Meet our Community. Mrs E R Hicks.

Mrs E R Hicks was born on the family property at One Tree Hill. She was educated at the Precolumb School on Paines Road where she had the same teacher for all but the last six months of her schooling. Her teachers name was Miss Turner. Mrs Hicks considers she was an excellent teacher.

During her teenage years she and her sister used to organise dances and concerts at the Institute. Her father Joseph Charlson and her uncle Pete used to provide the music by playing accordians, while the ladies provided supper. These dances helped raise money for charity and also for the laying of the One Tree Hill cricket pitch. It was at one of these dances that she met her husband. She was married at Pirie Street Methodist Church in a double wedding with her sister. While her husband was away at the war she lived at "View Park", the family home of her parents. While living there she used to walk regularly to Spring Gully droving sheep and helping lamb the ewes. Spring Gully is now under the Little Para Reservoir. When her husband returned from the war, they bought the General Store and Post Office which they ran for 30 years. They lived on the premises, and brought up two sons there. Amongst her duties was the job of telephonist, post mistress and the ringing of the fire alarm. Mrs Hicks was a founding member of the Progress Association and also a member of the Uniting Church. She maintains an active interest in One Tree Hill and its history.

In this annual report I would want to focus on some of the achievements of the last 12 months and challenge us to plan and work for the future.

The "Institute".

This community facility came into being through generous gifts and the hard work of a previous generation.

This year through the generous bequest of the Mrs Clucas (a... we believe as part of Mr Clucas's plans) we have seen the coming together of its upgrading.

The play area is now in excellent shape through the efforts of Fleur Michell, and others, who planned and implemented the total redoing of this area. Thanks to the support of the council it is now all fenced attractively and safely. The area is much more useable both by the playgroups and others.

With the planting of the front completed and the repainting of the doors etc the hall is most attractive.

We indeed have a facility we can be proud of and we hope its use will support its on going costs. A pamphlet to promote it is on the way.

We need to organise our party to celebrate these events!

Development is not a static thing. The local Rotary group have already agreed to supply a picnic table and chairs for the play area and plans are under way to shift the old Library shelter to provide shelter over the sandpit. We still need to explore the possibilities of more convenient storage as well as any improvements to the remaining areas surrounding the hall.

The Grapevine

The current trial of direct distribution of the Grapevine together with a new editorial team is certainly reaching out into the community. Articles which have introduced us to some of the people of this community are helpful in building links between us. Often it takes time before people find the space to get out and make some new contacts with other people and groups within this place.

It has been good to see the support via advertising for this project. We need to think creatively about how to really make contact and build a greater sense of community and how to fund these actions such as the Grapevine.

Local History

The recording of local history, particularly oral history, has long been a concern of this association so we have been delighted with Jill McLatchie's involvement in this area. It is most encouraging to see this getting off the ground, and we are pleased to assist with some of the ongoing costs.

Building Community

As an association we need to bring together the past and the present and plan for the future. The hall is one of the focal points of this community. This association provides a place were people can come and express their concerns and their dreams about One Tree Hill. We are here to encourage a sense of community.

The ongoing community markets must be commended. Sometimes we tend to focus on "not many stalls" or "seemed to be fewer people" rather than the fact that some people have taken the opportunity to get together and made contact with other people in this place and hopefully helped the finances of individuals and groups. A single trading table adds to a community, this group is doing much more in providing a regular meeting point for the community.

The Craft Shop which runs under our incorporation, while it has struggled especially in the last 18 months is to be commended for keeping on. It has reached arrangements that enable it to keep on going.

Thank you too to the local council for the Community Notice boards have proved their worth.

People make a place. While I have mentioned a few already there are many others who make this Association work and make One Tree Hill a good place to be. Whether it is ensuring that the hall is cared for by its hirers, fixing the little things that go wrong, organising others to do more major tasks, encouraging the Grapevine crew, looking after our money, challenging us in new directions, reminding us of the importance of the past, writing up the minutes, making a cuppa - they all contribute and make this thing work.

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PLACES TO VISIT AROUND ONE TREE HILL.

If you're looking for a quiet family outing on Sunday, one thats not too far away, and not too expensive, you can't do better than visit the Humbug Scrub Sanctuary. Neville Bellchambers, son of the late Ray Bellchambers has come from Victoria to take over the caretaking of this unique private sanctuary. Here in the peaceful bush setting are many native birds and animals, many free to come and go as they wish, while others are protected in enclosures. While the Sanctuary is now open on Sundays only between 11am and 5pm, Neville has plans to open during School holidays as well. Neville enjoys talking to people about the Sanctuary and interaction with the animals is a very enjoyable experience. It's fun to walk down "Cockatoo Street" and be talked to by the feathered residents there!

Charges are very moderate: Adults 40cents, Children 20cents, minimum charge \$2.00. The charm of the place lies in its lack of commercialisation, the bush and the friendly wildlife.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR AUTUMN.

At this time of year many lambs are being born and some unfortunately end up as orphans needing to be reared on the bottle. If you are unable to obtain any colestrum (the first milk produced) here is a useful formula for both lambs and calves:

1 pint cows milk added to half a pint of warm water.

1 whipped egg

1 tablespoon full of glucose

half a teaspoonful of cod liver oil.

pentavite vitamin drops may also be added. Feed the colestrum formula for the first week then 1 7e onto a proprietary milk powder such as denkavit. For the first week your lamb will need 3 feeds a day, One sixth of a litre at each feed. Second week 2 feeds a day of one quarter of a litre. 3-8 weeks, 2 feeds a day of one half a litre. Your lamb can go out daily but it will need shelter from the elements, fresh hay and water, with protection from predators such as foxes. If you want to keep your lamb inside disposable nappies size 0 are very useful! To feed your lamb for the first month a teat on a stubby beer bottle is effective. After this a larger beer bottle is more practical. It will be necessary to ring tails and testicals at weaning around 8 weeks of age. Your lamb may have a few problems. They may not tolerate the formula and this causes stomach discomfort. bloat, constipation or scours. Your lamb will lose interest in food and water. Seek urgent advice from your vet as lambs can deteriorate quickly if appropriate intervention

does not occur. 24hrs may be too long to wait. Your lamb

can rejoin the flock at 4 weeks of age so it can learn how

to be a sheep, socialise and eat grass.

ROTARY NEWS.

From the Rotary Club of Torrens Valley which meets each Wednesday evening at the Kersbrook Tavern. 7pm for 7.30 start. Visitors are welcome to join us in a counter meal (\$10.00) and fellowship, and to hear about Rotary projects. Rotary is open to both men and women nowadays. Contact; President Jim Dahl 2807284. Charles Moore, District Forester for Mount Crawford, addressed the club as guest speaker on Local Forestry at our May 18th meeting. All the forests in this area were"cut over" for pit props and to support the railways in the 1800s. Large stumps remain in places indicating trees much larger than the current scrub used to flourish here. Nowadays 40,000 cubic metres of softwood logs are harvested each year and, as more than that is added in growth and new plantings each year, this is a continuous resource of the 5000 hectares specifically allocated for timber production. Pinus Radiata is the only species planted on a broad scale. It was chosen after extensive trials involving native and exotic types. Some of these test plantations are still standing. There may still be commercial possibilities for other types, but the East Coast Forest trees generally need summer rain for good growth. Mount Crawford timber is used in building and for fruit boxes and pallets. Timber brings the State 1.6 million dollars a year. There are several separate areas ch constitute the 12.500 hectares of the Mount Crawford Forest Reserve. New plantings are on land from which the pevious pines have been harvested. None of the remnant native forest areas are logged, but are managed for recreation and research activities. The workforce is aout 30 people at Mount Crawdford, and with the sawmills at Williamstown, Kuitpo and Wingfield another 50 people, there are also about 8 contractors.


Charles showed slides of the plantations and logging operations, and gave members and guests a very interesting insight into the value of our local forests. Reminders.

Did You Know._some early history of One Tree Hill. One Tree Hill is situated in the hills and valleys of the Northern Mount Lofty Ranges, South East of Gawler. The natural vegetation comprises wattle, Tea Tree, gums, wild flowers and grasses. The first settlers, principally from Britain, arriving in the 1840s, cleared the land by pick and axe, developing the area into one of the best grazing belts in the state. Pasture improvements and the starting of farming with vineyards, orchards and wheat led to the evelopment of some large grazing properties like Yattalunga" and "Goulds Creek", "Goulds Creek was demolished in 1977 to make way for for the Little Para Reservoir) Today many of the farms are sub divided and a new and growing population is becoming established. On the old route (now Blacktop Rd) to the goldfields at the Barossa and Humbug Scrub Lady Alice Mine, a Mr. W.E.Loftes built an inn which which was first licensed in 1851. It was the first meeting place of the Munno Para East Council, Opposite the inn is the site of the the original

"One Tree" now surrounded by five gums planted to replace the original. Editors note_There seems to be several stories going around about the actual siter of the tree and what really happened to it. Some sources say it was burnt down, others that it was chopped down by mistake. Can any readers tell us the true story.
