





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GARDENERS' CORNER

It's rose time again. Select an open sunny position with good air circulation. Bare rooted roses are best planted in June and July. Containered roses may be planted all year round. Because of heavy clay soil in this district, do not dig a hole any more than 6" deep. Mend some soil in the bottom of the hole and fan out the roots. Do not plant any deeper than the soil level indicated on base of stem. Water well. The graft should remain 2 inches above soil level. Potted roses are now available at your local garden centre. Happy Gardening!

School. The School Inspector visited twice a year and sometimes

DID YOU KNOW - Some local historyAt the end of the last century many local children attended the Uley

inbetween. Everything was inspected from the state of the toilets to the copy books which the children wrote on. The children were given examinations and the teacher was examined too on his or her teaching methods and the conduct and discipline of the children. The Roll was inspected and had to be correctly filled in, in fact no aspect of the School seemed to be overlooked. Copies of these School inspections with the Inspector's comments can be found at the Uleybury School Museum and are well worth a browse through. Here are some examples of the comments: March 1st 1881 -"Conduct of some of the boys is far from good. Laughter and Talk were freely indulged in during my stay." October 8th 1880 unation of today shows that considerable care and attention have been given. It is clear however that some of the children are remarkably dull." March 13th 1903 - "The children answer in a promiscuous and fragmentary manner. This largely accounts for many of the deficiencies in the School. Address the question to the class. Do not allow anyone not chosen to speak, do not repeat the answer, do not patch it up. Either ask further questions or teach the point that is not clear. Junior reading will not be satisfactory until every letter is instantly sounded." Some of the reasons for a small attendance are interesting too. Sometimes children were away grapepicking. Other times they were sick with whooping cough, influenza and diptheria. At times the Inspector's writing is so ornate and fancy that reading it is very difficult. School inspections were probably dreaded by everyone but they continued until recent times. Has anyone any memories of School Inspections they would be willing to share?

POULTRY NEWS

I wonder if you have looked at your chooks' feet and legs recently and wondered what those scaly lumpy bits were on some of them. The chances are they have got scaly leg mite. This is a small mite which burrows under the scales and causes irritation. This results in the build up of fluid which forces the scales away form the legs causing this rather swollen crusty look. It can be got rid of and is worth doing especially if you plan to hatch eggs out from a broody. Also the scales can get knocked which causes bleeding. Its also infectious, not to humans luckily! To get rid of it, first catch your chook! Bathe its legs in warm water and scrub the legs with a nailbrush and soap. Dry the legs and then put on one of the following with a toothbrush: sump oil, cooking oil to which a few drops of kerosene or eucalyptus oil have been added. You can also use WD 40 but the cooking oil helps the recovery process. It may take a few weeks before you notice a difference. Weekly treatment is recommended until the legs start recovering. Happy chook keeping!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Jeanne, one of the L.A.P. volunteers at the One Tree Hill Primary School, kindly sent us this yummy recipe for Rum-Bumble Pudding. It serves six and should be prepared the day before. Ingredients:

1.5 tablespoons gelatine 0.3 cups of rum

2 egg whites beaten until stiff 0.5 cups chopped almonds

1 cup sugar 4 tablespoons whisky

1 pint whipped cream

Instructions: Soak gelatine in 2 tablespoons of water. Then dissolve in 6 tablespoons of boiling water. Add sugar, rum and whisky, stir well until sugar dissolves, then strain and cool. When the mixture begins to set, beat until frothy. Add egg whites and 2 tablespoons of whipped cream and fold until smooth. Continue until all the cream is used. Pour into a mould and chill. Serve with cream flavoured with rum and sprinkled with almonds.



VETERINARY NOTES FOR JULY

Is your cat a Siamese or Burmese cat? Does it eat strange things like wool? Are you wondering if this is a dietary deficiency, will it harm them and should you seek treatment? This condition is called "Pica" or "Perverse appetite" and is seen most commonly in the oriental breeds of cats. Pica is not well understood and a range of causes have been suggested, including insufficient dietary fibre, early weaning, get. Ic inheritance and excessive dependence on the cat's owner. Wool is the most commonly eaten substance, but this can progress to a whole range of fabrics and textiles. As a rule, problems only arise if the fibres either are caught around the teeth or if they become caught in the gut, in which case they can "saw" through the walls of the bowel and cause peritonitis and even death. Most cats with Pica, however, seem to manage without difficulty!

RURAL WATCH

At the recent Rural Watch Community Meeting, the guest speakers were three members of the Native Animal Network (NAN) They brought along two kangaroos, a baby hairy nosed wombat and a ring tailed possum, live exhibits of their work, and which added greatly to a very interesting presentation. NAN is a voluntary organisation with the main aims to give advice on animal care, to provide an educational resource on native animal care to schools and other interested parties, to continually upgrade knowledge on the subject, to give advice on care for injured sick and orphaned native animals. NAN is often involved in the rescue and recapture of escapees and freely gives advice on the best way to prevent a recurrence. If you wish to take a native animal into your personal care, then a permit or licence may be required. NAN can give you advice on this. It is illegal

to release a hand reared animal into the bush. In doing so it would most likely be exposed to a variety of dangers, against which it would be ill equipped to defend itself. PROPERTY IDENTIFICATION

As a result of the increase in break-ins recently, especially shed breaks, it's important to engrave your property. There are several engravers available for your use through your area coordinator. Engrave items such as videos on the rear with the letter "S" for South Australia followed by your Driver's Licence Number. This makes it hard for the thief to sell it. Also don't forget brushcutters, chain saws etc. Make a list of everything you engrave plus photos of those valuables you can't engrave and keep it in a safe place. This will make life harder for the thief and help the Police to get your property back.

MEET OUR COMMUNITY-JIM DAHL

Jim is the current President of the Torrens Valley Rotary Club until "changeover" night in July. Most people know him better as the bloke who cooks the sausages at the Rotary B.B.Q. on market days! Jim was born at Charra Station on the far West Coast of S.A. At age five he moved with his family to Denial Bay, also on the West Coast. It's called Denial Bay because Matthew Flinders sailed up it hoping to find the great inland sea. However most of Jim's childhood was spent at Ceduna except when he was boarding at Port Lincoln to attend High School. At age 17 Jim began his teaching career as a Junior Teacher. In those days teachers often learnt on the job, it was war time and teachers were in short supply, so he found himself teaching grades 3, 4 and 5, as well as year 8 English and geology. Actually Jim

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would have preferred to be a pilot but teaching was a family tradition. After a brief period at Adelaide Teachers' College he joined the RAAF as an Airgunner. He finally retired as the Principal of Kapunda High School but couldn't keep away from the classroom. For the next four years he taught at Adelaide High, Croydon High, Mercedes College and St Michael's College. Jim has lived in One Tree Hill for five and a half years after marrying his wife Tess. A second marriage for both of them has meant they now have 8 children and 13 grandchildren. Jim enjoys golf, travel, reading and writing poetry, playing the didgeridoo, and woodcarving. He also enjoys Rotary and has been involved with Rotary for 20 years. He's been President for 4 years in two different clubs and has found his time in Rotary enormously satisfying. 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

SIMON'S PET CORNER

Simon reports seeing the hawk that Pam told us about in last month's Grapevine but his pigeons are safe thanks to his tame magpie v went for it and flipped it over on to the road. It flew off okay but has not bothered his pigeons again! This part of the Grapevine is going to be reserved for discussion on childrens' pets and all One Tree Hill children can write in and tell us about their favourite pet and how they look after them, and why they make good pets. Also if you are having pet problems we may be able to help you. Simon Squire is going to start by telling everyone about one of his favourite pets horses! Simon says horses are nice animals and they make good pets even for very young children. Simon sat on his first horse when he was about two years old! You don't need too big a horse for a child. 13 hands is about right for an 11 year old. It's important to have a quiet tame horse that goes in the horse float nice and easily. Choosing the right horse is very important. Before buying check the horse thoroughly. This includes saddling the horse up and sitting on him, going for a little ride and unsaddling him. Also pick up and inspect his feet. Simon suggests finding out if the horse is used to a paddock or stable and try to house him in the same way. Feed your horse on lucerne hay, chaff, maybe some horse pellets mixed in or stablemate but that tends to make them frisky. You will need to ride your horse about four times a week if you can. Simon has foun if he hasn't ridden his horse for a long time he needs to lunge him first to get him tired! Brush your horse and pick his feet regularly. If you are riding on the road you will need shoes for his feet. Simon says ring 280 7396 about this! Horses enjoy tidbits like apples and carrots. They also like racing around in a big paddock. They like other horse company but Simon suggests you don't put two stallions together as the horses will get cuts, bruises and bites. You will need to geld one. Mares get on better. Simon doesn't recommend small ponies like shetlands as they can be nippy. Horses make good lawnmowers too! Simon warns that children should be nice and quiet near horses not running around in circles by them or shouting. If they behave like this the horses may kick, rear up or bite, and can be a dangerous animal. (Thanks Simon for telling us about your pet. Other children can write in. Leave your contribution at the Deli in an enevelope marked Grapevine and it should reach us).

COUNCILLOR MATTHEW HAYDEN'S UPDATE

Well I must say, it has been a very interesting period since my last report and also a very busy time, so let's begin with news this past month. First the bad news, RATES which you are all aware, very rarely come down and this year is no exception. The increases for most people this year will be between 1.79% to 3.67%, but there are others, who due to valuation increases by the valuer General's Department will be higher. Some 120-130 properties within the One Tree Hill Ward are affected by increases of 6-7% and most are within the Township. This is, in the main, a direct result of sales figures and



strong demand for properties in One Tree Hill.
