Did you know we have a famous celebrity in our midst? On whose picture has appeared all over the place, in the newspapers, magazines, and even stickers on the backs of cars. He is also a "hero" and has been selected for a special award. Unfortunately interviewing him might be a little difficult. His name is "Wellington" (no, not the boot variety) and he is a bloodhound owned by Marion and Tony Boocock. Wellington was recently selected for an award by the Foundation SA Dog Heroes Awards. There are only about ten bloodhounds in South Australia so the Red Cross felt very lucky to find such a perfect ambassador. Wellington willingly appears draped in ribbons and placards to encourage everyone to be a blood donor. His slogan is "we don't want to hound you but we need blood". Cute toy bloodhounds - Wellington's little helpers - have recently been on sale at a number of shell Shops at a cost of \$8.95 each. If you can't find one left, Shell say they'll give you a raincheck. Money from the sales will eventually go to help the Blood Bank.

DID YOU KNOW - some history of One Tree Hill

For many the history of One Tree Hill will start in the 1840s when the first British settlers arrived but have you ever thought what this area might have been like before this? Can you imagine the hills covered with trees? Huge Eucalypts once lined the creeks and rivers. Many had large hollows in the bases, so large that Aboriginal people sheltered in them. there used to be many examples of these trees along Goulds Creek but they were destroyed in 1977 when the Little Para Reservoir was built. Some of these trees grew to 30 metres in height. If you are lucky you may still have some of these trees on your property. For a list of some of the species of plants which are indigenous to this area I suggest you read the latest edition of the One Tree Hill Sketchbook by Steven Hill.

The Aboriginals who once lived in the Western half of One Tree Hill were members of the Kaurna Plains tribe. In the Eastern half lived the Peramangk tribe. They lived as hunter gatherers and if food was available they stayed in the one area for several months. Some of the food they ate included roots, ries, lizards and game such as kangaroo. In the winter the haurna people stayed down on the plains where it was warmer but in the summer they moved to the hills and ranges. In the summer they didn't wear much clothing but in the winter cloaks of possum fur were worn. The possum skins were sewn together using animal tendons and a sharpened kangaroo bone to make the holes. Camps were set up near permanent water holes. Information on their culture is very poor because they were decimated by the arrival of the Europeans who failed to value them. Disease and killings over land and property rights contributed to their disappearance.

For an idea on earlier attitudes to Aboriginal people have a look at one of the books in the Uleybury School Museum.

I've heard that one of the houses in One Tree hill is haunted by the ghost of an Aboriginal man as it was built on the site of a burial ground. Is this true? Please let's have the story.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR AUTUMN

Horses

There is a danger in many parts of One Tree Hill that overstocking of the paddocks is happening. This year this is especially bad because of the very dry conditions. When the feed runs out the horses are forced to eat the bottom of the grasses pulling out the roots and swallowing a lot of dirt at the same time. This dirt accumulates in the stomach causing blockages and colic. Troubles are not over when the rain starts because the animals eat the new shoots which pull easily out of the ground, and ingest the dirt as well. Pastures get very degraded, erosion occurs, and weeds get a chance to spread. To stop this situation, it is essential to:

- Not overstock paddocks. 1.
- 2. Rest paddocks to give them a chance to recover.
- Feed good quality feed all the year. This means good 3. quality hay is essential, preferably in big round bales so the horses always have something to pick at without picking up sand and dirt.

If you are new to OTH - or even not so new - you
may be wondering what the Association is and what it
does.

The Progress Association has been in existence for over 35 years and its basic aims are:

- To foster community spirit and promote the welfare of the One Tree Hill Community.
- To promote the expansion, improvement and maintenance of educational, sporting and other facilities for the benefit of the One Tree Hill community.
- To administer the One Tree Hill Hall.
- To stimulate and maintain an active interest in all district matters.
- To do such things as may be incidental to the attainment of such objects.

In short, the Progress Association exists to give residents and ratepayers a voice in the matters which concern them, and to given them an opportunity to take an active role in the local community.

We frequently raise matters of interest and concern with the Munno Para Council through our local Councillor. We also regularly represent the local community to the relevant bodies regarding such matters as planning, the environment, roads, etc.

Another role of the Association is publishing the monthly Grapevine, which enables residents to keep in touch with happenings in the district.

The Craft Shop is run by a committee of the Association and is a valuable meeting place as well as an outlet for local crafts and produce.

Groups which use the Hall for their weekly activities range from Playgroups to the Senior Citizens' Club.

The Hall is also available for hire for functions such as wedding receptions, birthday celebrations, etc.

Meetings of the Association are open to all residents and ratepayers and are held on the third Thursday of each month at 8pm in the One Tree Hill Institute. The Association also arranges or supports events such as Community Markets which enable people to meet informally while buying and selling the products on offer.

A Memorial Park has been established with plantings occurring in May/June of each year.

Look for the signs at both ends of the township. All meetings end with tea/coffee and biscuits to give everyone the opportunity to get to know each other.

Formal membership is open to all residents and ratepayers who have agreed to accept the aims of the Progress Association stated above, and paid the prescribed fee. Members over the age of 18 years have a formal vote at general meetings.

NEWS AND VIEWS FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR

Dear Residents,

Council, at its meeting on April 19, passed its 1994-95 Business Plan. There are many key aspects in the plan, such as:

Reductions in both the deficit and long term debt: contributions towards a community facility in Angle Vale and the upgrade of assets at Virginia to establish a Produce Fair; allocation of \$300,000 towards upgrading community facilities. On the down side: \$105,000 reduction in rate income based partly on the new rating system being introduced in the urban areas; 33% increase in garbage collections costs reflecting an increase in volumes and, in real terms (not paper talk) a reduction in funds available for allocation to the road construction program.

Whilst the overall Business Plan, as approved, is an interesting document and has a number of things going for it, I couldn't support it on the basis that there is only \$200,000 in unallocated road construction funds. In other words, if we are lucky, 2 km of roads (other than Curtis Road extension along with the commencement of Medlow Road construction, both of which are mainly funded by other than Council resources; and other already allocated road funds to Virginia area) will be constructed and sealed throughout the City next financial year.

This Plan will form the basis for the budget and even though we have presented Council with petitions, letters and made phone calls, it appears now as if they have another agenda for road construction. What concerns me is that Council appears to be taking an engineering consultants recommendations literally in that unsealed roads that don't have more than one person/kilometre living along it or 150 vehicles/day passing over it might never be sealed. My fear is that Council will get locked into this scenario and overlook ratepayers requests for sealing of roads based on health, welfare and safety issues. I am angry at the way Council is treating us and I will make my feelings known throughout the rest of the Budget debate - IF THERE IS ANY!!

On a more sombre note, there is some good news in that there is a proposal to restore (possibly) the five cemeteries in Council's area. This could be done under the Landcare Environment Action Program at very little cost to Council and we will know the outcome soon.

And a final note - REMEMBER THE HOPPER WILL BE AT ONE TREE HILL ON SATURDAY MAY 7 BETWEEN 8.30AM AND 3.30PM AND THEN ON THE FIRST SATURDAY OF EACH MONTH THROUGH UNTIL NOVEMBER.
