PLAYFORD COUNCIL NEWS

EXCLUSION OF COMMUNITY LAND

Playford Council are in the process of reducing the amount of "Community Land" in the Council Area. When Community Land has been revoked from that classification, the Council can then sell it, lease it, or develop it without Community Consultation. This month, Playford Council will move to revoke the community land classification of 42 properties. Many of these properties are reserves, and include four properties in the One Tree Hill Area. These properties are listed below with the reason(s) for revoking their classification as Community Land.

1. One Tree Hill CFS Station: (a)Not available to the public without a fee or membership (b)Land is required for Council operational purposes
- 2.Uleybury School Museum: (a)Not available to the public without a fee or membership (b)Land is required for Council operational purposes
- 3.Uleybury Cemetery:(a) There are future plans in place to change the use of the land. (b)Land is required for Council operational purposes
4. Craigmores Road Land, Uleybury (9400 sq metres): The land is in an area sufficiently well equipped with open space and/or appears to

be surplus to Community requirements.

When Council have voted to revoke this land from its classification as Community Land, a public notice will be given to allow for Community comment and objections, then Council will be free to dispose of the land as they see fit.

NEWS FROM HUMBUG SCRUB WILDLIFE SANCTUARY.

Greetings again from our little neck of the woods. We often ask ourselves why the days are not longer and we are not super people who can at least be able to concentrate on one job at a time. Time gets away from us.

But we managed a milestone this week when we finally moved some of our Tamar wallabies to their paddocks up the hill, so now they can keep our forebear Tom Paine Belchambers company as he is buried on the hill near them. Tom is classified on Graham Junay's internet site under Lonely Graves of South Australia.

We had many families visit us over the last School Holidays and they loved interacting with our animals and birds, both wild and tame.

On a percentage our visitors can be classified as 50 per cent being regular visitors and 50 per cent being new comers who say they will come again and tell their friends about the place. We are pleased with that as word of mouth can be a powerful tool.

Just a reminder. Our opening times are weekdays from around 1.32p.m. to 4.p.m and Saturday 11a.m. to 5.p.m. and Sundays 10.30 a.m. to around 5 p.m.

Just follow our signs from Para Wirra Park Main gates on dirt road about 3 kilometres and look for our Sanctuary Open sign.

I am in the throes of retyping Tom Paine Belchambers old stories and thought I would add the one below this time. Tom upon arrival from England in 1876 found work on Hindmarsh Island and became a friend and advocate for the Hindmarsh Island aboriginal tribes. He could read and write and wrote many articles of his adventures. We have a small collection of aboriginal photos in our cottage display at Humbug Scrub. Tom became a lifelong friend to many members of this tribe and talked about the atrocities of white man against a gentle people.

Tom's era was one of the times when people worked six days a week and were supposed to have a rest on the Sunday. Tom tells of his work and how the boss expected him also to work on Sunday. Remembering this was in 1876. Have things really changed.

Hope you enjoy the story.

"EAT A PENNY"

Soon after my arrival I met one of Mr. Price's daughters, Llama, and she was the first person to show a sympathetic interest in me, a stranger amongst strangers, and her personality naturally impressed itself on my memory. The first kindly word of sympathy amid the sordid and uncongenial surroundings, it was like dew from heaven. Later on, I became acquainted with Mr. Price (of Shorthorn fame) and found him a pleasant and kindly man. He, it was who introduced hares to the Island. Later I was engaged as shepherd by an old gentleman whom the neighbours designated "Eat-a-Penny".

Getting across to the place on the Monday, I was set to work ploughing, in company with one of the Tremaines, a very decent fellow. When Sunday came around I had a tiff with the boss, as our ideas of a fair thing were in variance.

I reckoned if I ploughed on weekdays, Sunday was for rest, but his idea was to plough six days, and shepherd on Sundays. He also had an idea that the working day ended at 10 p.m., but my idea was that sundown was the limit for the wages (from 10/- to 15/- a week).

Sunday was the only day on which I had a chance of studying the flora and fauna of the Island.

Game was very plentiful. Large numbers of curlews, or stone plovers, found shelter amongst the sheoak. Early one morning I came face to face with the last surviving kangaroo. We were both surprised, and stood staring at each other for a time. The poor lonely beast was protected by the Islanders, but on the arrival of a new Manager for Grundy's Estate, it was shot.

One day my mate and I, going further afield than usual, came across a heavy belt of ti-tree fringed by a narrow swamp. This we crossed, and found ourselves in the midst of a Nankeen Heronry. The birds circling up into the blue sky in hundreds, and many trees containing four or five nests. Further in were native platforms of the dead, where the mummified bodies of the blacks were laid to rest under the leafy canopy of the ti-tree, with the herons for neighbours, and the murmur of the ocean for a requiem.

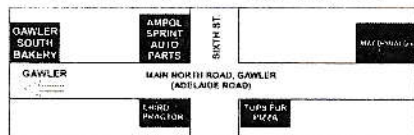

PUMPKINS ON PARADE

A grower in Port Lincoln with the same type of pumpkin grew one which weighed in at 350 kilos!! The secret is lots of mulch and fertilise fortnightly.

Garden tips:-

A long hot summer and water shortage -what better reason do we need to grow native plants. They have smaller leaves and so need less water and don't suffer from leaf burn. Some good ones are Grevillea, thryptomene, westringia, kjunzea, bottle brush, agonis and lots more. Please mulch to save water.

VETERINARY NOTES FOR NOVEMBER

Ringworm.

Ringworm is the common name for fungal skin conditions caused by *Microsporum* and *Trichophyton* fungi. These fungi can cause patches of hair loss, usually bald circular areas sometimes with flaking or crusting and occasionally secondary infection. The infected hairs break off close to the skin. Fungal spores on these hairs can survive for over 12 months both in the environment, and on carrier animals which may have no clinical signs. Generally young animals are more susceptible than adults.

Diagnosis may be made with an ultra violet light called a "Woods lamp" in the case of *Microsporum canis* which glows with a blue-green fluorescence. Other *Microsporum* and *Trichophyton* will not show up with a Woods Lamp and in these cases, hair samples can be stained and examined microscopically for fungi, or fungal cultures can be undertaken.

Treatment may involve topical anti fungal treatments such as creams or ointments and shampoos to help reduce skin contamination and will resolve smaller areas. To treat more generalised cases, Griseofulvin tablets will be given orally for six weeks. Removal of contaminated hairs from the animals' environment with procedures such as vacuuming and anti fungal sprays, are an important part of controlling an outbreak.

It is important to note that ringworm is a zoonotic condition, which means that it is transferable from animal to human and vice versa, therefore it is vital that veterinary treatment is sought if your pet is showing symptoms in order to prevent infection of family members and other pets.

TREES FOR LIFE.

Small shrubs especially prickly ones, offer valuable habitat for small birds. As an example, the Superb Blue Wren requires a thicket of something prickly in its home range for safe roosting and refuge. These birds spend a large part of each day of their lives eating insects, and so can help check the insect population on all plants in a revegetated area. Thicket can be provided by a variety of *Acacia* and *Hakea* species. *Acacia Paradoxia* is a prickly but useful plant for small birds and it is important to provide understorey as well as growing large trees.

LOCAL HISTORY

The area of Sampson Flat in One Tree Hill was most likely to have
 been named after the Sampson family who were early settlers in the
 district. John Sampson migrated with his wife, three sons and two
 daughters from Cornwall, England, to South Australia in 1849.
 Initially the family traveled to the Burra District where John worked
 in the copper mines. After two years the family moved to One Tree
 Hill where John purchased land from the government and began
 farming. He called his property 'Precolumb Farm'. Late in 1851,
 John and one of his sons followed the gold rush to the Victorian
 goldfields and were quite successful. After four months they
 returned to their home in One Tree Hill. James, John's third son
 married Emeline, the daughter of Samuel Crittenden of Smithfield.
 John sold one acre of the 'Precolumb Farm' in the northeast corner
 for five pounds and the community built a school there in 1855.
 This school was closed in 1938 and we still have residents in our
 community who attended this school.

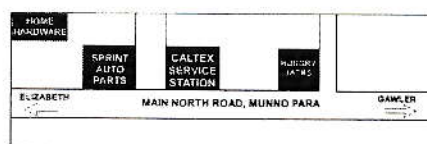

PREVENTING DOG ATTACKS.FROM THE RSPCA NEWSLETTER APRIL 2002.

Dogs make wonderful companions. In South Australia authorities
believe that there are around 320,000 dogs, most living in harmony
with their owners and other companion animals. Unfortunately dog
attacks do occur and medical reports show that each year
approximately 6,500 dog attacks require some sort of medical
treatment. In addition to these attacks there would be many more
minor attacks which go unreported.

Many people are also bitten when they try to stop fighting dogs.
Sometimes they even get bitten by their own dog! Make sure your
dog is always on a lead when out in the street but should a dog
wander up and attack your dog, yell for help and try and get a
bucket of water to throw over the dogs or a running hose to disrupt

PLANT & ANIMAL CONTROL

The Adelaide Plains Animal & Plant Control Board targets certain plants and animals, proclaimed by the government, which have the potential to cause disastrous effects particularly in the rural areas, but also on urban properties in the region.

Authorised officers of the Board encourage property owners to be active in identifying weeds on their property, to understand the potential impact of pest plants and animals, and to determine and act upon the best control measures for each situation.

Spread of proclaimed plants into agricultural areas and other rural regions causes problems such as; smothering native vegetation, decreasing the value of the property, decreasing yields by competition and contamination, and hindering harvest operations. Also, if the plants are poisonous and/or unpalatable there may be a loss of stock or a loss of stock condition.

Now is the time to identify and control the establishing proclaimed plants; African boxthorn, boneseed, Cape tulip, Calomba daisy, variegated thistle, hoary cress, creeping knapweed and cut-leaf mignonette.

It is important to control these weeds when they are young, or before they have set seed, this approach achieves a more successful control program by preventing further spread of weed seeds. Some weeds re-appear in the same season or again in the following season, it is difficult to eradicate a weed infestation because the seeds from any uncontrolled plants lie dormant in the soil. Weed seeds will wait until suitable conditions arise before they germinate. Control measures must be applied once again in this situation.

It is therefore important to establish a long-term integrated control strategy aiming to decrease the size of the infestation each season.

It is up to everyone in the community to be a responsible property owner, caring for the sustainability of our environment and creating beneficial land usage. In taking action controlling pest animals and plants, the efforts will give many rewards and a community effort will ensure more effective control.

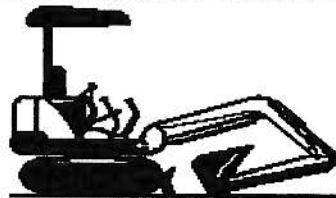
