NEWS AND VIEWS FROM YOUR COUNCILLOR

Dear Residents.

Well, 12 weeks 'til Christmas and another year comes to a close. Where does the time go???

I thought that I would like to bring you up-to-date on happenings around our district:

- earthwork is continuing on Grandview Drive reserve, further drainage installation should take place soon, levelling of the first stage for a playground area is proposed and an order has been placed with the E&WS for a water point which will help residents to look after the trees more easily and other shrubs and trees have been planted to replace those that died;
- work is ongoing on Springvale Heights reserve and the installation of a park bench, bins and other facilities has been arranged and an order has been placed on ETSA to install a light at the playground;
- the old pine tree at the back of our Institute has been removed and the gum tree overhanging the toilet block has been trimmed, the pavers have been relocated to the playgroup area and a table and chairs (per kind donation of the Torrens Valley Rotary club) will be installed soon, a pergola is also planned for this area and when it is finished it'll be very nice for the parents and others who may wish to sit in the playground to be with their children.

The Council is considering a new storeroom at the back of the Institute to assist the Senior Citizens, the Playgroup and other groups who use the Institute to store their equipment.

I met with representatives from the McGilp Oval Committee, Cricket Club, Tennis Club and the Boy Scout Group to discuss their requirements for a new toilet and shower block at the Oval. We came to an amicable agreement and I have submitted a 'rough' design to Council for costing and further design. I am hopeful that the extensions to the present clubrooms will proceed as soon as the Council and the group have agreed on the final design.

NAWMA's Landfill Facility Management Plan is now complete and will be forwarded to the Environmental Protection Authority for a licence to be issued to NAWMA to operate the site. However, it will be at least two years before any waste will go to the site. The Committee involved in developing this plan has had some long and hard decisions to make over the past two years. I would like to thank all involved for their assistance in making the Landfill Facility Management Plan a very professional document to ensure that the operations at the site conform with the letter-of-the-law and protect the people who live closest to it, the ecology and the wider environment.

REMEMBER THE HOPPER WILL BE ON SITE SATURDAY OCTOBER 1 AND THE CFS WILL LOOK AFTER YOU BETWEEN 8.30am AND 3.30pm.

Bring all of your waste materials, clean green waste and if you have clean newspaper, I have arranged for a hopper to

be on site to take this as well. BUT I MUST STRESS IT IS FOR CLEAN NEWSPAPER ONLY. The reason we are able to supply this extra hopper is that NAWMA has negotiated a viable contract to have all CLEAN and I stress clean newspaper recycled through a de-inking plant in Albury, NSW.

POLICE BAND CONCERT

The One Tree Hill Rural Watch and the Country Fire Service has combined to bring the world-wide recognised Band of the South Australia Police.

In 1884 a volunteer group of metropolitan foot police formed the band of the South Australia Police, being the first police band in Australia. Its members were given a bonus of sixpence a day and allowed four hours practice a week. Established as a brass band, it quickly became very popular in Adelaide. In 1958, the Band was made a full time unit and in 1974 added woodwind instrumentation to its original brass sound. The Band's outstanding performances at the Royal Tournament and the Edinburgh Tattoo in 1990 have given it worldwide recognition. It has also created greater demand for their services in South Australia where the Band seeks to perform for all groups in the community. The Band averages 250 performances annually, providing entertainment and pleasure for thousands of South Australians.



DID YOU KNOW? Some early history of One Tree Hill

In 1841 gold was discovered by George Goddard, a government mining authority, in the Humbug Scrub area. This started a gold rush and One Tree Hill became a busy place. A township was developed by the Lady Alice mine with about 500 inhabitants. The remains of their buildings are still there but it is a dangerous place to visit as there are still many old mine shafts there. Some of the mine shafts are on private land while some are in the Para Wirra Park. In 1879 the gold was mostly mined out.

When the mine was active, Cobb and Co used to run a coach service from Adelaide through to the Goldfield. The property known as "Milton Bank" was a stopover for them. In the 1870s a large boiler destined for the mine was pulled from Port Adelaide by a team of bullocks. It has been said that over 100 bullocks were used to pull it, and it took about 6 weeks.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR OCTOBER

With the onset of warm weather, so the onset of the flea breeding season! If you have noticed your pet scratching lately, you may have a flea problem. Other tell-tale signs are fleas found directly on the animal or flea "dirt" on their skin.

Some points to consider:

Fleas are prolific breeders, with eggs that hatch every 10-14 days. For every adult flea there are at least 20 infants on the way. Fleas, their eggs, and larvae can live in your pets bedding, in chairs, carpets, curtains, gardens and wooden kennels. In fact, anywhere your pet visits! Fleas are tough. You need a consistent and persistent treatment strategy to win the battle. There are several approaches and a myriad of products to choose from ranging from shampoos, rinses, sprays, spot ons and oral preparations. Your vet can help you make the right choice. But remember, the golden rules are: treat all animals at once and include the animals' environment such as bedding, etc. One treatment or a single product is probably not enough. Repetitions are necessary throughout the flea breeding season and beyond if you want to be successful.

GARDENERS' CORNER

Spring is here, and with it the arrival of pests in the garden. We should all be concerned with the amount of chemicals being used to control garden pests. So to follow are a few organic remedies:

To control aphids, white cabbage butterfly, white fly, caterpillars: In a large metal container place one third of tansy, one third of roman wormwood (or southern wood), one third garlic leaves or rhubarb leaves. Top up container with water and bring to the boil. Allow to cool down and strain. Use at full strength.

To control red legged earth mites, red spider mites, ants and lawn beetles: Use the leaves of the white cedar tree (melia Azedarach), leaves only not the berries. Fill one third of a container with leaves, top up with water, bring to boil, strain. Use at full strength. This one is also good for cherry slugs.


October 30 will be the North East Riding Club Gymkhana at the Salisbury Riding Club Grounds. Hacking, novelty events and jumping.

MEET OUR COMMUNITY - Martin Lindsell

Martin was born in Ilford, Essex, in England, migrating to Australia with his parents and two brothers in 1951 at the age of eight. After two months in Bonnigilla Migrant Hostel in Victoria they moved to the Woolsheds at Rosewater. Martin remembers the chicken wire and tar paper rooms and the rats! They stayed there 18 months before moving to Clearview where Martin attended Northfield Primary and Enfield High school. He left school at 15 having been offered a job as Assistant Photographer with the English Electric Company at the former W.R.E. It was around this time that Martin first came to One Tree Hill because he used to come here on his motor bike and play cricket. The roads were all dirt in those days and he still remembers the corrugations on Snake Gully!

Martin joined the Air Force in 1962 still doing photography. While based at Woomera he met his wife, Bev, at a Youth Club Dance although it took a bit longer for romance to blossom. Martin was still having road problems hitting everything from sheep to fallen trees, even rolling his car on Uley Road! When finally he was posted to Queensland, Bev agreed to marry him. They had their reception at the Institute in One Tree Hill.

Martin left the Air Force in 1968, and the family returned to SA. Son, Aaron, was born in 1971 and son, Justin, in 1974. Martin worked for the Highways Dept. After a time in Port Lincoln in 1975 running his own photography business, the family returned to Adelaide and Martin began work with the EWS. They bought a block of land at One Tree Hill and eventually moved to the Uleybury School Museum House for 6 months while their house was being built.

In 1985, Martin was actively involved in saving the red gums on Kersbrook Road from being cut by ETSA. This led to him joining the Council in 1985. Martin was also involved in the Agricultural Bureau, Uleybury School Museum, Craigmore High School, One Tree Hill School, CFS, Progress, Cricket - you name it, Martin seems to have been there and still is very involved in many community activities.
