CFS NOVEMBER NOTES:

With the early invocation of the fire season in response to the dry conditions the CFS conducted a small number of burnoffs to alleviate possible threats to property. A look at the incident book shows the season has begun in earnest. In the 40 callouts this year (from July 1st) the incident book shows a couple of animal rescues (reluctant cats) a number of vehicle accidents, grass fires in Evanston Park and Rifle Range road, a number of fires attributed to lightening strikes and a plethora of small events, a number of which could reasonably be considered malicious. We are all to be vigilant, understanding the risk posed by fire to our various properties and the risk we pose to our neighbors as a fire source. I would ask that every one also be aware of the risk posed to the district from the malicious setting of fires and note anything suspicious. The police are again focusing on this activity.

The hopper continues to be well supported. The regulars know to bring a book or the paper to while away their time in queue. It is a great opportunity to chat with those nodding acquaintances and catch up with the vibrations in the vine.

CFS NEWS

The One Tree Hill Brigade has been reasonably busy already with calls to grass and bush fires. With the hotter and dryer than average summer expected make sure your properties are cleared and access is available for fire appliances if required. For the One Tree Hill 34 appliance to gain access to a driveway, a space of approximately 3m x 3m is required, plus a larger turning area. Please keep your rural watch skills up and report any suspicious vehicles or persons to Police. Please contact the Brigade if you require information to be sent to you regarding protecting your family and properties from fires. The "Wildfire - Your Survival Guide - Plan Now to Stay or Go" and other CFS publications are

also available to download at the following web site www.cfs.org.au".

Activities: Members of our Brigade have recently attended the Region 2 Field Day held in Paskeville. They were given six tasks to complete during the day which included fire investigation, rural shed fire, car fire and pump drill exercises.

Hopper: The Brigade continues to monitor the hopper bin which is available for One Tree Hill residents only on the second Saturday of each month between approximately 8.30am-2.30pm. Bins are available for metal and paper recycling as well as general rubbish bins. Items that cannot be dumped are tyres, liquids such as paint or chemicals, and large amounts of bricks/rubble.

Bottles: The Brigade collects and sorts refundable bottles and cans for fund raising. Please leave these items behind the main station on the concrete next to the smaller shed named "Mick's Office".

The brigade can be contacted by phone (numbers listed at bottom of front page) or by email at others@chariot.net.au. Please note the 8280 7000 fire phone system is no longer in use. The number to call for emergencies of any kind is 000 when you will be asked to request Police, Fire or Ambulance. If you report an incident for CFS attendance in the One Tree Hill area, our Brigade is responded by pager.

It has been a bad year for many with the onslaught of the drought and as we all sit down to our Christmas dinners wherever we are may we see family values and love and joy prevail before we get back to the doldrums of every day living.

For all of you who need a break from our hectic lives our Sanctuary is the place to help people unwind and temporarily come closer to our inner selves and the natural environment. Many of us live in a concrete jungle and forget there is so much beauty in natural things. We strive at the Scrub to protect what God created.

I write this in my capacity as a resident in this area.

There appeared in the November grapevine under the heading of Playford Council News information on the reclassification of "Community Land" in the council area. One of the land items in question is the One Tree Hill CFS shed. The back ground of this action is directly linked to the transfer of Council assets to the State Government under the Emergency Services Provisions. The Council are attempting to recover their investment in the real estate and plant and in doing so stand to jeopardize the function of the One Tree Hill CFS. Ask yourselves what will happen if the CFS shed (purpose built) was sold. Relocation of the facility could impact on response times, would have a detrimental effect on the group of dedicated volunteers that serve your community unpaid 24 hours a day 7 days a week and at the far end of the scale could cost a life. I venture to suggest that the council is loosing sight of the service provided in an attempt at short term financial gain. Yes, they feel aggrieved at the loss of their investment and are attempting to do the best for the ratepayers in general however they stand to lose more in their power plays than they stand to gain. I would urge all the constituents in the rural wards and those in the hills face suburbs to contact your councilor and express your views. Let them know what the sight of a white truck and yellow overalls means to this community and persuade them to rethink the inclusion of the CFS shed in their land plans.



PLANT AND ANIMAL CONTROL OR NON-CONTROL

Now that most of our annual weeds are reaching maturity and have set seeds for next years outbreak, the Adelaide Plains Animal and Plant Control board have again come out of hibernation to let us know they are still in existence(see November Grapevine), and are being paid roughly \$42,000 each year by Playford Council as well as a similar figure by the State Animal and Plant Control Commission, to do what?

Firstly the Board does NOT control or eliminate any weeds, but to use their own phraseology they "encourage property owners to be active in identifying weeds on their property" etc. We are then told of the impact of weeds "smothering native vegetation, decreasing the value of the property, decreasing yields and the poisoning of stock or loss of condition" etc.

We then read as new list of proclaimed weeds, most of which would not be recognised by even long term rural residents. Does the Board provide illustrations of these weeds, advise what time of year they are rampant or when effective control measures should be undertaken? The answer is NO. Unless we initiate enquiries, and then a qualified officer will gladly travel from Two Wells to One Tree Hill to identify your weed problems and probably recommend a contractor to eradicate the horrid weed(at considerable expense).

The professional staff of the Board have sought for well over a year to remove one of our most wide spread perennial weeds, wild artichoke, from the list of proclaimed weeds which must be controlled, and prevented from spreading. They have also sought to downgrade two other widespread weeds of serious concern to rural

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landowners, namely Horehound and varigated thistle.

The abiity to remove artichoke from the proclaimed list was, I understand, denied by the Animal and Plant Control Commission, however there are always different ways of "killing a cat" if you are smart. How?Remove any funding for the policing of weeds in question from the Boards Budget.

If you suffer from invasion of these proclaimed weeds from neighbouring properties(Artichoke and varigated thistle can travel in excess of two kilometres) don't blame your Council representative on the Board. They have been fed erroneous and misleading information by the paid staff leading to some disastrous decisions of recent times. Strangely one of the two Playford delegates on the Board, a council employee, has been a prime mover in attempting to remove Artichoke from the proclaimed list and also seconded a motion to remove funding for policing of regulations. I believe he has been "conned".

In conclusion I add that I have twice been threatened with legal action in relation to my criticism of the Board's lack of performance. How long, Madam Mayor, CEO Tim Jackson and Councillors, do we have to finance a non-performing bureaucratic hole in our pockets?

Please don't tell us that the matter of the future of Weeds Boards is under review, with the Government contemplating a merger of Weeds Boards, Soils Boards and Water catchment Boards.

The rural community want effective control and policing of proclaimed weeds NOW, not as a recent Board decision proposed "to be reviewed in five years time"

Tzatziki

(Makes around 750 grams)

500gram container Greek style yoghurt

1 large continental cucumber

4 cloves of garlic

GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER PUMPKINS ON PARADE

Seedlings are still available!

Seedlings should be grown in hills which are shallow depressions in the soil(Surely that's a valley!Ed) Pumpkins require a well dug, well drained soil that is moderately rich in nutrients. Over rich soil will encourage foliage growth and lessen the size of the vegetable. Keep the weeds down and water well during the early periods of growth, gradually reducing the amount of water as the pumpkin begins to ripen. Pinching out the ends of the trailers will encourage the setting of the fruit.

The pumpkin beetle may attack and needs to be eradicated. Powdery mildew can also be a problem. Fertilise with phostagen. FRESH CUT CHRISTMAS TREES WILL BE AVAILABLE FROM THE GARDEN CENTRE EARLY IN DECEMBER. A VERY MERRY CHRISTMAS TO ALL OUR CUSTOMERS! Happy Gardening!

VETERINARY NOTES FOR DECEMBER

Elongated soft palate.

The soft palate is a flap of skin, which extends from the back of the roof of the mouth to cover the opening of the airway(epiglottis) during swallowing. Short faced breeds of dogs such as pugs, pekinese, shih-tzu etc. tend to have a relatively long palate. This can partially cover the epiglottis at times other than swallowing, interfering with breathing and triggering coughing episodes. In severe cases, the soft palate may be sucked onto the epiglottis, completely obstructing the airway, only releasing when the dog loses consciousness. Episodes are usually triggered by exercise or excitement. These dogs commonly snore when sleeping. Conditions which cause swelling in the throat such as infection can also make the condition worsen. Treatment is usually undertaken for more severe cases, and involves surgical shortening of the soft palate.

PLANT & ANIMAL CONTROL THORNY PROBLEM

Burry weeds such as caltrop, three corner jack and khaki weed are quite a problem in the Gawler and Playford areas. Khaki weed is restricted to some caravan parks and reserves where it has been spread from interstate vehicles. Caltrop and three-corner jack are becoming widespread despite ongoing efforts by councils to remove the weed from footpaths, parks and sports fields. They produce many spiny burrs and can cause injury to feet and are a hazard to people using parks and playing fields during the summer months. The best method of controlling these plants in the community is to stop them from seeding. This can be done by digging the plant out or spraying it before burrs form. To help people identify these weeds a colour pamphlet is available. Copies of the pamphlet and more information about these burry weeds can be obtained from the Adelaide Plains Animal and Plant Control Board on 08) 85203282. Alan Arbon J
