ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

New members are very welcome!

We are very keen to have new members, so if you are interested in community issues want to meet and work together with other locals for the development of One Tree Hill, please join us at the AGM. Supper will be provided.

Report from the meeting: April 20, 1995.

Planning approval for the new storeroom to be built on the northern side of the Hall has been given, so as soon as the engineer's report is completed, work will begin. We expect this to be during the week beginning on the 24th April. The storeroom will make access to trestles and other equipment much easier than it has been in the past. This is yet another project that has been made possible by the bequest funds left to the Progress Association by Ms Clucas, whose son died in WW1 - his name appears on the monument at the front of the hall along with other service men who died in this war.

ETSA has responded to a letter from Progress which expressed concern that cutting off power on high bushfire risk days meant that the pumps driving the town water supply could not operate. ETSA's response was that this policy needed to continue and so we would need to take action ourselves to ensure water supply to the town at these times. Action to follow this up will have to be planned.

The meeting also discussed the Minister for Transport, Ms Diana Laidlaw's response to our request that action be taken to improve the safety of the Blacktop Rd, Yorketown Rd intersection. You may recall there was a serious accident there last year. Ms Laidlaw indicated that as soon as resources permit, a number of changes will be made:

- Grading the area at the junction and to the west to reduce sight restrictions
- Installing a junction warning sign
- Addition of safety bar layouts to the Blacktop Rd arms to control turning
- Widening the area at the head of the junction to enable westbound motorists to proceed to the left of motorists turning right into Yorketown Rd.

These measures will certainly help and we hope that there will not be a long delay. Progress has written to acknowledge these plans but has expressed concern that nothing has been planned to address the dip in the road, which we believe to be the major problem. Ms Laidlaw

mentioned that this would be reassessed after the above measures were in place.

The archway which was damaged several weeks ago will be replaced. Unfortunately it was clipped by the hopper truck as it was turning into Blacktop Rd, and the archway crashed to the ground. Luckily no-one was injured. The new structure will be made higher to prevent a similar accident.

Martin Lindsell reported on the NAWMA Landfill project and plans to apply for funds for a streetscape project in the township which would involve putting power lines underground and creating a village green. It seems that the current hopper site would be ideal for a green and the hopper would be relocated to a more suitable place.

Progress has sent a letter to the council suggesting a roundabout be built at the intersection of Precolumb, Cross Hill, and Blacktop Rd to control traffic problems.

Plans to develop a golf course in One Tree Hill are before the council and approval is subject to satisfactory government reports on the issues of water supply and drainage. Concern was also expressed about the build up of soil from the new OTH quarry along the Para Wirra Road, as it is very close to the road and trees are being engulfed - perhaps you have noticed this as you've driven past.

Michelle Turner, who is standing as a candidate for the OTH district in the May Council elections, spoke to the meeting.

Our next meeting is the AGM, in the Institute at 8pm, Thursday 18th May, 1995.

EDITORIAL

Many of you will know that I lost two Border Collie dogs on March 26th. They took off after a fox and never returned. This has been a very distressing time and I wish I could say it had a happy ending but I still have not found them. However, in the efforts of searching, I discovered some facts about dog laws which I did not know before. I thought I would share this with you as others may not know either.

It is an offence to take in a stray dog and keep it without informing the Council. You can be fined \$2000 dollars if you do this. The animal cannot be taken directly to Sandy Creek Sanctuary or the Animal Welfare League, R.S.P.C.A., etc., by a member of the public. They only receive stray dogs through the Council. Munno Para Council keeps any strays a week and then they go to Sandy Creek Sanctuary where they are sold not destroyed. A number of other Councils send their dogs to Sandy Creek too. If you shoot a dog on your property, the law states that you have to inform the Police, and if the dog has I.D. such as discs, inform the owner or the Council.

If someone in this area has shot my dogs, or found them dead on their property, it would be an act of kindness to tell me even if you do this anonymously. Not to know what has happened to them causes continual torment. I would also like to thank many people in One Tree Hill for their support and kindness which they have shown in many different ways. It has been very much appreciated.

POULTRY AND BIRD NEWS

This month Simon would like to tell you about ducks, particularly Indian Runners. Indian Runners are usually a white colour, they stand up very tall, they can run very fast and they don't fly. Simon says their big advantage over Khaki Campbells and Muscovies is that they don't poo nearly as much and therefore are much nicer to have running around your garden and verandahs! Indian Runners are also good layers, laying about 160 eggs a year, and the eggs are big and great for pavlovas! Indian Runners are also good in the garden for eating snails and fertilising (on a small scale!) They are also good for showing but will need to get used to handling. Children scare them a bit if they get handled roughly. They need to be shut up at night and have good fencing around them because of foxes. While they need constant water they don't necessarily need a pond - a good tub of water will do. Feed them on chook or duck pellets. You can buy them at some fodder stores, such as Allingtons on occasion or possibly at the Gawler Poultry Market. This is held every Wednesday morning at the Gawler Trotting ground. Simon does not recommend either Khaki Campbells or Muscovies.

GARDENING NOTES FOR MAY

Here is a very easy recipe for a safe effective spray to use on those garden pests.

- Garlic spray
- 90 grams of chopped garlic cloves
- 2 tablespoons of mineral oil or liquid paraffin
- 15 grams pure soap or soap flakes
- 500 ml of warm water

Mix the garlic and the oil and stand for 48 hours. Dissolve soap in warm water. Mix the two solutions together and strain. A reasonably strong mix for spraying is one part mixture to 50 parts of water. You can try other dilutions if you like. This mixture is useful against aphids, caterpillars, snails and wireworm. It will also discourage many other pests. Garlic will also help against downy mildew, some rusts, leaf spots and early blight of tomato because of its antibiotic properties. PROPERTY IDENTIFICATION

As a result of the increased break-ins recently, especially shed breaks, it's important to engrave your property. There are several engravers available for your use through your area coordinator. Engrave items, such as videos, on the rear with the letter "S" for South Australia followed by your driver's licence number. This makes it hard for the thief to sell it. Also don't forget brushcutters, chain saws, etc. Make a list of everything you engrave, plus photos of those valuables you can't engrave, and keep it in a safe place. This will make life harder for the thief and help the Police get your property back.

ONE TREE HILL C.F.S.

The One Tree Hill C.F.S. has been very busy this fire season with numerous calls to incidents within our district and assisting our neighbouring brigades in their districts (especially the Tea Tree Gully Brigade with the Anstey Hill fire). We would like to thank everyone in the community for their support and assistance during our busy week of fires in January. The One Tree Hill Station was open for over 100 hours during the week, with over 50 appliances in our area at one time. Due to all members being very busy with callouts, hopper duty, etc., the distribution of the RAPID plates and key rings has been at a standstill. We aim to recommence the implementation of the RAPID system after the fire season has officially finished on the 30th April. Dawn Leonard, Admin. Officer (from the Rural Watch Newsletter) will give you advice on this.

POISONOUS PLANTS

If your caged bird is given flight time in the house they might possibly become curious and nibble on some house plants. The following plants are dangerous to your bird:

- Christmas cherry: the berry is bad news.
- Dieffenbachia: The leaves can cause severe regurgitation, loose droppings, swelling of the tongue and even suffocation.
- Dried arrangements: The seed pods and beans of tropical plants may be highly toxic.
- Mistletoe: The berries are highly toxic and can cause severe regurgitation, loose droppings and convulsions.

If your bird has dined on a poisonous plant, call the Poison Control Centre immediately and get veterinary aid. If you don't know the name of the plant, take it to the vet's office. (reproduced from newsletter of the Bird Care and Conservation Society)

RURAL WATCH

At the recent Rural Watch Community Meeting, the guest speakers were three members of the Native Animal Network (NAN). They brought along two kangaroos, a baby hairy nosed wombat and a ring tailed possum - live exhibits of their work - which added greatly to a very interesting presentation. NAN is a voluntary organisation with the main aims to give advice on animal care, provide an educational resource on native animal care to schools and other interested parties, to continually upgrade knowledge on the subject, to give advice on care for injured sick and orphaned native animals. NAN is often involved in the rescue and recapture of escapees and freely gives advice on the best way to prevent a recurrence. If you wish to take a native animal into your personal care, then a permit or licence may be required. NAN can give you advice on this. It is illegal to release a hand reared animal into the bush. Doing would most likely expose it to a variety of dangers, against which it would be ill equipped to defend itself. VETERINARY NOTES FOR MAY

Is my pet drinking too much? This is a common question but unfortunately there is no simple answer. The basic rule is that if your cat is drinking more than 50ml for each kilogram it weighs (100ml/kg for dogs), each day then their intake is excessive. This means that a 10 kilogram dog should drink less than one litre of fluids per day. Apart from normal causes of increased drinking, such as exercise or hot weather, there are a number of diseases which can lead to abnormally high fluid intake or polydipsia. The most common diseases are Diabetes Mellitus (or sugar Diabetes) in dogs and kidney failure in the older cats. There is another much rarer form of diabetes called Diabetes Insipidus caused by reduced amounts of a hormone which stimulates the kidneys to concentrate the urine. Other causes of polydipsia can include both low and high activity of the adrenal gland, excessive thyroid hormone production, liver failure and kidney and reproductive tract infections. If you think your pet is drinking too much, then the first step is always to find out how much they are drinking. Mark a line on their water bowl and always fill to that line. You can then accurately record how much it takes to top up the bowl over 3 or 4 days and your vet can start on the (sometimes) long road for an answer. Whilst I can't name everybody, I would like to mention Graham Hill for his work as our Councillor during 1989-91, Peter Watson for his untiring efforts in making sure we had the best CFS station in the state, Vince Cozzitorto, Bruce Schultz, Dean Pentland and Dean Kossatz for their work in implementing the RAPID scheme, operation of the hopper and in getting the new fire unit commissioned before our Mayor Jo Gapper retired.

Among some of the other things we have achieved together are:

New CFS fire units, new club room and improved facilities at McGilp Oval which include the automatic irrigation system and fencing of the oval, Scouts and Cubs Hall, new fencing, water tanks and patio, along with paving and painting of the shed in the playgroup area at the Institute, commencement of and ongoing commitment to upgrading Grandview Drive Reserve, improvements and better facilities for Springvale Heights Reserve, a more equitable rating system, Greening of Munno Para projects (the first project, in 1985,

was the planting of Miles Road), planting of trees and shrubs throughout the city, new signs for our township, upgrade and improvements to One Tree Hill cemetery and better maintenance of Uley cemetery, ongoing commitment to Uleybury School Museum and a monthly hopper service including bins for recycling.

This year I have managed to get another kilometre of Kentish Road sealed, part of Gulfview Drive constructed and sealed. At present, Council's road construction crew is constructing the first stage of Medlow Road - from Craigmores Road junction - 2.7km west to the quarry entrance. This is at no cost to ratepayers because it is being funded through a "Special Local Roads Grant" and the remainder to Main North Road should be completed later this year with funds being provided as part of the Northern Adelaide Waste Management Authority's (NAWMA) Landfill facility.

For next year, apart from completing Williams Road, I would also like to see the final section of Kentish Road constructed, along with the sealing of Tyeka Drive and another section of Shillabeer Road. I am confident, unless there is a major change to the present Council, that there will be an increase in road construction funds in 1995/96.

For your information, here are my requests for OTH Ward:

ROAD CONSTRUCTION: Complete Kentish Road (800m), Williams Road (600m), 1km of Shillabeer Road (eastern end), sealing of Tyeka Drive = \$300,000. Construct and seal Taylors Road, Walter Road, Gould Creek Road, Miles Road, Kaiser Drive, Gulfview Drive, Willison Road, Paines Road, Eagle Nest Road, Johnson Road, Rutland Drive, Highfield Drive, Spring Road, Vivian Road, Blencowe Road, Kellys Hill Road, Karwin Road, and complete Sommerton Road = \$1m. Upgrade and improve road safety at Black Top Road, Cross Hill Road, and Precolumb Road Junction as well as complete kerb and guttering and provide a bus hard-stand = \$50,000.

GRANDVIEW DRIVE RESERVE: Installation of fencing and playground station, sprinkler system and grassing of playing area, park furniture, etc = \$24,000.

SPRINGFIELD HEIGHTS RESERVE: Installation of another light, further park furniture, netting for games such as cricket, etc., improved landscape = \$20,000.

McGILP OVAL: Complete new shower/toilet block, provide sporting equipment, playground station and park furniture = \$30,000.

ONE TREE HILL: Improve streetscape, participate in ETSA's Plexi-Scheme, create 'Village Green' next to Institute = \$60,000.

ONE TREE HILL CEMETERY: Improve landscaping, better drainage and pave footpaths = \$20,000.

ULEY CEMETERY: Improve landscaping, maintenance = \$5,000.

Thanks again for all your help over the past 10 years.

I look forward to serving you as Mayor, and making Munno Para both the 'Greenest City in South Australia' as well as the 'City of Strong Community Growth' into the 21st Century.
