News & views from your councillor

Dear Residents,

I must apologise to those of you who went to dump rubbish in the hopper on Saturday 19 March only to find it not there. The hopper has always been placed at One Tree Hill from the first Saturday in December to the second Saturday in March. Unfortunately, nobody reminded us. However, in view of the fact that you are not allowed to burn rubbish in your backyard, we are going to trial a once-a-month hopper service during the winter. Its anticipated that the first day of operation will be Saturday 7 May and then the first Saturday of the month June through to November.

Recycling is going well in the township and plans are still progressing for the rural area.

Because of the continuing warm weather, the town bore water supply is being treated with chemicals (chlorine) to reduce any risk of bacteria entering the system. This will continue until tests, conducted by the E&WS, indicate that the water is back to its normal quality.

The Playgroup has certainly done a good job of their play area at the Institute and it is now much more servicable for their needs. So that it is better utilised, Council is to relocate the paving and shade cloth from the back of the Institute to the playgroup area.

Craigmore Road and the section of Potts Road within our City have been sealed, Viney Drive and Uleybury School Museum driveway have been resealed and a number of unsealed roads have been resheeted over the past month or two.

It's that time of the year again when consideration is being given to items for the budget. I am proposing the following list for the One Tree Hill area: upgrade and seal the remainder of Kentish Road, Tyeka Drive, part of Shillabeer Road, Trevilla Road, Taylors Road, Johnson Road (if the residents want it sealed) and Gulfview Drive. Upgrade drainage and paths at OTH cemetery; new toilet/shower block at McGilp Oval; improvement of reserve areas including Grandview Drive and Springvale Heights; improve streetscapes and institute landscape (especially around the back); upgrade and improve road safety at Blacktop, Crosshill and Precolumb Road junctions; and upgrade and improve landscape at Uley Chapel cemetery.

Following a community survey, traffic turning right out of Blacktop Road will be redirected along Bungarra Street to link into the John Rice Avenue intersection. Right turn into Blacktop Road from Main North Road will remain as will the left turn in and out (the same as Target Hill Road). This work will most probably start next year.

Work on Curtis Road extension and its link in with the relocation of Craigmore Road intersection should commence soon. This will give a signalised and safer intersection, a better road into Springvale Heights/Blakeview and a direct route into Munno Para West and the golf course. All Councils have now agreed on allocating the special local road grant to the construction of Medlow Road which should commence next April. It will be completely upgraded and sealed from Main North Road to Craigmore Road junction by October 1995.

The new North Lakes Golf Course is open and anybody can join or have a game. It's a community course that caters for the young and not-so-young and has programs specifically for women and aimed at school participation. You can hire all the appropriate equipment: clubrooms and refreshments are available; and you can play between 6.30am and 6.30pm. Even though it is a community golf course, membership is available. DID YOU KNOW - some historical facts about One Tree Hill

The One Tree Hill Post Office and General Store was owned by members of the Fiebig Family for 53 years. Mr Rudolph Fiebig who died in 1928 was one of the early Postmasters. His Grandfather, August, was famous as a maker and player of both violins and the bass viol. He used to play the bass viol at the Theatre Royal in Adelaide. They would send a chauffeur driven car up to his home to pick him up and bring him home again. One of the violins he made was sent to New Zealand for one of the leading overseas violinists to play on at some special concert arranged there. A cutting from a Victorian paper gave him great praise for the clarity of tone of the violin, likening it to a Stradivarius.
