News & views from your councillor

Dear Residents.

Welcome to the New Year. I hope 1994 brings you more of what you deserve.

Congratulations and thanks must go to all those CFS guys and girls who went, and assisted in the backup operations, to fight the NSW bushfires. A special thankyou to our own people - both the Munno Para Group and One Tree Hill personnel who risked their lives in the protection of others. It was a wonderful gesture and highlights the true blue dedication these people have to their own and the broader Australian community. I dips me lid to you.

Some other good news happening in our district the fence along the eastern side of McGilp Oval, along McGilp Road, has been completed and work has started on the upgrade and sealing of Potts and Craigmore roads. It should take about six weeks to complete both projects.

From pleasantries to gripes - not a very pleasant way to start my first message for the year - but it has to be said - the hopper is for the use of people living in the One Tree Hill Ward ONLY and is available for placing rubbish between 8:30 am and 3:30 pm on Saturdays between December and March. Some people have been abusing the system to the extent that Council has had to send a bobcat and truck on a number of occasions to clean up the mess left by some inconsiderate people. Council has also place an employee at the site to oversee the hopper operation. This is to ensure that only One Tree Hill Ward residents are using the service and that it is used properly. This practice will continue on an ad-hoc timetable. Obviously, this adds greatly to the cost of operating the FREE service to our area in the bushfire season. If we don't take some steps to remedy the unsatisfactory practice of a few, we could lose the facility altogether. Abuse it and we will lose it.

Therefore I ask all residents to

- be vigilant and
- make sure that you use the hopper ONLY between 8:30am and 3:30pm
- · place your rubbish in the hopper and
- try to keep the surrounding area as tidy as possible

I also notice that the graffiti artists are leaving their unwanted calling cards on buildings and signs in our town. Again, if you see anybody carrying out this antisocial practice, do something about it. I just wish the people who spray could be made to pay either in time cleaning the mess and repairing/replacing the damage caused or in a monetary sense. On another note, I would like to

thank one of our local people who took the time to clean the 'tags' off the Community notice board and the direction board outside the Institute. It is hard work and takes a lot of elbow grease to clean up somebody else's mess and that is exactly what it is a mess - nobody can tell me that these 'tags' are anything else. Let's keep our township clean and tidy.

The NAWRA landfill facility at Medlow Road is moving into its most important phase - that of getting a licence to operate. The four Councils also have to make a decision on providing the funds to construct and seal Medlow Road from Main North Road to Craigmore Road. It is planned, at this stage, to begin construction in April 1995 with completion in October 1995.

Have you heard of C.A.M.H.S.?

This is a service for parents, children and teenagers. Parents often feel the various demands of life competing for their time and energy. Children and teenagers experience demands from several areas including school, peer pressure, chores, discipline and learning new skills. From time to time these can contribute to make life hard work for children, teenagers and parents. Sometimes the way these demands combine can lead to a family finding it a struggle to cope.

There are occasions when traumas such as serious illness, loss, violence, or major changes in family relationships, may cause a parent of child to experience difficulties in managing all of the usual demands of life. Unlike adults, some children are often unable to describe what the problem is. They may not have the words to talk about it or they may not understand it themselves.

At these times some families may benefit from someone removed from the situation to help.

C.A.M.H.S. staff are highly trained, experienced and dedicated to helping families understand and deal with these difficulties.

Some common difficulties CAMHS can help with

- Difficulties with relationships in the home or at school
- Parenting issues related to Child/Adolescent behaviour
- Grief/Loss reactions
- Fears
- Temper tantrums
- Aggression
- Shy or withdrawn behaviour
- Effects of child abuse
- Emotionally related speech difficulties
- Stealing
- Sleeping difficulties
- Family Crisis

When and how to contact us

The first clue that a problem is developing may be some changes in the child's or teenager's behaviour. This might include sleeping difficulties, a loss of friends, difficulties at school, changes in the child's normal behaviour patterns.

It might be a good idea to contact a C.A.M.H.S. office and talk more about your concerns if -

- you have been worried for some time
- the problem happens often
- the situation worsens
- the problems are leading to a tense and unhappy home or school life

You do not need a referral for comunity services - just make contact with one of our staff at your nearest C.A.M.H.S. office.
