next year. (Thanks Simon, we will look forward to hearing about that).



Some plant losses were immediately evident, others are stressed and not suitable for sale. The Munno Para Council were helpful in supplying a tanker of water but not until 4.45. By that time it was too late for some plants. We were told by Council at half hour intervals that it would only take another half hour to repair. At 4.00 it was repaired but the tanks had to be filled and this would take another two hours. We would have liked a more accurate assessment of the situation so we could have taken steps earlier so losses could have been avoided. How often does this arise? I hope not in the fire season. If we had a situation like last year (a fire in the town) when the CFS is protecting the homes, certainly their top priority, how would we have got on? I can't understand why half a town, the size of One Tree Hill has to rely on a bore. Irene Peryman.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR DECEMBER

As the warm weather comes it also brings more problems for our pets such as more allergies, fur balls, fleas, related skin problems and viral diseases. Fur Balls - As the weather gets warmer your pet will shed his or her coat, causing a build up of unwanted hair. Some of the smaller breeds of dogs with long hair may need grooming and clipping. Cats tend to be more extensive groomers than dogs, therefore fur balls can be quite frequent. Often no amount of grooming from your pet will get rid of all the excess hair. Regular grooming is recommended, and sometimes professional washing and grooming is required. Hydrobaths are a fun alternative for dog and owner. Allergies- These may be caused by pollens and dusts in the air. Fleas, bees, ants, spiders, flies and mosquitos can all be a problem to your pet especially if they have reacted badly to previous bites. If you see any sort of self mutilation due to an allergic reaction, consult your Vet as soon as possible.

GARDENING NOTES FOR DECEMBER

Following lots of requests here is the recipe for garlic spray. 90g CHOPPED GARLIC CLOVE

2 TABLESPOONS MINERAL OIL

15g PURE SOAP OR FLAKES 500ml WARM WATER

Mix garlic and oil and let it stand for 48 hours. Dissolve grated soap in warm water. Mix the two solutions together and strain. Try different solutions. A strong one being one part mixture to 50 parts of water. This is useful against sucking insects, caterpillars, snails and wireworm and it discourages many pests. It is also said that garlic helps to control downy mildew, some rusts such as bean rust, leaf spots, blight of tomato and brown rot of stone fruit, through its antibiotic properties. GOAT NOTES

How much should you expect to pay for a goat? That depends on how you look at it.

The cost of raising a doe kid from birth to the start of her lactation:

- 1. 70 days @ 2 litres of milk per day = \$50.00
- 2. 600 days @ 2 bales of hay per week = \$150.00
- 3. 90 days @ 1 kg concentrates per day =\$45.00
- 4. mating to begin producing = \$40.00

TOTAL COST TO KIDDING = \$285.00

- 1. Family uses 3 litres of milk per day @ \$1.20= \$1314.00 per year.
- 2. Cost of feed for doe.

Concentrates @ 2 kg per day = \$365.00

Hav @ 2 bales per week = \$400.00

TOTAL PROFIT PER YEAR = \$650.00

LIFE EXPECTANCY OF DOE = 12 to 15 years.

These are simplified figures, a basis on which you can do your own calculations. My method of valuing a doe is to measure her milk production and multiply it by 90 days then multiply it by the retail price of milk. This 90 days is the approximate time it will take her to return her buying price plus earn her keep. After that her milk costs what her care costs. These calculations will result in the average pedigreed dairy doe giving 3 litres of milk per day being worth \$270.

Good does should produce 4 to 5 litres, and the better ones give 5 litres. After that they are probably not what the average household wants, as few of us use 7 or 8 litres of milk a day over summer and 3 per day all winter. If we do we would be better off with two milking does to supply a more even flow of milk by mating at different times (and that's another story) But what about the little goat down the road? She's going for \$50. You get what you pay for. She will probably return you some milk. With a pedigree you can see what her female antecedents have produced in controlled recording situations, and this information is a guide to her potential for milk production. PEST PLANT OF THE MONTH - CALTROP

This is a prostrate hairy summer annual. It has thin wiry stems which spread out up to a metre long from a central taproot. The leaves are in opposite pairs, each divided into 4-7 pairs of leaflets. The flowers are solitary on slender stalks at the base of the leaves, about 5cm wide with 5 yellow petals. The fruit is a cluster of 5 burrs, straw coloured when ripe. Each burr is wedge shaped, 6-9 mm long, with 2 long sharp spines and 2 shorter ones. This weed is common around One Tree Hill. The burrs injure feet of humans and stock, cause internal injuries if swallowed, damage tyres and contribute to vegetable fault in wool. If it is grazed by sheep it can cause no early autumn so several treatments over the growing season may be needed. Small patches can be hand hoed. Gather and burn all fruiting plants. For details of suitable sprays contact the Animal and Plant Control Commission.



LOCAL HISTORY NOTES

There have been a lot of changes to the One Tree Hill Post Office and General Store over the years and some of you may be interested in the early history as seen through the eyes of the late Mrs E.R. Hicks. Mr Buttfield and Mr Skewes were postmasters in the late 1800's. Mr Harry Skewes married Miss Shillabeer, a sister to the late Mr Samuel Shillabeer of One Tree Hill and Miss Maud Skewes married Mr F.L. Ifould. The land adjoining the business was also part of the property. It ran East to the first intersection and turning right ran down the right hand side of Precolumb Rd and adjoined the late Mr Charlsons Property at a gate marked "Tonto". There was also a cottage on the property. When Mr Rudolph Fiebig took over the business, his parents, Mr and Mrs August Fiebig used to reside in the cottage. The Fiebig family ran the business until Mr Fiebig died in July 1928. It then traded under the name of A. Fiebig and son. After Mrs Fiebig's death, her eldest daughter, Selma (Mrs A. Hurley) and her husband were the proprietors from 1939 to 1942. The business was then leased for several years. In 1945 the Fiebig family sold the business. It had been in the family for 53 years. Mr and Mrs Hicks bought the business and a portion of the land surrounding it. Mr Hicks was appointed postmaster in 1942 and retained that position until his death in 1969. During that period the business improved greatly and many new subscribers were added to the then manual Telephone exchange. They also delivered the mail six times a week. cks was appointed Postmistress after the death of her husband and continued to run everything until 15/1/73. During 1945-1969 renovations had been numerous to both dwelling and shop, including a new shop being built onto the old building. The property remained in the Hicks family for approx 32 years. After Mrs Hicks retired the premises was leased until it was sold in 1980 to Kennett Bros Pty Ltd.
