WHAT'S ON IN ONE TREE HILL This is the start of the year and some of the newcomers to the District may be wondering what goes on in One Tree Hill. Some of the less recent residents may be wondering too so I thought I would list some of the activities. I am sure to miss something out, so I hope you will let me know if I have and we have and we headline them in the next Grapevine. If you are interested in your community you might like to join the ONE TREE HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION. This Association has been in existence for over 35 years and its basic aims are: to foster community spirit and promote the welfare of the One Tree Hill community, to promote the expansion, improvement and maintenance of educational, sporting and other facilities for the residents; to administer the Institute Hall and to take an interest in all district matters. Meetings are held on the third Thursday of every month at 8pm in the Institute. Everyone is welcome. RURAL WATCH is another organisation for everyone who lives here. It is similar to the Neighbourhood Watch programme in the city with a local Coordinator and a Police Liaison Officer. We get a number of breakins, burglaries, even arson in our area. There were 26 incidents in the last 3 months alone. The next meeting will be on Monday February 27th at 7.30pm at the Institute when a member of the Security Advisory Unit will give a talk and demonstration. Rural Watch meetings are held regularly throughout the year usually on the third Monday of the month. The COUNTRY FIRE SERVICE is another community activity of great importance, our "local heroes" do a magnificent job in times of fire and accidents. While some are out actively fighting fires. others are looking after the radio, preparing food and drink for the fighters, and other necessary tasks. CFS members also help with the monthly hopper service. Dawn Leonard is the Administrative Officer and can be contacted at the CFS shed on Monday and Friday nights after 7.30pm. Perhaps you are interested in crafts. You might like to become involved in our LOCAL CRAFT SHOP. All goods sold within the shop are produced by community members and sold on a commission basis. The ONE TREE HILL CHILD PARENT CENTRE is a very special place for children and parents. The Centre aims to provide play and activities which will help children develop skills and confidence in a happy learning environment. Although children cannot begin until 3 years 9 months, enrolments are needed early. The Centre is based within the Primary school and much time is spent sharing in activities with the Junior Primary classes so that when the time comes to start school there is no trauma.

DID YOU KNOW - some local history

The construction of the Institute building began in 1906. On November 7th of that year, Edward Kelly laid the Foundation Stone. He was presented with a silver trowel, suitably inscribed to mark the occasion. Among the one hundred or so people who attended the ceremony were E.A. Thomas, T. Hutchins, G. Smith, J.S. Harvey, F. Ifould, G.G. Wallace who was the architect of the building and R. Fiebig, the Postmaster and General Store keeper of One Tree Hill. The Institute cost about 600 pounds to build. The money was loaned by Arthur Thomas. Stone for the structure cam from a quarry on the O'Connor property on Cornishman's Hill Road. By the way, this road was named after a Mr Skews who came from Cornwall and had a hilltop property in the vicinity. Mr Reg Ruder was the MP at the time and he organised a fundraising activity at the time of the Foundation Stone laying which raised quite a lot of money.

The Institute has been the town meeting place from the beginning and has been the focal point of the area's social and sporting activities. Concerts and monthly dances were held regularly and a popular library operated in the building in the underground room under the stage right up until the 1960s. Apparently the room was damp which can't have been too good for the books.

In the early years the Rechabite Lodge held a yearly Carnival and Big Ball. The Carnival was held on Sampson's Flat followed by Ball and Concert in the Institute. Talented artists came from Adelaide to entertain the community.

A supper room was built on the side of the Institute as a memorial to those who died in World War Two, while at the front a monument was erected to honour those who died in both World War One and Two. Names and photographs of those who served are displayed in the hall and trees were dedicated to the men. Improvements are still taking place at the Institute and it remains an important part of our community.

There is no GARDENING ADVICE this month as unfortunately our Gardening Adviser is sick.

POULTRY CORNER The Grapevine is lucky to have secured t' services of Simon Squire, a young man with a great deal of k...wledge and experience on all kinds of poultry. He has agreed to give us regular information, and this month will be talking about Silkie Bantams. For those of you who are unfamiliar with this breed they resemble little fluff balls, their feathers being long and silky, quite different to ordinary feathers. Simon says they make ideal children's pets as they are nice tempered and calm. Occasionally you do get the odd mean rooster but this is rare. Another advantage of silkies is that you can earn some extra pocket money by breeding them. Little pullets sell for about \$6, mature hens \$7 or \$8. Little roosters \$3 and old roosters \$4. Silkies need a simple house and nestboxes. Simon says they eat a lot for their size. They can be fed on chook pellets, wheat and enjoy scraps, silver beet and cabbage. They are good layers, each hen is meant to lay about 80 eggs a year. Simon can recommend the eggs for taste, he says they are much better than store eggs. Also they are a good size and are great curried. He has observed that round fat hens lay round eggs, while taller hens lay oval ones. Silkies are also good mothers and will look after other breeds hatching quails, ducks, chooks and even peacocks eggs. Simon suggests you don't breed your silkies in winter as you might lose the babies through cold. He also recommends you put a rock in the water bowl to prevent accidental drowning of the babies. Silkies can also be shown, and their feathers don't need brushing. Simon recommends silkies as 'top quality' children's pets. They will live a long time too if properly looked

#### VETERINARY NOTES FOR FEBRUARY

This month we address the issue of bushfires and what devastating effects they can have on our pets and livestock. With the recent fires in our area, we can see that damage occurs to pasture and vegetation. Some properties will be left bare and burnt, leaving surviving stock very little to eat. Fencing may also be damaged and with a few more long hot months ahead of us feed will be non existent. When returning stock we must first repair the fences and bring feed in to replace natural grazing. Large bales are adequate scattered around the paddock. Shade must also be provided if trees have been lost. The more unfortunate animals who have burn injuries must always be treated as emergencies.

First Aid: If the burn has occurred within the preceding two hours, ice water packs may be applied to the area, loose tissue may be loosely wrapped with strips of old sheets or pillow cases. Cooling reduces the pain and can reduce the severity of the burn. Shock will be the most dangerous aspect of being burnt severely. Your vet must be contacted and can offer treatment. Try and find confirmation of the extent of the burn. This may not be possible for up to ten days post burn when skin layers may be removed to reduce bacterial infections. There are very good products available to promote healing and protect body tissue. it can be a long process but normal function is possible.

His birds stayed calm and also a flock of feral pigeons being blown about in the wind came in and landed on their roof too! The Squire family got wet but all the birds were fine!

GOAT NOTES With the summer heat upon us, our animals need extra consideration. Goats need shelter from the elements as much as we do, and shade is essential in the heat of the day. Their water supply needs to be reliable, and because they won't drink any that has been fouled, care must be taken to ensure their container is cleaned at regular intervals. Many a goat has been left without drinkable water because its bucket was full (of unsuitable water). Tethered goats need extra care, both with shade and water, to ensure they are always available. Although we see goats lying around in the sun, that is no excuse to leave them where they don't have the option of moving into shade. With feed now scarce on the paddocks, we need to cart feed to them. A goat that is producing, whether milk or fleece, has greater need of nutrients than dry stock, but all benefit from supplementary feeding in summer conditions. This is the time of the year that they are particularly hard on trees. They are searching for minerals in the bark and leaves, and would benefit from seaweed meal added as a supplement. An alternative is for you to prune some trees and feed to the goats. "Cut and carry" gives you the option of choosing which trees (and which parts of the tree) your goats eat.
