#### NEWS AND VIEWS FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR

Dear Residents,

I would like to congratulate everybody on the operation of the hopper in July. It was an excellent example of the community working together to produce a worthwhile result for all. A special thanks must go to Vince Cozzitorto and all the crew from our CFS who looked after and controlled throughput at the site so well. The end result was that One Tree Hill CFS received some good public relations in that they were able to meet more of the community and received a small donation for their efforts, residents had easy access to the hopper, the hopper was changed on a regular basis and Council was more than pleased because the site was left in a clean condition. In other words is was a win all round.

The CFS has offered to patrol the hopper for the next couple of months and if they have the resources, they may even consider doing it each month in the future.

# THE HOPPER WILL BE ON SITE ON SATURDAY 6 AUGUST.

Remember to have some form of identification (eg driving licence, rate notice etc) with you when placing rubbish in the hopper. Council is considering, in conjunction with Progress Association and CFS, a possible retrial of recycling some materials especially metal. I'll keep you informed of any progress.

On other matters - Council has allocated a further \$30 000 towards the puchase of a new fast attack vehicle for our CFS station. This new 4x4 fire unit will be in operation by the coming fire season and will give our personnel a versatile vehicle that will be very important in case of a fire in the township or where quick response/access is required. The on road cost of the vehicle is about \$90 000.

A lot of work has been going on at the One Tree Hill cemetery and the site is starting to look very pleasant with a number of old headstones being repositioned and cleaned. The grounds have been cleaned up with removal of dead and unwanted shrubbery, footpaths are better delineated, the galvanised fence has been painted green and a planting program around the perimeter is scheduled to commence soon.

Council has increased the cost for the lease of closed roads for 1994/95 by 50 cents bringing the lease for this land to \$16/hectare.

However, the townships water bill will remain the same as it was last year. The annual fee is \$80 and the cost of water will be 45 cents/kilolitre.

# GARDENERS CORNER.

The Gawler Garden Club meets on on the first Tuesday of every month, at the Willaston Uniting Church Hall. This month August 2nd the topic is Pest and Diseases. The first of the spring bulbs are already blooming jonquils and daffodils adding colour to those dreary corners. Ranunculus and freezias are soon to come. With the warm winter that we have had, many of the fruit trees are already in bloom even before the leaves have all dropped.

Jobs for August.

Look for the signs of rust on hollyhocks, carnations etc. Spray with Zineb if necessary. Heavy clay soils can be improved during winter by an application of Gypsum at the rate of 1kg to 2 sq metres. Plant perennials or divide existing one, s.

Gardening Problem Corner.

Q.. My geranium bush has developed green and distorted flowers and leaves. What shall I do.

A...Your geranium has Greening Virus. This is an airbourne virus spread from plant to plant by insects. Unfortunately there is no cure. The plant should be removed and discarded. Thanks to everybody involved with the excellent rubbish hopper collection last month.

To the C.F.S. - the service was great!

To the Council – and its officers, and to all Residents who used it so well. We are looking to use this service and improving it by extending the recycling facilities offered. Metal recycling and hopefully extending the waste plastic paper etc, available to the urban and township area to the rural area. It is essential that it be supervised. The C.F.S. have indicated that it is a possibility to continue doing this on a monthly basis right through the year. The proposal is that we do it every first Saturday of the month from 8.30 to-3.30 (same day as the comunity market) and run it as well as possible. With a chipper service. With a donation system to the C.F.S. to make it worthwhile to them (plus we all benefit.)

With adequate bins—With improved recycling facilities. If you want to make any comments on this, either come along to the next Progress Association meeting (18th Aug-Spm in the One Tree Hill Institute, or you can ring me on 2807484. Next Service: Saturday 6th Aug. Any material for chipping must be free of anything that would damage the chipper-keep it separate. Avoid any poisonous plants such as Oleander. The C.F.S. collect glass in all forms and drink cans so separate these as well. We are trying to get a metal recycling bin for this collection so be readyto put that material in it.

# VETERINARY NOTES FOR AUGUST.

When the cold weather sets in, Arthritis flares up in our older dogs and cats. There are several types of arthritis but the most common form in dogs is ostioarthritis.

"Arthritis" is imflammation of the joint, and Osteo refers to bone. Thus osteoarthritis is a degenerative inflammatory process involving bone and cartilage. As a result dogs who have arthritis are usually reluctant or have difficulties getting up after they have been laying down for a while. With time mobility gets less and lameness becomes worse. Dogs may find it hard to jump or drop on command, and dont enjoy as much exercise. There is much that can be done to help your pet enjoy life more.

## HEARD ON THE GRAPEVINE.

In July the National Calistherics Championahips were held in Melbourne. Eight year old Candice Kean of One Tree Hill was a member of the South Australian Sub-Junior team which travelled to Melbourne to compete. Her team acheived a great result and won the Sub-Junior National Championships.

Did you know some early history of One Tree Hill. The Gawler Wesleyan Circuit in September 1866, decided that application be made for permision to build chapels at One Tree Hill, Pinkerton Plains and Willaston, and on December 26th 1866 that One Tree Hill be taken up and preaching established at once. In this way Methodism came to One Tree Hill. Land on which the church is built was a government grant to William Henry Gartrell, on December 4th 1852 by Sir Henry Fox Young, who was Governor of South Australia at that time. Then this land was transferred to James Purdie. By consent of Rev Thomas Lloyd, Mr Purdie transferred the land to the Trustees of the One Tree Hill methodist Church on July 23rd 1867 at a cost of 5 pounds.

They didnt wait long to lay the Foundation Stone and begin building. The Church Foundation Stone was laid on August 13th 1867. Most of the inhabitants of the neighbourhood with many triends from Gawler and Salisbury gathered to watch William Kelly of Goulds Creek "duly and efficiently" perform the ceremony. Mr Kelly also delivered "a short but truly catholic speech, an ongratulated the people of One Tree Hill on their promises of increasing gospel privileges. "The Rev Thomas Lloyd commented "upon doctrines that would be preached "and they all adjourned to a spacious tent for tea. While the building was being erected the congregation worshipped underneath a tree on the western side of the present building.

Did you know we have part of the Mount Crawford Forest just off the Kersbrook road? This forest is good for walking and enjoying the outdoors. The variety of landscape supports native animals and birds as well as some feral animals such as deer and goats. The Mt Crawford forest District includes sections of the Heysen Trail from Kaiser Stuhl at Pewsey Vale in the North to Cudlee Creek in the South. There are six recognised Heysen Trail campsites for people hiking through the forest. Camping Permits are required to camp in the forest. Contact the Ranger at the Forest Headquarters 7km from Williamstown on the Birdwood Road, or telephone (085) 24

Apart from camping and walking, its also possible to collect firewood, but you must obtain a permit first, again from Forest Headquarters.

Parts of the forest can also be used for horse-riding. In the forest east of the Forest Headquarters there are two marked trails for riders who are unfamiliar with the forest. Get your permit from the Ranger and enjoy a forest ride. By the way, people who enter forest reserves for recreation do so at their own risk.
