


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THE ARCH DISASTER

After waiting months for the replacement arch over McGilp Road to arrive and be erected it took less than a week before it was knocked over again! Those who did see it before it disappeared claim that it was less arched and not set higher than the original one (which was understood to be the plan) so that it had less clearance than the previous one! One thing we are looking for is any photographs of the original arch so that this claim can be tested. The arch commemorated the gift of the OTH Tree Hill Oval - McGilp Park to the community of One Tree Hill by a Mr McGilp earlier this century. He was a resident of the area, saw the need for recreation space for this community and gave the land to us. While it is now vested in the council there is a "Oval Committee" that takes responsibility for its use and future plans. The bulk of the new reserves in One Tree Hill abutt the park creating a very interesting area for use now and in the future. The arch then both showed the way to this facility and marked the gift.

Since we have now lost it twice in a few months there are some questions being raised. These include: Should it be put back in the same spot? Two alternatives proposed are over the entrance to the park itself or to the side of its present position. Should it be rebuilt at its original site - but ensuring that it is a bit higher? What do you think? How about a letter to the editor or come to a Progress meeting and share your thoughts. Progress Meetings are always open to all people interested in One Tree Hill.

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JILL WILSON - Progress Meeting 21/9/95

Plans for street scaping and the reserves in and around One Tree Hill are a continuing topic. We have appreciated the presence of our councillor Matthew Hayden at this and previous meetings. These meetings are a regular meeting point between residents of the area and our councillor. (Are you aware that Matthew also usually comes to the OTH Market days? This is another good time to talk with him and share your views and hear what is going on.) We are looking for some followup of previous discussions that we have had with Gwyn Cleeves of the Munno Para Council about overall planning of the reserves in One Tree Hill. In particular we would to see residents of the township and others interested in the development of these reserves being involved in the planning and implementation of work in these areas. Keep your ears open for further developments. Improving the look of the town is another matter that we is an ongoing issue.

TRINITY COLLEGE BUSH CAMPUS

Since the community meeting held at the One Tree Hill Institute on the 28th August 1995 where the College outlined its plans and sought feedback on other possible locations, Dale Martin from the College has been following up a number of suggestions that were put forward. Trinity is keen to hear from the local community about any properties, and particularly those which abut the recreation park or the forestry reserves which might accommodate a bush campus. In addition to identifying alternative locations Dale has been visiting neighbours of the Tuckwell property where a campus site was the subject of an earlier unsuccessful application. The purpose of the visits is to provide a personal contact with the College and to seek feedback on the issues of concern to neighbours, and where possible, how to address these issues should another site be identified and an application made. The Bush Campus concept is unique in South Australia and will provide at any one time 60 students with a home away from home on week nights for two terms. During the day students will

undertake their studies as part of the normal year 9 curriculum, supplementing and enriching their learning by using the surroundings to better understand local environmental, historical and scientific features. Students will take the opportunity at the campus to explore a range of outdoor activities of a recreational and educational nature which are in sympathy with the environment. The anticipated outcomes for the students will be in developing their ability to relate to others, improved self esteem and greater environmental appreciation and sensitivity. Local community benefits anticipated are in terms of the maintenance and development of the property under sound management strategies, shared enterprises such as seedling production, use of local expertise and industry such as sheep management, and a focal point for locals with common interests in wildlife regeneration, photography and bird watching. FROM OUR FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT - Ann Davenport Unfortunately this item arrived a bit late for inclusion in last month's Grapevine and now our much travelled foreign correspondent has returned after a trip through Sweden, Finland, Germany, Austria, Italy, France, England, Scotland,

land and home through Singapore!! However it is not too late for us to get a bit of an insight into some of the different life styles which Ann and Terry met overseas. On Dogs...Now, I'm a dog lover, but I must say I have been surprised at the extent to which the French seem to love their dogs! They take them on holiday to big cities, to the beach, the supermarket, the laundromat and to restaurants - where they sit under the table - and even to the butchers! However perhaps they do know where to draw the line - the escalators at Le Louvre had signs indicating no dogs - as if anyone could take their dogs to the world's most famous art gallery!! Not surprisingly most city dogs seem to be small - poodles or terriers. Some are scruffy, others are pampered with bows in their hair. But the most surprising sight of all was a French couple with their large dog in the showrooms of an exclusive Italian glass manufacturer, surrounded by wine glasses etc., all at a very dangerous tail wagging height. I was terrified that the dog and its tail would show an enthusiastic interest in something or somebody. In Vichy, France, there was a "doggy bar" on one street - a solid marble drinking trough for canine passers by. In Nice they also drew lines on the

footpaths illustrated with doggy pictures to direct dogs to "do their business" on the curb side of the pavement. And those Riviera dogs must read too, cos that's where they did it - well mostly!

On beaches...The French may have the Riviera but what they don't have is sand! Instead they have cobblestones which are rather hard on bare feet and not at all comfortable to lie on. Trying to look cool and elegant amongst the tanned and bare breasted beauties at the beach is rather difficult when you find yourself wincing and hobbling painfully from the water (even crawling on hands and knees at times) back to the safety and comfort of one's sandals and towel.

On the environment...While we sort and recycle the Europeans are at it too. One example was the green curbside domes where people deposit their glass containers. In Sweden we saw an interesting enterprise where cow dung was being converted into gas for domestic use. Of course, in a country where their animals are housed in barns over winter, collecting this dung would be much easier. I wouldn't want to chase our animals over ten acres with a spade! In Sweden too we saw wind generators and in Italy small electric buses. Pollution has wreaked havoc on old buildings in European cities, creating multi million dollar cleaning and restoration projects. Most of the buildings in Rome and Florence, for instance, have been coated with black grime and the accummulation of this and other pollutants eat into the stonework and corrode it away. Unfortunately graffiti artists have left their ugly marks too. often on significant and sentimentally valuable buildings and statues. Nevertheless clean up projects are underway and the results are remarkable. Le Louvre in France looks renewed and in Italy it's heartening to see buildings where restoration is giving new life and colour.

It was a familiar story! However in Australia we don't have the distressing sight of beggars in the streets or young children of about 4 or 5 collecting money from travellers in dirty coke cups or joining others to pick pockets.

On breakfast, continental style... While the average Aussi may be sitting down to cornflakes, tea and good old toast and vegemite his or her Italian counterpart seems to be munching out on croissants and coffee. Many Italians seem to have their breakfast on the way to work, in small cafes which also double as bars which they can revisit on the way home. Ask for a cup of coffee there and you'll get a tiny cup that's one third full of strong (and I mean strong!) expresso coffee. Most people I watched then added one to two teaspoons of sugar

to this tiny tablespoon or so of caffeine. Quite a boost to the day I'd say !!

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

coming to Australia she worked as a legal secretary. She married Ken Richardson and they had two children. Ken believed

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that the family should come to Australia as the children would have more opportunity in this land than England. After two years Ken finally convinced Sybil that this move was the one they should take. So they arrived in South Australia in 1964 and lived in a hostel at Smithfield for two weeks prior to moving to Elizabeth Downs. As both Ken and Sybil were used to

the small "village" in the "old country" they set about looking for such a place. Their searching brought them to One Tree Hill in 1972 and to the building of their home, a lot of which they did themselves. Ken died in 1982 and Sybil later married Doug Winsor. Sybil has been so involved in community work and helping other people it is hard to describe how much this is part of Sybil's life. While living in Elizabeth Downs, Sybil came to the Progress Meetings at One Tree Hill. Later she was secretary and president of the Progress Association. As a member of the Uniting Church Sybil has served as an Elder for many years. She was involved in the Craft Shop when that first "got off the ground" and continued to be a committee member and serve in the shop for ten years. Sybil also worked for the Para District Counselling Service for 9 years and Lifeline for two years. Sybil is currently involved with the L.A.P. programme at the One Tree Hill Primary School. Lyell McEwin Hospital as a Uniting Church Personal visitor. It must be mentioned that Sybil and Jill Wilson were the founders of the "Grapevine". These were run off on a spirit

NEWS FROM THE PAST

Some of you may have missed the item in August's Grapevine which explained the history of the McGilp road archway because a number of you have been asking about it again. Here is an extract from the Grapevine in October 1987 which explains the history. The McGilp family donated the land on which sporting facilities were established in 1929. The archway was constructed many years later by members of the community and ogress Association. The finance was raised by a youth group which had disbanded prior to the opening. The archway was officially opened as a tribute to the McGilp family on Saturday 27th October 1962. An equestrian event was held on the oval after the opening ceremony. All entrants paraded through the archway after the ribbon was cut by Mr Lachlan McGilp and his daughter in law Mrs Neil McGilp. A commemoration ball was held that evening in the Institute. In August I asked if we were going to have a similar opening ceremony when this one was replaced. In view of recent events it's a good job we didn't arrange anything. The first archway was up for nearly 33 years without a problem, the second arch was there for less than a week. Let's hope "they get it right" for the third archway!

VETERINARY NOTES FOR NOVEMBER - GRASS SEEDS. Early Summer brings with it the problem of grass seeds. The most common offender is the wild oat seed. With its sharp point and barbs it is well equipped to penetrate the skin and move through the tissues carrying bacteria with it. The most vulnerable locations are: Ears, feet, eyes and nose. These must be dealt with immediately. Once penetration has taken place it is essential to find and remove the seed. This can take many months if it has a good start migrating

along a tract in body tissues. I help my dog by clipping all hair from feet, under the ears and underneath chest and abdomen. Licking, sneezing or headshaking are early signs that something is wrong. Beware of grass seeds at this time.

GARDEN TIPS FOR NOVEMBER-INSECTS

A gardener should tolerate much of the insect life in the garden. The few insects that are seriously destructive usually can be controlled by moderate methods. Quite often the damage is not serious enough to justify special action, and a natural balance can be reached if some damage is tolerated and the gardener leaves the destruction of the pest to the natural predators of the insect world. For all gardeners it is important to make a distinction between serious damage and the normal day to day blemishes and defects in plants caused by the general activities of insects. RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Here is a great Christmas cake recipe for all One Tree Hill oks. You'll need a cup of water, a cup of sugar, four (arge eggs, two cups of dried fruit, a teaspoon of baking 50da, a teaspoon of salt, a cup of brown sugar, lemon juice. Auts and a bottle of whisky. Sample the whisky to check for Quality. Take a large bowl. Check the whisky again to be sure et is of the highest quality, pour one level cup and drink repeat. Turn on the electric mixer. Beat one cup of butter in a large fluffy bowl, add one spoontea of sugar and beat again. Make sure the whisky is still okay, cry another tup. Turn off the mixer, break two leggs and add to the bowl and chick in one cup of dried fruit, mix on the turner. If the fruit gets Stuck to the beaters, pry it loose with a drewscriber, sample the whisky again to check for tonsisticity. Next sift two Cups of salt, or something, who cares? check the whisky. Now seft the lemon juice and strain your nuts. Add one babblespoon of drown sugar, or whatever colour you can find, mix well. Grease the oven and turn the cake pan to 350 gredees. Don't forget to beat off the turner, throw the bowl out of the Window, check the whisky again and go to bed.

PEST OF THE MONTH

The est this month is Bridal Creeper, which is a proclaimed plant under the SA Animal and Plant Control Act 1986. Bridal Creeper is a light green hairless perennial climber with thin Evining stems to 3 metres long. It has a dense fibrous root system with many underground tubers. The leaves are pointed, oval, 2-3cm long, shiny, parallel-veined. Small white flowers are produced along the stems in early spring. The flowers are followed by red berries 6-10mm diameter containing several Seeds. Originally it was introduced from South Africa as a garden plant but it is now widespread. This plant is dormant in the summer. The tubers sprout at the Autumn break and vegetative growth continues through winter and spring. Flowers appear in August followed by berries which are eaten by birds. This plant is a problem because it forms a dense cover which Liminates native shrubs and ground flora. This is one of hose plants which, if you've got it on your property, you are o bliged by law to control it and you may be required to defray the costs of control on neighbouring roadside reserves. You will need to hand weed, dig up the tubers and spray when the plants are actively growing but before flowering.

available for residents who didn't collect a paper. Around one hundred copies were printed, somewhat less than the six hundred currently



Do: Take care when handling the bird, for your own sake as well as the bird's. Remove the bird from possible sources of danger such as cats, dogs, ants and extreme heat or cold. Place the bird in a warm protected environment such as a strong ventilated cardboard carton. Remember that the bird will be in shock from its injuries and from being handled. young children. Call the Bird Care and Conservation Society as soon as possible for advice, or to arrange for a member to take over treatment. Members are listed in your telecom white pages. Do NOT: leave the bird for hours without seeking help. Prompt action is most important if the bird is to survive. Don't attempt to treat the bird unless you know exactly what you are doing. Don't keep the bird to amuse the children. It is a wild sensitive creature that feels pain, fear, heat, cold and hunger - it is not a plaything! It is more beneficial to educate your children to be caring responsible people. Don't attempt to keep the bird as a pet - it is a wild bird and very likely a protected species. You could be liable for a heavy fine. Don't simply leave the bird in a cage with seed - many birds are not seedeaters. One of the most commonly rescued birds is the lorikeet which looks like a seed eating parrot. It is in fact a nectar-eater! Most importantly don't pick up young birds which are being attended by parent birds unless they are in imminent danger.
