NEWS AND VIEWS FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR

Dear Residents,

Council met over the weekend of June 4-5 to work through the 1994-95 budget and set the rates for the forthcoming financial year.

Council has reduced the rate in the dollar for One Tree Hill township by 5% and for the rural areas by 2%, however, because the Valuer General has increased valuations throughout One Tree Hill, Hillbank and Craigmore, there will be an increase in rates for some of us. It appears that these areas are in demand??? I have listed below what most of us can expect to pay next year.

One Tree Hill Township
48 have a reduction in rates
71 have rises above \$10, and the remainder will have
a rise if about \$8.

Rural Area

118 have reduction in rates 50 have a rise above \$25, and the remainder will have a rise of between 10c and \$25.

There are a couple of properties have rather large rises. I can only assume that this is because they have built new houses and this has pushed the values up. However, if anybody is unhappy with the increase in property values please ring the Valuer General's Manningham office on 261 3311.

On the plus side the OTH and Uley cemeteries will be upgraded, a new toilet/shower block will be built on McGilp Oval, a new CFS fast attack vehicle will be purchased, another kilometre of Kentish Road will be upgraded and sealed, the first section of Medlow Road will be constructed, there will be improvements to both Springvale Heights and Grandview Drive reserves as well as an upgrade of drainage at Hillbank and construction of the next section drain 1E along Craigmore Road. There will also be some improvements to the OTH streetscape, Institute surrounds and reserves in our township. I have asked (again) that the reserve at and the Cross Hill Road, Precolumb Road, Black Top Road junction be upgraded - I'll be interested to see the outcome of my further request.

I also requested that more money be spent on road construction and I fought as hard as I could with (unfortunately) very little success. However, the remaining section of Williams Road could get a Guernsey if there are any funds available later in the year. For next year, I have been promised that at least \$850,000 will be allocated for road construction but \$200,000 of this will be directed to finishing Medlow Road.

ONE TREE HILL HOPPER SERVICE

This service has been continued on a trial basis outside the fire ban season on the first Saturday of the month. At the June 16 meeting of the OTH Progress Association the problems related to this service were raised and proposals to make it workable particularly with the assistance of the local CFS were discussed. The CFS has generously agreed to work with the Council to trial new arrangements for July. The points to note are:

- The service is ONLY available to residents of the One Tree Hill Ward of the Munno Para Council and you can be expected to show ID or a rate notice to support that status.
- 2. The service is ONLY available between the hours of 8.30am and 3.30pm on the first Saturday of the month during the non fire ban season. Even though the hopper may get there before that time and be picked up after that time, it is not available outside those hours. (The service is fortnightly during the fire ban season.)
- the hopper is filling up very quickly largely because a lot of space filling plant material is being dumped.

The plans for July are as follows:

- The CFS will man/woman the facility between the hours of 8.30am and 3.30pm on that day, ask for proof of residence and generally supervise the facility. Outside those hours the gates will be locked and also chained off at the back. Dumping outside those hours is illegal.
- Vince Cozzitorto will bring his "chipper" so that good clean plant material can be chipped and the mulch recycled. This should mean that far more space is available in the rubbish hopper.
- A second bin will be provided part way through the day.

We all need to assist in this matter.

- For this first trial no charges have been set, however, a donation towards the OTH CFS would make the time spent by these volunteers more worthwhile (and we would all benefit).
 Further, Vince is willing to sell back the mulch created which would defray part of the expenses in running the chipper. (Current costs per trailer at the depot is \$12 so there is plenty of scope for a good donation.)
- For chipping, plant material needs to be free of ANYTHING that could wreck the blades. It should also be free of weeds and any poisonous plants such as Oleander. Keep it as separate as possible from all other rubbish - make a couple of trips, one with just chippable material. Vince will, of course, decide what he can put through his chipper.
- Look at ways of reducing the amount of material you are putting in the hopper. With the amount that arrived last month even two hoppers would have overflowed.
- Ensure that rubbish is ONLY brought during the specified hours.

If you see any illegal dumping, e.g. on roadsides, please let the Council know as soon as possible and if you have any information that might assist in prosecuting the vandals, pass that on too. Council will try to remove the rubbish quickly. Phone 254 0123.

DID YOU KNOW - some early history of One Tree Hill

Following our item in the Grapevine last month, I have had several queries as to the location of the five trees which were planted to replace the original "One Tree". If you are driving towards One Tree Hill township along Blacktop Road, you will pass the turn off to Elizabeth on your left. On your right you will see an old house which was the original One tree Hill Inn. This Inn was chiefly used by bullock drivers on their way to the Barossa Valley and the Lady Alice Goldmine. Just past this house on the left hand side of the road on the corner of Walter Road, you will see five gum trees growing. Apparently the reason there are five is that there were a lot of problems getting one to grow and so after several failures, five were planted in the hope that one would survive. Needless to say all five survived!

An early resident, D. O'C. Blackham wrote in 1936 that the district was named from a lone blue gum tree which grew on the top of a hill and so acted as a 'trig'. It was the last of the gum trees west of the wooded country. The straight dry trunk of the old tree stood there until about 1890 when it was burnt down. He said his father first it in 1841 when half of it was green and the remainder dry.

A newspaper article written about the school centenary of the One Tree Hill School in 1956 states that the district was named after a giant redgum which was cut down in about 1920. So far I haven't heard which is the true story yet, I hope someone will be able to tell us all. Now another puzzle for us. What sort of animal is a "pinky"? Apparently these animals used to be plentiful around the Gould's Creek area. I would really like to know what they were and if any can still be seen.

ROTARY

The Rotary Club of Torrens Valley meets every Wednesday at 7 for 7.30pm start in the Kersbrook Tavern. Visitors are very welcome to join us in a counter meal (\$10) and fellowship, and to hear about Rotary projects. Rotary is open to both men and women nowadays.

On the third Wednesday of each month we have a guest speaker - a general interest topic, or sometimes a special Rotary project. Members of the public are especially welcome at these meetings. At the meeting on June 15, Mairi Walker, Director of Nursing at the Hutchinson Hospital in Gawler, spoke to the Club about her visit to Pakistan where she stayed and assisted in a Christian Hospital for women in a poor area. The hospital catered for the most needful women, most of whom had no way of paying for often urgent maternity needs. Mairi inspired the Club with her descriptions of care and operations with only very basic equipment. Christian people in Pakistan are in general of very low status, and Christian women and girls are at the bottom of the social scale. A Christian girl child with any physical or mental deficiency is likely to have great difficulty in surviving into adulthood. The hospital has no official backing, and overseas charities and dedicated staff and local trainees keep the facilities going. It was amazing to hear how little (in our money terms) can buy so much to assist staff and patients. The possibilities for Rotary help appear endless!

Operations by torchlight when the electricity goes off due to frequent load-shedding; remedial operations necessary owing to appalling non-medical treatment in childbirth; turning away of desperate women when the hospital is full but 2000 births a year with women leaving with healthy children, staff fulfilled with the knowledge of the results of their efforts. A heart-warming story of effective help in difficult conditions.

Mairi capped off(!) her talk by showing her collection of prayer hats, some beautiful wedding shoes and wedding hat, and many other fascinating examples of local craft.

This was an evening to consider how well off we are, and to wonder at the sacrifices that are made to help people who undergo a very different way of life.

At the end of April 1987, a public meeting was held to express opposition to the opening of a quarry near the scenic route at Yattalunga. During this meeting and a subsequent meeting, a total of \$147.17 was collected in order to pay for further publicity.

The quarry did not proceed, but the money is still held by the Progress Association in a separate account. As 7 years have now elapsed, it is proposed that unless objections are received within three months, i.e. by the first week in October, the amount concerned will be absorbed into the Association's general fund.

- Plant new and prune or shift roses
- Plant and prune deciduous fruit trees
- Lift and divide perennials
- Plant deciduous ornamental trees
- Prune grapevines, remember that Sultanas fruit between the 4th to 14th bud on the cane so prune the canes around the 12th to 14th bud
- Dig dahlia tubers and store in sand or sawdust
- Prune Hydrangeas, cutting out some of the old wood and trimming younger stems just above the top pair of buds, keep about 8-10 canes per bush
- Look in your local nursery and see what seedlings are in stock, these are the ones to plant now.

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MEMORIES OF PRECOLUMB SCHOOL

Lance Walter was five years old when he started at the Precolumb School on Paines Road in 1928. There were about 15 or 16 children there when he went, of various ages in the grades of one to seven. There was one teacher who taught all the grades.

The school was about the size of an ordinary big room. There was a room on the side which was a lunch room and there was an entrance porch where the children could hang their coats. The toilets were down the yard and were not like the toilets today. They were just a deep hole in the ground. Lance remembers a fireplace in the classroom where they used to have a fire on cold winter days. There were few pictures on the walls. Outside the school yard was about an acre of sloping ground with prickly pears on two sides. Lance says they used to have fun cutting tracks through them, hiding in them and of course falling in them! Lance remembers an underground water tank which fell into disrepair. One day Lance was first at school and he saw a snake in there. He managed to drop a rock right on its head!

Lance remembers playing rounders, which was a game like baseball, and cricket, as well as exploring the scrub which also bordered the school. Children used to mainly walk to school using a track from the town across a gentleman's property. Some children, such as Bill Kelly and his sister Josephine and John Harvey from Blacktop used to ride their horses to school tying them up to the fence during the day.

Lance says his teachers were good, not too strict although they would get an occasional tap across the knuckles with a ruler. He doesn't remember any one getting caned. The only time he was threatened with the cane for something he didn't do, he managed to talk the teacher out of it? His teachers' names were Mr Toysener, Miss Leonard, Miss Thompson, Mr Fenner and Mr Pearson. Mr Pearson used to live in the township where the Blacksmith Inn is now.

The children had exams every quarter and at the end of the year. The School Inspector also visited and everyone had to be "on their toes" the day he came. At the end of Grade 7 there was an exam for the Qualifying Certificate. Lance got this twice! He left school at the age of 13 which was not unusual for those days, but he thinks the education he got at Precolumb was a good one.

GARDENER'S CORNER

Does your garden lack winter colour? Why not try some of the following plants for that flash of colour. Cheiranthus (wallflowers) in shades of orange, red to purple. Marguerite Daisies, Nerines, Hanging pots of Schlumbergera (Zygo Cactus) in many new colours, Canary Island Lavender, and Euryops just full of brilliant golden daisies. You cannot go past the Cootamundra Wattle (Acacia bailevana) cascading in golden blossom.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR JULY

Many people are buying calves at the moment, either from the market or from dairy farms. The calves may be any age from one day old. The very young calves will be fed on formula such as Denkavit, while the older ones need weaner pellets, good pasture or hay. The majority will do well but there can be problems:

1. Malajustment to formula:

This can cause stomach ulceration. If left unattended it can cause the rupture of the gut lining. If your calf shows signs of bloat, or scours (diarrhoea) and lethargy, seek vet advice as soon as possible. It's a good idea if you've bought your young calf at the market to give a tablespoon of glucodin in a bottle of warm water for its first feed as they are often upset by their market experience and it helps settle their stomachs.

2. Ringworm

This is often seen but is easily treated, seek vet advice - before you catch it!

3. Worms and Diseases

At 3 months of age or at weaning if your calf is on its mother still, your calves should be wormed and vaccinated. There are many proprietary brands of worming mixtures. Some only need to be poured on the animal. Discuss with your vet which is best. Worming should be done again one month later, then worming should be continued at least every six months throughout the life of the animal. Ideally the animals should be put onto fresh pasture after worming. Remember all pastures will contain a percentage of worms, rotating your use of the paddocks, resting them periodically, will help diminish numbers.

Vaccination is done at weaning and then once a year. A five in one vaccine is commonly used against pulpy kidney, Tetanus, black disease, blackleg, and malignant oedema. The best time for vaccination varies across the state, so consult your vet.
