DID YOU KNOW - Some local history

At the Uleybury School Museum there are the old School Registers for the Uleybury School. At the beginning of the books are the notes and instructions for the teachers. Here are some extracts from the 1908 register.

1. Teacher should be on the premises at 9am to see that the room is tidy and dusted, the materials ready for the day's work and

all necessary blackboarding done.

2. The second whistle should sound at 9.15am when the children will assemble, an inspection of hands, boots and hair made, breathing exercises and a little of the new drill be taken and a short observation lesson be given.

3. At 9.30 the children will be in their places and at work. Teachers should wish the children "good morning" before work

begins.

4. Out Offices: It is a good idea to keep a tin of dry earth and a scoop in each place and to see that the children use them freely. This is extremely important for health reasons. The seats should be thoroughly scrubbed with hot water and soap once a week.

Give three temperance lessons per quarter and see that the

pledge book is signed by all who are willing.

6. Attend to positions of pens and bodies. Children should sit well back from their books. Let them know the reason for this. Fifteen inches is the minimum distance between eye and book to prevent short sight.

Get the children to carry their bags on the right side when

going to school and on the left when going home.

8. Singing lessons should begin with breathing exercises. Children should sing marching in and out of school and at change of lessons. Give frequent lessons in voice training and make the children open their mouths.

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
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VETERINARY NOTES FOR MARCH

Buying a Horse - Negotiating a minefield!!!

Purchasing the ideal horse can be a frustrating and confusing episode. overzealous vendors whose long discourses about their horse's advanced intellect and athletic ability can easily blind one to other less desirable qualities and imperfections. Remember that with a few exceptions, it's a buver's market - so do not rush into anything!

Clearly set out in your own mind the tasks you will be asking your horse to do. The old adage there are "horses for courses" is very true. It is often helpful to take an experienced friend along with you to look at any horse

you are interested in buying.

Temperament: This is often the single most important characteristic, since riding is supposed to be a pleasurable activity. Compatibility between horse and rider is essential both on and off the saddle. Vices such as biting, kicking, rearing and unwillingness to float are fairly obviously undesirable

Size: Ensure that the horse in question is of suitable statue for you. This can best be assessed from observation in the saddle. Also try to assess the

horse's age accurately.

Bodily Condition: Although horses in poor or overweight condition can often be nursed back to health, always bear in mind the possibility of problems which may be associated with such states. The skinny horse may be suffering permanent bowel damage from worms, or be affected with severe dental disease whereas the fat pony may well have weak feet from chronic founder.

General Health: Symptoms such as chronic coughing, diarrhoea, skin disorders, cloudiness of eyes, etc., must be viewed with disfavour. Action: If after considering the above points you are still interested in the horse, then it is time to assess the limbs. There are a few basic pointers which are useful in this regard:

Compare - with the horse standing square, stand back and compare the fore and hind limbs. Any discrepancy between the contour of the limbs should be noted particularly over joints and tendons. It must be stated that many blemishes are not unsoundness. Carefully check all the hooves. Variation in the size of opposite hooves is a suspicious finding.

Observe - Watch the horse in all gaits particularly the trot. This is best performed on a lunge and on a level surface. Abnormalities may show as unevenness or lameness, or unwillingness to lead with the correct leg at the canter.

Feel - many people find it easier to detect lameness when riding the horse. Subtle abnormalities can often be felt from the saddle. If the vendor is willing to let you take the animal on lease, it can be of great help to spend time getting to know the animal. It is important to draw up a lease contract to the satisfaction of both parties to avoid any confusion as to your respective responsibilities and liabilities in the event of injury or illness.

Professional Examination: Pre-purchase veterinary examination of the horse is advisable as it will detect any subtle lameless or other abnormalities which may lead to problems in the future. This can save you money and, just as importantly, much wasted time and effort.

POULTRY AND BIRD NEWS

This month Simon is going to tell us about pigeons. There are many different kinds of pigeons and they are often distinguished by the way they fly. Birmingham Roller pigeons and Donics fly up high and then come rolling or spinning down. Muff Tumblers fly along and do flips. Serbian High Flyers fly very high and glide down. Most pigeons can fly so high they will be out of sight. Kings are a heavier type of bird and they aren't meant to fly properly. Pure bred Kings are distinguished by a red ring around their eye.

Pigeons come in all sorts of colours such as black, white, black & white, lavender, tan, speckled or with different colours such as blue, red, lemon or silver as bars on their flight feathers. A baby pigeon is called a squeaker. Pigeons lay two eggs. They take 18-20 days to hatch. Pigeons are good mothers and will often accept other pigeon babies if only one of their eggs hatched. Pigeons secrete a special kind of "milk" inside their crop. They store food in their crop and drink water which mixes into a milk-like substance which they feed to their babies. Pigeons are housed in a special shed called a pigeon loft. This has an area they can fly around in, roosts and nest boxes with doors on to let them out. At first the birds are kept in for four weeks and they can be allowed to fly free. When they have had enough they come back of their own accord. Sometimes they can have problems with enemies such as falcons, hawks and small eagles. Wedgetails are not a problem as they can't fly fast enough. Simon suggests banging tin cans together. This puts the hawks off and the pigeons can be trained to come down when you start banging. Also beware of cats getting into the pigeon loft at night. Simon says you can feed your pigeons on special pigeon mix or make up your own food using peas, wheat grain, saffron, and milo but not corn.

The pigeon and Canary Club run shows and although the prizes are not big you can get trophies. To prepare for a sow you can shampoo and shine them. Kings need to be trained to turn their tails up. Simon reckons pigeons are lots of fun and are interesting especially all the different ways they fly. Thanks Simon for telling us about them.



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MEET OUR COMMUNITY - Phil Squire

Phil was born in Walingford near Shillingford in Oxfordshire, England. He remembers they had a scullery and a special room for the coal and the group of houses they lived in had a communal well. When he was six they moved to Oxford and he remembers going to school on a sled his dad made in the winter. Phil and his family came to Australia in 1956 on the SS Strath. He really enjoyed the boat trip. His parents only saw him in the morning and at night. At first they went to Semaphore to stay with an uncle. They were told that Adelaide was a cowboy town where people tied their horses up outside the hotels and certainly the hotels had hitching rails outside them! As they drove to his uncle's, they went past a goat farm so Phil had a smelly introduction to South Australia! At that time steam trains ran down the Semaphore Road and Phil remembers seeing the John Martin's Christmas Pageant on television in England.

The family moved to Glanville and Phil attended Ethelton Primary - well he attended about one day a week. The rest of the time he spent visiting all the horse studs in the area. There were a lot there at that time and he knew every one! He also remembers paddling around the mangroves where West Lakes is now. His best friend was an Aboriginal boy who had been taken away from his parents and lived in the local orphanage with others, similarly taken. When Phil was 14, he'd had enough of school and left. He got a job at Carr Fasteners as an electro plater but after two years he left to work on a horse stud called Woodcroft Farm. It was here that he had his first attempt at shoring horses! After six months he returned to Carr Fasteners where he stayed six years. He met Jan, got engaged, found her a job at Carr Fasteners and then left to work at SABCO. Phil and Jan were married on March 6th 1971. Jan wasn't allowed time off for their honeymoon so she left and Phil got a job at SABCO too. Their daugh' Megan, was born on December 26th 1974, the day after Cyclone Tracy mt Darwin

Phil was made redundant but soon got a job at Bonnetts Saddlery as a wholesale salesman and he was here 10 years. Phil also spent five years in the CMF. Phil's first contact with One Tree Hill was through his interest in Irish Setter dogs and friends who had a block here. This was eighteen years ago. The family lived at Tregoodwill on Harvey Road for five years and have lived at the Uleybury School for the past nine years.

Phil has always maintained his love for horses. This resulted in him being Master of the Salisbury Hunt Club for three years, and he still follows the Hunt. Here it is simulated hunting with people following the master over jumps. There are no hounds or foxes. The Hunt used to come around One Tree Hill and Kersbrook, but not any more. Phil also used to be President of the Pony Club and President and Vice President of the Novelty Riding Club which is now defunct. Phil owned his first horse when he was 24 and often used to fall offl. He taught himself how to shoe horses. He did attend a TAFE course but he had to wait so long for a place in it that by the time he got there, he didn't learn anything he didn't already know! Phil has done full time farrier work for the last six years but part time farrier work for the last twenty. Phil also has done some eventing, four television

ndvertisements, and been involved in movies such as the "Light Horsemen". Simon was born nearly ten years ago and Phil says he won't be allowed to leave school at the end of Grade 7!

NEWS AND VIEWS FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR - Dear

Residents.

Well, two months of 1995 gone already and the local Government elections will be upon us in two months. Do take your right to vote and have your say on SATURDAY MAY 6th - the first Saturday in May. It should be quite eventful - what with the market, the Munno Para Council elections and the Hopper on site. It will certainly be a hectic and hopefully rewarding day for all involved in the different functions.

As you will be aware, Blacktop Road near the Power Station has been improved. Yorktown Road has still to be completed, and I am still awaiting the Department of Transport's report on the Blacktop Road/Yorktown Road junction.

In the meantime, Council has sealed another kilometre of Kentish Road, is planning to construct and seal 200 metres of Gulfview Drive from its junction with Blacktop Road for safety reasons and a contract has been let to construct a section of Medlow Road should the landfill facility go ahead. However, it is not and has never been intended to be an alternative access. Council is constructing and sealing this section for the benefit of its residents. The work is being paid for with a special local road grant of \$200,000. A sand quarry on Milluna Stud will go ahead, however there should be minimum impact on residents or the environment. It is planned to operate for two years and the area will be revegetated restored to a natural contour.

'Ine town water supply is linked into the E&WS system and can be drawn on in cases of need. The supplementary bore for One Tree Hill on Lance Walter's property is operable and can also be used when necessary.

Plans for the store room on the Institute and the new toilet/shower block at McGilp Oval are progressing well and construction should start before the end of this financial year.

Our new CFS fire unit, hopefully by the time you read this, should be in operation. It took a little longer than anticipated but, fortunately it wasn't required for its main role but I'm sure our CFS personnel would've appreciated its capabilities for some of the other incidents that occurred over Christmas. New Year and since. The RAPID system number plates delivery is nearing completion and I would like to thank Council for funding this very worthwhile safety and identification initiative and especially the CFS who have dedicated many many hours over and above their fire fighting, hopper servicing, and many other community roles to ensuring that our area is covered with an easy identity system. Thank you all for a great job - well done!

bile Garbage Bins (MGBs) will be introduced into our district over the next few months. These 140 litre bins will replace all past refuse services and should encourage a greater use of NAWMA's recycling facility. If you require further information on the MGBs, recycling or any other facet of waste collection/management, please ring NAWMA on 250 8910.

GARDENERS' CORNER

We were very pleased to receive the following gardening hints from local resident John Chapman which will be very helpful to all those people trying to grow fruit trees in our arid climate. He says "I scooped the area out saucer shaped, put on key drippers, and left a square metre in the centre. I laid down cardboard (or newspaper, 6 sheets thick, covered with mulch or spent hay, old weeds, etc., then filled the centre with horse manure. This lasts for two years then I repeat the process. You can still fertilise, but it is particularly effective with shallow rooted citrus. It stops drying out, gives protection to worms, slaters, etc., and you can plant tomatoes and capsicums in the area under the tree quite successfully. Keep manure away from the trunk. It works particularly well with bore water, or limited watering. Vegies can be grown on dripper lines covering between drippers with a few sheets of paper with a few clods of earth, etc., on top thus suppressing the weeds as well as keeping the ground and dripper hose cool. It's also very easy to fertilise".

Thanks, John, may be others would like to add to this or contribute their own One Tree Hill gardening suggestion.

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ACTIVE BREAKERS:

Lock up your houses and lock up your sheds, we are currently experiencing a large increase in house and shed breaks within our area. Since November 1st 1994 our area has ben the target of more than thirty crimes with the majority being house and shed breakins. This number outweighs the entire total number of reported incidents for the whole of the 1993/94 financial year. Along with this problem we have also experienced several fires which have been deliberately lit and which caused a large amount of damage to property. For these offences to have occurred the offenders must have had the use of vehicles, therefore, if there is vehicle unfamiliar to you or one you think is suspicious and in your area, please take down the registration number and hold on to it just in case the police come knocking on your door asking for your help to stop these crimes in our area. Please remember that a registration number makes a lot of difference when trying to solve these types of crimes.

This is our first Rural Watch Newsletter for 1995. Here's hoping that all enjoyed a safe and happy festive season. Who, you might ask, is writing this introductory passage. Well, I am Neil Smith, the new Area Coordinator for Rural Watch in the One Tree Hill area.

I had only recently returned to the One Tree Hill area with my family when I noted that a Rural Watch meeting was being held at the Institute. As concerned residents of the area, my family and I attended the meting. It was at this meeting that I volunteered to be Area Coordinator. It is all new to me but with the support from Committee members and residents alike i am sure we will get through.

On a more serious note, the grass fires that occurred in January caused a large amount of damage but fortunately not to lives or livestock. If you haven't already done so, it would be an ideal time to clean out those gutters, cut back the trees and shrubs and generally clear our properties of debris. Remember there is a lot to be said about preventative measures. Bearing in mind that the fires are believed to have been deliberately lit, it is up to all of us to be vigilant and report any suspicious persons or vehicles in the area immediately to police and/or Rural Watch committee members. Being vigilant can also apply to fire reporting. The Johnson Road fire was reported by only one resident and not by any of the motorists driving along Blacktop Road at the time. Fire watching from the power station has been discontinued, so it is up to all of us to do our bit.

On behalf of the One Tree Hill community, I would like to thank the CFS for the great job they did in fighting the fires. In these tough economic times with government cutbacks it is now more than ever that we need to pull together as a community and not lose sight of what Rural Watch is all about. In 1995 let's make every effort to keep One Tree Hill a safe and secure place for all residents.

As the new Area Coordinator, I look forward to the support of all members of our community.

If you intend to breed your goats in the coming season, now is the time to decide which buck to use. Bookings do not need to be made just yet, but approaches to the buck owners would be welcome and you can think at your leisure about pedigrees and conformation. Remember that the billy down the road may be cheaper, but the pedigreed one gives a greater surety of the quality of the offspring. Within the Dairy Goat Society, there are now stringent disease controls in place, and any does using registered bucks need to have blood tests before the matings will be permitted. These can be planned now, giving you plenty of time to carry them out. They protect your doe as well as the herds of registered breeders.
