

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# ONE TREE HILL GRAPEVINE CFS REPORT FEBRUARY 2011



### Incident Report

The last couple of months have seen a number of grass fires in the area. Two in particular were of concern.

A grass fire started by a ride-on-mower on Vivian Road, Uleybury was very difficult to access due to very poor gate design and internal fences, a number of houses were under threat.

7 Fire Units brought the fire under control.

Remember when using farm equipment to take the necessary precautions.

The other grass fire was on Starrs Gully Road, Yattalunga. This fire was started by persons unknown near a new house, the terrain was difficult to access due to the hilly nature of the land. With the aid of little wind and aerial bombers and 11 Fire Units the fire was contained after a few hours of hard work.

Remember to Plan Activities when working on the land with a view to preventing a fire.

The other main activity for the OTH Brigade has been vehicle accidents. One accident a head on collision involved considerable time and effort on Airstrip Road, Sampson Flat, requiring helicopter retrieval.

### Councillors Report

Hi, a belated HAPPY NEW YEAR to all, I hope 2011 finds you all well and not too much heavier after the holiday seasons festivities, let's hope 2011 will be a great year for all.

By the time this edition is printed the Tour Down Under should have been and gone and council should be in full swing with a 9am to 4pm Saturday session completed on Urban Renewal and Urban Growth Planning, with another Saturday session planned for February concentrating on rates positioning, debt and the long term financial plan.

Numerous persons from rural areas made contact with me regarding Section 105F (8) notices issued by council in relation to fire breaks or the lack thereof. Some people had already made a fire break but still received a notice. This led to my asking the question of council "if I have provided a fire break, am I not compliant with the Act and if subsequent to that fire break being established due to un-seasonal weather conditions the grass re-grows should I still not be compliant with the Act?" In the first instance Yes I am compliant with the Act but in the second instance No I am not compliant with the Act as there is a clause that requires a fire break to be established and then "MAINTAINED" to the satisfaction of the council fire officer, hence some people received expiation notices even though they believed that they had done the right thing. Subsequent meetings with myself and council staff has resulted in a better and fairer methodology of notifying persons of there obligations and procedures available to them to meet their obligations even to the point of council assisting with the writing of letters to extend timelines for compliance or to explain difficulties in meeting your requirements. It should go without saying that it is in the best interests of every landowner and their neighbours, to mitigate BUSHFIRE RISKS by clearing excess fuel loads, providing fire breaks where safe and reasonable to achieve and to do what ever else can be done to achieve a safer environment for both the landowners and the CFS personnel that need to fight fires should one occur. Yes I realise that some landowners do not meet their obligations either through a lack of understanding, resources or plain stubbornness but it is not my role to police these people or report them to council so please do not ask me to do so, I do however encourage all land and business owners to consider the risks and implications involved with fires and to do the best they can to mitigate those risks and losses.

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

he Good Eggshell

We are often asked at the fodder shop for advice regarding poor quality eggs and in particular egg shells.

Like most things in life there is usually more than one possible factor that can cause problems and so it is with the quality of eggs so I thought that we might look at what things can be done to give your chooks every chance of getting it right.

The egg shell is made of calcium carbonate (approximately 94%) and you need to ensure that your birds are able to replace what is used every time they produce an egg. If they can't, you will start seeing problems such as thin translucent shells or even eggs without shells. You can provide calcium supplements to your birds in many ways. Some people give shell grit, limestone grit or even recycled egg shells that have been crushed but if you want the efficiencies of recycling the egg shells make sure that you wash them very well first before finely crushing them. You do not want to introduce the bad habit of egg eating to your bird.

On hot days you will notice that your birds pant like a dog, if the conditions become intense, your birds might begin to stress and if they do, it is likely that they will naturally lose carbonate from their system. One trick to getting more carbonate into your birds in such conditions is to provide them with carbonated water to drink So if you think that your eggshells are not up to their usual quality during hot spells, this might be worthy of a try. Vitamin D is extremely important for good egg production so ensure that your birds are getting ample sunlight during the day.

There are many good quality chicken feeds available and most try to cater for the production of sound eggshells. Once you find something that works for you and your birds try to stick with it as generally the hens do not perform well with extreme changes to their diet. In some instances dietary changes have been known to bring on diarrhoea so many people suggest small changes over a longer period of time.

You may have wondered why large eggs often tend to break easier than small eggs. The reason is that a hen is only capable a introducing a small amount of calcium to the shell each time it produces an egg. As the bird gets older the eggs tend to get larger but the hen still has only the same amount of calcium to place into the eggshell as when its eggs were smaller.

Please try to remember to not expect too much from your hens during hot spells as heat affects them just the same as it affects us and they tend to eat less which has an adverse effect to their egg production.

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








### ON THE WAY TO THE BUS OR SCHOOL


- Stay off the roads, use footpaths if you can or walk as close to the edge of the road if no footpath



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Media Release: Health Warning - Excerpts from a Media Release Issued by The Public Heath Department on January 13 2011

"Increase in Ross River Virus and Bamah Forest Virus". The Communicable Disease Control Branch has identified a recent increase in notifications of Ross River virus and Barmah Forest virus infections. These cases have been reported from a number of locations in SA with particularly high numbers in the Riverland and Murray Mallee. The increase in cases corresponds to an increase in the number of mosquito vectors and favourable breeding conditions resulting from above average rainfall in SA last year, along with high inflow to the Murray River from the number of large rainfall events in the Murray Darling basin.

- Both infections are spread by mosquitoes from infected animals (most commonly kangaroos and wallabies) to humans. The usual incubation period is between 1 to 2 weeks (range 3 days to 3 weeks).
- The severity of symptoms increases with age. Symptomatic disease uncommon in children.
- Common symptoms include arthralgias (joint pain), fevers, fatigue, headache, myalgias (muscle pain) and a maculopapular rash (a flat, red area on the skin that is covered with small raised bumps).
- At this time of the year many people are on holidays so their place of exposure may be a holiday location or when visiting friends or relatives.
- Control and prevention: Prompt and accurate notification including place of exposure is
  important to assist SA Health and the Local Government to undertake targeted mosquito control
  measures where appropriate. However not all mosquito breeding areas can be eliminated, so it
  is important that people are reminded to take measures to protect themselves and their families
  against mosquito bites, and ensure that water does not collect in gutters, containers or other
  breeding sites.

#### A Look Back in Time

### **Pioneer Farming**

Wherever man settles he needs to provide shelter and food for himself and his family; he uses whatever materials are available. Can we today visualise what this entailed?

Trees had to be felled, using pick, shovel and axes - no chainsaws were available! The timber cut to size and a rough shelter erected immediately - no easy task. The land was prepared, using a single furrow plough, with manpower, womanpower, horse or ox—power; then with seed bag hung by straps from his shoulders, the farmer walked up and down the furrows broadcasting the seed which was cross harrowed or raked into the soil. At harvest time, the crop was cut with a hand held scythe or sickle, very often by the womenfolk, then gathered into sheaves and tied together. The wheat was threshed with a flail (made of two pieces of wood joined together with a strip of leather), until all the grain was dislodged from the wheat heads. On a windy day the heap of grain was cleaned by throwing it up into the air using a large fork; the grain, being heavier would drop down while the chaff and straw, being lighter, blew away. The grain was bagged, sewn by hand - usually by the women and children - then carted to the nearest mill or, after 1857, to the railhead at Gawler. These bags held initially 4 bushels, which was later reduced to 3 bushels... (1 bushel equalled approximately 60lbs) no wonder bad backs and heart attacks were prevalent, as they were humped by manpower.

When many of the areas were opened up for agriculture, another problem emerged - the farmer ploughed over stumps, and when the harvest was complete, the whole area was burnt to kill off the young shoots, then the stumps grubbed. "Necessity being the mother of invention" brought the stump jump plough into being, thus one problem was solved. The Ridley stripper also lightened the pioneer farmers load.

In many areas such as One Tree Hill there was the problem of rocks in the fields, stone picking was a back breaking job, usually done by the daughters of the family; the stones piled into heaps and later used to build pigsties, barns, cowsheds, stables and even fences.

Many of the earlier homes were built using up the seemingly endless supply, as each ploughing brought more stones to the surface.

Successive droughts, rabbits and mice plagues such as that experienced in 1917 were to cause the farmer and grazier of later years more heartbreak.

Homes of the Early Settlers

The early settlers built their humble dwellings from whatever was available; usually 2 roomed structures of straight timber, rammed upright into the ground side by side, the gaps filled with a mixture of mud, grass or straw, the same mixture was used to plaster the walls inside and outside. The roof was thatched with straw, often tied down by wires slung across and weighted down with blocks of wood, then whitewashed. Stones were quarried, carted, crushed then burnt to provide mortar, plaster and whitewash. Floors were tamped earth, sometimes covered with lime or flat stones. A bake oven, in which bread was baked was built of stone at one end of the kitchen, although some were built separately away from the home. In the fireplace, there were no stoves, stood a "four-footer" - (a metal frame on 4 legs with metal bars across, on which stood a large cast iron fountain and camp oven). Stew pots were often hung from hooks embedded in the fireplace wall. Furniture was home made, thus only the bare essentials, a table, benches and beds, were provided. Mattresses made from hessian or calico, stuffed with straw and the cover made from calico filled with feathers constituted their bedding. As the family increased in numbers, more rooms were added.

Their homes were lit by candles, which they made themselves - what a luxury kerosene lamps must have been when they became available!

A well was usually sunk, as well as an underground, stone lined tank from which their water supply would be drawn, by the womenfolk. Prior to this, water was brought from the nearest creek or stream. A galvanized tank, even if it had been available, would have been useless - water could not run off a thatched roof!

Without refrigeration, a cellar was a necessity, built either beneath the home or close by.

Bathrooms, as we know them today, were non-existent - once a week, usually Saturday night, the huge tub, (in which the clothes were also scrubbed on washing day) would be hauled into the kitchen, filled with hot water, and starting with the cleanest, the weekly ablutions ensued. Upon completion, the water was poured onto the garden.

Under a rough shelter, often out in the open, the housewife scrubbed, by hand, the heavy clothing of the era; the washing hung on a 'prop line' - which often allowed the clothes to fall in the dirt, then the women would have to start the task again! Scrubbing boards, heavy ribbed glass in a wooden frame, then later hand pumped washing machines made the housewife's task a little easier. The following day the best clothes would be ironed, using a box iron (a container with a heavy iron base, filled with coals from the fire - small holes at the bottom of the sides let the air in) - these were reported to be very scary to use! Flat irons were also used, they came in a set of 3 with a detachable wooden handle which clipped onto the iron base which was heated on the stove.





### **Horse Care for February**




**Hoof Care in Summer** 

Hot dry days dry the hoof. Oil at least every 2 days with a good hoof oil is recommended. I use oil as it soaks in better than grease. Now we want the horse to stand in a wet/damp spot for about 30 minutes each day, provided by having a dripper soaking the ground while you feed. Or have a bit of irrigated pasture that they can graze on for 30 minutes per day. The damp grass works well on the hooves and is good for their gut. Oils should be put on liberally around the coronet band with some onto the hoof wall, not on the sole. Shod hooves need oiling more often, at least once a day, as the shoe absorbs heat from the ground and dries the hoof. Keep the trimming up or the long toe will break off and cause further damage.

Pony's feet may not need as much care as horse's feet. Thoroughbreds in particular often have poor feet which chip easily.



### LEGIONNAIRS' DISEASE ALERT TO TRAVELLERS FROM BALI

Australia's Chief Medical Officer, Professor Jim Bishop, has issued an alert to travelers in Bali or who have recently returned, who experience 'flu-like symptoms such as fever and cough to consult their GPs or hospital emergency departments.

"It is important that patients advise their doctor or hospital of their recent travel to Bali", Professor Bishop said.

"Over recent months, Australian health authorities have been made aware of 11 cases of Legionnaires' disease detected in Victorian and Western Australian residents returning from holidays in the Kuta area of Bali between August 2010 and January 2011.

Professor Bishop said Indonesian health authorities and the World Health Organization (WHO) are aware of the problem and are investigating. They have taken water samples from possible sources of outbreak for testing and have advised on appropriate disinfection and cleaning of water supply systems at the hotel and buildings in the vicinity. A number of those who contracted the disease stayed in the same hotel in Kuta (The Ramayana Resort and Spa) and most had visited the same local shopping centre.

The Australian Government Department of Health and Aging is working with State and Territory health departments to ensure that health professionals are alert to the potential risk of contracting the disease from travel to Bali.

"There are specific antibiotics available to treat the disease. The time between a person's exposure to the bacteria and becoming sick is usually between two to ten days," Professor Bishop said.

"People most at risk of Legionnaires' disease are those over 50 years of age, smokers, and anyone whose immune system is suppressed by medication or diseases such as cancer, kidney failure or diabetes. These people may experience more severe disease".

#### Facts about Legionnaires' disease

Legionnaires' disease may cause fever, chills, a cough and shortness of breath. Some people also have muscle aches, headache, tiredness, loss of appetite and diarrhea. Legionnaires' disease is not spread from person to person.

The legion Ella bacteria occurs naturally in the environment, mainly in water and soil. It is normally in very low concentrations but can increase markedly, particularly in man made aquatic environments with warm recirculation water, such as air conditioning cooling towers.

Legionnaires' Disease is acquired through breathing in very fine droplets of water which contain the bacteria, such as spray drifts which are vented from cooling towers. Whirlpool spas and warm water systems can also lead to the illness.
